Special music will be provided by Jan Burt, who will sing "Listen With An Open Mind."

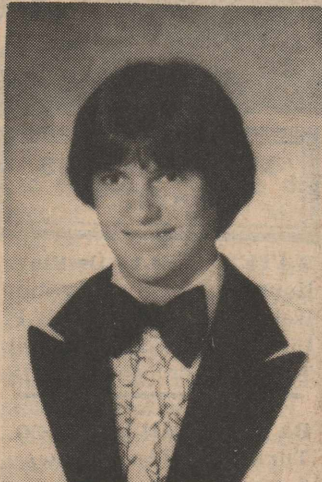
Rev. Doug Stenberg, pastor of the First United Methodist Church, will bring the message and Foursquare Church pastor Dave Stone will give the benediction.

Round both her junior and seniors.

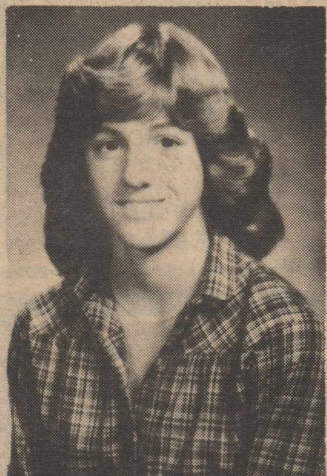

## Gene Nix Elected Sheriff

Gene Nix, recently appointed sheriff of Knox County, won election to the unexpired term of James Redwine Saturday when voters gave him 979 votes to his opponent, Benny Archer's 295.

In the race for Precinct Two commissioner, incumbent Bobby Roberson garnered 166 votes to Wayne Sutton's 134 to force them into a runoff election on Saturday, June 5. Others seeking the seat were Sammy Pierce and Fred Carver who each received 76 votes.

Lee Patterson, incumbent for Precinct Four commissioner, was re-elected with 226 votes to Chester Smith's 146.

Pate Meinzer won election as Justice of the Peace for Precinct 2 with 262 votes. Janice Tolson had 130 and Imogene Young received 52.

Of special interest to Knox County voters was the race for State Representative, 78th District. Steve Carriker, a 31-year-old Roby farmer and son of the late Rep. Max Carriker, stunned incumbent State Rep. Walter Grubbs in

## APPLYING FOR A SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER

Every spring, in anticipation of summer, hundreds of high school students start looking for summer jobs. One of the very first things that they are asked for is a social security card. A great number are not hired because they don't have a social security number, so they rush to the social security office expecting to get a number right away. Since all numbers are issued out of Baltimore, Maryland, there is a delay in receiving the number itself.

Some tips to follow in applying for a number are (1) Apply for a social security number well in advance, usually 8 weeks before school is out, and (2) Have the proper and necessary documents.

The necessary documents are a filled-out and signed application and proofs. The applications can be obtained by calling or visiting the social security office. Along with this, you MUST present a certified copy or original birth certificate.

Remember, don't wait until the last moment. The sooner the application is made, the sooner the number will arrive.

## MINUTES OF THE CITY COUNCIL MEETING

April 27, 1982

The City Council met in a special session with Mayor Charles Auburg, Councilmen Carol Felts, Jim Potteiger, Larry Staggs, Craig Williams, and Greg Kuehler present.

The meeting was a budget workshop. The prior year budget and actual expenditures were compared and discussed.

The Council discussed equipment that may have to be replaced in the near future. These included a fire truck, garbage truck, dump

truck, street sweeper and pickup.

Jim Potteiger asked to go on record as favoring turning a few of the downtown street lights back on. Approximately 65 lights on Main, Central and City property were turned off in April 1981 thus saving \$475.25 per month.

Funds for a Softball Field were discussed in the April 19 meeting. The discussion included donating \$2,000.00 from Revenue Sharing Funds for this purpose. The Council was advised that "donations to any organization or individual, no matter how worthy the purpose, are forbidden." The Council was pleased to learn that the Softball Association has secured a site, most of the necessary equipment and promises of services.

Mayor Auburg advised that there is an opportunity to lease the golf course property at \$35.00 per acre for oil, gas and minerals. The City owns one half of the royalty. The

Mayor recommended that the City lease the 60.51 acres. Greg Kuehler made a motion not to lease the property. Jim Potteiger seconded the motion. All members of the Council voted in favor of not leasing said property.

Mayor Auburg noted that due to the needed equipment and inflation, it will be necessary to raise taxes to meet this year's budget. The City has not increased taxes since 1974.

### Sales Tax Up Almost 20 Percent

AUSTIN, Tex.—State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$31.8 million to 962 cities as their share of the one-percent city sales tax for April.

"Total payments we have sent to these cities so far this year are running more than 19 percent ahead of last year, which means sales of taxable merchandise in these cities are running that much more than 1981," Bullock said.

