### KC Man Is Honored For Service

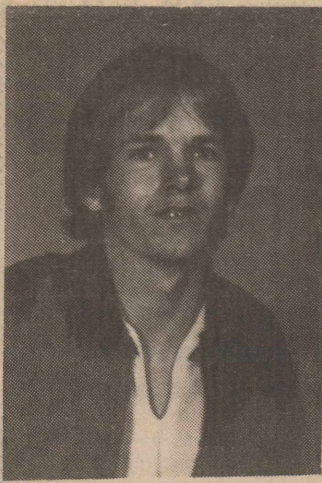

### Felts Named To All-State Church Choir

Ted Felts has been chosen to be a member of the 1981 Texas Baptist All-State Youth Choir.

To be eligible to participate in an all-state choir, a person must be an active participant in the music ministry of a Baptist church cooperating with the Baptist General Convention of Texas, be recommended by the minister of music or pastor, be a high school sophomore, junior or senior, and audition in a state audition center.

The all-state week for the choir will be held on the campus of Hardin-Simmons University June 22 through 27. The all-state choir and band will present a concert at the Abilene Civic Center on the evening of Saturday, June 27. On Sunday, June 28, they will travel to Palo Duro Canyon and present a concert where the drama, "Texas" is presented each summer.

## Open All Trophy Show Saturday

On Saturday, June 13, at 10:00 a.m., the Open All Trophy Horse Show will get underway at the Knox City arena in Knox City.

The show this year is dedicated to the memory of Cliff Swain, who actively participated and strongly supported all arena activities. Cliff was one of the first persons here to support the idea of a horse show.

Classes in three age groups will be available. Age groups include 13 and under, 14 through 18 and the open division, which is open to any age, adult or youth. Age in youth classes is determined by age on January 1, 1981.

Point horse must be designated at time of entry. Points count only in the division in which they are

earned. Performance classes include showmanship, western pleasure, western horsemanship, reining, trail, barrels, flags, and poles. Open classes in English pleasure and English equitation will also be featured. There will be no open showmanship class.

No stallions will be allowed in youth classes. All stallion handlers must be 19 or over.

There will be halter classes for stallions, mares and geldings.

According to his mother, he is somewhat weak but is "doing good" after undergoing both a tracheotomy and a tonsillectomy.

