Cattle Sale Rounds Up Funds

A packed house at the Abilene Auction Monday kicked off the 22nd year of cattle sales for the Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children.

The initial sale, which included many different breeds of cattle and various other items, netted the West Texas Rehabilitation Center a total of \$132,437.56. This figure topped the 1980 figure of \$123,100 by more than \$10,000.

With the \$32,000 in cash donations, the total figure from both cash and cattle for the first sale of 1981 totaled \$164,437.56. It fell short of the \$179,700.81 collected during the initial sale of 1980.

Both Shelley Smith, executive director of the West Texas Rehabilitation Center, and Jim Alexander, general livestock superintendent for the 1981 Cattlemen's Round-Up for Crippled Children, were extremely pleased with the sale.

"With cattle prices the way

they are, I thought it went real well," Smith said following the tabulations of the cattle sale.

Smith lauded the efforts of area chairmen, which include Lee Smith of Knox City and Togo Moorhouse of Benjamin, as a total of 322 head of cattle sold during the two and a half hour sale.

Lee Smith and Togo Moorhouse expressed their appreciation to all those who

helped from this area with donations of cash and cattle. They were very pleased with the response from the immediate area.

County Jail Now Complies With Texas Jail Standards

Joe Slater, supervising inspector for The Texas Commission on Jail Standards in Austin, was in Benjamin Monday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock to certify that the Knox County Jail facilities have been accepted in compliance with the Texas Jail

Standards.

According to Knox County Sheriff James Redwine, the process in complying has taken two years, with the paper work requiring three months. A new addition to the existing jail, built in 1951, was completed last fall, meeting plumbing requirements and adding a separate booking area. Redwine also explained that the Commissioners' Court had spent only a minimum amount to meet the requirements. On the first notification, the Knox County facilities had 42 non-

compliances, the last inspection had limited these to six, and on this final check, had none, Redwine said.

Slater said, "On behalf of The Commission on Jail Standards, the Knox County officials, Judge Homer T. Melton, the Knox County commissioners, and Sheriff James Redwine are to be commended on this splendid accomplishment. This is not due to any one person but to all working together. The taxpayers should be proud of these elected officials who have been able to achieve this result at minimum costs.

"Having achieved compliance with The Texas Minimum Jail Standards and with continued operation at this level, you can be assured frivolous complaints and lawsuits will not be looked upon favorably by the federal courts.

"Your compliance with the laws of the State of Texas serves to protect you as these rules and statutes have been tested upheld on numerous occasions by the federal courts.

"I extend my personal congratulations to these officials. It is a pleasure to work with them."

Truscott Jamboree Supper Saturday

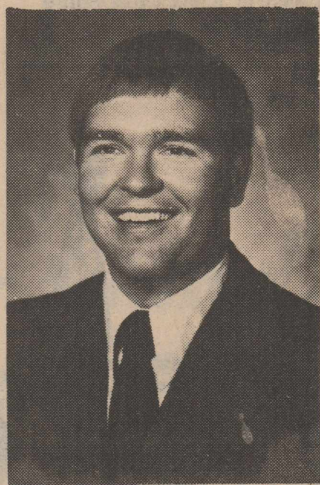
The Truscott Jamboree and Red Bean Supper will be held Saturday, October 3, in downtown Truscott.
