# Improvements Underway At Knox County Hospital

Progress is being made at the Knox County Hospital and the medical staff explains that with the additional new equipment, it is a "joy to work at the hospital now."

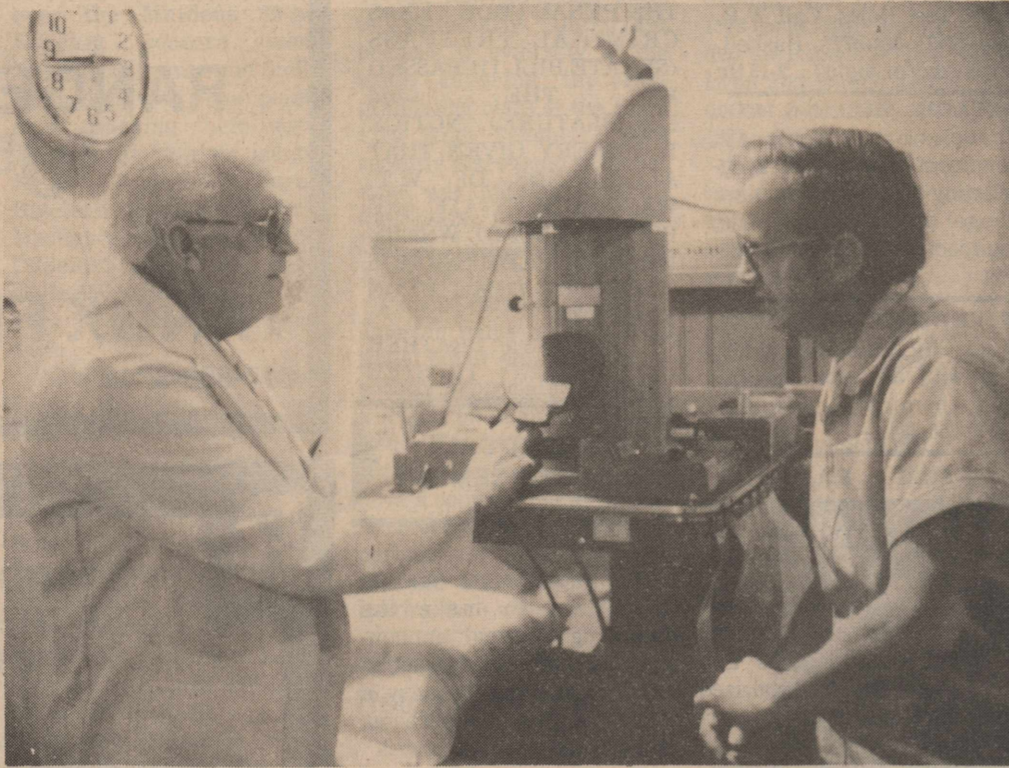
Among the latest equipment to be added is a new \$12,000 image intensification system which allows a gastro-intestinal study to be done at greater convenience to the patient. Dr. Newton D. Neufeld, who is well-trained in radiology, is able to conduct these G.I. studies here rather than referring patients elsewhere. Dr. W.F. Thompson also noted that the new equipment makes it much easier to examine and reduce fractures as well as detect foreign bodies.

Dr. Neufeld explained there was as much difference in using the new image intensifier as there is between a candle and an electric light. He said, too, that the work can be done in a dim light rather than in darkness as they had to do previously.

Another addition is an \$8,000 portable X-Ray which can be used in surgery, in the nursery, emergency room, or patient room, thus making it much easier for those patients who cannot be moved into the X-Ray room.

Another improvement which will be of great benefit to the hospital is the relocation and remodeling on the intensive-coronary care unit. Two rooms which have been used as ICU will be converted to patient rooms and the two rooms across the hall on the east side are being made into one larger room, removing the partition, and will accommodate three beds. Work is currently underway on the new ICU and should be completed by next week, according to Director of Nurses Melba Pharr.

Painting and cleaning of the hospital has been underway for several months and the plan continues to modernize. The heart monitoring system and the bedside monitor purchased by the Knox County Hospital Auxiliary are comparable to any found in the much larger hospitals.

## Missionary Visits KC

Doris Gene Stewart, missionary to Brazil for 28 years, visited in Knox City last week with her friend, Ozelle Stephens, and paid a visit to The *Knox County News* office.

Mrs. Stewart established Montalegre Children's Home in Recife, Brazil, in 1976, and the orphanage received its first child in September 1976.

At the time she opened the orphanage, Mrs. Stewart said that 18-21 babies were being found abandoned each month. With only one government institution available to receive the children, she said the death rate was very high.