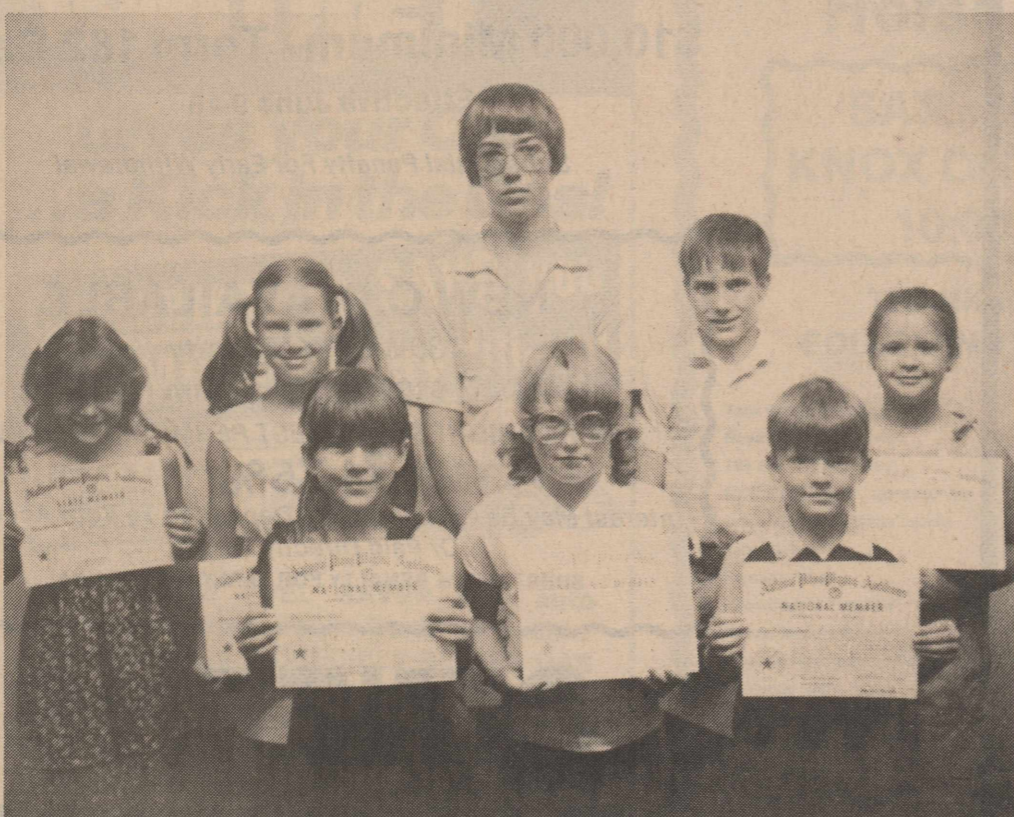

The God and Country Program was established to help in fulfilling the Scout Promise. The twelfth point of the Scout Laws is the basis of both the God and Country Program and the Scout

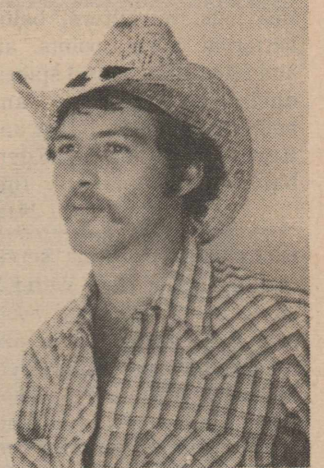
Promise. It is also a program of exploration in various areas of Christian responsibility.

### Ledbetter Named New Gin Manager

Randal Ledbetter has been named manager of the O'Brien Cooperative Gin where he assumed his duties last month.

A graduate of Hale Center High School, Ledbetter was employed as a ginner before he went to work for Independent Gin Repair as serviceman for two years. From there he went to work for Horn and Gladden Lint Cleaner Company of Lubbock as repairman and later worked for them on installation of new and used gin machinery. After three and a half years with Horn and Gladden, he started traveling on his own, helping install and rearrange gin machinery. Before moving to O'Brien, he helped erect a new gin plant at Driscoll.

Samuel Tankersley, a former gin manager, will be working in the office helping Ledbetter become acquainted with the bookwork and also will be handling the buying and selling of the cotton.

O'Brien Coop is installing a Horn and Gladden Rescuer 4000, which Ledbetter described as overhead machinery to replace burr machines, in an effort to update and increase the ginning capacity. He said there also were more changes being made to improve the cleaning system and give the farmer a better grade and better turnout on his cotton.

Ledbetter and his wife, the former Lola Scroggins of Plainview, are living in O'Brien. They are Baptists.

## Reappraisal Begins On County Property

Knox County Chief Appraiser Oscar Mangis and employees of the Knox County Appraisal District, Velma Melton, Clodell Duke, and Jan Rolston, are busy these days setting values on all property within the county as mandated by Senate Bill 621. The bill, passed during regular session of the 66th Legislature, requires that each county in Texas create an appraisal district to be responsible for setting the values on all property inside the county for tax purposes which each taxing entity will use.

Mangis reported that all farm and pasture land within the county has been classified, using the Knox County Soil Survey to classify all the acreage. He explained that this is a fair and equal system for all landowners.

The Appraisal District employees are now setting values on houses and improvements, and Mangis is

asking the help and cooperation of all homeowners. "To get an equal appraisal of all property in the county, we will need to measure most of the houses. Some of them have never been measured for tax purposes. This is a big undertaking and we'll need the help of everyone in the county," he said. The reappraisal is expected to be finished sometime later in the year, and the values will not be used until the 1982 tax roll, Mangis said.

