## Cotton Classing Report

ABILENE -- Local cotton prices have been weak to two cents per pound lower since the middle of this past week according to B.B. Manly of the USDA Cotton Classing Office in Abilene. Trading slowed as prices weakened, being moderate to mostly slow late in the week. Most cotton sold at 600 to 850 points over loan values. Premium mike, grade 42, staple 31 cotton sold around 55 cents per pound. Cottonseed prices paid producers were steady to 10 dollars per ton lower at 85 to 110 dollars per ton.

About 19,000 cotton samples were classed in Abilene during the past week which brought the season's total to 75,000 classed. Inclement weather slowed harvest operations, but Manly expects cotton harvesting to finally reach capacity volume next week if fair weather prevails.

The quality of Abilene area cotton has been high considering the amount of rain received during the past two months. Grades have been 70 percent light-spotted and 27 percent white with grade 42 the predominant grade at 36 percent. Grade 52 comprised 19 percent, grade 32 comprised 14 percent, and grade 41 has accounted for 11 percent. Micronaire readings have been 87 percent within the 35 to 49 range, with 38.5 being the average mike reading for the season. Fiber length was 22 percent staple 31, 21 percent staple 32, 20 percent staple 33, and 18 percent staple 34; with the average staple being 32.4. Strength readings have been 25 percent 22 and 23, 34 percent 24 and 25, and 20 percent 26 and 27 grams per tex breaking strength; with the average reading being 24.7. About 27 percent of the samples classed this season have been reduced in grade for bark or grass content.

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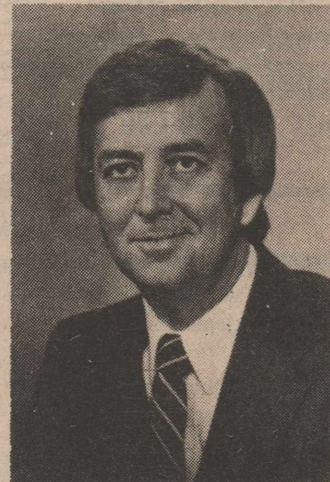
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## Perdue Is Appointed New County Judge

Austin. He then received his master of education in psychology and guidance in 1963 from Stephen F. Austin and during 1965-1967 completed over fifty percent of requirements for his Ph.D at East Texas State University.

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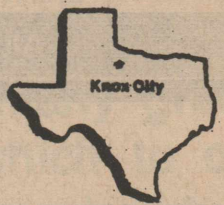

**STORING FOOD IN OPEN CANS**

Acid foods should not be stored in cans after opening. This includes foods like tomato juice, fruits, and fruit juices and drinks. Storage in open cans increases iron accumulation. Lead may also be picked up from older cans that have been opened, and this lead intake is not healthy. Metallic flavors also result from acid foods left in opened cans. If you're not immediately going to eat the food left in cans, empty the contents into clean glass or plastic containers.

The latest in all-weather clothing is "bion-coated" fabric that is waterproof, yet breathable. Developed by Biotex Corporation, bion-coated fabric has been tested in ski jackets and found to keep skiers dry and comfortable.

This new fabric coating differs from the brand of breathable fabrics now found in clothing for sailors, skiers, and joggers. The brand now in use contains a thin sheet of Teflon-like material sandwiched between a fabric and a lining.

Bion-coated fabrics are also breathable and waterproof. Winter skiers can look for the first Bion-coated one

piece ski suits under the Robert John label. Next year Biotex will make available Bion-coated tents, running suits and rugged outerwear such as hiking jackets, mountain climbing and foul weather gear.

The coating material was developed by a chemical engineer working on polyurethane materials to make the ideal wound dressing for surgical incisions, cuts and burns. He came up with a wound dressing by changing the basic molecular structure of polyurethane film and then realized it had many other uses. The wound dressing, when sprayed on as a fabric coating, produced a breathable, waterproof fabric.

**SOUR CREAM FUDGE**

4 Cups sugar  
1 cup sour cream  
1/2 stick oleo  
2/3 cup white corn syrup  
pinch salt  
1 Tablespoon vanilla  
1 cup pecans

Combine the first five ingredients and cook to a soft ball stage. Let stand 15 minutes. Then beat until it loses gloss and gets milky looking. Add nuts and vanilla. Pour into buttered pan and cut into squares.

## Spirited COOKING

CHRISTMAS GOOSE



Glazed goose with apple stuffing for a memorable Christmas dinner.

Christmas past can make Christmas present special. One way to return to Christmas past is by preparing the traditional roast goose cooked to perfection and glazed with a special sweet and spicy ruby sauce.

The glaze is a variation of Cumberland sauce which is traditionally made with port wine. Cinzano Sweet Vermouth is substituted and blended with juices and spices.

