

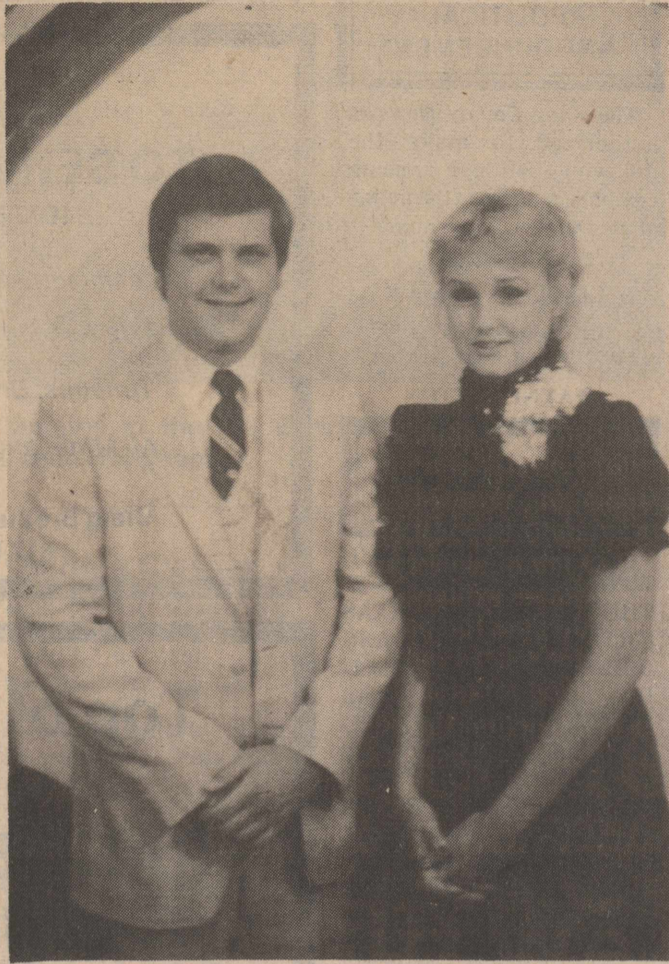

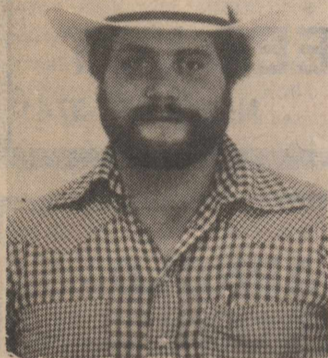
honor roll, and the physical fitness awards. Recipients of these awards are listed elsewhere in this week's News.

