## Wupperman Headed For State Tennis

Ricky Wupperman won second place in the regional tennis tournament held in Abilene May 1 and 2 and will advance to the state meet in Austin. Jerry Gutierrez, in his second year at the regional contest, placed third out of the sixteen contestants there and is therefore the alternate to the state tournament. Both of these fine players are sophomores, which bodes well for the future of Knox City-O'Brien tennis.

Ricky's first and last matches were his hardest. Initially paired against last year's regional semi-finalist, Ricky McBee from Rochelle, he lost the first set but came back, playing stronger and finally winning the match, 4-6, 6-4, 6-4. This rapidly improving young player then defeated Corky Turner of Garden City, 6-4, 6-1, and Mark Healer of Bellevue, 6-1, 7-5, to get into the finals. There, he faced an excellent all-around athlete, senior Steve Howard from Zephyr, who, in winning this year, became regional champion for the third straight time. Ricky nearly pulled it off, but finally was overcome, 6-3, 6-4.

It was Jerry's misfortune to be placed in the same side of the bracket as Howard, and therefore to meet him in the semi-finals. Earlier, playing excellently, Jerry dispatched Ronnie Erwin (Bellevue) 6-0, 6-0 and Mark Smith (Forsan) 6-0, 6-1. Then matched against Howard, he played well, but finally bowed to skill and experience, 6-4, 6-1. In his subsequent battle for third place, Jerry exacted a measure of satisfaction, upsetting Mark Healer 6-0, 6-1.

Knox City's doubles team, composed of seniors Greg Skiles and Greg Melin, split sets with, but lost in the first round to John Hanke and Devin Koenig of Cross Plains, a team that went on to take fourth place.

Ricky Wupperman will represent the school, the district, and the region at the state meet in Austin on Friday and Saturday, May 11 and 12. Keep your fingers crossed!

## KC Wins Regional

The Knox City Greyhounds walked away with the Region II-A Track Crown last Thursday at McMurry in Abilene, qualifying the sprint relay and three individuals for state.

Otis Lockhart started the day off right by winning the long jump with a career best 22-9½, then he anchored the 400-meter relay to victory in the first running final in 44.12. When Lockhart finished second in the 100 meters and Wayne E. Hutchinson won the 400 in 50.96, the race for team championship was all but over. Both first and second places qualify for state.

The Hounds, who won the Class A state football championship, will be in Austin this week giving it their best.

For Lockhart, winning the long jump erased some bad memories for him. He had won the Class A state championship while competing for Rule two years ago, but last year, he finished third at regional, losing out on a trip to state on the last jump when another leaper beat him by a fourth of an inch.

He had the event won by a half-inch Thursday before his last jump and Coach Jimmy Rogers really didn't want him to jump again.

and he goes out and jumps 22-9½, that's how much I know," Rogers said.

Lockhart's previous best was 22-6¼. "I hit everything right on my last jump," he said. "I was really surprised that I finished second in the 100, I just ran it for the points."

Hutchinson ran hard, trying to bring the 1,600-meter relay to at least second, but he had to make up too much distance and had too many places to pass. Hutchinson got the baton in third

after Lockhart had put the Greyhounds in front with his fine second leg. He wound up fourth.

"I just had too much to make up. I sprinted too much the first 200 and didn't have a kick left," he said. "I wanted us to make it to state, but we've had a good year."

Hutchinson also plays on the golf team, but he withdrew from that meet to run track. Had the team qualified for state, he would have done both at Austin, but the golfers finished third.

Some people confuse high blood pressure "control" with a cure. There is no cure for high blood pressure.

Others hear the medical term for high blood pressure, "hypertension", and wrongly assume that only anxious or tense people have high pressure. High blood pressure can affect anyone. Did you know that one out of every four Black Americans has high blood pressure? And did you know that high blood

pressure is the biggest cause of death among Black men and women?

Some people think a headache, dizziness, or feeling bad are telltale signs that blood pressure is up. These, too, are wrong. High blood pressure has no symptoms.

In addition to medicine, doctors sometimes tell their blood pressure patients to watch their weight, cut down on salt, exercise more, and stop smoking.

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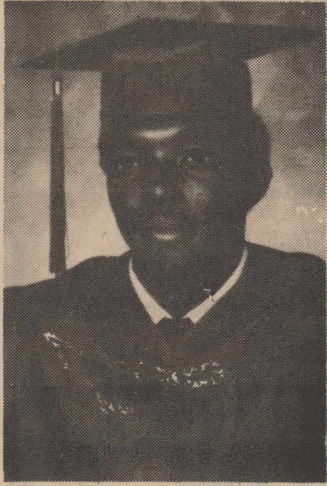
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## Seniors Of The Week

## Controlling Grasshoppers

Last week at the pest clinic stop in Benjamin, County Judge H.T. Melton wanted to know what could be done to stop the grasshoppers from eating his garden and peach trees. He said he has already observed a large number of grasshopper nymphs.

Grasshoppers are a tough insect to control as most people know, who have had to deal with these pests. Emory Boring, Extension Entomologist, stated that the best control is done before they reach their target. Some control can be achieved once the grasshoppers reach the garden or fruit tree but not before some damage has been done. This damage will be compounded because the grasshoppers must continue to come to the garden or fruit tree for this control to work. So controlling grasshoppers in the home garden is not what we are after but before they reach the home garden.

The first step is to keep areas around the garden or fruit tree free of weeds and grasses. The next step is to treat surrounding areas with an insecticide labeled for this use such as sevin, diazinon, malathion, or Naled. Follow label instructions for your particular use. This treatment should be done before grasshoppers reach the adult stage.

If you are surrounded by a field or pasture controlling grasshoppers before they reach your garden or fruit tree may be impossible. Control may only be achieved by treatment of the garden or fruit tree. Remember this control method has limited effectiveness.

Seven and malathion are two insecticides which may be used to control grasshoppers in the home garden or on fruit trees. Be sure to read labels for specific vegetables and fruits, for waiting periods to harvest and other restrictions.

## Sheriff Returned To Office

Knox County Sheriff Morris E. (Gene) Nix was re-elected Saturday with 752 votes to his opponent Van Green's 574.

In the Knox County Tax Assessor-Collector's race, Oscar Mangis defeated Steve Bisbee almost two to one, receiving 867 to Bisbee's 449. The present office holder, John A. Smith, did not seek re-election. Mangis also serves as Knox County Chief Appraiser.

Voters chose David Hajek as district judge in the 50th Judicial District with 832 to Tom Schrandt's 442. Schrandt was appointed to the judge's post when Judge Bill Brookreson was killed in an auto accident last year.

In the district attorney's race, incumbent W.H. (Bill) Healty received 570 to James M. Morris' 720. However, when votes came in from all four counties, Healty won the election by a 112 vote margin.
