For Cactus Farms

Big Bud Arrives

A very unusual, but very interesting sight to area residents Wednesday of last week was the huge, which is not an adequate adjective for the 'giant' tractors that came through Knox City en route to the former McFaddin Ranch west of Benjamin and Knox City, now owned by Cactus Farms of Dumas.

Charles Durham, farm operations manager of Knox City, said they had been interested for some time in acquiring a big tractor capable of turning out the work needed in both less time and expense. Last September, the Big Bud Company in Havre, Montana, flew Durham, along with two men from Abilene and one from Stamford, there for three days to see their product. Two days were spent visiting farmers in the large wheat area and talking to them about their operations with the large tractors and plows. Durham said the company does not manufacture the individual parts, but instead takes the best parts available from other companies and puts them together to produce the large Big Buds. He explained that a Detroit diesel engine along with a twin disc transmission used and the tilt steering wheel is an '81 Chevrolet steering wheel. In fact, he said he could buy any part needed in Abilene as many of the parts are stocked there for oil drilling rigs.

The two 650 horsepower tractors, two 55 ft. offset Big G disc plows, and two 80 ft. Friggstad chisel plows were purchased from B&C Farm Supply in Abilene and represented a three-quarter million dollar transaction. According to KRBC-TV farm editor Harry Holt, it was the largest farm transaction ever handled in Abilene.

Cactus Farms has 15,000 acres in cultivation with 13,000 of these in wheat with the balance in haygrazer.

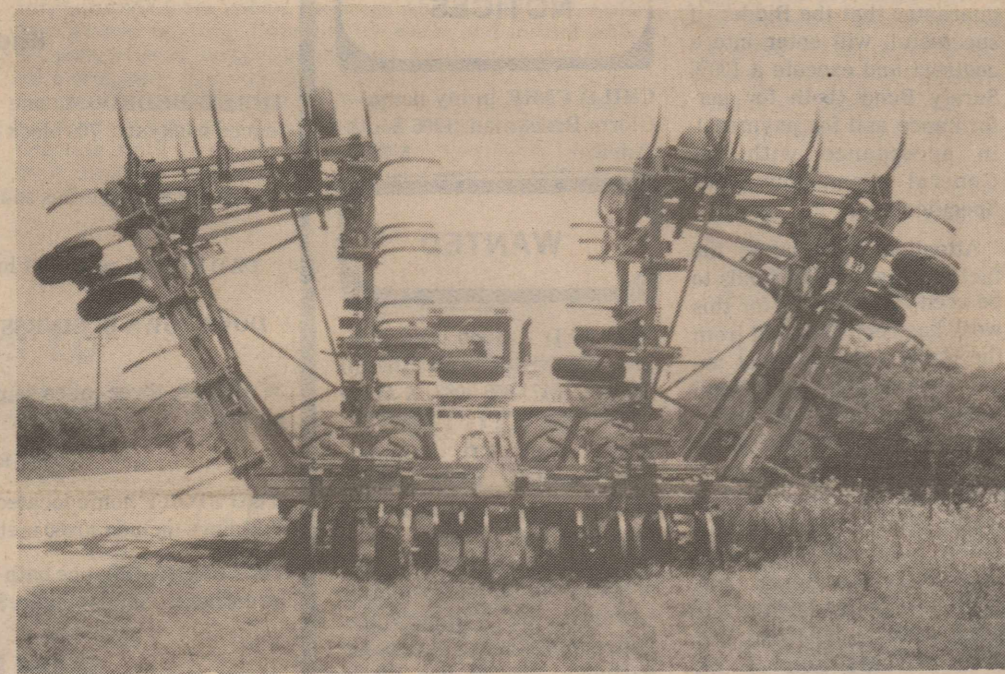
Durham said that one of the Big Buds could do as much as three tractors had been doing and burned only half as many gallons of diesel, which will amount to quite a savings over a period of time in this type of operation. On the chisel plows, each shank has its own spring and trips automatically when it strikes on object, such as a stump.

Durham said that when wheat sowing time rolls around again about September 1, he plans to use eight 10 ft. drills right behind the chisel plow.

