Sales Tax Rebates Are Increasing

State Comptroller Bob Bullock has sent checks totaling \$55.3 million in local sales tax payments to the 988 cities that levy the one percent city sales tax.

July payments reflect taxes on sales made in May and reported to the Comptroller by June 20.

Net amount for this period for Knox City showed \$3,912.37 as compared to \$2,837.34 for the same period a year ago. Payments to date in 1984 total \$40,929.83, reflecting an 11.36 percent increase above 1983's total of \$36,753.94.

Other Knox County towns all showed gains for this period. Benjamin had nothing listed for this period, but for year to date showed \$1,368.99, an increase of 2.29% above last year's \$1,338.39. Goree had \$511.18 for the period with nothing listed for this period last year. Year to date totals for Goree are \$3,041.66, a big 23.63% above 1983's total of \$2,460.21. Munday's net payment for this period was \$2,555.80 as compared to last year's \$2,280.53. Year to date totals for Munday were \$25,806.27, an increase of 1.39% above 1983's total of \$25,452.47.

For this period, Haskell's net payment was \$7,956.77; Rochester had \$511.15; Rule \$723.32; Anson \$3,811.93; Hamlin \$4,339.79; Stamford \$8,347.45; Crowell \$951.54; and Seymour \$8,102.20.

To Check On Records

Court Recesses

The Knox County Commissioners Court met in Special Session Friday, July 20, at 2:00 p.m. for the purpose of reviewing applications for the position of Project Director for the Knox County Aging Services.

Present were County Judge Homer T. Melton and Commissioners Billy G. Johnston, Bobby Roberson, and Philip Homer, County Clerk Gloria L. West, County Attorney Bobby D. Burnett, and County Sheriff Gene Nix.

Others present were Dave Thompson and Billye B. Angle, representing *The Knox County News*, and a number of senior citizens from Knox County.

The group was asked first if anyone had any questions or comments and after no one spoke, Dave Thompson, on behalf of the newspaper, asked the court, in view of the fact that it had stated in the beginning that only remarks concerning applicants would be heard, if a formal request could be made for a Public Hearing in order that both sides of the issue concerning the dismissal of Mrs. Lillian Logan could be heard before the hiring of a new Project Director. The question was raised if it would be alright to allow the court time to determine if all the records pertaining to the recent dismissal of Mrs. Logan as Project Director would be available to the public under the Open Records Acts or if some would not be available.

Also, there were questions concerning the job description for Project Director, and when it was learned that the revised job description contained no specified requirements, other persons attending indicated that they would have applied had they known that four years of college were no longer required.

The court then decided to continue receiving applications and as noted in a public notice in this week's *News*, applications are available at the County

Judge's Office or the County Clerk's Office.

The court was asked by an interested citizen the reason for the immediate dismissal of Mrs. Logan and in reply was told that the court felt that the aging service had not made the necessary progress. When Mrs. Logan asked to have a progress report read to the court, the presentation was not allowed.

The court then decided to recess until the necessary an-

swers concerning the Open Records Law were available and explained that the *News* office would be advised as to when the meeting would resume.

Later in the afternoon Friday, the *News* office was told that another meeting had been scheduled for Monday, August 6, at 9:00 a.m. at which time applicants would be interviewed and applications reviewed for the position of Project Director.

Moore Named Texas Ag 'Man Of The Year'

COLLEGE STATION--W.R. Moore Jr. of Munday, a longtime wheat and cotton producer in Throckmorton and Knox counties, has been named a "Man of the Year in Texas Agriculture" for 1984 by the Texas County Agricultural Agents Association.

One of seven Texans selected for the honor, Moore was nominated by county agents in the Rolling Plains District of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. He will receive his award during the annual TCAAA meeting August 5-8 in Brownsville.

The award is presented each year to outstanding leaders in agriculture and related industries who have supported educational programs conducted by the Extension Service, said Shackelford County Extension Agent Lawrence Winkler, TCAAA president. The award recognizes contributions made by these leaders to improving levels of living and economic growth in their communities, counties, state and nation.

Other recipients include Roddy Peoples, San Angelo farm broadcaster; Jack Barton, Houston banker and agribusinessman; C.B. Richards, San Augustine County rancher and businessman; James Leo Greer, Rocksprings rancher and pecan grower; Arnie Lawler, Camp County farmer and retired conservationist; and Bill Nelson, executive vice president of the Texas Producers Association and Producers Board, Amarillo.

Moore farms 3,000 acres of wheat and cotton in the two Rolling Plains counties and runs a stocker cattle operation. He has had wheat production demonstrations on his farm in support of county Extension programs for more than 20 years and has financially aided agricultural demonstration programs in several counties.

Soil fertility has been a primary concern of Moore's for many years. The fertilizer program on his farm is based on soil test reports and recommendations from the Rolling Plains Soil Testing Laboratory in Seymour.

In addition to his farming operation, Moore is active in community, state and national agricultural programs and activities. He is currently president of the Farmers Grain Co-op in Munday, is a board member and past chairman of the Texas Wheat Producers Board, is vice president of the Texas Wheat Growers Association, and is a director of the National Association of Wheat Growers. He also serves on the Small Grains Task Force of the Rolling Plains Economic Program.

Moore also has been active in the First Methodist Church of Munday and has served on the city council and school board.

He is a 1940 graduate of Texas A&M University.

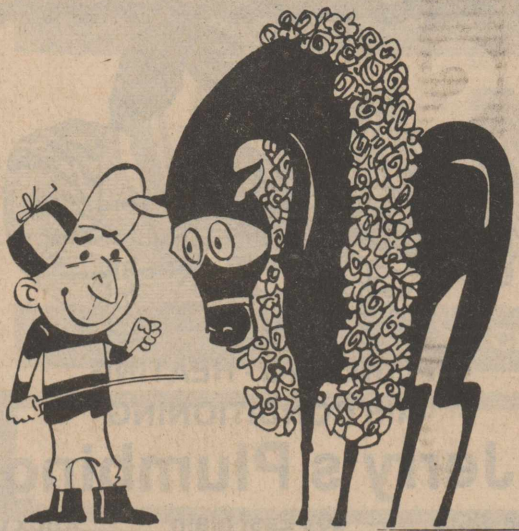
