Playoff Games Financially Rewarding

Many people never realize where their ticket money goes after they enter the gate at ballgames. For football games, the gross receipts are totaled by the home team, officials are paid by scale according to the gross gate and one official draws mileage, then the net proceeds are split between the two schools.

The game gates vary a lot because of the size of the towns, how far visiting fans have to travel, and general interest in each match-up. This year Knox City's part of the following games was: Albany, \$934.13; Munday \$1,398.80; Chillicothe \$876.50; Crowell \$883.50; Seymour \$1,336.15; Throckmorton \$265.10; Jayton \$1,915.90; Aspermont \$298.02; and Motley Co. \$302.50.

Each official usually makes \$30-40 depending on the gate. Mileage is paid from Abilene or Wichita Falls. Other expenses for each game include pre-game

scouting, where some lucky person, usually Coach Cox this year, gets to miss the weekly excitement of our own game and travel xx-number of miles to scout next week's team. He is paid for his mileage and meal. Then for out of town games, the team is fed after the game, and this usually costs \$150-200 per week.

Varsity uniform laundry ran \$500 for the season.

Football equipment this season ran \$8,000, which was a little over most years because we had to buy several new sets of shoulder pads at \$40 each, helmets at \$70, to suit out a record number of athletes. This equipment money went for such various things as repair of older helmets and pads, repairing the video camers, \$40 footballs, mouth pieces, hand pads, face masks, tape, Gatorade, band-aids, new jerseys, practice shorts and shirts, knee pads, hip pads,

chin straps, helmet decals, belts, ankle braces, more tape, socks, neck rolls, etc., etc. These supplies and equipment needs are budgeted by the coaches and checked carefully during the year.

Our net from the playoff games was \$694.12 from the Meridian bi-district game at Graham; \$836.13 regional against Nazareth and \$1,012.61 quarter-finals against Valley, both played at Childress.

Most playoff games are handled at neutral sites with their schools, Lions' Clubs and/or Chambers cooperating. Graham and Childress each offered a package deal where they furnished the parking attendants, ticket takers, chain-gang, announcers, etc. leaving both participating schools free to enjoy the game. They even take care of furnishing the trophy for the winning team. Their interest in hosting a

playoff game comes from proceeds at the concession stand, publicity for their cities, and the surge of business the game brings to their gas stations, motels, and restaurants.

Another expense off-the-top at all playoff games is 12 1/2% of gross receipts which goes to the UIL office in Austin. Gross gate for the Semi-finals game with Wink in Big Spring was \$5000; UIL received \$663, six officials each earned \$60.50 and travel, leaving Knox City a net of \$1,962.

Gross for the State playoff against Bremond at Weatherford was \$7,000; our net proceeds were \$2,781.

As you can see most of expenses for football occur whether a small team goes beyond district or merely suits up for the regular games. A season's profit comes from the playoff games, making them financially rewarding, as well as enjoyable.

Behind-Scenes People Crucial To Success

The time has come to admit that Maaybee the coaches and football players had a little help in winning the State Championship. There were just a few unsung helpers in the background.

Roland Marion and Billy Bob Reynolds ran the video camera at all the ballgames and showed the films at Booster Club meetings and later in the year on our local tv channel. Tommy Kent and Jerry Ray were on the sidelines running the chain, while J.M. Emerson kept the clock and Bud Reynolds gave us the play-by-play.

Down on the field David Counts and Lyndol Cypert were keeping stats which turned into the best newspaper accounts around, printed weekly in the KC

News.

Hiram Whitaker and Dick Evtatt headed up the Booster Club and, along with other Hound Moms and Pops, kept windows painted and signs made, and even helped with the scouting.

Dr. Thompson and Jackie Young with the ambulance were always on hand, just in case, as were our local policemen and highway patrolmen, Richard Ferguson, Daryl Clifton, Danny Wainscott and Brian Williams.

If you wondered why Coach Ronnie Cox wasn't at any of our games, it wasn't because he didn't care, he was just across the country or across the state, scouting the team

we would play next. His work was invaluable, as the other coaches were then able to assemble the new playbooks early the next Monday morning. When it got down to the playoffs, we weren't sure who we might be playing next, all the coaches turned scouts and went off in different directions. We also called on Greyhounds-at-Heart Jerry Lowrey, Tony Daniel, and Rogers Lankford to help scout games in their areas.

We cannot forget our own custodial staff who tended our field long before games ever started and kept the buses going: James Hewitt, Troy Brown, Whitey Gutierrez, James Washington, and Johnny King. Whitey, Dick Wupperman, and Louis Baty also

served as bus drivers for band and pep club. Many of the staff manned the gate for home games.