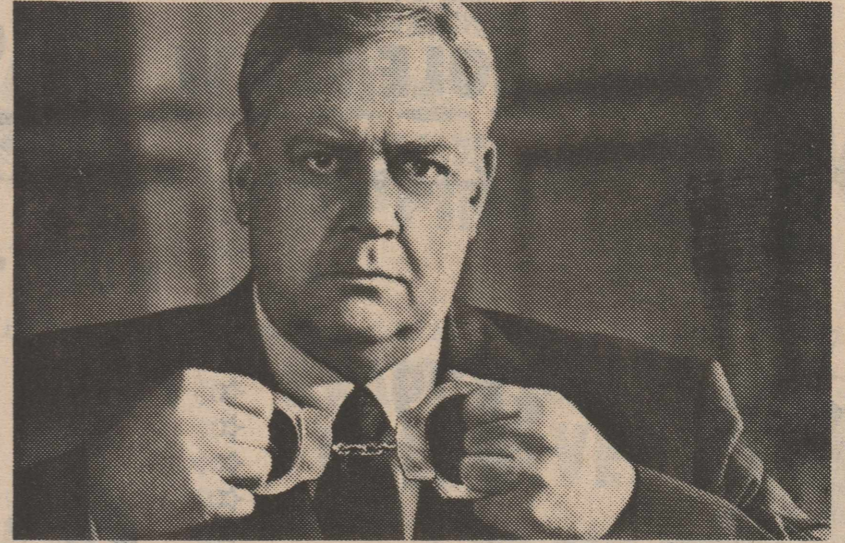

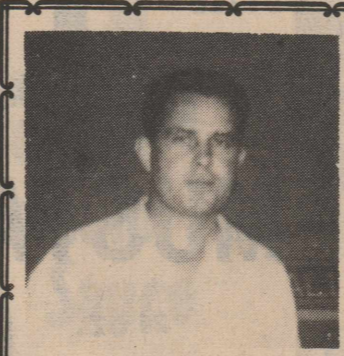

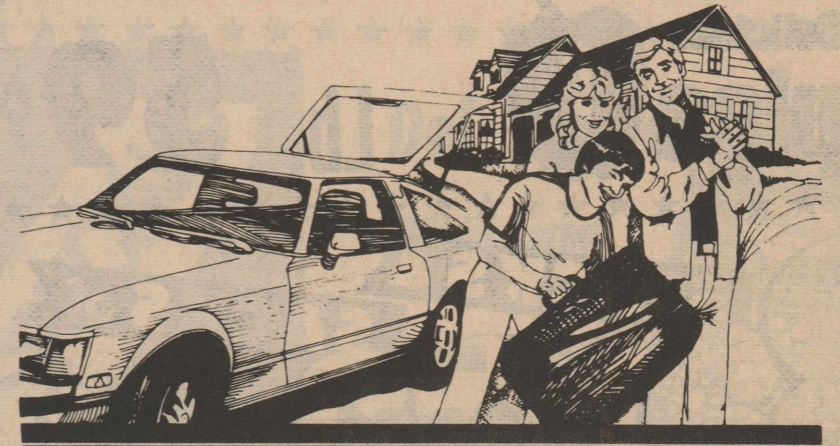

### Benjamin's Gas Rate Increasing

AUSTIN, Texas, May 18—The Railroad Commission has allowed new gas rates for customers of Lone Star Gas Company in the unincorporated areas around Benjamin and Shady Shores.

The new environs rates are identical to those already approved by the respective nearby cities for customers within their corporate limits.

With the changes, an average winter monthly residential bill for six Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas will increase by 95¢ for 104 customers in the environs of Benjamin, and by \$2.60 for 10 customers in the environs of Shady Shores.

The new rates will take effect on May 24 for Benjamin and May 27 for Shady Shores.

The Railroad Commission has the authority to approve rates for gas service in unincorporated areas of Texas. Proposed gas rates for these areas are examined in light of the company's operating efficiency and the rates that have been approved by the nearby city governments.

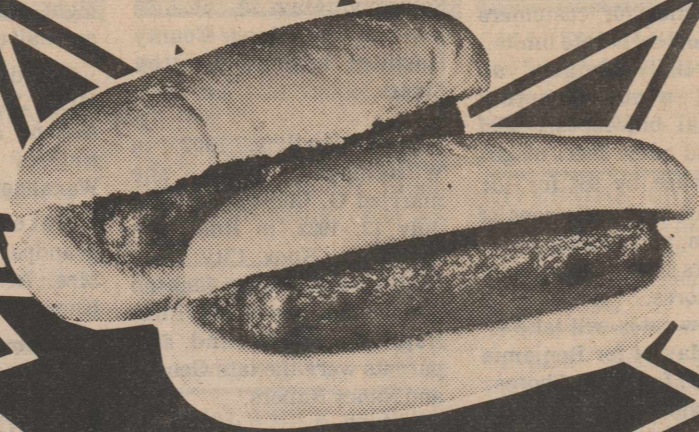

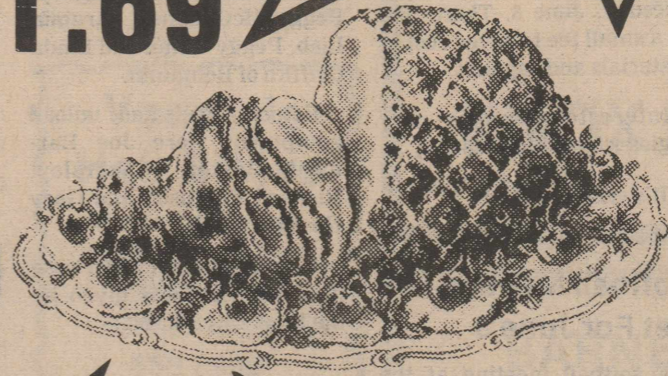

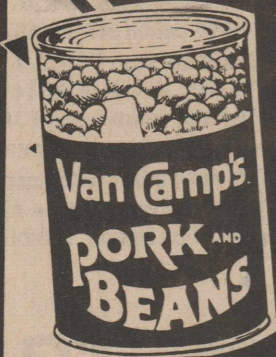
