PAYING MORE FOR LESS
This week got off to a bad start, made that way by an item that was received in the mail early Monday morning. A rather large information packet arrived from San Angelo with the return address heading of General Telephone Company. In reading through the material, the reason for receiving the information packet became obvious rather quickly. Once again the phone company is requesting another rate increase that will affect both residential and business customers.

It seems that only yesterday our phone rates were raised and now they will be going up again. The proposed increase for a residence in Knox City will be from \$8.55 to \$14.10 a month and the business rate will go up to \$36.55 from the current \$22.15 monthly rate. Overall, the company is requesting an additional \$4.8 million dollars, a 64% plus increase.

With the economy being as tight as it is these days, there wouldn't be too many people who would willingly go out and pay more for less. Unfortunately the small people in the system usually do not have much of a say in these constant rate increases; most seem to be granted in spite of whatever objections are voiced. It seems that we here in Knox City are forever doomed to poor telephone service and now we will once again have to pay more for the constant aggravation that faces us when we use our telephones.

It wasn't long ago that the phone company sent representatives to Knox City to find out what the problems were and what the complaints were all about. The timing of those visits had a lot to do with the fact that the Public Utilities Commission of Texas decided against granting the phone company the full amount of a requested increase because of numerous customer complaints about bad service.

Has the service gotten any better since then? The answer to that would depend if we were talking about service inside or outside of Knox City. Local in-town repair service is to be commended. Our local installation and repair representatives of the telephone company are the best and seem to do all they can to make the service better for everyone with whom they come in contact. In town service comes with a smile and a genuine professional concern for the customer.

How about the out of town service? If not the same as it was, it could even be considered worse than before. There were so many statements made concerning new and better equipment at the Seymour station that would make our service so much better. If the new equipment were supposed to make such a difference, why do the following problems still exist:

1. You may be trying to call long distance and not be able to get any connections outside of Knox City. (This happened to us here at the office four times last month.)
2. When connected, many long distance calls are filled with static and a scratchy noise that makes the call very difficult.
3. Long distance calls have loud audible "clicks" that make you wonder if you and the party on the other end have been cut off once again.
4. Many long distance calls are disconnected in the middle of a conversation. (This happened twice at the office and once at home last month.)
5. Each and every month the phone bill has to be studied very carefully to

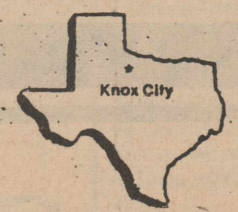

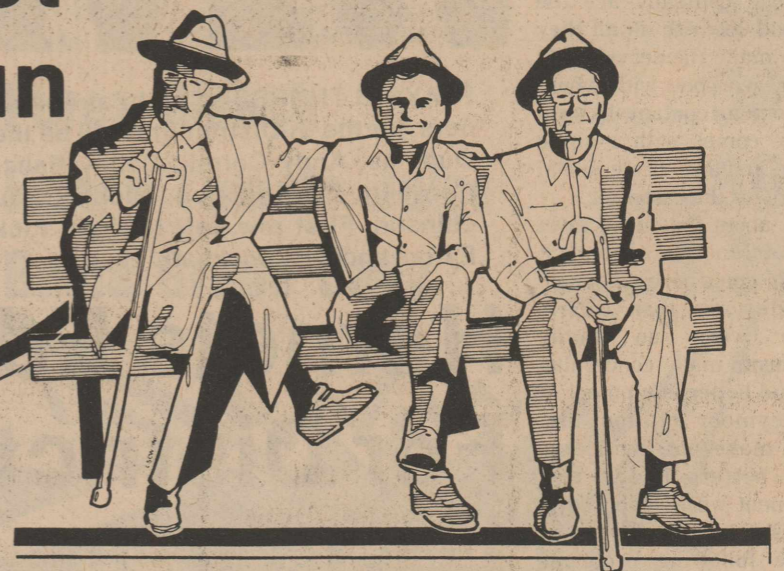

**GTE Files
For New
Revenues**

General Telephone Company of the Southwest today (Feb. 17, 1984) filed an \$84.8 million request for new revenues with the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

E.L. "Buddy" Langley, president of the company, said \$62.7 million of the filing is to allow the company to begin earning on the new investments made since the last filing, and to produce a fair return on the company's investment in Texas. The additional \$22.1 million is for revised depreciation rates that are more consistent with today's rapid technological changes and customer demands for accelerated change to more modern service, and to comply with recent Federal Communications Commission proposed accounting changes in regard to company-owned telephone instruments leased to customers at regulated rates.

make sure that calls made on another phone are not billed to our number by mistake. This problem happened with a family telephone for months in a row recently and was compounded by the fact that the phone company office insisted that this could not be happening because they were using new, automated equipment. We had to go to the extent of actually giving them the name and phone number of the person in town who had made the calls on their phone and who should have been billed for the calls on their own statement. This happened so many months in a row and got so aggravating that it was much simpler to just have the phone disconnected to avoid any further hassles.

6. Why, when calling long distance from either our home or business phones does the operator have to cut in and ask for our number? This was a complaint that I made to the company in the last round of complaint talks.

They assured me that the service was not supposed to work that way. The only times that the operators are supposed to cut in and ask for the number is when the long distance circuits are busy. I was assured that the problem would be corrected and it would not happen any longer. For a few weeks it was changed, now it is right back to the way it was.