He is thoroughly convinced that the giant tractors will serve the purpose intended. He said that clean-up operations at headquarters on U.S. 82 west of Benjamin were going very well, but that a lot of work was ahead of them on State 222 between Knox City and the Ranch House at the intersection Highways of 222 and 82.

Knox City senior trackster Rickey Gonzales has leaped his way to the state track meet set for May 15-16 in Austin. Gonzales qualified for the elite state meet by winning first place in the long jump with a 22-3½ leap at the Region II-A meet held last week at McMurry College in Abilene.

In overall team totals, the Hounds finished fourth in the regional meet with 30 points. Miles took top honors with 65 points edging out Rule by one point who finished with 64. Gorman placed third with 34 points.

The 440 relay team of Glen Hedgecoke, Chuck Hutchinson, Rance Hacker and Rickey Gonzales placed third with a time of 44.88.

Rance Hacker was fifth and David Flores placed sixth in the 120 yard hurdles. Their respective times were 16.42 and 16.60. Also placing for KC was Dwayne Watkins who finished sixth in the high jump with a 6-2.

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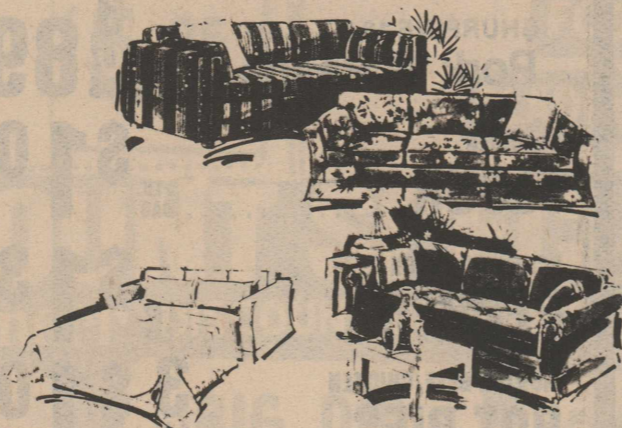

