Bill Posey, minister, and the Rev. Bertis White of Abilene. Burial was in the Benjamin Cemetery with Smith Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. House, 89, died Monday, May 25, at 6:50 a.m. in the Knox County Hospital after a brief illness.

Born June 6, 1891, in Knox County, his parents were the late J.T. and Lulu House. He married the former Ruth Jordan on December 25, 1927, in Benjamin. Mr. House had been a rancher all of his life. He was a member of the First Christian Church in Benjamin and the Old Settlers, Texas Cowboy Reunion in Stamford.

Survivors include his wife, Ruth, of the home; and several nieces and nephews.



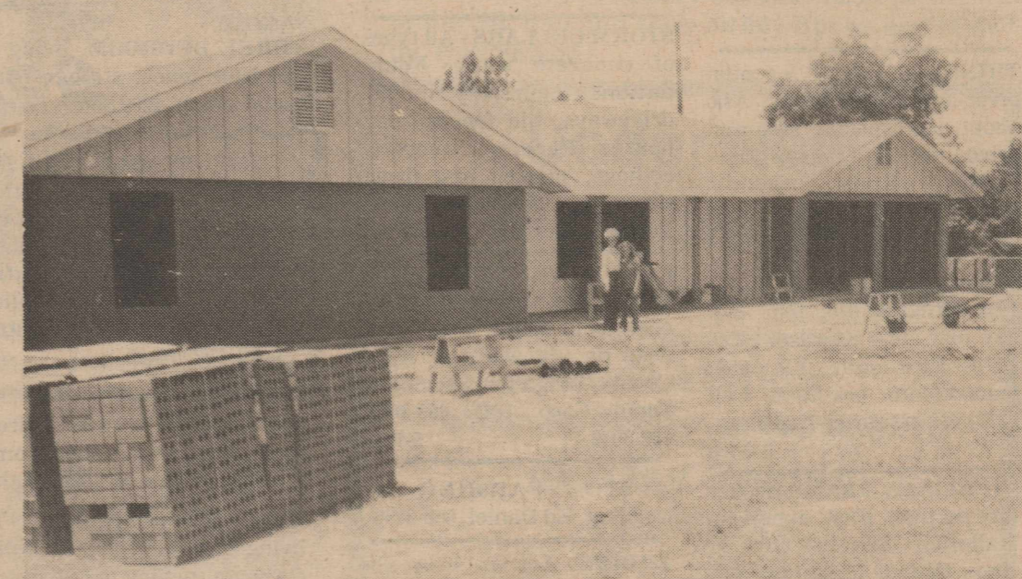
New Trainee Employed By Plant Center

Soil Stewardship Observed This Week

Soil Stewardship Week is being held nationwide this week May 24-31, according to Carl Hutcherson, district conservationist and L.D. Offutt, chairman of the Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District.

Since 1955, Soil Stewardship Week has been recognized in millions of churches and schools across the nation. It is designed to focus on the nation's natural resource problems and to consider ways to solve them.

"This country must, at whatever cost, maintain the capacity of the land to produce food and fiber," cities the National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD) in its booklet for the 1981 observance. NACD sponsors Soil Stewardship Week in cooperation with the nation's 3000 soil and water conservation districts.

"With our own population at 220 million and growing

and with many regions of the world depending on the United States to supplement their food supply, the need to maintain our productive capacity becomes increasingly apparent," according to NACD.

This year's event focuses on "Society's Pressure Points" as its theme and covers such topics as soil and water conservation, urbanization, and loss of prime farmland.

All local churches in Knox County observed Soil Stewardship Week last Sunday, May 24.

Sales Tax Rebates Are Increasing

AUSTIN, Tex. -- State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday said rebates of the one-percent city sales tax for the first five months this year are up more than 40 percent over the same period last year.

Bullock said his office is sending Texas cities more than \$96.1 million in sales tax rebates for May.

He said 1981 payments now total \$282.3 million, compared to \$201.5 million during the same time last year.

Bullock said he felt an upswing in first quarter sales and the agency's rapid rebate system to the cities accounted for larger than normal checks this month.

