## City Sales **Tax Rebate** Increases

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$48.9 million to 962 cities as their share of the one percent city sales tax for March.

The payment is the largest representing a single month's tax collections ever distributed--29 percent over the same period in 1981.

Knox City's 1982 payments to date increased almost 15 percent over 1981 payments. Net payment this period was \$6,031.28 as compared to last year's \$4,167.16. Payments to date for 1982 were \$19,410.86 which amounts to a 14.97 increase over last year's

Munday's net payment for the period was \$2,124.21 as compared to \$3,339.70 last year. Payments to date were \$10,927.56, a decrease of 14.57 percent over last year's \$12,791.52



Farming is enough of a

gamble, so don't add to your problems by gambling on fertilizer needs for this year's Instead, collect soil sam-

ples and have them tested so you'll have a game plan for fertilizing your 1982 crops. The best time for collecting and testing soil samples is

right now before the spring rush. That way you can determine your fertilizer needs and order supplies early before the busy spring

A soil test provides information about the nutrient status of soil as well as lime requirements in areas of acid soil. With fertilizer costs on the upswing, this means that the value of soil nutrients also increases. Thus efficient and profitable fertilization depends on a good evaluation of the nutrient-supplying

capacity of soil. The first step to a good soil test is to take a good sample. Get a composite sample from each field by collecting a slice or core of soil from 10 to 15 different spots. Then mix them all together and send

a pint to the soil testing lab for testing. It's equally important to complete an information sheet with each soil sample.


