ABILENE -- Local cotton prices have been weak to two cents per pound lower since the middle of this past week according to B.B. Manly of the USDA Cotton Classing Office in Abilene. Trading slowed as prices weakened, being moderate to mostly slow late in the week. Most cotton sold at 600 to 850 points over loan values. Premium mike, grade 42, staple 31 cotton sold around 55 cents per pound. Cottonseed prices paid producers were steady to 10 dollars per ton lower at 85 to 110 dollars per ton.



STORING FOOD IN OPEN CANS

Acid foods should not be stored in cans after opening. This includes foods like tomato juice, fruits, and fruit juices and drinks. Storage in open cans increases iron accumulation. Lead may also be picked up from older cans this lead intake is not healthy. Metallic flavors also result from acid foods left in opened cans. If you're not immediately going to eat the food left in cans, empty the contents into clean glass or plastic containers.

A. A benefit period is a way of measuring your use of services under Medicare hospital insurance. Your first benefit period starts the first time you enter a hospital after your hospital insurance begins. It ends when you have been out of a hospital (or skilled nursing facility) for 60 days in a row. There is no limit to the number of benefit periods you can have

Q. I am 45 years old, and I have a heart condition. My doctor tells me I shouldn't work any longer, but I'm not old enough to get Social Security retirement benefits. What can I do?

A. Social Security isn't just a retirement program. It also pays benefits to younger workers who become disabled. The years of work credit needed for disability checks depends on your age when you become disabled. To find out if you might be eligible for disability benefits, call or visit any Social Security office.

Q. I get SSI checks, and I have been offered vocational rehabilitation. What happens if I refuse to accept vocational rehabilitation services?

A. Refusing to accept rehabilitation services can affect your eligibility for SSI payments. If there is some reason you think you can't accept these services you should contact your Social Security office to discuss your case.

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

METER TAMPERING NOW A FELONY

The State of Texas has recently adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$5,000.

Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than \$200. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree.

- Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to:
- (1) Diverting electricity from passing through a meter device.
- (2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device.
- (3) Unauthorized activation of electric service.

As a special note to our members, it will also be considered meter tampering if a meter is reset and electrical service is restored by anyone other than a Cooperative employee.

All Cooperative meters are sealed. This seal should not be cut or broken without special authorization. In cases where the seal must be cut for emergencies the Cooperative should be notified as soon as possible so that the meter can be resealed.
