Fuel Smuggling Leads To Trujillo's Arrest

AUSTIN, Tex. - Efforts to halt the smuggling of untaxed diesel fuel along the Texas-Mexico border Friday resulted in the arrest of a 58year-old Laredo man, according to State Comptroller Bob Bullock.

Bullock said Milton Trujillo, also known as Jose Milton Trujillo, was arrested in Laredo on an indictment from the Travis County grand jury

A series of roadblocks and investigations by Bullock's office led to the indictment and the surveillance will continue until "the diesel leaks from Mexico are plugged," Bullock said.