The Appraisal District also will be responsible for valuing properties outside the county within a school district which belongs to the county. The Knox County Appraisal District will value the O'Brien community for school tax purposes only. The Goree School District has some property in both Haskell and Throckmorton Counties.

Other duties of the Ap-

praisal District will be taking care of all veterans' exemptions, homestead exemptions, and ag-use exemptions. In 1982, all exemptions must be filed with the chief appraiser. The Appraisal District also will be responsible for discovering and valuing all personal property in the county for all taxing entities.

The Appraisal District is located in the Knox County Courthouse at Benjamin, in the first two offices just inside the south entrance. Mangis said that all taxpayers are welcome to come by anytime and see how the new office duties are being handled.

Knox County Appraisal District board members include, D.B. Gass, Don Hertel, E. L. Horton, Clyde Voss, and Bud Carver.

## Foreign Students Need Homes In KC Area

Homes for foreign high school students wanting to come to the United States and learn about middle income American family life are being sought by area representatives of the Youth Exchange Service (YES). Rev. and Mrs. Don Jeffreys of Trinity Baptist Church, Sweetwater, are the Texas representatives of YES, based in San Clemente, California. "We want to place one or two students in the Knox City area and are looking for homes to provide temporary lodging, meals, and love."

The students are carefully screened by the YES home office. "We want only the top class students from other countries in this program." The families are screened by

the Jefferys. Single adult homes may also be acceptable to host a student. The students are between 15 and 18 years of age and because of their economic backgrounds in their home countries, these students are potential national leaders in the future. The exchange program arranges transportation, medical coverage, and arrival and departure dates for the students. In order for students to arrive for the fall school term host families need to apply as soon as possible, preferably by June 15. Applications need to be in by October 1 for a student to arrive in December or January.

## Good Water Supply Essential

Every cattleman knows that cattle do better and gain more when they have plenty of good clean water to drink. Rangeland can be grazed uniformly with adequate spaced sources of water. Site conditions will not always allow the proper spacing of ponds or wells.

A pipeline should be considered as an alternate method to deliver livestock water. A rural water system, well, or adequate pond can be used as the water supply.

Beef cattle require about 12 gallons of water per day each and dairy cattle require about 25 gallons per day. Any drinking facility should be large enough for all the stock to water, without having to wait for the facility to re-fill. All pipelines that are connected

to rural water systems must enter drinking facilities in such a manner that the outlet is always above the water surface. This is to prevent backflow in case of pressure failure.

Pipelines can be made of several different kinds of material, including PVC plastic, ABS plastic, polyethylene plastic, or steel. PVC is most often used. PVC is easy to install, economical, and rodent resistant. Any pipeline that is used to transport drinking water should be marked with a seal that indicates its suitability for this purpose.

The size of the pipeline depends on the discharge pressure at the source, elevation, and supply of water needed. Provided elevation changes are minor, a one-third horse power pressure pump will deliver approximately 3 g.p.m. through one mile of 3/4" PVC and 5 g.p.m. through one mile of 1" PVC.

Costs of installing pipelines can vary among different suppliers. The approximate costs of various sizes per mile is: 3/4" - \$1900; 1" - \$2100; 1-1/4" - \$2500; and for 1-1/2" - \$2900. Savings can be realized by doing the installation. Pipelines should be installed at least 18" deep.

For assistance in planning and preparing cost estimates of pipelines, readers may contact Carl Hutcherson District Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service at Knox City.

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# Texas Wheat Board Election Set June 26

The Texas Wheat Producers Board formed in 1971 to support wheat research and market development will hold its fifth biennial election on June 26 according to Leo Witkowski of Hereford, chairman. The terms of three current board members expiring at that time include Troy Sloan, Spearman; C.L. Edwards, Panhandle; and W.R. Moore, Jr., Munday.

In 1971 when the Producers Board was formed by Texas producers as a self-help program to enhance the value of their crops, 3.5 million acres was planted to wheat that produced 31.4 million bushels valued at \$37.3 million. In 1981, just ten years later, Texas' planted acres of wheat is 7.7 million acres, producing 179.2 million bushels valued at \$700 million. All of the increased

production in the insuing years has been exported through newly developed markets. The domestic use in the U.S. has remained virtually unchanged.

