# Whitley Collection To Be Shown At Bank

The art show for the month of March at the Citizens State Bank features several artists' works from the collection of Melanie Whitley.

One of her most prized paintings is a large landscape done by the late Anson artist and art teacher, John Crump. The painting "Deserted Pens" and barn is characteristic of Crump's oil glazing technique. The paintings were under-painted first with acrylics, then glazed in "thick, syrupy" transparent oil glazes, part of the glazes were "lifted off" and opaque oils were added. 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# As KC Woman Awaits Kidney

# Time Important

"Everyday I see people throwing away happiness with both hands. If they only could realize what happiness one day of good health would mean to me and to many others, how thankful they should be!" These words came from Jan Watson, a Knox City woman who has undergone one unsuccessful kidney implant and is currently number one on an emergency priority list for the entire United States for another kidney.

Jan's story is a very courageous one and when we asked if she would consent to an interview, she promptly replied that she would be glad to tell her story in hopes that more people would become aware of how vital organs are needed throughout the world in order that others might live.

When Jan was fourteen years old, she discovered she had developed diabetes. Even though there was no history of diabetes in her family, her father, Charles Larson, who is a registered pharmacist in Seymour, noticed symptoms in Jan - great thirst, increased appetite, loss of weight, and fatigue. When their family doctor confirmed his suspicion, Jan began taking proper care of herself and said it was never hard for her. She made sure she ate her meals on time, never yielded to the temptation of having a Coke with the other kids, but instead carried along a diet drink, and always saw to it that she had the proper rest. She said by living in a small town, everyone knew she had diabetes and there was no need to try and hide the fact as many youngsters sometimes do.

"Treatment has changed so much in the last twenty years," Jan said. "Even though I was on good juvenile control, at that time younger persons were not on as strict control as older adults, and they feel that because my blood sugar remained at a higher level than it would be allowed in children now, the damage was done in my early years even though I was following prescribed treatment."

Following her graduation as valedictorian of her class from Seymour High School, Jan attended the University of Texas at Austin and graduated with a degree in micro-biology. After studying a year at Baylor Hospital in Dallas, she was certified as a medical technologist. She did research at the University of Texas Medical School in Dallas and worked fulltime at different hospitals including Bethania Hospital in Wichita Falls and the Seymour Hospital until 1974.

As problems developed, Jan worked part-time until three years ago when she had to quit altogether. Her first complication was neuropathy of her feet and lower legs which has been worsening for the past ten years. Next came retinopathy, a problem with her vision, which she explained she knew was coming, so she had gone in before it developed and had nine laser beam surgeries. At that time, the laser beam surgery was experimental but is now considered routine treatment. In having her eyes checked before she lost any vision, she feels that it helped tremendously in delaying any loss of vision.

About five years ago, Jan began to experience high blood pressure and kidney failure, and then three years ago, when her kidneys failed, she underwent a transplant from her sister, Jean Nelson of Seymour. Jan's other family members, a younger

sister and brother and also her parents, were unable to offer as their kidneys did not match Jan's. The transplant seemed to be successful as Jan was her oldself within a matter of hours, according to her mother, Hazel Larson, but after 34 days, they knew the worst - Jan's body had rejected her sister's kidney.

Jan then began going to the Dialysis Center in Abilene three times a week, and two years ago, she and her mother went to Dallas to learn how to dialyze. She explained that it takes a partner and Jan's husband, Tommy, also learned the process so that he can help when Jan's mother cannot. Jan and her mother lived in Dallas for six to eight weeks for the training.

Jan said that when dialysis was first used in the centers, only so many patients could be put on the machines a day, and it was up to a committee to decide who would be lucky enough to receive the treatment. The ones who were turned down faced death. Now, all kidney failure patients are classified as medicare patients regardless of age and the dialysis machines as well as necessary supplies are furnished to the patients in their homes. She said it was much less expensive to receive the treatment in one's own home than in a hospital.

