The 1982 Knox County Livestock Show will get underway Friday and Saturday, January 15 and 16 in Munday. All entry fees are to be in to local FFA advisors or the county extension agent by Wednesday, January 13, at 5:00 p.m.

Sheep, rabbits, and broilers must be in place by Friday, January 15, at 10:00 a.m. Those animals not in the premium sale will be released to go home Friday after the show. Classes will begin Friday at 3:00 p.m.

All barrows will be weighed Friday from 5:00 to 10:00 p.m. and there will be no weighing Saturday morning. Classes will begin Saturday at 9:00 a.m. and will be judged in the following order, market barrows, beef and dairy heifers and breeding steers. The sale will follow at 3:00 p.m.

Judges for this year's show will be Don Ballard, cattle and swine; Charles Smith, sheep; John Therwhanger, rabbits; and Ed Blankenship, poultry.

Farabee Asks Re-Election To Senate

State Senator Ray Farabee announced his candidacy today for re-election to the Texas Senate representing the 30th District. The 30th Senatorial District will cover a twenty-nine county area, plus part of Denton County, in North Central and Northwest Texas, if the proposed redistricting plan is approved. This will include Knox County. Farabee, who is 49 and a Democrat, was elected to the State Senate in 1974 and is now completing his second term of office.

Senator Farabee has served for six years on the Legislative Budget Board which has primary responsibility for preparation of the State Budget. He was appointed by Governor Clements to the Texas 2000 Commission where he serves as chairman of the Agriculture Committee. He was appointed by

Knox City and area residents braced for the winter storm watch of which weather forecasters were warning Sunday night, but were not quite prepared for the early morning reading of three degrees Monday.

This area was spared the snow and sleet on Monday; however, Tuesday morning a light glaze of ice coated sidewalks and streets and several near mishaps in cars were noted in front of the *News* office.

Although the skies cleared and the sun was shining on Tuesday, forecasters were calling for still another cold front to hit the area Tuesday night predicting a 50% chance of snow or sleet.

Precipitation to the south and east of this area made travel hazardous early Tuesday, it was reported.

The bitter cold forced many schools in the area to shut down, as will be noted in another story elsewhere, because of Lone Star Gas Company's 100 percent curtailment to all industrial users.

According to school officials as of press time, school was to have been dismissed for two days, Monday and Tuesday, and advised that parents and students listen to Channels 2 and 13 in Knox City, Radio Stations KVRP-Haskell, KWFT-Wichita Falls, and KDWT-Stamford; and Channel 6 TV in Wichita Falls for information concerning classes, during this time as well as at later dates.

Superintendent of Schools W.R. Baker and principals Charles Reed and Bill Holcomb will notify teachers of information concerning classes.

Area schools also closing included Haskell, Hamlin, Benjamin, Rochester, Rule, Munday, and Paducah.

The employees of the Haskell County Appraisal District will mail out the homestead and agricultural use exemptions on Wednesday, January 13. These exemptions must be signed and returned to the appraisal district by April 30, 1982, if the taxpayer wants the advantage of the exemptions.

filling out the exemptions. Skiles Family Has Close Call Thursday

The Weldon Skiles family had a very frightening experience Thursday morning of last week, when they were almost asphyxiated by poisonous gas fumes.

Mrs. Skiles said the alarm clock had just rung about 6:00 a.m. and when she awoke she felt "real hot and very weak". She said she started to the kitchen and when she went through the living room, she fell. Her husband heard her and when he got to her and put her on the couch she was moaning telling him she could not explain how she felt other than she was very weak. She said she called to their daughter Rhonda to get her mother a robe so he could get her to the doctor and when Rhonda started down the hall, she fell, hitting the dresser. Estelle said that Weldon then realized that something in the house must be the cause of their illness and he got their son Greg awake to go for help next door

to the Larry Staggs. Greg's room was closed off from the rest of the house and he was not affected, but by this time Weldon was beginning to feel dizzy, Estelle said.

Neighbors Beth and Larry Staggs were there immediately and helped Weldon and Greg get Estelle and Rhonda to the Knox County Hospital.

Estelle explained that she had cleaned the filter on their central heating unit Wednesday and had been told to always keep the metal door to the unit securely closed to keep out the poisonous fumes. She said she thought she had the metal door closed but when gas company officials checked the unit the metal door was open. There was a basketball in the closet, she said, and she thought it might have gotten against the metal door preventing it from latching. She was not sure just why it had not closed, but she said with a warning like this horrible experience, she would be sure from now on that it was properly latched.

Estelle was still undergoing tests at the hospital early this week and expressed her profound thanks for having the hospital here and for the quick medical attention she and Rhonda received.

