New Heart Monitor Is Installed Tuesday

On Tuesday of this week, E.P. Industries of Dallas installed a new CARE patient monitoring system manufactured by CMP Corporation of Huntsville Alabama. The CARE system is the last system tried out by the local hospital several weeks ago and is the first such system to be installed in Texas.

The installation of the heart monitoring system is a culmination of a goal set by the Knox County Hospital Auxiliary when it organized last August, that of purchasing equipment that would be an asset to the Knox County Hospital. The group voted several months ago to purchase a heart monitor, but after receiving one which had been used, the hospital staff agreed that the hospital needed a more up-to-date system. The next several weeks were spent looking for another system which was adequate but still within the auxiliary's budget, and with the help of the auxiliary president-elect, Mrs. Lee Smith's great-nephew, Doak Smith, this CARE system was introduced to the hospital. The auxiliary is purchasing the primary system with the Knox County Hospital incurring charges for additional components. The CARE system will provide Knox County Hospital with the latest technology in cardiac monitoring capabilities. The system will provide monitoring capabilities for two patients with the option for six additional patients as deemed necessary by the hospital staff. The CARE system will also allow the patients the flexibility of moving about the hospital freely while being monitored.

In related matter, the hospital board is still pursuing the remodeling or construction of a replacement

hospital for Knox County. With the addition of another physician, board members hope that the hospital utilization will increase to a point that would justify the improvements. The architect's plans have been reviewed by the board and financing alternatives are being considered prior to any final action by the board.

In an effort to provide more public awareness of the hospital, recent board action will result in the minutes of the Board of Directors' meetings being made available for publication in area newspapers. Additionally, the financial statements will be made available to the media on a timely basis for publication.

When asked about the future of the hospital, administrator Tom Haden commented he felt more optimistic now than ever before. "With the addition of Dr. Newton Neufeld to the medical staff, the hospital will have the services of another talented surgeon in addition to Dr. W.F. Thompson, thus complementing the existing medical staff," Haden said. Haden reported that Dr. Neufeld, who was here in Dr. Thompson's absence recently, was called upon to perform emergency surgery and was satisfied with the enthusiasm and cooperation of the staff as well as the physical capabilities of the hospital.

"In addition to the surgery, the hospital also had done two deliveries in the past few weeks," Haden said. The hospital administrator was recently appointed to the Texas Hospital Association's Texas Voluntary Cost Containment Review Committee and has been in Austin on two occasions to represent the smaller hospitals in regard to fiscal management. Haden

explained, "The smaller hospital has many obstacles to confront in order to maintain solvency in today's economy. Hospitals must be staffed to meet an expected service level and when these levels are not met, the hospital can suffer financially. The smaller hospital often has one person serving in the capacity that larger hospitals delegate to two or more persons. As a result, when a slack period ensues and the larger hospitals react with a personnel layoff, the smaller hospital generally has to retain its respective employee in order to fill the need in only one area. As an example, our dietary department must be staffed with not less than one employee regardless of how few meals are prepared. It is very difficult to lay off a half of a person, yet the alternative of maintaining our capabilities is necessary due to the unpredictable nature of this unique business," Haden said.

Knox County Hospital is the smallest hospital represented on the THA committee. Haden, who has been instrumental in presenting the plight of the smaller hospital by his representation on the committee, has identified the similar yet paradoxical role of the smaller hospital as it relates to the larger hospitals in Texas.

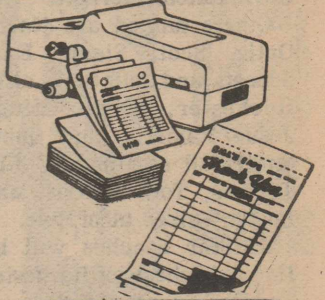

Follow Simple Rules Of Photography To Help Keep Summer Memories Alive

Pictures of summertime fun can be as refreshing as a dip in the pool if you follow a few simple rules.

