Kristi, sixteen-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Boone, will be a junior at Knox City High School this fall, where she is an honor student and is active in sports, band and 4-H. Kristi is incoming president of the Knox City-O'Brien Chapter of Future Homemakers of America and is a junior class officer.

Sixteen-year-old Doug is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Stanton Brown. He will be a junior student at Benjamin High School this fall, where he is active in sports, school organizations and 4-H. Doug is currently serving as an officer in both 4-H and the Benjamin Chapter of the Future Farmers of America.

The tour, which left Dallas July 28, will return to Dallas August 11. Enroute to Washington, the group stayed in Jackson, Mississippi; Chattanooga, Tennessee; and Petersburg, Virginia. Along the way, they toured the Vicksburg Battlefield and Museum and the Alabama Space and Rocket Center, the world's largest space museum, at Huntsville, Alabama. They also visited colonial Williamsburg,

Virginia, a completely restored colonial city, where people dressed in colonial clothing work at jobs with tools of colonial America. Just prior to entering Washington, the group toured Mount Vernon, the home of George Washington.

In Washington, the tour will visit the United States Capitol complex and office buildings; the Library of Congress, the Smithsonian Institute, the United States Archives, the Washington Monument, the Jefferson and Lincoln Memorials and Arlington National Cemetery and the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. The group will also see the play "Annie" at Kennedy Center. Each delegate will also visit his congressman while in Washington.

So I began collecting names and addresses, talking to local people and mailed out cards.

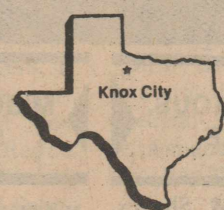

AUSTIN, Tex. — Efforts to halt the smuggling of untaxed diesel fuel along the Texas-Mexico border Friday resulted in the arrest of a 58-year-old Laredo man, according to State Comptroller Bob Bullock.

Bullock said Milton Trujillo, also known as Jose Milton Trujillo, was arrested in Laredo on an indictment from the Travis county grand jury.

A series of roadblocks and investigations by Bullock's office led to the indictment and the surveillance will continue until "the diesel leaks from Mexico are plugged," Bullock said.

Trujillo was charged with selling fuel without a state permit after his arrest by agents of the Comptroller's office, the Webb County Sheriff's office and U.S. Customs.

According to Bullock, Trujillo was jailed in Webb County after being arraigned on the fuels tax charge which is a third-degree felony.

The arrest is part of a continuing investigation ordered by Bullock to crack down on diesel smuggling along the Rio Grande and Bullock predicted "two or three more arrests will follow."

Bullock's investigation showed an estimated 100 million gallons of untaxed fuel was coming into Texas from Mexico each year.

"I intend to put the contraband fuel business out-of-business because these smugglers are stealing from the taxpayers in this state," Bullock said.

Texas taxes diesel fuel at six and a-half cents a gallon with the revenue going to highway and state education funds.

Expensive diesel fuel in Mexico—sometimes as low as 17 cents a gallon—helped create the blackmarket for fuel in Texas.

Texas routinely collects taxes on more than a billion gallons of diesel fuel a year sold by legitimate dealers.



Vic Lowrys Return Home

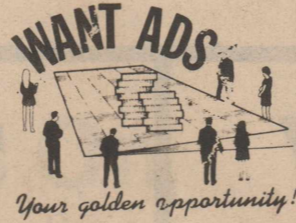