Jan is on the dialysis machine about four hours at a time three days a week, usually every other day on Monday, Wednesday, Friday, then skipping two days. The dialysis machine cleanses the blood of impurities. Jan said

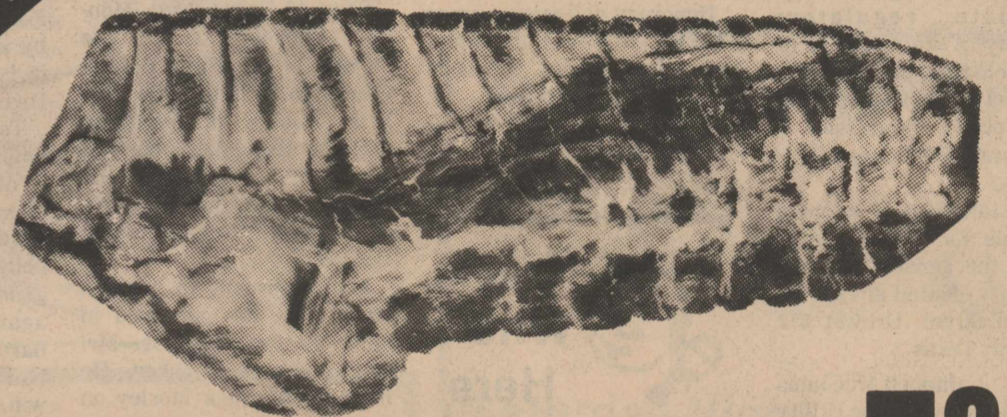

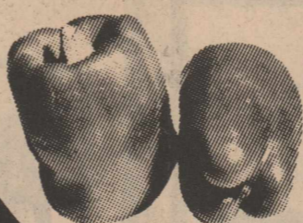

she had alerted both West Texas Utilities Co. and the City of Knox City Water Department to let her know in advance of any shutdown of electricity or cut off of water in order that she would have time to get off the machine. Someone would have to hand-crank the machine and the city employees have said that they could bring up a pump to keep her supplied with the necessary water, in case of an unforeseen emergency, to get her blood out of the machine and back into her body.

After the kidney rejection, Jan said she had planned to dialyze for the rest of her life, but in January 1981 she fell at home and broke her right leg just below the knee. The bone would not knit back and she underwent surgery in Dallas in October 1981. The doctors felt that her general health was deteriorating on the machine, as diabetics do not do as well on the machine as other kidney failure patients, so a second transplant was planned to help with the healing process on the broken leg. Jan wore a full cast for three months and stayed in bed for six months, but when the cast was removed the leg broke again.

As Jan was considered a poor candidate for another transplant, the doctors felt that she should take cobalt radiation. She took massive amounts of cortisone with the first implant which failed. The cobalt radiation technique was developed at the University of Minnesota and a total of 50 persons in the entire world have taken this. Jan is the first person in Texas to undergo the technique for total lymph node radiation in preparation for a transplant, and Dr. Richard Dickerman, who heads the team at Methodist Hospital in Dallas, is very enthusiastic over this procedure for transplant patients who have had previous problems.

She and her parents rented an apartment in Dallas and she began the cobalt radiation in October. She finished the 32 treatments on December 23, and since then, has had three touch-ups. After a patient completes the treatments, the touch-ups are administered to keep the antibodies at a lower level. She said it was believed that they could keep her at the present level for approximately six to eight weeks, and hopefully before this time expires, a matching kidney will be available.

