WHEREAS: Section 33.07 Texas Property Tax Code provides for the invoking of a 15% penalty on taxes that "remain delinquent in July of the year in which they become delinquent."

Therefore, be it resolved that the Knox City-O'Brien I.S.D. invoke a 15% penalty on all taxes becoming delinquent July 1, 1982 and each year thereafter;

Motion carried by unanimous vote.

A motion by Doug Meinzer seconded by Allen McGaughy that the district enter into contract with Jack McCreary, 510 West 15th, Austin, Texas, for the collection of delinquent taxes for the period February 16, 1982 and ending February 28, 1984. Motion carried by unanimous vote.

The board again reviewed the findings concerning the condition of the high school football field lighting system. They also reviewed proposals for the rebuilding of the system.

A motion by J.B. Rutherford seconded by John Gillispie that the secretary be instructed to advertise for bids for rebuilding the lighting system and that all such bids must be received by March 19, 1982. All bidding will be done according to procedures found in the official policies of the district. Motion carried by unanimous vote.

The board then reviewed the evaluations of the performances of the building principals.

A motion by J.M. Emerson seconded by John Gillispie that Charles Reed and Bill Holcomb be employed as principals and teachers subject to assignment by the superintendent for the 1982-83 school year. Compensation is established by district policy and is to be determined by the

Texas Education Code salary schedule for positions of pay grade 12, 207 days of service. This offer for employment is contingent upon their returning a signed contract acceptance to the superintendent by April 16, 1982. Failure to do so will void the offer for employment during the 1982-83 school year. Motion carried by unanimous vote.

The board president then called for bids for the repair of the cafeteria building roof. It was noted that bids were received from Queen Roofing, Haskell, Texas, and Knox County Roofing, Munday, Texas, and that neither bidder complied with the specifications set forth, also neither bidder was present.

A motion by John Gillispie seconded by Allen McGaughy that the board table any action of the above bids and proposals until additional information concerning the proposals can be obtained. Motion carried by unanimous vote.

Supt. W.R. Baker then reported to the board his findings concerning the closing of school January 11, 12 and 13 because of natural gas curtailment and his report of the closing to the Texas Education Agency. He advised the board that the matter of making the days up or following the official 1981-82 school calendar was a decision now vested with the board.

A motion by J.B. Rutherford seconded by Doug Meinzer that the Knox City-O'Brien ISD continue to operate on its previously adopted 1981-82 school calendar. Motion carried by unanimous vote.

A motion by J.M. Emerson seconded by John Gillispie that the meeting adjourn. Motion carried by unanimous vote.

Shannon Forehand handed out rice roses.

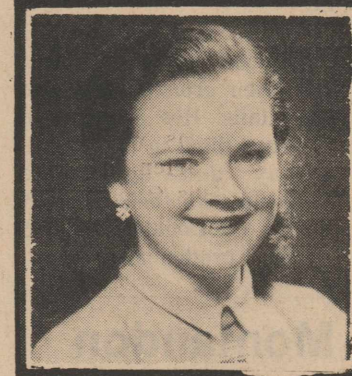

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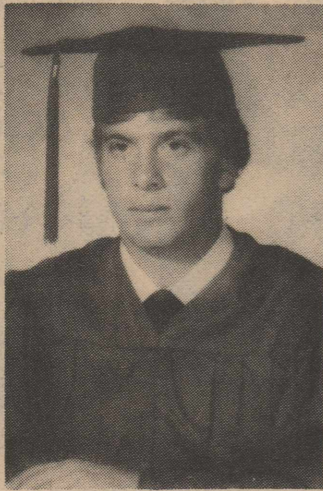


Seniors of the Week
