County Horse Show Saturday

The annual Knox County Open All Trophy Horse Show will be held at the Knox City arena Saturday, June 12, with classes getting underway at 9:00 a.m.

Tom Bigbee of Fort Worth will judge the show.

There will be three divisions, with a belt buckle being awarded to the high point winner in each division. Divisions are youth 13 and under, youth 14-18, and the open division. Age division is determined by contestant's age on January 1, 1982, in the youth classes. No stallions are allowed in youth classes.

In order to qualify for high point, contestant must enter halter and at least three performance classes. Points count only in the division in which they are earned. Performance classes will be judged under 4-H rules. Open performance classes are for contestants of any age and for stallions, mares and geldings.

Trophies will be awarded in all classes through fifth place. Trophies will also be awarded to Grand and Reserve Champion Stallion, Mare and Gelding.

In addition to halter classes for stallions, mares and geldings, there will be a walk-trot class for children 8 and under, two English classes and classes in showmanship, western pleasure, western horsemanship, reining, western riding, trail, barrels, flags, poles and stake race. The final class will be a ride-a-buck class, in which contestants ride bareback sitting on a dollar bill, at a walk, trot and lope. The last rider with a dollar bill still under him wins all the money lost by the other riders.

Physical Therapy Now Available

Hospital 'Looking Up'

The Knox County Hospital is now able to offer physical therapy to its patients as well as out-patients, with the addition of the new physical therapy department.

Hospital administrator Randy Abernathy said that the establishing of the new department is the culmination of the medical staff's long-standing desire to be able to offer these services and that many persons, both young and old, will benefit from the treatments.

Here last week to set up the new department were Kana

Davis, licensed therapist of Abilene, who will be here two or three times a week; Sandi Zirkelbach, licensed therapist and regional director of TPT, Inc. based in Houston, who will be here probably once a month; and Denise Cope, licensed therapist who also works out of the corporate office in Houston and was here to assist in establishing the local therapy department.

David Morton, licensed physical therapy assistant, will be local clinical manager and has moved to Knox City

with his wife Sherri, and children Elizabeth, 3, and Jillian, 1. A graduate of Vincennes University in Indiana, Morton has had eight years' experience in therapy, transferring here from the Corpus Christi Memorial Medical Center.

New facilities are almost ready for the physical therapy department, Abernathy said, but until the carpet is laid and other details are finished, a small room within the hospital is being used for out-patients' treatment. Therapists said that about one-half of their equipment is here and the other, including the whirlpool, should arrive within the next week or ten days. Out-patients are admitted on doctors' referrals, Abernathy explained, and the department is open Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. Hopefully, within a month, they expect to be open seven days a week.

The administrator said the addition of the physical therapy department is evidence of the progress the hospital is making. The new, ultra-modern equipment now available at the Knox County Hospital includes an image intensifier, portable x-ray, sigmoidoscope, gastroscopes, autoclave steam generator, anesthesia machine, and bedside monitor. The hospital now has a new ICU and the administrator's office has relocated upstairs in order to make room downstairs for the physical therapy department. "New carpet and new paint have added greatly to the appearance of the hospital, Abernathy said, and with two of the best doctors one will find anywhere right here on our staff, the hospital is continuing to advance."

Abernathy reported that of 71 hospital employees, a total of 25 is licensed or registered personnel, which is quite a record for a hospital this size.

Coming up in the near future, possibly by July 1, the hospital will have a mobile unit of ultra-sound radiology, one of the greatest diagnostic tools available, he said.

Charlie Myers Grain Is Open In Benjamin

Charlie Myers Grain Company has recently opened new facilities in Benjamin.

Construction began in February of this year and the new office building has 1200 square feet and contains three offices.

The two large storage bins will hold 360,000 bushels and manager Dave Oxford says that truckers will be interested to know that the leg will handle 8,000 bushels per hour. The new 60 ft. scale will also weigh semi's.