7. Telephone billing statements have a due date on them. One would presume that if the bill were paid on or before the date indicated, that they would be credited with the amount paid. Why is it then, that we receive a late notice when we have taken the payment ON OR BEFORE THE DUE DATE to our local phone service center? When faced with this problem, I made a call to the business office and was informed that the amount due has to reach the San Angelo office before the due date in order to reflect proper credit and not be considered "late".

If that is the case, why even bother with taking the payment to a facility here in town that is supposed to be "Convenient" for us? If payment is made to a phone company outlet on or before the due date, then it should be considered paid right then and there - regardless of how long it takes for a local agent to send it on to another office.

8. Why is that one can dial 0 for operator and have the phone ring endlessly with no answer? This happens a lot lately, as a matter of fact it happened last night at my residence and another gentleman was in City Hall complaining on Monday morning because he had tried two different pay phones in town and could not get an operator to answer-it just rang and rang. To put that problem into a different perspective, imagine a person having a heart attack or some other emergency and unable to dial anything but the 0 for operator, then getting no answer. It could be a problem with a tragic ending.

In reading the material sent in the information package, it is very clear that the phone company is having a lot of problems because of the recent action by the government that dealt with

de-regulation. But, why should poor service and age old complaints continue when the news release says, "The new investment dollars were spent to expand the local network in order to meet the increase in the number of customers served, to improve and modernize service as required by the mandates of customers and the public utility commission, and to expand services to meet the needs of today's customers."

The release goes on to say, "The rates we have proposed reflect changes that place the costs of individual services on the customers using the services rather than spreading some of those costs over the entire customer base."

Reflecting on that last statement makes one think that it is only fair to pay for the services that one uses. But with the current state of affairs, does it make sense to pay MORE for that which we are already dissatisfied? Does it make sense to pay MORE for less? It sure is something to think about.

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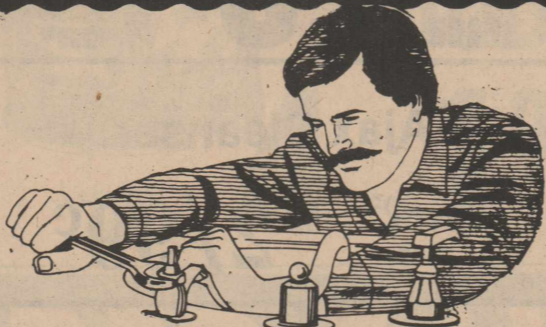

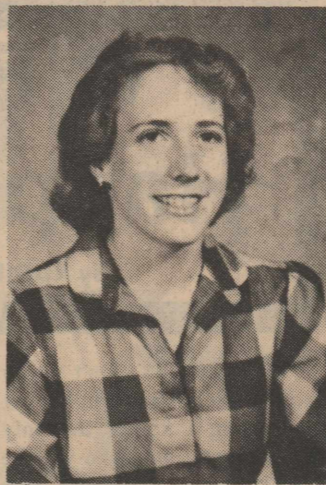
Another introduction of each Greyhound player was then made by Sloan, as he introduced the seniors the coach had individual remarks and his own impression of their performance throughout the year.

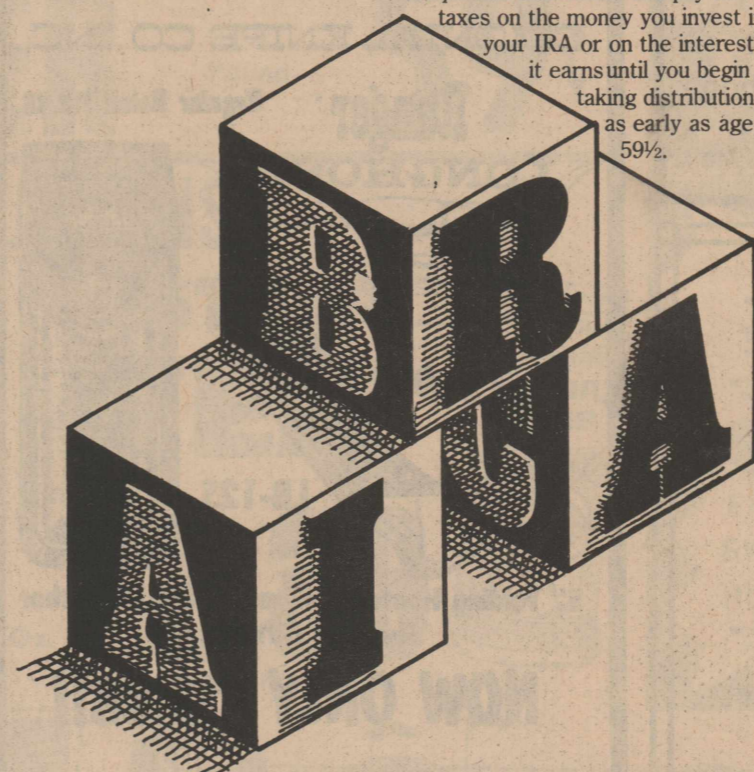

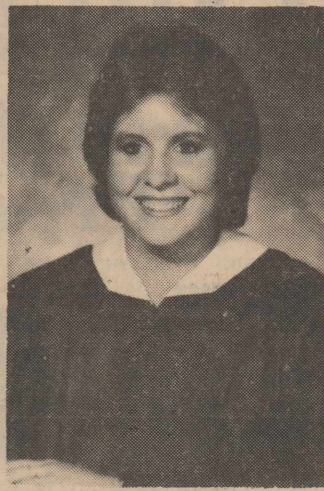


BECKY SMITH