Again we want to mention all our local merchants who bought ads on the football page every week and helped to broadcast our games on KVRP. It was wonderful, too, to have our very own broadcaster Dave Thompson, alias Mark Decker, to interview our coaches and give interesting play-by-plays in our behalf.

The boys, coaches and faculty at Knox City-O'Brien Schools appreciate every one of you and the help you gave. You have truly made the State Championship more than a school honor; it is an achievement for the whole Knox City-O'Brien area.

Knox City's First Team Originated In 1921

The first Knox City High School Football Team originated in 1921 with thirteen players and the football field where the city park and swimming pool are now located. Four of those original players still live in Knox City including Ulric Lea, Jesse Hitchcock, John Milford, and Harvey Freeman.

Only three members of the first team had ever seen a football game. To prepare for the first game and a game with Munday, Coach Grady West, who was also the ag teacher, took his team to see Haskell and Hamlin play at Haskell.

The Greyhound mascot came about the next year in 1922 when the basketball team was playing on a dirt court and some spectator was heard to remark, "Why they run just like a pack of Greyhounds."

Football was suspended during the period from 1936 to 1939 because of the financial depression.

Knox City began playing six man football in 1940 and continued until 1952 when they went to eleven man again.

The second football field was where the current high school and ag buildings are

now located. That field was lighted in 1946.

Greyhound Field was moved to its present location for the 1952 season.

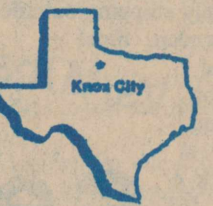

★ TOMMY SLOAN ★

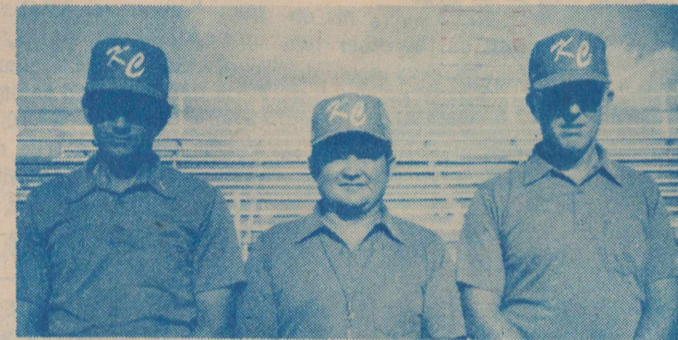
Tommy Sloan was born and raised in Haskell County. He is the son of Howard Sloan and the late Fychelene Norman.

He graduated from Rochester High School where he was a four year letterman, all district, all area football player, regional qualifier in the mile three years and played basketball. Rochester won district in football every year except his sophomore year, when Knox City won. He was a member of the all-area band on the French horn, all district one act play casts, and was a Lone Star Farmer.

He then went to McMurry College where he was vice-president of the sophomore class, and a member and officer of IHR Social Club. He was not able to play any sports in college due to a bad knee. He graduated in 1966 with a degree in physical education.

He then married Carolyn Bean of Rochester in 1967, who is the daughter of Loree Hamilton and the late Wilson Bean.

Tommy then came to Knox City in 1975 and has helped Coach Rogers and the Greyhounds to several championships before becoming head football coach this year.

Jimmy Rogers was born in Olney, Texas, in 1945. He spent all of his childhood in Elbert, Texas, where his parents Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Rogers live today.

He coached at Anton, Texas, for two years and came to Knox City in 1969 as head track coach.