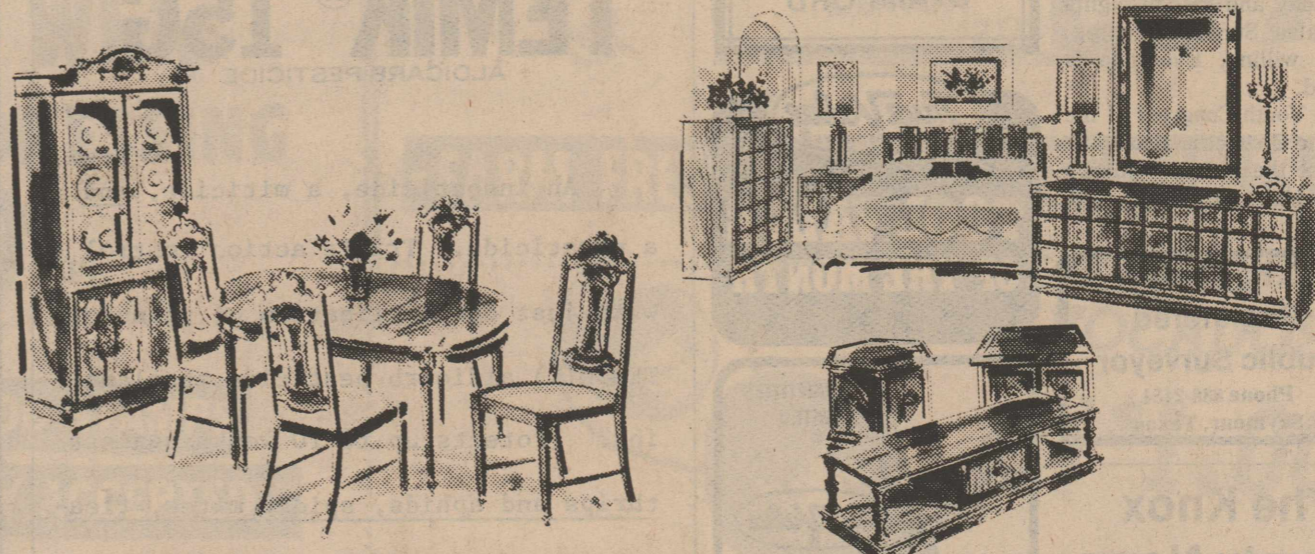

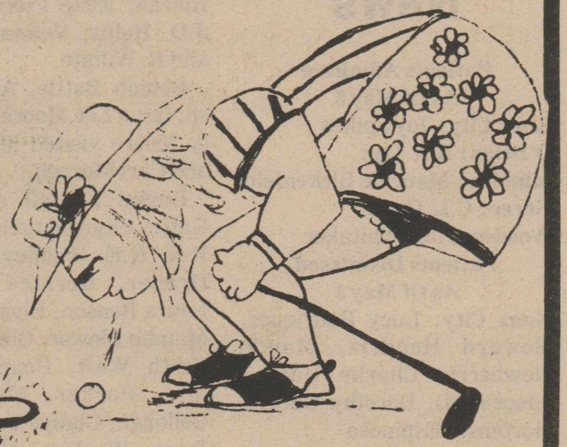

Highlights Given On PCA Meeting

Stockholders, friends and employees of Rolling Plains Production Credit Association met Friday, May 1, in Childress and Saturday, May 2, in Stamford for their 47th Annual Stockholders Meeting.

Highlights of the business session of the meeting included the election of two directors. B.H. DeBusk of Anson and W.J. Boykin of Northfield were re-elected for three-year terms. Other PCA directors are Willard H. (Snooks) Williams of Spur, Dan Henard Jr. of Wellington, and Garon B. Tidwell of Munday.

James A. Rogers, senior vice president of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank in Houston, attended both sessions of the meeting and brought greetings from the FICB. He reassured the stockholders that the FICB was "gearing up" for the future and will be prepared to meet the agricultural credit needs of tomorrow. He discussed what these needs might be which included more long-term financing, on-farm computers, and the financing of a marketing program for farmers as they move further up the ladder in marketing their commodities.

Garon B. Tidwell, director from Munday, gave the report from the board. Tidwell stated that the drought of 1980 had initiated a review of the Association's credit policy and lending philosophy. He also reported that Rolling Plains PCA equals or exceeds the generally accepted standards in areas such as financial, credit, operations, personnel, member and public relations and business development.

R.C. Cobb, president of the association, reported to the stockholders that a significant drop in interest rates could not be foreseen for this year; however, the association is charging only 1/2 of 1% above its cost. Cobb recently testified before a House Subcommittee on cotton and he informed the stockholders that he had shared with the members of the subcommittee the concern that the farmers' operating costs keep increasing without corresponding increases in commodity prices.

After discussing high interest rates and low commodity prices, JoVan Sears from Houston created a welcomed outburst of

laughter. Her witty, humorous presentation kept the room shaking and the tears rolling. Everyone who heard her will agree, that "city" girl really knew how to entertain those "country" folk.

Five men were elected to serve on the 1982 nominating committee and included M.C. Jones, Matador office; Claude Andrews, Childress office; Jimmy Perryman, Spur office; James Smith, Munday office; and Lynn White, Stamford office.

FLUFFY CHEESECAKE
(Makes 12 servings)

2 tablespoons (2 envelopes) unflavored gelatin
1 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 egg yolks
1 1/2 cups liquid CARNATION® Instant Nonfat Milk

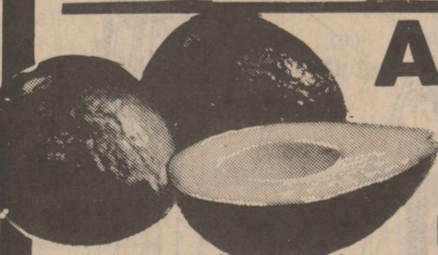

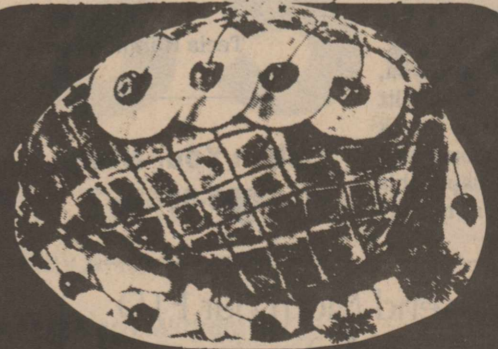
