

In Movie Theaters

THROW MOMMA FROM THE TRAIN (PG-13) This lively, meanspirited farce takes its plot from Hitchcock's perverse thriller "Strangers on a Train," and may be just what the doctor ordered to wash away some of the overblown sentimentality of the holiday season. One proviso: You have to be able to laugh at the idea of wanting to knock off an exwife or a screechy-voiced hag of a mother. This is for people who liked "Ruthless People," though it may be a better film - pure malicious silliness

Directed by Danny DeVito, "Throw Momma" offers Billy Crystal as a struggling writer whose ex-wife has ripped off his best idea for a book. De-Vito co-stars as one of Crystal's writing class students — a guy who lives with the most horrendous harridan of a mom imaginable. (Anne Ramsey plays her, shall we say, definitively.)

Consciously adopting the murder-transference scheme of the Hitchcock film, DeVito agrees to kill Crystal's ex, on the condition that Crystal then wipe out Momma. The rest - an agreeably commercial blend of black comedy and slapstick - is best left for the viewer's own discovery, though special mention should be made of Barry Sonnenfeld's witty camerawork. GRADE: ***

have heaped on this adaptation of William Kennedy's prize-winning novel. The movie, directed by the gifted Brazilian Hector Babenco ("Pixote," "Kiss of the Spider. Woman"), is a numbing bore - nearly two and a half hours of drinking, more drinking and downbeat disintegration, filmed

in shades of brown and gray. Set in an Edward Hopperesque lower-depths vision of Albany, N.Y., circa 1938, this portrait of guilt-ridden exballplayer and current boozehound Frances Phelan (Jack Nicholson) and his highfalutin lush of a girlfriend (Meryl Streep) fails to capture the in-ternal life of its characters — even though Kennedy himself wrote the screenplay.

In the novel, Frances is haunted by the ghosts of his checkered past, but the movie gives us stiff, white-faced figures who strike poses, turning up inscrutably from time to time. The performances

Initially unrecognizable, Nicholson has all the grungy externals of tough. tired Frances down pat, yet the film's punishingly slow rhythms and monotnous ambience draw the juice out of his performance. Meryl Streep, meanwhile, veers between a striking impersonation of a once-successful now-dying singer and what can be taken for a Carol Burnett-style parody of a bag lady. A few of the sup-porting performers give the film oc-casional jolts of energy — especially songwriter Tom Waits who was born to play the kind of poetic, shambling

drunk he does here.

But the movie drags on and on, and it never justifies paying such close attention to outcast Frances and his bedraggled life. Everything is studied, overly literary, dead. It's like "Barfly" without any of the good times or even the psychological amplitude. GRADE: *

SEPTEMBER (PG) Woody Allen shot this movie once; then, unhappy with the results, he went back (with a somewhat different cast) and did it again. He should still be dissatisfied. Like "Interiors," it's one of Allen's relentless stabs at arty seriousness an aspiring-to-Bergman-and-Chekhov portrait of familial angst.

The central conflict - that of an absentee mother/minor celebrity (Elaine Stritch) and her withering daughter (Mia Farrow) - draws upon the Lana Turner/Cheryl Crane murder case but depends for its life on Bergman's "Autumn Sonata." (The two movies even share an autumnal color scheme.)

The only real reason to seek out this talky, ill-focused doodle of a film is for Stritch's bravura performance as a vodka-swilling, emotionally armored tough broad. GRADE: ★★



Fungus infection may run its course

DEAR DR. GOTT: My son has just developed histoplasmosis of the eyes. How is this cured?

DEAR READER. Histoplasmosis is a fungus infection that rarely needs treatment. It runs its course and, after healing, leaves scars in lungs, lymph glands and the eyes. Ordinarily, the scars themselves do not affect health.

A more serious form, called progressive histoplasmosis, can sometimes be fatal and can infect large areas of the body. The problem faced by doctors is to determine whether the histoplasmosis is "burned out" (leaving scars) or whether it is active and requires treatment. Special blood tests can help differentiate between active and inactive forms of the disease

If your son lives in an area - such as the Mississippi and Ohio River valwhere histoplasmosis is endemic (very common), he may simply be showing the innocuous consequences of the infection. Nevertheless, his ophthalmologist will wish to test him in the event that the eye lesions reflect active disease and, hence, should be treated.

DEAR DR. GOTT: During a CT scan, cysts were found on my right kidney and liver. My doctor says this is not uncommon in persons my age (61) and not to worry. Do you agree?

DEAR READER: One of the problems of new medical testing is that doctors often discover more than they need to know. Tests are more accurate and sophisticated than they were years ago.

For example, computed tomography, or CT, can show small abnormalities that were easily missed by older, more traditional X-ray examinations. Case in point: kidney and liver cysts. These small, benign, fluid-filled structures rarely cause problems. They are common and may inadvertently be found during scanning for other, more serious conditions.

Your doctor is correct. DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm female, 60 and play senior tennis tournaments. During matches, my heart beats rapidly, I become lightheaded and tired, and my arms seem to be made of lead. I'm 5 feet 1 and weigh 100 pounds Your natural advice would be "give up tennis," but it gives me real plea-

sure. Should I worry? DEAR READER: As er, my "natural advice" is: Don't give up the sport! However, I do encourage you to see a doctor, because the symptoms you describe may indicate illness. In particular, you may be anemic or have a heart condition that needs attention.

At rest, our bodies have a basic metabolic demand. This demand is increased enormously when we exercise. Your tennis-induced fatigue and rapid heartbeat suggest that your system is overworking in order to supply your muscles with the oxygen necessary for strenuous activity. If you are anemic, less oxygen is carried in the blood cells; if your heart's efficiency is impaired, less blood - and less oxygen - will circulate. See a doctor and get checked out before your next tennis match.