Knox City's net payment this period was \$3,495.77 as compared to \$2,290.52 for the comparable period last year. Payments to date for 1982 totalled \$22,906.63, reflecting a 19.47 percent increase over payments to date last year.

Munday received \$2,684.82 for this period. Comparable period last year was \$1,717.18. Munday's payments to date were \$13,612.38, noting a decrease of 6.18 percent from year to date payments last year of \$14,508.70.

Other towns and their respective amounts for this period include Aspermont \$2,686.47, Crowell \$1,198.55, Haskell \$4,552.27, Rochester \$696.02, Rule \$680.47, Seymour \$5,005.12, Starford \$5,643.02, and Throckmorton \$2,054.06.

No amounts, for the following towns were listed, but year-to-date totals were Benjamin \$718.72, Goree \$1,090.57, O'Brien \$364.48, and Wehnert \$359.73.

The city sales taxes are collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and businesses and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller.

## Great Plains Program Aids Conservation

Five years ago W.R. Moore Jr. of Munday had a gully eating into his farmland. To protect the farmland from the gully, Moore built a Grade Stabilization Structure on his farm four miles southwest of Knox City. The dam of the Grade Structure is twenty seven and one half feet from the bottom of the dam to the crown. A pipe barrel of forty eight inches in diameter and a riser of seventy eight inches in diameter were needed for the primary spillway. A secondary earthen spillway was also constructed. It is designed to function only one year in twenty five.

Moore entered into a Great Plains contract with the Soil Conservation Service in November 1976 to do this and other conservation work on the farm. The Great Plains Program has made it possible for Moore to build

parallel terraces, diversion terraces, waterways, and put in underground irrigation pipe along with the Grade Structure. The Great Plains Program was established in 1956. The purpose of the Great Plains Program is to "assist farm and ranch operators to make, in orderly progression over a period of years, changes in their cropping systems and landuses which are needed to conserve the soil and water resources of their farms and ranches and to install the soil and water resources of their farms and ranches and to install the soil and water conservation measures needed under such changed systems and uses."

Productive cropland, valued at several hundred dollars an acre, can be destroyed and scarred by gullies "eating" their way into fields. These gullies are caused where water courses are taking rainfall runoff into river channels such as the Brazos and Wichita rivers. Gullies of this nature also occur where cropland borders along "badlands" throughout the county. There are many areas in Knox county that are eroding due to these washes and gullies. A Great Plains contract would help farmers and ranchers to build a Grade Structure, which is a costly practice. For more information, contact the Soil Conservation office in Knox City.

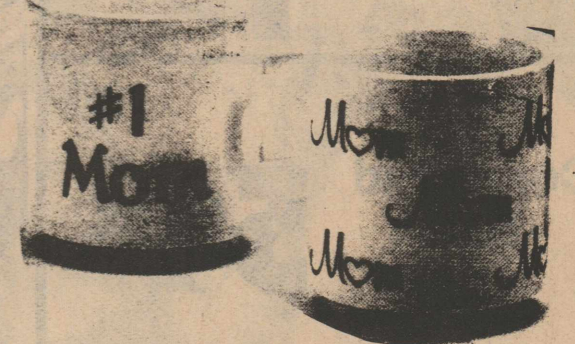

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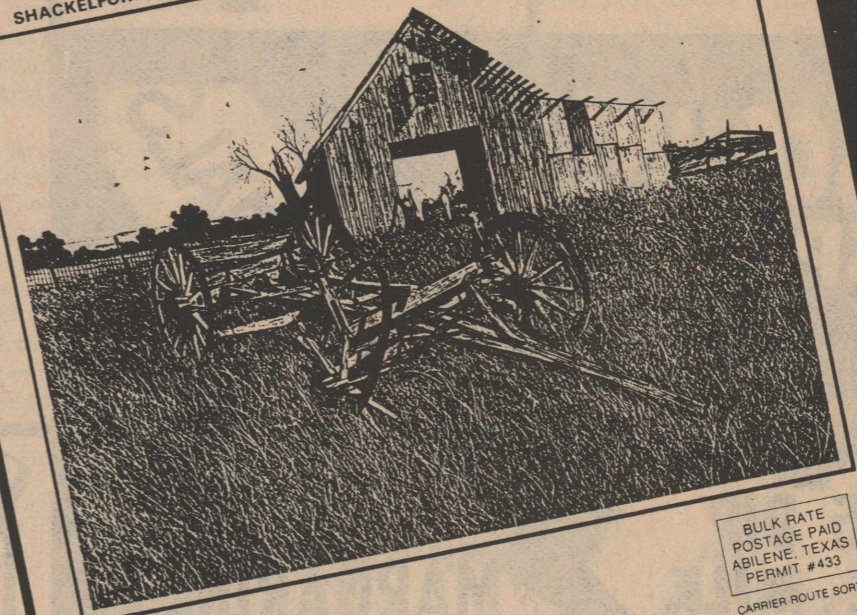
