Gonzales Third In Long Jump

Knox City senior Rickey Gonzales finished third in the long jump competition at the state track meet held Friday at Austin's Memorial Stadium. He leaped 21-11 for the third place spot.

According to Coach Jimmy Rogers, Gonzales was happy to place third. He was third going into his sixth and final jump with his 21-3 leap. However, Melvin Shead of Cayuga went 21-6 3/4 and all of a sudden, Shead was third and Gonzales was fourth.

However, Gonzales came up with a 21-11 3/4 on his final try to recapture third. Thomas Jackson of Thrall won with a 22-2 3/4 and Wayne Jackson of Burton was second at 22-0 1/4.

Gonzales went into the meet with the best Class A long jump performance from his regional win of 22-3 which would have won him the state title; however, he had problems with jumping the past two weeks after pulling a muscle. On his last jump, Gonzales commented that he knew what he had to do, so he psyched himself up and did it.

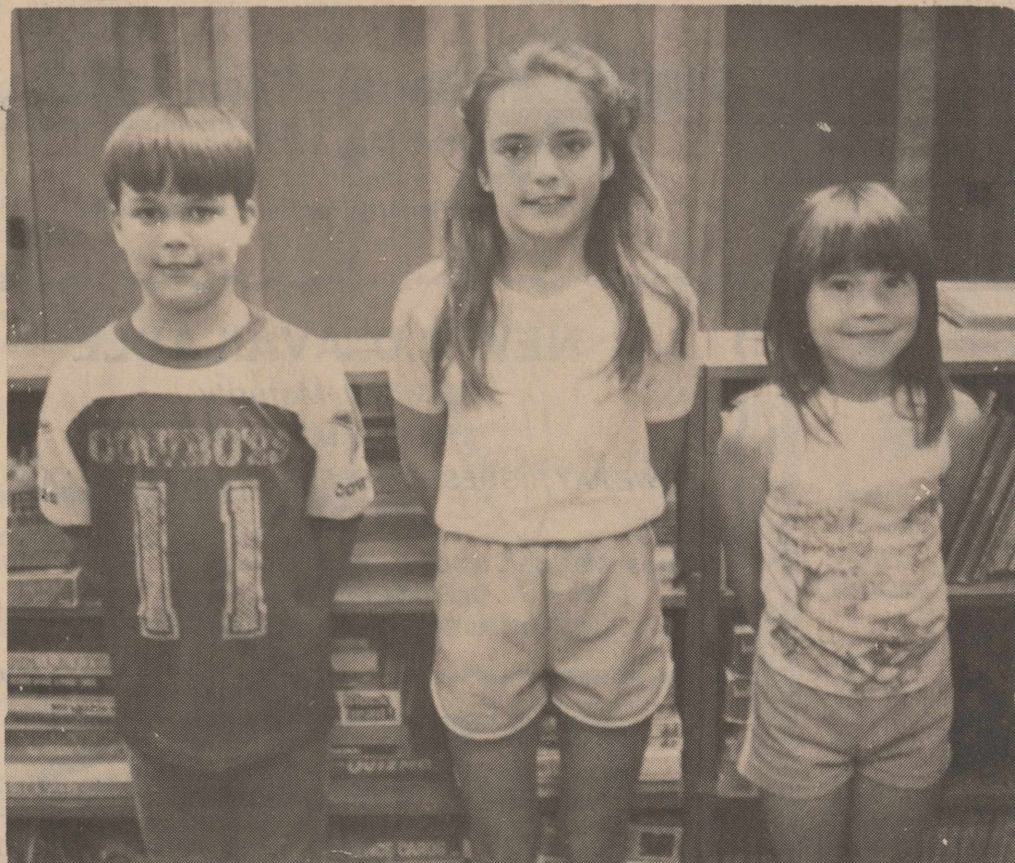
She said that the cooperation of the administration and faculty has made teaching in Knox City extremely pleasant.

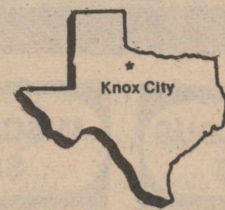

Benjamin Couple To Retire From Teaching

When this school year's end rolls around, Benjamin Schools will be losing two faculty members in that of School Superintendent Kenneth Roberts and his wife, Jessie, who taught in the system.

Mr. Roberts will be completing 33 years of teaching while his wife has taught all of her 21 years in Benjamin.

Mr. Roberts received his bachelor of science degree in agricultural education from Texas Tech in 1944 and his master of education degree in 1953. He taught vo-ag in Shallowater for one year and also worked for the Soil Conservation Service for two years in Aspermont. For seven years, he taught vo-ag in Rochester where he produced several Lone Star Farmers and one American Farmer. Mr. Roberts received the Honorary Lone Star Farmer degree also while teaching in Rochester. In addition to this, Mr. Roberts farmed in New Mexico for two years.

He taught vo-ag in Benjamin for ten years where he produced several district, area and state winning grass judging teams and Farm Skills Demonstration teams. Several of his judging teams also won sweepstakes awards. Mr. Roberts served on the state board of directors of the Texas Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association and was also president of the Oilbelt District of Vocational Agriculture Teachers.

For the past 15 years, he has served as superintendent of Benjamin Schools. He has

served as president of region IX Texas Small Schools Association, president of Knox County Unit of TSTA, and was a member of state and local for 24 years. Mr. Roberts is also charter

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AND CHANGING A FRANCHISE ORDINANCE ENACTED BY THE CITY OF KNOX CITY, KNOX COUNTY, TEXAS, ON JUNE 14, 1971 AND BEING PARTLY STYLED, "AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO LONE STAR GAS COMPANY, A CORPORATION, ITS SECESSORS AND ASSIGNS, A FRANCHISE TO FURNISH AND SUPPLY GAS TO THE GENERAL PUBLIC IN THE CITY OF KNOX CITY, KNOX COUNTY, TEXAS"; AND PROVIDING FOR A MODIFICATION OF THE DEFINITION OF THE TERMS "SERVICE LINES" AND "YARD LINES" REFERENCED IN SECTION 4 THEREOF. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE: SECTION 1. As of the effective date of this amendatory ordinance, and upon acceptance by Lone Star Gas Company of the provisions hereof, Section 4 of the aforesaid captioned franchise ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 4. - Except as heretofore and hereinabove changed and amended, the terms, provisions, conditions and requirements of the aforesaid franchise ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 5. - This amendatory ordinance shall become effective as of May 12, 1981 if the Company files its written acceptance of the provisions of this ordinance within sixty (60) days after its final passage and approval by this City and upon acceptance, the provisions hereof shall be binding upon City and Company, their successors and assigns.
