## Sales Tax Reflects Increase

AUSTIN, Tex. -- State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday said Texas cities collecting the one-percent city sales tax have received \$310.7 million in rebates during the first six months of 1981.

Bullock said the June sales tax rebates to cities totaled \$28.3 million, compared to \$24.9 million during a comparable period in 1980.

Knox City's net payment this period was \$3,630 as compared to \$3,047 for the same period last year. Payments to date for 1981 total \$30,762 a 12.62% increase over 1980's \$27,316.


Munday's net payment this period was \$1,860 with the comparable payment last year \$1,502. To date, Munday has received \$22,337, a 10% increase over last year's \$20,194.

Other towns and their net amounts for this period include Aspermont \$2,990, Haskell \$4,690, Crowell \$1,080, Paducah \$1,410, Rotan \$930, Seymour \$4,510, and Stamford \$5,440.

Payments to date in 1981 for other area towns which had no amounts listed for this period were Benjamin \$871, O'Brien \$609, Goree \$1,296, Rochester \$4,605, Rule \$8,339, and Weinert \$587.

The city sales tax is collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and businesses and is returned each month by the Comptroller to the cities which levy the tax.

## Outstanding 4-H'er Receives Scholarship

COLLEGE STATION -- Kelley Ryser Boone, an outstanding Knox County 4-H member, has received a four-year \$6,000 scholarship from the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

Kelley, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe T. Boone of Knox City, was an honor graduate at Knox City High School. A 4-H member for nine years, Kelley received the Knox County Gold Star Boy award and the Danforth "I Dare You" award. He was a delegate to the National 4-H Congress, president of his local 4-H club and a participant in the state 4-H horse show.

During high school, Kelley was FFA vice president, class president, Beta Club president and coeditor of the school paper. He also participated on the debate team, football team, annual staff and basketball and track teams.

Kelley, who plans to major in agricultural economics at Texas Tech University, was one of 50 recipients of Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo scholarships presented at the state 4-H Roundup.

The show, which will also present 50 four-year, \$6,000 scholarships to FFA members during their state convention in July, is the largest donor of agricultural scholarships in the United States. During the coming year, the show will have 445 students on scholarships in Texas colleges and universities, at a commitment of \$2.45 million.

The winners, carefully selected from hundreds of applicants, are the best in the state from the standpoints of academics and leadership. The only requirements made of the students are that they major in some form of agriculture at a college or university within the confines of the state.

The monies used to fund the scholarship program are derived directly from proceeds generated by spectators at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, a civic, charitable organization whose efforts, actions and revenues are used directly to benefit youth and support education.

In presenting the scholarships, show president Allen H. Carruth said that the presentation of each scholarship is far more than a gesture of good will.

"The show's concern for youth and its commitment to





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
