If the opportunity ever presented itself to post a sign at each entrance to a community that best describes the most prominent features of the town, the above symbol should head the list as a warning of what to expect when entering or living in a small town.

Lately a very bad case of rumors has really hit our small community, and like any unwanted virus or disease, the rumors have sure spread fast and furious. Have you had the occasion to hear any good ones lately? Well, by all means, be sure to do like everyone else does - pass them on as the absolute truth!! And of course, they will be honestly believed because YOU, a very honest and believable person will be the one doing the talking next! And of course, you heard it from a very reliable person and so did they and so did the ones before them and so on and so on...

Rumors lately seem to be hitting all parts of our community, from public institutions to professional people, from individuals to some married couples that may or may not be having their own personal problems. But, we must all remember that what is being said on the many different issues just has to be the truth because someone else told it and they ALWAYS know what is really going on!!

Just how do these rumors get started? Well, I have always thought it would be rather difficult for just one person to start one and keep it going so I guess it would be safe to assume that they get started and flourish anywhere there is a gathering of two or more people! The first Booster Club meeting for the 1984-85 school year will be Tuesday, July 24, at 7:30 p.m. on the KC school campus.

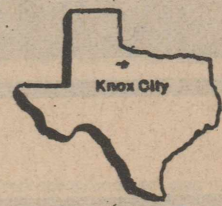

Hospital Board Has Long Agenda

Members Present: Vernal Zeissel, David Perdue, Ray Lynn Hardin, Maureen Reeder, Benny Grill, Buster Lowrey, Bernard.

Others Present: Randy Abernathy, Brenda Muncrief, W.F. Thompson, D.O., Bobby Hutchinson, Gary Decker, Jimmy Reed.

The June meeting of the Knox County Hospital Board of Directors was called to order at 8:00 p.m. by Board President, Vernal Zeissel. The minutes from the May Board meeting were read and approved.

Under Old Business, Bobby Hutchinson, Gary Decker, and Jimmy Reed met with the Board regarding the previously requested subsidy for a weekend driver once a

month for the Munday Ambulance. After lengthy discussion, the Board requested further information and asked that it be reported to Ray Lynn Hardin. The request was rejected by the Board at this time.

Dr. W.F. Thompson then addressed the Board regarding the possibility of the Hospital District purchasing the Knox City Clinic. Vernal Zeissel informed Dr. Thompson that after discussion, the Board was not interested at this time.

Brenda Muncrief then presented the financial reports for the month of May consisting of Cash Flow Statement, Profit and Loss Statement, Census Report, Checks Written, Insurance Report, Personnel Report, and DRG report. Mrs. Muncrief then presented a list of May Accounts Payable for approval.

Following discussion, Benny Grill made a motion to accept the financial reports as presented and to approve the Accounts Payable for payment. The motion was seconded by Buster Lowrey and passed with no opposition.

The motion was then made by Bernard Brown that the Board go into Executive Session. The motion was seconded by David Perdue and passed with no opposition. Executive session began at 9:45 p.m.

David Perdue made the motion that the Board return to regular session. Maureen Reeder seconded the motion which passed. Regular

session resumed at 11:10 p.m.

The motion was made by Ray Lynn Hardin to accept the physician recruitment contracts as presented by the administration. Benny Grill seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

Maureen Reeder moved that the Board of Directors give the authority to the administrator to construct and send a letter notifying Dr. W.F. Thompson that he must complete all incomplete charts by July 23, 1984, in order to comply with Medicare requirements. Benny Grill seconded the motion which passed unanimously.

The Board agreed that a memorandum should be sent to the Department Heads of the hospital stating that services rendered by the hospital would be for inpatients and outpatients of the hospital only.

David Perdue made the motion to adjourn and Maureen Reeder seconded it. With no further business to discuss, the meeting adjourned at 12:00 midnight.

The Knox City-O'Brien High School drill team, the Scarlet Belles, attended the American Drill Team School at Southern Methodist University in Dallas July 9 through 12.

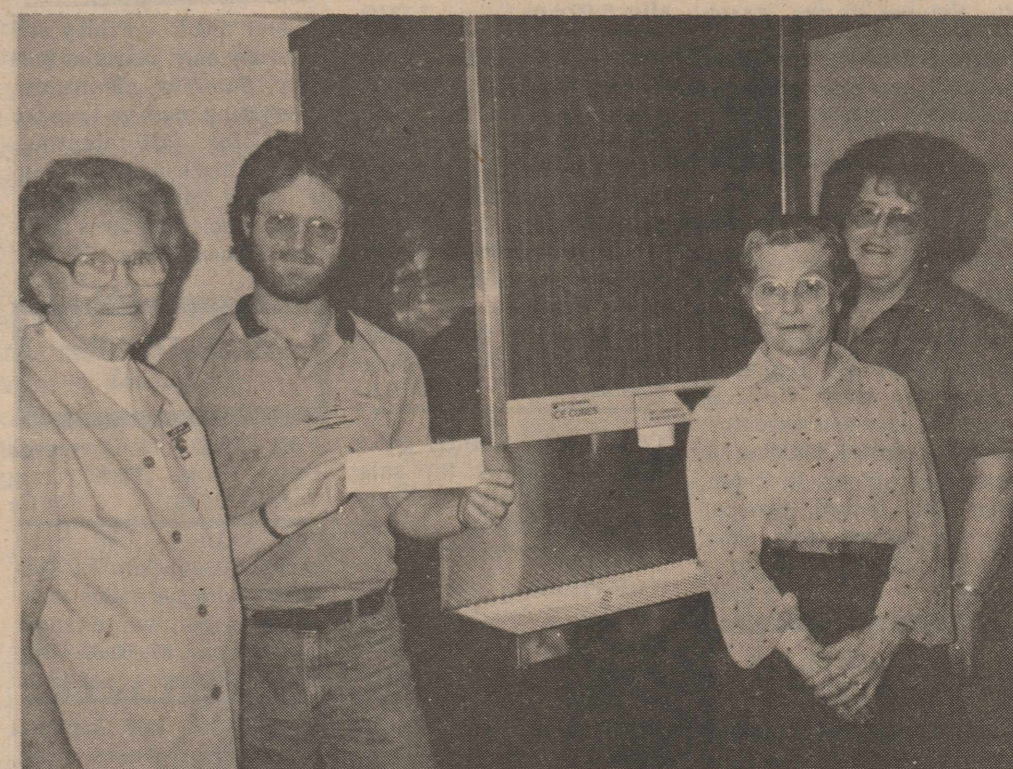

Dr. Charles, 78, of Rochester died Sunday, July 8, at 8:20 p.m. in a Haskell hospital.

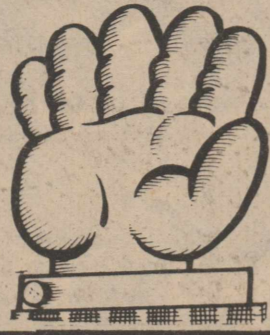