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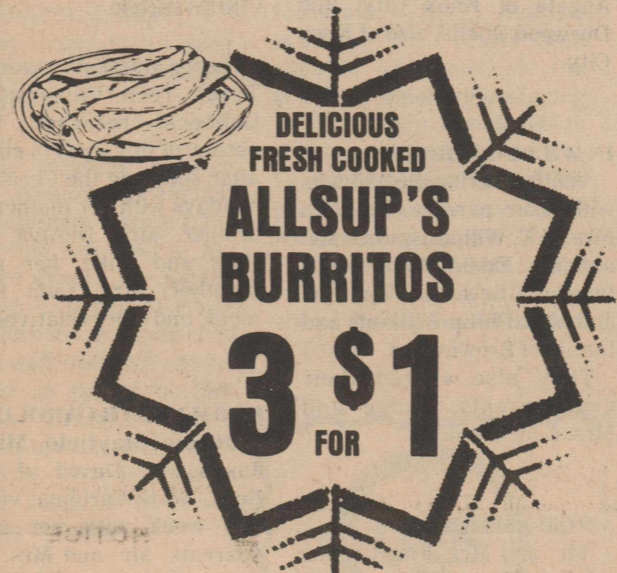

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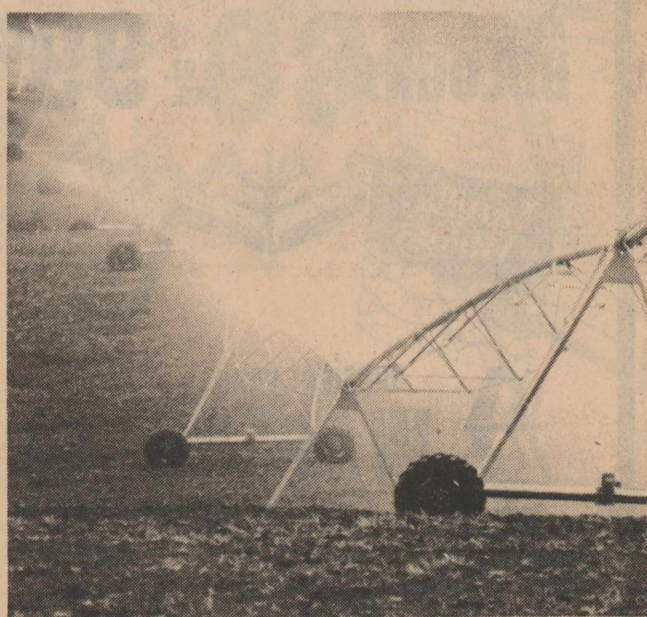

Lieutenant Governor Bill Hobby to the Select Committee on Public Education and was recently appointed to the Finance Subcommittee of the Water Task Force.

Over the past seven years, Senator Farabee has sponsored legislation to benefit this area as well as the entire State. As a result of his legislation, broad and significant changes can be expected in areas of taxation, education, and criminal justice.

Taxpayers will save \$18 million in 1982 because of the repeal of the state inheritance tax.

Taxpayers will save \$8 million in 1982 because of the exclusion of livestock and poultry from property taxes.

Small investors will save at

last \$4 million annually through the prevention of fraud in the sale of business opportunities.

Prospective public school teachers will have to pass a standardized test demonstrating their competency in basic subject areas, such as English and Math.

Retired teachers will be better able to keep up with inflation due to increased benefits ranging from 7% to 21% depending on the date of retirement.

Street traffic in prescription-type drugs will be reduced as much as 40% because of stricter record keeping requirements on prescription drug dispensing.

Convicted major drug dealers will serve a minimum of 10 years in prison and will forfeit to the state all property purchased with illegal drug profits.

The backlog in handling criminal appeals after trial, currently 4 years, will be reduced by at least 50% because 14 courts are now able to hear criminal appeals instead of just one.

In October Knox County received a direct benefit from Farabee's lateral road fund bill in the amount of \$63,153.24.

"Texas is on the right track and we want to keep it there," Farabee said. "As chairman of the Senate State Affairs Committee, I will work to maintain the healthy economy in Texas and provide solutions to the problems which will be facing us in the 1980's. I would like to continue my public service for the 30th District and the people of Knox County to deal with these challenges."

Farabee has been cited twice by Texas Monthly as one of the top ten legislators in Texas.

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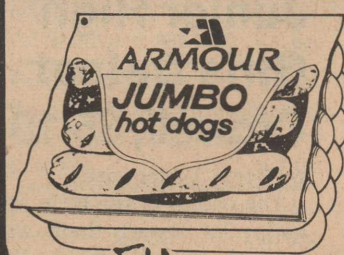


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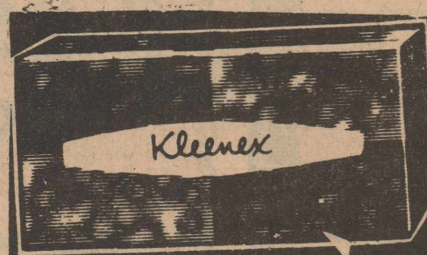
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
