Grubbs Seeks Texas 78th Legislative Seat

State Representative Walter Grubbs of Merkel has officially filed with the State Democratic Executive Committee in Austin to have his name placed on the ballot in the May 1982 Democratic Primary for re-election to the Texas Legislature. Grubbs' legal residence is in the new 78th Legislative District where most of his present 61st district counties have been placed by the state redistricting board in their actions last October. The federal judge panel recently approved the plan insofar as the 78th district is concerned. Grubbs has represented the 61st district now for two terms in the State House.

In making his announcement for re-election to the legislature in the 78th district, Grubbs said he welcomes the opportunity to seek re-election in this new 12-county district, which includes four counties from his present 61st district, being rural Taylor, Nolan, Fisher and Jones, and adds Scurry County from District 63, Lynn County from District 77, and Garza, Kent, Stonewall, King, Knox and Cottle Counties from District 101. Grubbs added that he feels this 12-county area comprises a distinctly compatible community of interest because the economy is based largely on farming, ranching, oil and gas production, financial institutions and retail business. He added that he has spent most of his life in this West Texas area and feels he knows well the interests and problems of folks in this part of the state.

Having worked in West Texas and in Washington, D.C. for nearly 22 years, as assistant to Congressman Omar Burlison and Congressman George Mahon, Grubbs said he has found it very gratifying and a challenge to represent the fine people of this West Texas area in the Texas Legislature.

"Being a retired congressional employee I am free to spend my full time and energy in this position as your state representative. I have the time and desire to serve, with no other compelling



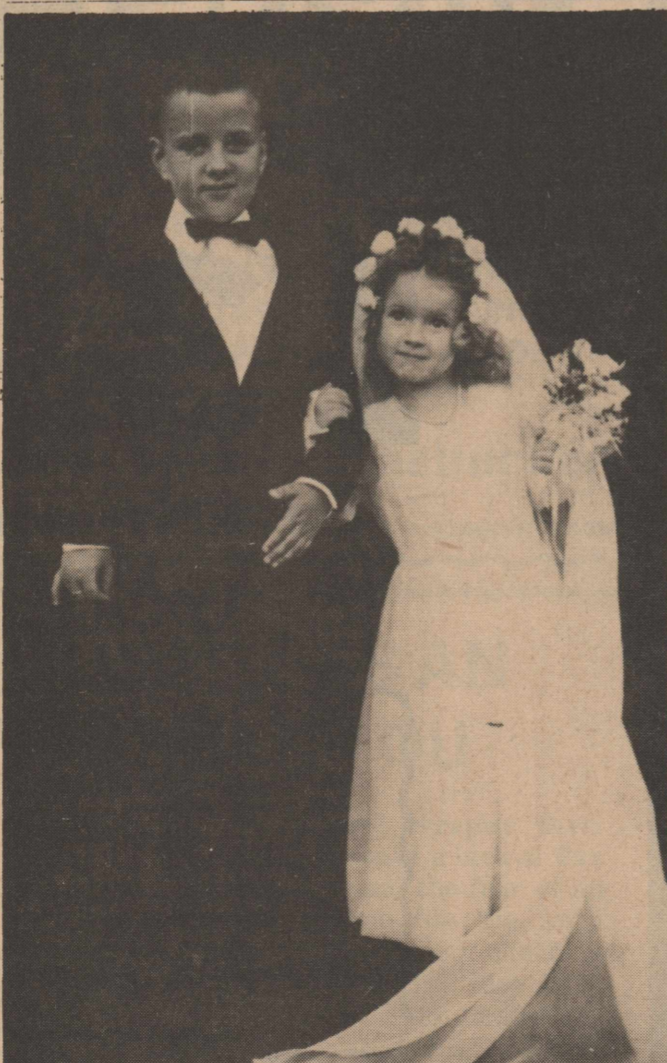

responsibilities except, of course, my wife and three fine grandchildren."


Grubbs was reared at Colorado City in Mitchell County, where he served on the City Council, and as

Mayor, for six years. He knows the problems of our smaller communities and shares the interests and concerns of this area from the standpoints of experience and background. His father was a cotton ginner at Colorado City and his mother served as County Treasurer for twelve years in Mitchell County.

In making his public announcement for re-election to the Texas Legislature, Walter Grubbs stated that he is always available to assist with problems and other community activities, and that he wants to get acquainted in the new counties and will be visiting over the district during the next few months frequently. Grubbs added, "This 12-county district is a big piece of the Big Country, but I will be making every effort to see as many people as possible so that I can personally ask for your goodwill and support in the Democratic Primary."



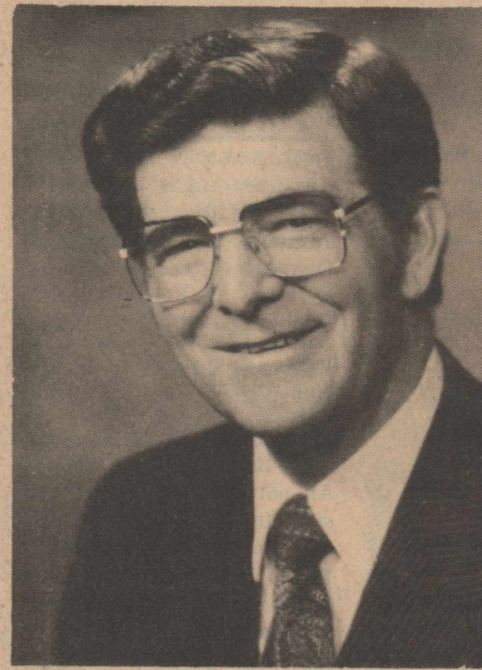

This entry will indicate the amount of tax the over-65 taxpayer should have paid in 1979, had he been granted the \$5,000 general homestead exemption and the \$10,000 over-65 homestead exemption. No refunds of taxes paid will be given for 1979, 1980, or 1981.
For 1982, the taxpayer's amount of homestead taxes paid may not exceed the amount of taxes the school district would have imposed on the homestead for 1979, had the taxpayer been granted his homestead exemptions. This frozen tax amount will remain in effect as long as the homestead remains the same.
