Mrs. Crownover said that the Knox County Auxiliary members will be assisting with volunteer duties, Director of Nurses Melba Pharr will be responsible for professional help, and the Santa Rosa Catholic women will be in charge of the canteen. City officers will assist in loading duties, she said.

This visit's goal is 70 pints and donors will have an added incentive this time, as Sandra and Vic Edwards, owners and operators of The Cotton Patch Cafe, will be giving away a sirloin for two dinner to some lucky person whose name is drawn from the list of donors.

"Only about three percent of those who can, actually do give blood," Mrs. Crownover said. "They're carrying the whole load. And with demands for blood increasing almost daily, this small handful cannot continue to meet the total need of hospital patients - needs that we all have at one time or another."

The Bloodmobile chairman said, "Donating blood is a personal responsibility. That is why it is important that you and all our friends, relatives and neighbors who are healthy and able, carry our share of the load."

Sales Tax Rebates Up Over 1980's

AUSTIN, Tex. -- State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday said 750 Texas cities received \$40.9 million in city sales tax rebates for September.

The September payments push the city's rebates for this year to \$480.3 million, up 14.7 percent over yearly payments to date during 1980.

Knox City did not receive a check for this period as, according to clerk Mary Beth Smith, the city had been overpaid previously. The 1981 payments to date were \$48,367.22, a 7.12 per cent increase over 1980's \$45,153.81.

Munday's net payment this period was \$2,693.59. Munday had a gain of 0.73 per cent in its 1981 payments to date of \$35,360.56, as compared to 1980's \$35,104.95. For this period, Aspermont received \$1,819.46; Crowell, \$1,417.22; Haskell, \$5,440.90; Rule, \$1,043.82; Seymour, \$8,377.62; and Stamford, \$7,902.12.

The optional one-percent city sales tax is collected by merchants and businesses along with the four-percent state sales tax and returned each month by the Comptroller to the city in which it is collected.

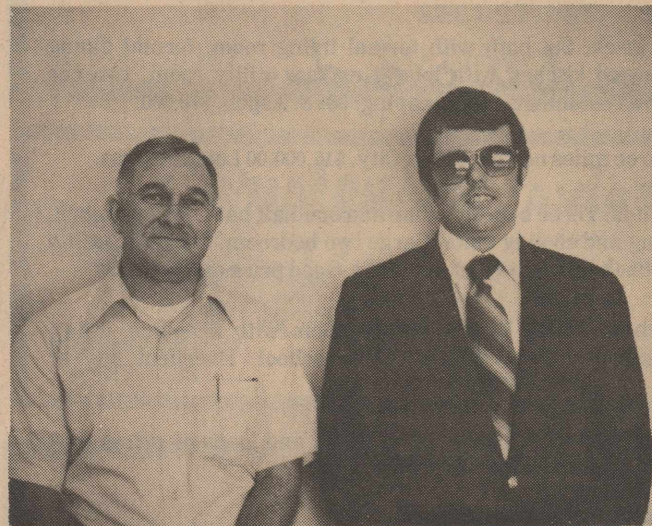
The Moguls' other two touchdowns came on an 11 yard pass from Robert Boyd to Chris Moore and a two yard run by Robert Murray.

Mrs. McGaughey also reminded members of their obligation in helping with volunteer duties for the Bloodmobile visit set here next Tuesday, September 29.

In other business, Mrs. McGaughey advised members that the two-person scramble set by the Knox City Country Club to benefit the auxiliary in its purchase of the heart monitor for the Knox County Hospital had been scheduled for Sunday, October 4, with tee-off time at 1:30 p.m.

A report was heard from Mrs. McGaughey, president-elect Jerry Smith, Ann Eells on their trip to the District VI-A meeting of the Texas Association of Hospital Auxiliaries held in Abilene at the Abilene Woman's Club on September 16.

Mrs. Smith, who is chairman of the Thrift Shop, also reported on the progress of the Thrift Shop during its first year of business. The shop was opened September 19, 1980, and has brought approximately \$10,000 in during this time. The auxiliary members voted to purchase the heart monitor, badly needed for the Knox County Hospital, with some assistance from the hospital in purchasing additional units. The auxiliary borrowed \$3500 to finish out funds and has made one payment of \$1,000, and according to Mrs. Smith, with between \$200.00 and \$300.00 coming in each week and sometimes more, the second payment of \$1,000 will be on hand by the time it is due, she said.

Items are donated to the Thrift Shop and all help is voluntary, so this project of Mrs. Smith's is serving its purpose well-real well!

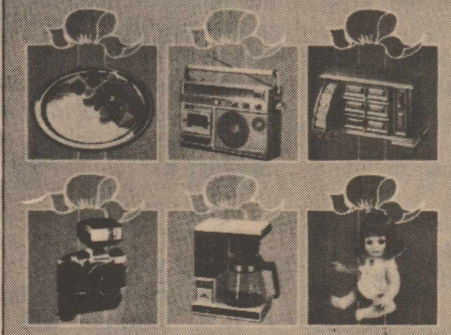