First wheat was received Sunday, June 6, and was brought in by Cactus Farms. Moisture content was 14 and it was the first load from Cactus Farms' 12,000 acres, Oxford said.

Oxford said that they were paying \$4.03 per bushel on the Government Storage Reserve Program. Also, he explained that there would be free storage until July 1.

Office personnel includes Beverly Tolson and Tammie Jobe while Troy Oxford is outside man.

In addition to the facilities in Benjamin, Charlie Myers Grain Co. also is located in Truscott, Gilliland, Rhineland, Red Springs, Seymour and Wichita Falls.

Roberson Is Re-Elected To Office

In a light turnout Saturday for the Democratic Second Primary (Runoff) Election, incumbent Bobby Roberson managed to outdistance his opponent, Wayne Sutton of Vera, for the Knox County Commissioner, Precinct Two seat, winning 164 to Sutton's 151.

Other races and Knox County totals included Attorney General - Hannah 217 and Maddox 187; Land Commissioner - Snelson 249 and Mauro 146; Judge Court of Criminal Appeals Place 1 - Humphreys 187 and Campbell 176; and Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals Place 2 - Black 193 and Miller 173.

Highway 6 To Receive Seal Coat

CHILDRESS--Work in Knox County is included in a major highway rehabilitation and safety program approved by the State Highway and Public Transportation Commission.

District Engineer Lewis H. White said work in this area is part of a continuing effort to modernize and increase the safety characteristics of roads and highways which are worn out or inadequate for today's traffic.

Area projects include 13.7 miles of seal coat on State Highway 6 from Benjamin south to the Haskell County line at a cost of \$184,200.

The 1983 State Highway Safety and Betterment and Farm to Market Road Improvement program will provide improvements to 3,908 miles of highways.

The program includes 656 projects in 198 counties in the state.

Approximately 61 percent of the financing included in the program is on US- and State-numbered highways, 37 percent is for FM and RM roads and two percent is held in reserve.

The program includes work which will upgrade existing highways to handle larger volumes of traffic than present designs can accommodate efficiently. The work also will enhance safety and will reduce the amount and kind of maintenance necessary to protect the public's investment in the highway network.