To capture facial expressions, move in as close as possible and get on your subject's level. If you can't take a picture like this one without jumping in the pool, try a camera with a built-in telephoto lens to help you photograph the occasion from a "safe" place away from the action.

A camera with a telephoto lens helps you in these situations because you can take pictures from a moderate distance—yet capture close-up views of faces. The Kodak Tele-Ektarite 600 camera—with its built-in telephoto lens—in effect moves you twice as close to your subject. The lens helps you take pictures like this from the edge of the pool without getting wet and brings you closer to the subject while



eliminating distracting backgrounds.

Here are some additional tips to help you take great photos this summer:

- Hold the camera steady and squeeze the shutter gently to avoid movement;
- Take pictures from different angles;
- Use foreground framing by aiming through a tree branch, iron fence, stone arch, etc.;
- Turn the camera for vertical or horizontal pictures—whichever captures the scene best.

Finally, don't forget to get yourself in some of the pictures.

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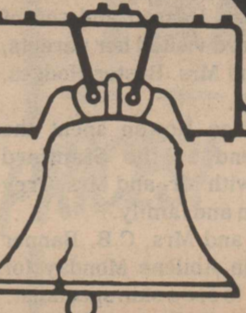
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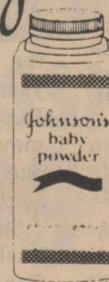


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Local Taxing Units To Publish Notices

AUSTIN-- Kenneth E. Graeber, executive director of the State Property Tax Board (SPTB), today said a number of local taxing units throughout Texas will be publishing advertisements titled "Notice of Tax Increase" within the next two months.

Graeber said the notices, which include the percentage of proposed tax increase, are required under the state's "Truth-in-Taxation" statute. The notices, he added, are intended to insure that taxpayers have notice that a jurisdiction's tax revenue is likely to increase, and that the taxpayer has a right to appear at a public hearing to speak either for or against the increase.

The notice is required whenever a jurisdiction proposes to adopt a tax rate which is three per cent or more above a maximum tax rate calculated by the jurisdiction's assessor. This maximum tax rate is a rate which would provide sufficient revenue for the current year's debt service and provide operating revenues equal to those of the prior year.

"It is important that taxpayers be aware that the percentage of increase shown in the notice relates to the jurisdiction as a whole. A specific individual's taxes may increase at a greater rate, may remain the same or may decrease," Graeber said.

"The tax bill on an individual piece of property will depend on the value of the property less any exemptions, multiplied by the jurisdiction's tax rate," he added.

In jurisdictions throughout the state, compliance with truth-in-taxation follows this sequence:

--After the Board of Equalization certifies the jurisdiction's total assessed valuation, the tax assessor

will calculate the maximum tax rate and publicize it by publication in a newspaper of general circulation in the jurisdiction;

--If the governing body chooses to adopt a tax rate which does not exceed the calculated rate, it may do so at any meeting. Other items of business may be on the agenda but the tax rate should be adopted as a separate item from the jurisdiction's budget.

--If the governing body determines that a rate which exceeds the three percent limit must be adopted, the members must give notice of a public hearing on the intent to adopt a higher rate. The jurisdiction must publish a notice no smaller than one-quarter page of a standard-size or tabloid newspaper, and must set the date of the public hearing at least seven days from the date the notice is published.

The date, time and location of the public hearing must be stated in the notice. The date must be on a weekday and not a public holiday. The hearing must begin after 5 p.m. and before 9 p.m. The location must be in a public building in the jurisdiction's boundaries.

Names of all members of the governing body, showing how each voted on the proposal to raise the tax rate and indicating those absent, must appear in the

As an option, the jurisdiction may mail the notice by first-class mail to each registered voter. If published in a newspaper, the notice cannot be in the section with legal notices and classified ads.

--At the public hearing, the discussion of the tax rate should be the only item on the agenda. Taxpayers should be given ample opportunity to express their opinions and discuss the issue with members of the governing body.