Jan said she used to feel guilty about hoping that the kidney would be available soon as she knew a person would have to die in order that she might be helped, but the doctors explained that

this person donating the precious organ would have died regardless and that his or her commitment to donate the organ was the choice they had made, willfully. She said she wished more people would give some thought to donating organs, such as corneas, kidneys, etc., but that she did not blame anyone for not doing it. Most of the time if people wait until a person dies, they are too immersed in their own grief to make that sort of commitment. However, if a person gives some thought to what this would mean to others, all he or she has to do in Texas is to sign the back of their driver's license. She said not long ago her radiation doctor in Dallas told her he had never really given any thought to this until he became aware of how important it is to Jan now to receive this vital kidney. Jan also explained that those who felt that they would like to consider this may be assured that these organs can be surgically removed without disturbing the body's appearance and in later years, the family can have a great sense of satisfaction in knowing that their loved one's commitment made it possible for another to live a more normal life. She said she was not sure of the age requirement for donors.

With blood and tissue typing, a kidney can be matched as the information goes out all over the United States on a computer list. Jan is classified as emergency and it is critical that she receive a kidney during the remaining weeks when her radiation level of antibodies is low. With the antibodies that have built up within her, none of her family members can be considered.

She also stressed the fact that even though she had been under good control, her complications were probably due to genetics—she just did not have a strong enough system to combat them. With the changes in treatment that have been noted the past twenty years, there is lesser chance that juvenile diabetics will develop complications. She said she now has a little machine that was not available when she was a child, that by pricking her finger, she can do blood sugar studies several times a day and keep her insulin adjusted to the proper level. She said it takes only a couple of minutes to do this and that a person does not have to have a medical background to do the test, as it is very simple.

There is a risk, she said, in doing the second implant as implant patients are more likely to develop tumors, or she said, "I could die from post-operative infection as I do not have the ability to fight it. Also in 15 to 20 years, I could develop cancer from the radiation I've had, but Tommy and I have thought about it and talked about it

and we believe with the chance to have a more normal life, the gains outweigh the risks. If I don't have the implant, I could fall and break a hip and be a cripple for the rest of my life as nothing would heal. If this doesn't work, then I plan to try CAPD, which is continuous abdominal peritoneal dialysis, a new type dialysis where there is an opening into the abdomen and you put fluid in it four times a day and you can do it yourself. I'll probably have to have my kitchen fixed for a wheelchair since I've been in bed or in a wheelchair for several months."

Jan said that the people in Knox City have been so supportive of them in all of this. She said people would bring meals to the house, some would come in to do the dishes and grocery shopping, and since she had been in Dallas, many have sent cards and letters keeping her informed as to what's going on at home. Jan's attitude and spirit tend to be an inspiration to everyone. She is not one to feel sorry for herself or be depressed. She said life is too precious to waste one moment in being bitter. Jan's mother, said her attitude made it so much easier for the entire family and that she kept all of them going. Jan also remarked that her in-laws, Fannie and Abe Watson, have been like second parents and are always there when she needs them.

In addition to all the other things Jan is denied, she is on a very strict diet, for her diabetes and also for the kidney failure. Her liquid intake is very limited. When we asked Jan what she was

looking forward to after the implant, she said, "The first thing I want to do is go out and order a huge pizza and the biggest glass of iced tea they have!"

Jan has a lot going for her and if her determination is any indication of how things will go, Jan will be having that pizza and iced tea before we know it!

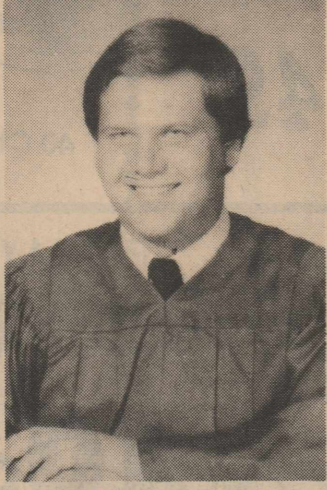

The women's service was conducted by the Chaplain, Missionary Patricia Ward and an institute was held with 3 classes.

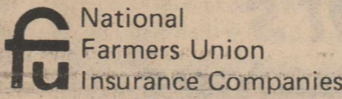
District Missionary Ward brought the message that night from Act 9, "Lord Work it Out", a stirring, blessed message.