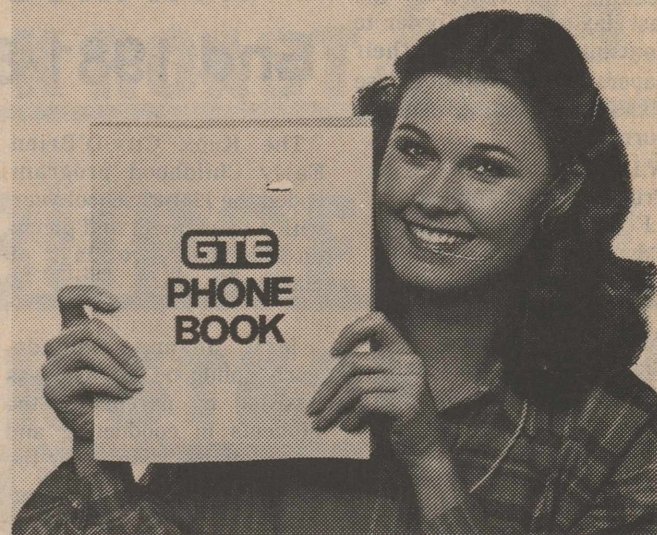

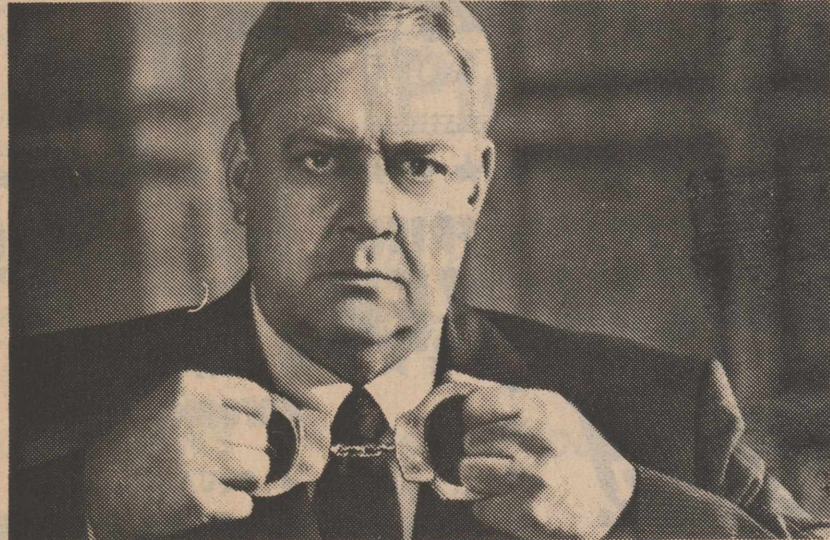

High Protein Grass Is Not An Accident

By Charles Siepel

Which grass has the best protein content for use in Knox County?

Actually, protein content of a grass is influenced mainly by two factors: amount of fertilizer it receives and stage of maturity.

Fertilizer increases protein content. Nitrogen has been recognized for a long time to be important. The more nitrogen applied, the higher the protein content. Phosphorus, potassium, sulfur, and other nutrients are also important for improving protein content in grass.

All soils in Knox County are inherently low in nitrogen, and many also are low in phosphorus, potassium, sulfur and other nutrients. A soil test is the best guide for planning fertilization practices for pasture hay.

Maturity of a grass greatly influences protein content and other quality factors. As grasses begin to mature, protein content, digestibility and other quality characteristics decline rapidly.

As a rule, grasses are best quality when at three to four weeks of growth. Grasses which make seedheads, such as Kleingrass, johnsongrass and bluestem, should be grazed or harvested for hay before seedheads appear.

Coastal bermudagrass makes no viable seed and should be used by the time it has three to four weeks of growth. If grown for grazing,

cattle should be turned into Coastal pastures when they have less than three weeks of growth. Harvest Coastal hay at about four weeks of growth.

Soil and climatic conditions and fertilization practices influence growth rate on all grasses.

Numerous forage demonstrations have been conducted in recent years and results of these are available at the county Extension office.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, or natural origin.

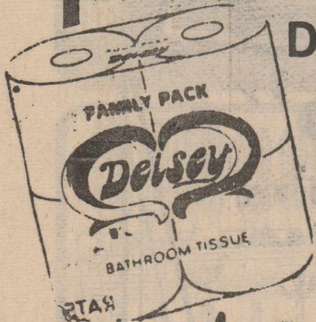

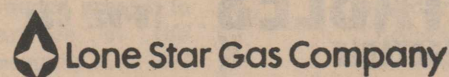

The rate schedule is expected to furnish a 11.44 % increase in the Company's gross revenues in the environs of Benjamin, Texas

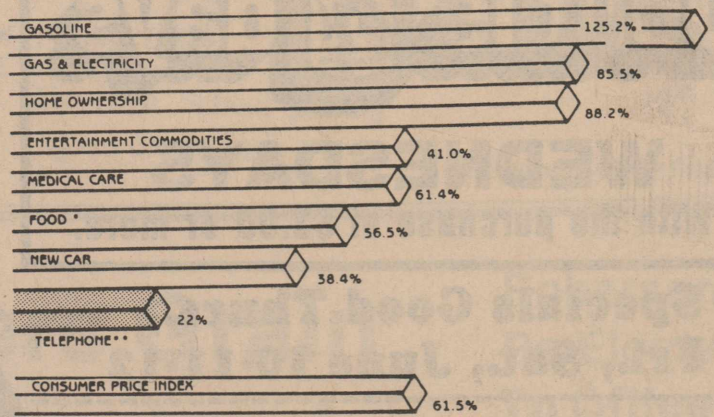