Because of the need and the idea of saving the whole life of the child, to form it instead of having to reform it, Mrs. Stewart decided to concentrate on the abandoned newborns.

Since the opening, 400 babies have been received at Montalegre. Ten died, 20 are in residence, and 370 have been placed in homes.

Dr. Nelson Ribeiro, children's judge of Recife, stated at a Congress of Judges last year that one fourth of the population of Brazil is abandoned children.

The problem is so gigantic that Brazil cannot find adequate solutions, Mrs. Stewart said. Yet they are very hesitant to let foreigners adopt their children.

Most of the children of

Montalegre Children's Home have been adopted by Brazilians, but they have placed around 10 in other countries, including Belgium, Switzerland, France, Italy, Germany and on this trip to the United States, Mrs. Stewart brought Vicente who was lovingly received by Mr. and Mrs. Ed Miller of Marietta, Georgia. Vicente was sent to Montalegre by Dr. Nelson. He was two months old and weighed four and one-half pounds. He had been wrapped like a package and placed in a back yard. Today Vicente is five years old with a chance to become all he was meant to be, Mrs. Stewart proudly explained.

During the past two years, 245 babies have been received. Also six beautiful acres of Montalgre have become the property of Montalegre Children's Home.

Mrs. Stewart said, "God is the Father of orphans, this

work is His. We work together with Him and expect to make an even greater contribution in the face of Brazil's great crisis to the saving of these little lives."

Mrs. Stewart expressed her thanks to each person who helped this past two years, especially the First United Methodist Church of Knox City and Mrs. Ozelle Stephens. She said Mrs. Stephens had been a 'true grandmother' to these 400 children. She plans to start a nucleus of substitute parents who would like to be in direct contact with Montalegre Children's Home.

The first baby to arrive at Montalegre, Durad Stephen Stewart, is the namesake of Ozelle's, and the second baby to arrive was James Patterson in honor of the Rev. James Patterson, who was a former pastor of the Knox City-Benjamin First United Methodist Churches.

## Wind Stripcropping Is Frequently Practiced

In some parts of the state a conservation practice frequently used is wind stripcropping. According to Pete Elliston of the Conservation office, the practice could be used to advantage of Knox County land users.

Wind stripcropping is used more extensively in the Stephenville area than any area of the state. Elliston pointed out that this is due to the high cost of planting on such crops as peanuts. The expense and other problems involved with the crop they can not take the risk of blowing out, and have used the practice for years.

Whether stripcropping prevents blow outs, damage

to growing crops or wind erosion in the form of blown up turnrows, the damage is done. By planting several rows of tall growing crops such as sorghum and then a considerable greater number of rows of shorter, less dense growing crops, such as cotton will prevent sand particles from becoming air borne. Whether you call it wind stripcropping or planting crops in strips perpendicular to wind direction the results are the same—less erosion.

Anyone desiring information on wind stripcropping or any other conservation practice should contact the Soil Conservation office in Knox City.

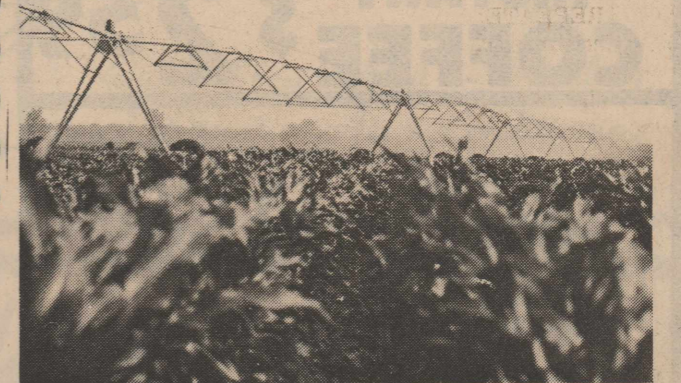



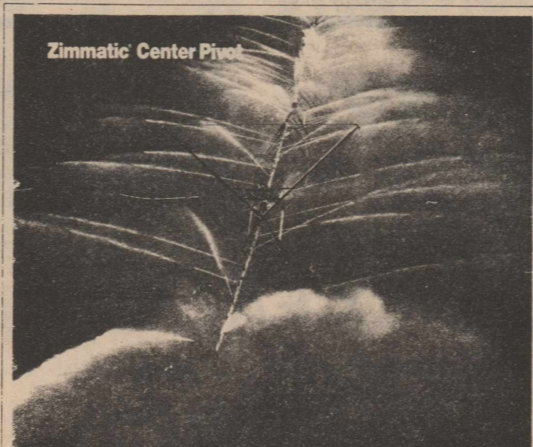
### O'Brien Boys Win Thriller Over Crowell
