

In the early part of the 1950's, the west side of the business district, from the south end to the present location of Jones Pharmacy was burned or heavily damaged by smoke and water. Several men were injured during this fire, which lasted several hours.

Chevrolet booster truck.

During this fire, one of the trucks being used was a 1941 Ford, which had seen it's better days several years before. Because of the well worn condition of the truck, the engine and pump were shelled out with the extended and continuous use.

The city fathers, seeing the city in a desperate situation with only one truck, by emergency need bought a 1952 Chevrolet booster truck for the approximate cost of \$8,000.00. Its capaicty was 500 gallons of on board water and rated to pump 500 gallons of water per minute. Since it was purchased, it has made

over 1,800 calls Although the truck is still in use today, its dependability has long since past. The unavailability of parts for the chassis as well as the pump apparatus is a major concern for the department as well as the City. The company that built the apparatus, Howe Manufacturing, has since gone out of business. Due to reoccuring mechanical problems, the truck is down for repairs more time than

Each truck is tested, periodically, by the State Board of Insurance. This is done to certify the truck for insurance credit. Part of the Key Rate, or the base rate of fire insurance premiums is determined by this certification. (The Key Rate will be the subject of a future article.) In order for the truck to receive this credit, it must be able to pump a minimum of 500 gallons of water per minute.
