He was presently a partner and general manager of The Man's Store in Seymour and was a rancher. He was also a member of the Knox City Lions Club and the First Baptist Church in Knox City where he had served as a deacon since 1965. Mr. Swain was ordained as a deacon at the First Baptist Church in Seymour in 1957.

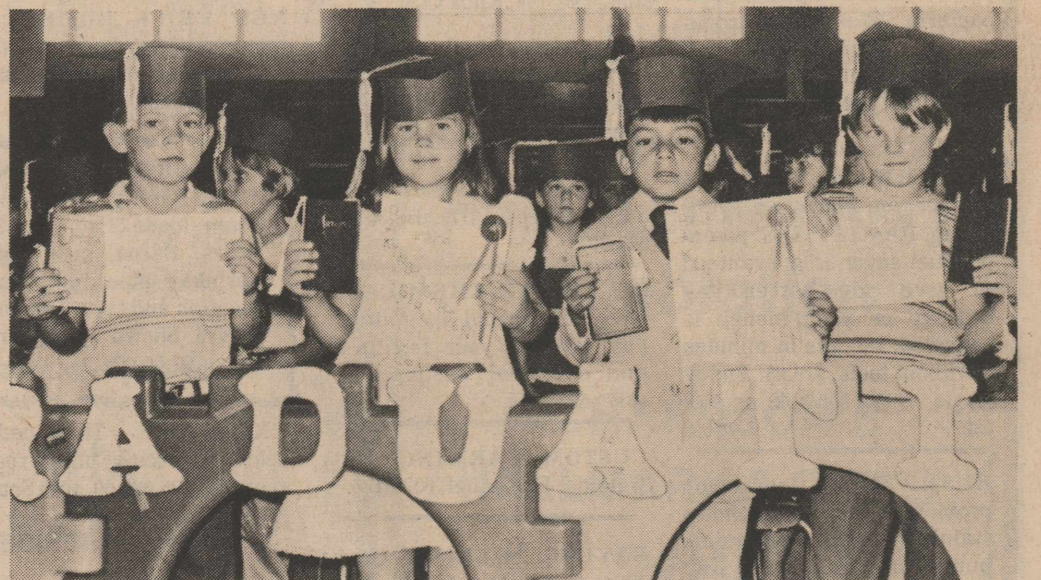
The committee is one of 15 throughout Texas. Commissioners of the Texas Animal Health Commission have named one committee for each of the 15 TAHC areas. This group represents TAHC area 14.

"Selection of these committees is a major step forward in the Texas brucellosis program," John Armstrong, Kingsville, chairman, TAHC, said. "All members are actively engaged in livestock production, and their suggestions and recommendations as to how to improve and implement the Texas Plan for brucellosis control will be invaluable to Commissioners and the entire staff of the TAHC," Armstrong explained.

Brucellosis is a highly contagious disease of livestock. It affects the reproductive organs resulting in abortions, partial loss of milk production, weakened calves, and in some cases sterility in bulls. In humans, brucellosis is known as undulant fever.

Members of the committees were selected from names submitted to the Commissioners by various segments of the livestock industry. "These are not 'rubber stamp' committees. We have members who come all persuasions. We believe we have committees which will provide us with practical advice, which we will incorporate wherever possible in the Texas brucellosis program", Armstrong said.

More than 600 names were submitted statewide for consideration. A total of 180 producers were selected and have agreed to serve for terms ranging from two to six years. "The entire livestock industry should be grateful to these producers who have volunteered their time in this endeavor," Commissioners said.

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Parallel Terraces Will Conserve Water

By Pete Elliston

Two of the reasons farmers of Knox County build terraces are to reduce erosion and conserve moisture. Some farmers are going a step further and leveling the interval between terraces giving somewhat of a bench leveling effect.

Currently, a level interval terrace system is under construction on the C.D. and J.W. Feemster farm northwest of Vera.

With the intervals leveled, rainfall is caught and conserved for plant growth.

Many farmers feel that too often half the rain that falls is lost through runoff and the runoff water causes many detrimental effects, some of which include erosion, runs to low areas on the farm or adjoining farms and causes drowned out crops, and many times runoff carries needed fertilizers off the field.

With half the rainfall lost to runoff, one can see it would not be unusual to lose it to five inches of water during the year. The four to five inches that is lost would be equivalent to one complete irrigation or twice light irrigations.

Some of the farmers in the county who have built level interval terraces are C.D. and J.W. Feemster, Ervest Harton, Oliver Albright, Charles Griffith, John Kinnibrugh, Lloyd Waldrup, and Billy Kinnibrugh.

Anyone interested in information of assistance on terraces or other conservation practices should contact the Soil Conservation Service office in Knox City.

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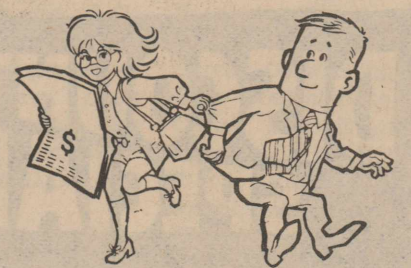
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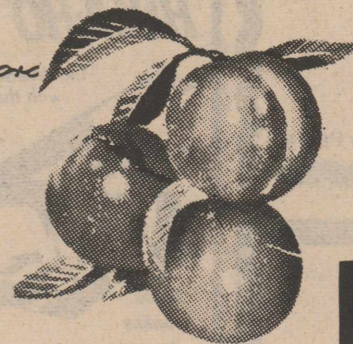


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