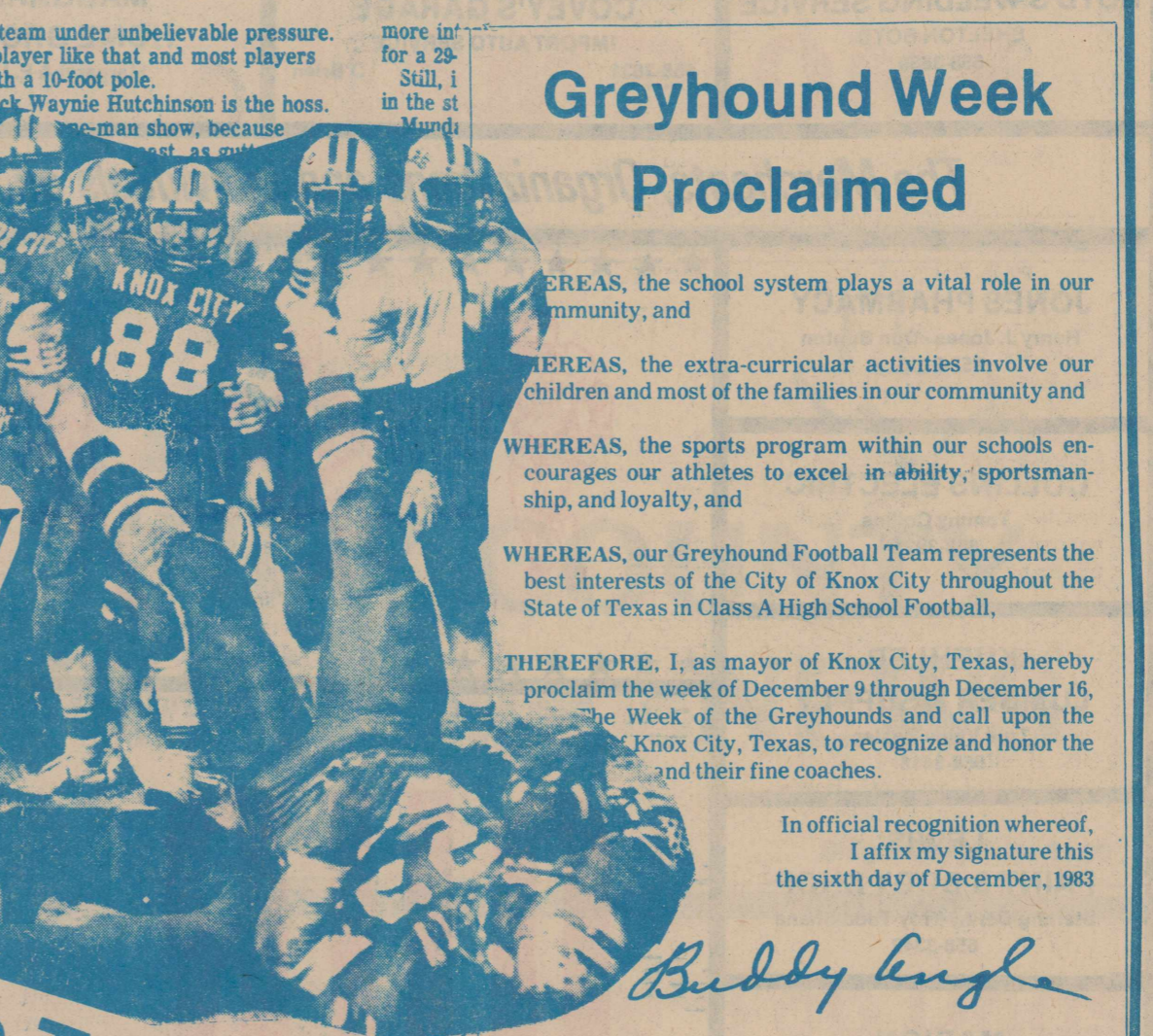

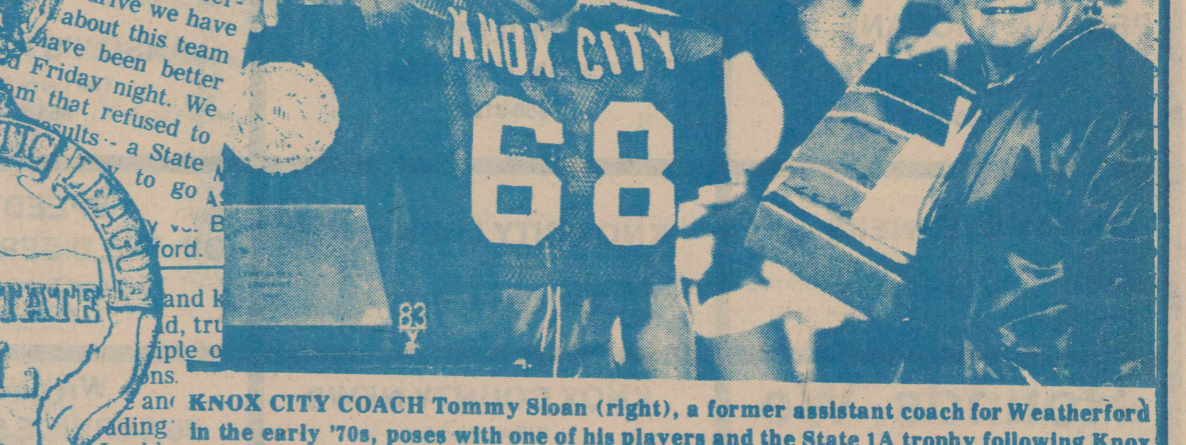