Any wheat farmer producing within the 34-county commercial wheat area is eligible to vote for a board member for that district. Counties included are: DISTRICT I: Dallam, Sherman, Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hansford, Roberts, Moore, Hartley, Hutchinson and Gray.

DISTRICT II: Carson, Potter, Oldham, Deaf Smith, Randall, Armstrong, Briscoe, Swisher, Castro, Parmer, Hale and Floyd.

DISTRICT III: Childress, Hardeman, Foard, Knox, Throckmorton, Haskell, Archer, Baylor, Wilbarger, Wichita, Young Clay.

Witkowski points out that any person qualifying to vote in the election may place his name in nomination for membership on the Texas Wheat Producers Board by application to the

organization, signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the election, at least 30 days prior to the election date, in order to have his name placed on the ballot.

The election will be held by mail ballot, which will be provided to all eligible voters 15 days prior to the election, Witkowski said. He also indicates that any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot 15 days before the election date, may obtain one at Agricultural Extension Service offices in the 34-county area as provided by the Texas Commodity Referendum Law.

Wheat producers fund TWPB with a 1/2 cent assessment on their deliveries of wheat at commercial handlers. Proceeds from such participation supports programs of foreign and domestic market expansion, food and feed wheat technical service, insect control demonstrations and other activities designed to strengthen wheat producers income. In addition to Witkowski and the three members with expiring terms, other TWPB members are: Dwight Hamilton, Olney; Cagle Kendrick, Stratford; Otis Harman, Tulia; Robert Graves, Perryton; and Wiley Tabor, Quanah.

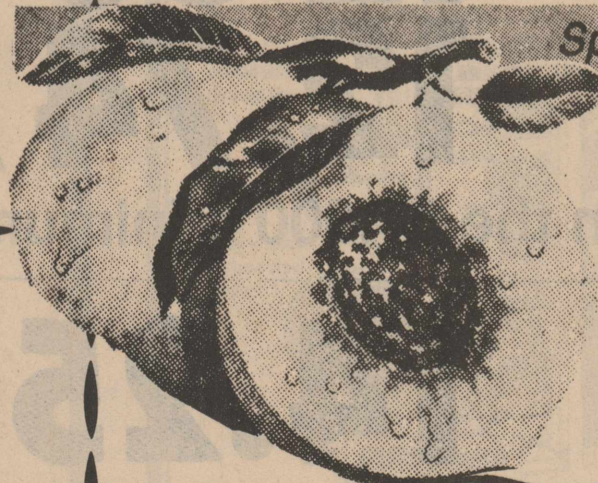

# WTU Signs For Future Fuel Needs

West Texas Utilities Company, a subsidiary of the Dallas-based Central and South West Corporation, has signed an agreement with Exxon Coal, USA, to meet future fuel needs.

The contract calls for the delivery, beginning in 1986 and continuing over a 20 year period, of 48 million tons of Wyoming coal to the Oklahoma Power Plant site

in north central Texas. The Oklaunion project is being managed by West Texas Utilities which will own 350 megawatts of the unit's total capacity of 640 megawatts. Two other Central and South West System Subsidiaries, Central Power and Light Company, Corpus Christi, with 115 megawatts, and Public Service Company of Oklahoma, Tulsa, with 175 megawatts, are participants.

The fuel contract between West Texas Utilities and Exxon Coal is extendable for a 15 year period followed completion of the initial 20 year delivery schedule.

Exxon will ship coal from its Rawhide Mine near Gillette in Campbell County, Wyoming.

On May 8, 1981, West Texas Utilities, acting on behalf of its partners, filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas for a certificate of convenience and necessity which will allow construction of the power generation station and related facilities to proceed. The plant is to be operational by December, 1986.

Estimated cost of construction of the 1900 acre site is \$675 million. The location is in Wilbarger County, southeast of Vernon, Texas and near the community of Oklaunion.