### ROSY GLAZED GOOSE WITH APPLE STUFFING

- 4 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 2 medium onions, chopped
- 2 ribs celery, sliced
- 1/2 cup Extra Dry Cinzano Vermouth
- 12 tart apples (about 2-1/2 pounds)
- 1-1/2 cups apple juice
- 1 bag (8 ounces) herb seasoned stuffing mix
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 10-12 pound goose or two 4-5 pound ducks

In a large skillet melt butter. Add onions and saute until limp, about 3 minutes. Add vermouth and simmer 10 minutes. Add apples and saute 5 minutes. Add apple juice, stuffing mix, salt and pepper stirring well to combine. Remove from heat and allow to cool for about 10 minutes. Preheat oven

to 325 degrees F. Stuff cavity of goose with cooled stuffing and skewer closed. Place goose on rack in a roasting pan. Cook in preheated oven for 2-1/2 to 3 hours or until meat thermometer reads 185 degrees F. Carefully drain accumulating fat at least twice during cooking or as necessary. Discard fat. During the last 1/2 hour of cooking baste goose with Rosy Glaze (recipe below). Carve goose and arrange on serving platter with stuffing. Pass remaining glaze. Makes 4-6 servings.

- 1 cup orange juice
  - 1/4 cup lemon juice
  - 1/2 cup cranberry juice
  - 3/4 cup Cinzano Sweet Vermouth
  - 1 teaspoon mustard
  - 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
  - 1/4 teaspoon onion powder
  - 2 tablespoons cornstarch
  - 1 jar (10 ounces) currant jelly

In a small saucepot combine all ingredients. Heat over medium heat for 12 minutes or until mixture boils, stirring occasionally. Lower heat and simmer for 15 minutes. Reserve glaze for basting goose during the last 1/2 hour of roasting. Reheat remaining glaze and serve with goose.

## Hints For Homemakers



Microwave cooking offers some major advantages, if it's taken advantage of properly. For example:

- Your kitchen stays cool when you use a microwave oven as microwaves move through air and cooking dishes, only the food gets hot.
- Microwaves are reflected by metal surfaces but are able to pass directly through plastic, paper, glass and some wood.
- There's little need to plan ahead as with conventional cooking methods. Frozen foods are easily defrosted in the microwave when

needed.

- Food never sticks to microwave cookware made of UDEL polysulfone from Union Carbide, even without treatment or after scratching, because the non-stick surface is built in, not added on.
- The microwave oven will cook about 75 percent of the foods usually cooked conventionally. A few exceptions are popovers, angel food cakes and hard and soft eggs in the shell.
- Cooking with a microwave oven is safe as the cooking is done inside a closed, sealed oven cavity—eliminating hot coils or open burner.

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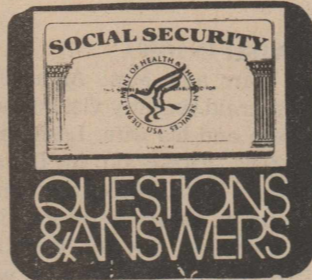

**Q.** I heard there is a limit on how many days of care Medicare can help pay for in each benefit period. But what is a benefit period?

**A.** A benefit period is a way of measuring your use of services under Medicare hospital insurance. Your first benefit period starts the first time you enter a hospital after your hospital insurance begins. It ends when you have been out of a hospital (or skilled nursing facility) for 60 days in a row. There is no limit to the number of benefit periods you can have.

**Q.** I am 45 years old, and I have a heart condition. My doctor tells me I shouldn't work any longer, but I'm not old enough to get Social Security retirement benefits. What can I do?

**A.** Social Security isn't just a retirement program. It also pays benefits to younger workers who become disabled. The years of work credit needed for disability checks depends on your age when you become disabled. To find out if you might be eligible for disability benefits, call or visit any Social Security office.

**Q.** I get SSI checks, and I have been offered vocational rehabilitation. What happens if I refuse to accept vocational rehabilitation services?

**A.** Refusing to accept rehabilitation services can affect your eligibility for SSI payments. If there is some reason you think you can't accept these services you should contact your Social Security office to discuss your case.

Most Social Security questions can be answered over the phone.

## METER TAMPERING NOW A FELONY

The State of Texas has recently adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$5,000.

Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than \$200. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree.

Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to:

- (1) Diverting electricity from passing through a meter device.
- (2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device.
- (3) Unauthorized activation of electric service.

As a special note to our members, it will also be considered meter tampering if a meter is reset and electrical service is restored by anyone other than a Cooperative employee.

All Cooperative meters are sealed. This seal should not be cut or broken without special authorization. In cases where the seal must be cut for emergencies the Cooperative should be notified as soon as possible so that the meter can be resealed.
