## Maines Brothers Opry To Unfold Friday

After several weeks of reading newspaper stories and hearing advertisements on the radio, the time has finally arrived for Knox City and area residents to enjoy a night of country western music with the Maines Brothers Band from Lubbock.

To be held this Friday night at 7:30 o'clock in the School Auditorium, the Maines Brothers Opry will be held as a fundraiser for both the Knox County Hospital

Auxiliary and the Knox City Chamber of Commerce.

Arriving in town on Friday at lunchtime, the members of the band and other entertainers will also be attending the salad, soup and sandwich luncheon being held in the school cafeteria as a fundraiser for next year's Knox City High School Scarlet Belles Drill Team. After the lunch the band will spend the afternoon setting up equipment and practice session for the other entertainers who

are also scheduled to appear on the show. The auditorium will be closed to the public during practice.

Other entertainers on the show with the Maines Brothers will be trumpet player Tommy Anderson of Lubbock, saxophone player Don Caldwell of Lubbock, gospel singer Buddie Lytle of Anson, the Angle Sisters, and 10 year-old Clay Hewitt of Lubbock. Each entertainer appearing on the show with the Maines Brothers has done so many times before, in Oprys both in Lubbock and on the road.

Tickets for the show are being sold for \$8.00 each in advance for reserved seats and \$9.00 each at the door the night of the show. Tickets are still being sold at all four locations: the Hospital Auxiliary Thrift Shop, the Chamber of Commerce office in City Hall, The Knox County News, and at the Music Box record store in Haskell. Ticket sales in advance of the show have been good, as many who are planning on attending the show have purchased ahead to reserve their seats.

With the proceeds of the show and bake sale auction going toward the two organizations, both groups will raise funds for projects to help out Knox City. The Hospital Auxiliary group plans on using their share of the funds for the purchase of an ice machine to be donated to the Knox County Hospital while the Chamber of Commerce plans on using their proceeds for printing costs involved in making up a brochure that will promote Knox City. When finished, the brochure will be sent out in an effort to attract more industry to Knox City.

Remember to plan ahead and reserve your seating by purchasing your tickets for the show early. There will be tickets available at the door for those who may be unsure of their plans prior to the 7:30 starting time on Friday night.

David Albus brought the first load in to Charlie Myers Grain Elevator. According to manager Dave Oxford, his wheat weighed 59 pounds, moisture content was 9.9, and the Bona dryland wheat yielded an average of 33 bushels per acre.



## Remember To Vote Saturday!



Voters are reminded that Saturday, June 2, will be election day for the Democratic runoffs.

Only one polling place will be used for the June 2 election - the Knox City Community Center and polls will be open from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. Serving as election judge will be Arche Lieb.

The main Democratic statewide runoff race is for Senate, where U.S. Rep. Kent Hance of Lubbock squares off against state Senator Lloyd Doggett of Austin. Also, runoffs will settle the

nominee for Justice, Court of Criminal Appeals Place 2 between incumbent Bill Davis and Roy Greenwood, and Place 3 between Thomas B. Thorpe and Bill White.

Absentee voting for the Saturday election ended Tuesday and as of the *News'* deadline, only five had voted.

## Black Retires From Exxon Co.

Thurston H. Black with Exxon Company, U.S.A. retired on May 1, 1984 with 36 years of service. He was assigned as field superintendent in the Midcontinent Division, Production Department, Midland District, in the Bateman area.

In 1948, he joined the Company in Magnolia, Arkansas, as a roustabout. Production field assignments with increasing responsibilities followed in various locations in the Southeast Division. In 1973, he transferred from LaFayette, Louisiana, to Midland, and early the following year transferred to the Bateman area as field superintendent. His hometown is McNeil, Arkansas.

For the present time, Mr. and Mrs. Black continue to make their home in Knox City.

Officials are hopeful that this is not indicative of the turnout for Saturday's election. Even though Knox County does not have any runoffs, everyone is being encouraged to remember to vote Saturday and give their support to the candidate of his or her choice.

Haskell County will see Johnny Mills and Jack Whorton on the ballot for county sheriff and the winner is virtually assured of succeeding Garth Garrett as sheriff since there is no Republican nominee.

In Baylor County, incumbent Don Mooney and Wes Hollar are running for sheriff. Hollar was the leading vote-getter in the May primary. Incumbent G.C. Laney and Bud Slaggle are candidates for Precinct 1 commissioner.

## HOMES IMPROVEMENTS SCAMS AFFECT ELDERLY

While consumer frauds are widespread and pervasive, the elderly are special targets for these abuses, says Nancy Granovsky, a family resource management specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service. According to research conducted by the U.S. Senate Special Committee on Aging, home repair and improvement frauds were the most frequent type of frauds committed against the elderly, she explains. Nationwide, 71% of the elderly own their own homes. The majority of these homes were built before 1940. This combination of the number of elderly who own homes and the age of the dwellings is especially attractive to phony repairmen, notes the specialist.

## Jane's News Notes

In cooking, think about what the salt in a recipe will contribute before you add it automatically. Reducing or eliminating the salt from home baked goods, including breads, will not affect rising or texture.

The same is true for that "pinch of salt" you are told to add to beaten egg whites and to cooking water for vegetables or pasta. It won't contribute much to taste or texture, but a generous pinch may contain more sodium than a whole day's recommended intake. By the way, what is recommended? Doctors call 2 grams of sodium or 5 grams of salt per day a moderate sodium restriction.

Our doctors have told us. Time magazine has told us. Consumer groups and government experts have told us: Our bodies don't need as much salt as we use. Salt, or more accurately the sodium in salt, seems to contribute to high blood pressure (HBP) in some people.

Doctors believe that some people can cut their chances of getting HBP by cutting down on the salt they consume. With their doctor's advice, some people who already have HBP can

### Second Quarter Estimate Due

Some wage earners and other individuals who have income other than wages may be required to make estimated tax payments, the Internal Revenue Service says.

Generally, if you have income, with no tax withheld, of more than \$500 and you expect to owe at least \$400 on this year's return, you are liable for filing a declaration of estimated tax and for making payments.

Just like withholding by employers, the IRS says, estimated taxes are paid in advance of the actual tax return, Form 1040, due for the year. Estimated taxes are normally paid in four installments.

For 1984, the four estimated tax installment dates are: April 16, 1984; June 15, 1984; September 17, 1984; and January 16, 1985.

reduce the amount of medicine they need or lower pressures to healthy levels without using drugs at all.

The first step in cutting back on your salt intake is to take the salt shaker off the table. Next, eat fewer foods that taste salty. These changes will help, but as a salt-wise shopper and cook, you can do more.

We all need to be aware that nearly all processed foods are much higher in sodium than fresh foods. On package labels, many different words mean that the product contains sodium: salt, monosodium glutamate, sodium benzoate, and disodium phosphate are some examples. If a label does not give the exact amounts, remember that ingredients are listed in order of quantity; those cutting down on sodium might avoid buying products when a sodium word is among the first three ingredients listed.

One teaspoon of salt contains 2.3 grams of sodium. A diet moderately restricted in sodium should contain no added salt, because naturally occurring sodium is already present in many foods.

Take heart. Most people find that the less salt they use, the less they want. You have to give it a chance so try it for a couple of weeks.

### SALT SUBSTITUTE

1 teaspoon chili powder  
2 teaspoons ground oregano  
2 teaspoon black pepper  
1 tablespoon garlic powder (not garlic salt)  
2 tablespoons dry mustard  
6 tablespoons onion powder (not onion salt)  
3 tablespoons paprika  
3 tablespoons poultry seasoning  
Mix all seasonings together and put in your salt shaker.