At the conclusion of the hearing, another record vote must be taken for the purpose of a second public notice. In addition, the officials must orally give the date, time and place of the meeting to adopt the tax rate. The second notice will be identical in form to the first except it will include a statement that "a public meeting to vote on the proposed increase will be held on (date), (time), at (meeting place)."

The second notice must specify a date which is not sooner than the third day after the hearing and not later than the 14th day. If the meeting to adopt the higher tax is not held within 14 days after the public hearing, then a new public hearing must be held and notice properly given.

--At the final meeting, at which the vote to actually adopt the tax rate is given, other items of business may be on the agenda. Again, however, the vote on the tax rate must be separate from the vote on the jurisdiction's budget.

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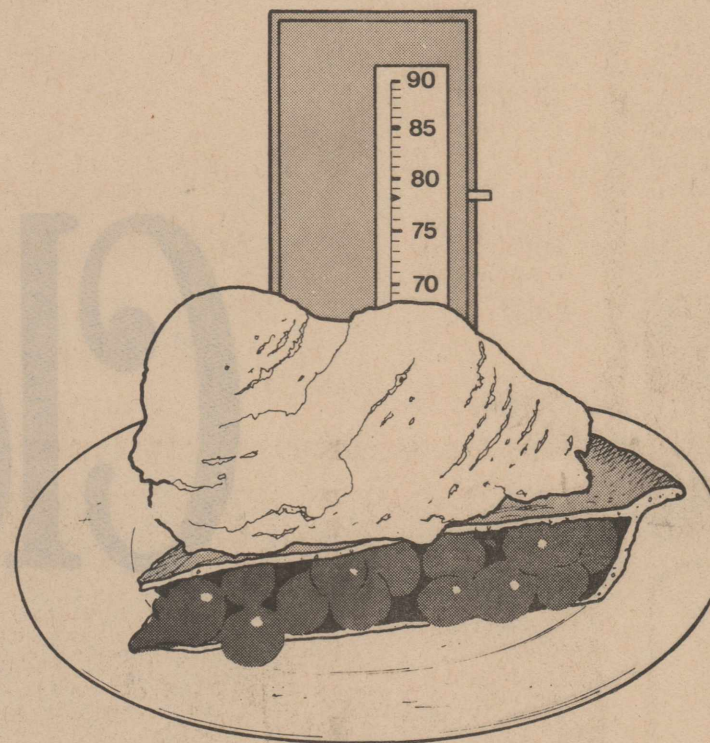

Kristi placed sixth in barrels riding Jay Nip and was third in poles riding John's Choir in the senior division.

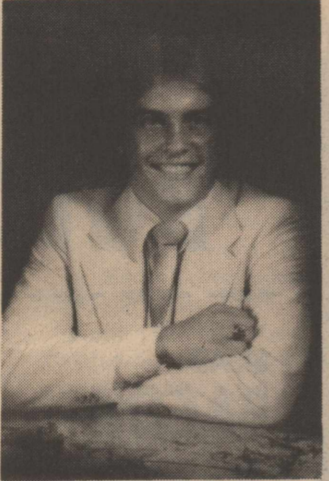
Brand, riding Dr. Mito, placed second in reining, fourth in poles, fifth in barrels and showmanship and sixth in horsemanship in the senior division.

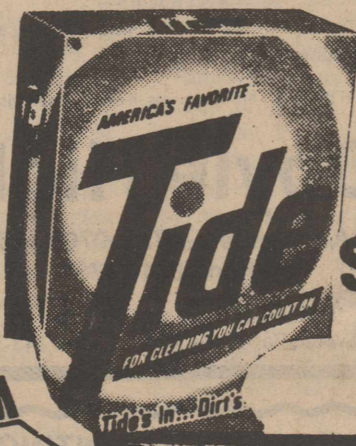