Knox City's check for this period is \$7,958.08 as compared to \$4,424.13 for the same period last year. Payments for 1981 to date total \$27,131.97, a 26% increase over last year's \$21,531.53.

Munday received \$5,968.06 this period as compared to \$1,740.90 for the same period last year. To date for the year, Munday's payments have been \$20,476.76, a 43% increase over 1980's \$14,262.67.

Other towns and their respective amounts for this period include Benjamin \$442.59, Crowell \$3,642.27, Haskell \$20,203.60, O'Brien \$224.91, Rochester \$1,482.63, Rule \$2,617.36, Seymour \$21,564.87, Stamford \$20,592.73, Throckmorton \$5,603.98, and Weinert \$250.33.

DO NOT BE MISLED About Spraying Your Pecan Trees

Health and vigor of Pecan trees and satisfactory nut quality and yield depend on a well planned and executed insect and disease control program. Insect and disease losses can be greatly reduced by using sound grove management and sanitation practices and by following suggested pest control procedures.

ZINC NUTRITION:

Pecans require zinc for normal stem and leaf growth. Trees not receiving zinc cannot produce the plant growth hormone, indoleacetic acid, and short clustered stems with small leaved result. This disorder is known as zinc rosette. Therefore zinc must be applied to the foliage. Zinc is not translated from leaf to leaf and new shoots and foliage must be sprayed if they are to achieve optimum growth. Apply zinc frequently early in the season.

WHEN AND HOW TO SPRAY

Preventing disease and insect losses requires strict adherence to properly timed spray applications. Table #1 Specifies when to apply in relation to tree development or pest occurrence. Thorough spray coverage of the trees with each application is essential for effective control. Maintain sprayer pressure at 300 to 500 psi.

Munday Field Day Is May 28

Grain sorghum could become an important alternative cash crop for the Rolling Plains if managed in a special way, says an agricultural scientist.

He is C.J. Gerard of Vernon, who puts it this way: "Preliminary research indicates that deep plowing and furrow-diking can increase cotton and grain sorghum yields."

Dr. Gerard is a soil physicist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. He will discuss the use and potential benefits of furrow-diking in the Rolling Plains during the May 28 field day at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research Station at Munday.

Furrow-diking is a method of tillage that puts across a furrow at every four to eight feet "dikes" that are from four inches to eight inches high, depending on the type of diking machine used.

Gerard says the potential for capturing rainfall by furrow-diking for crop production in the Texas Rolling Plains appears to be greater than in the Texas High Plains.

Gerard says the modern diking equipment enables growers to put up or remove dikes with little interference in normal farming operations.

He also says dikes need to be in the furrows in time to catch the April-May-June and September-October rains.

Diking, chiseling, the right planting date and the right choice of variety-all are critical, says Gerard, to the successful production of crops, especially of grain sorghum, in the Rolling Plains.

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'Backbone' Of Program

4-H Projects Key To Learning

4-H projects are the "backbone" of the 4-H program.

Projects help 4-H members grow because, as a member studies and works, he learns by doing, April Werley, county 4-H program coordinator with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, says.

Skills are learned and developed through practice such as sewing a dress or baking a cake. Publications and other project aids, project meetings, talks with parents, leaders and others all help members learn. But projects are real-life experiences that help 4-Hers learn to make wise decisions.

First a member must decide which project to take. Then he must decide a lot of things as he is doing the project. In gardening that would include such things as the location and what vegetables to plant. These decisions help members feel

responsible for their own actions and give them personal satisfaction.

Learning to work with others is another benefit of a project, Miss Werley says. The work is done in or near the home where the whole family can work and be together. As members work together, they share ideas and help each other. They learn to compare their work with what other club members are doing. In some projects, club members own their projects. When they do, they learn to care for their property and respect other's property.

Most 4-H projects are set up to meet the needs of boys and girls of different ages--beginners, juniors and advanced members. As a member grows older and makes more progress, he has a chance to make more of his own decisions and do work that he could not do at an earlier age.

Besides the development of skills in a certain area, a 4-H project offers the 4-H member fellowship, leadership growth and personal development. The 4-H project, the most important part of the 4-H program, offers 4-H club members the opportunity for head, heart, hand and health development through many avenues of participation in 4-H, Miss Werley notes.
