

Downing will run 2nd time

Silver Haired Legislature post

Snyder's Delbert Downing, who represented a 12-county area in the fall of 1986 at Texas' first-ever Silver Haired Legislature, has filed for re-election to that body.

Downing won over a field of seven candidates for his first term of office representing District 3. During the session, he served on several boards to include the employment, finance and elections committees.

The Silver Haired Legislature is a non-partisan body of senior citizens. Members, who serve without pay, will meet again in Austin this coming September to draft and propose suggested legislation to be considered by the 71st Texas Legislature.

One arraigned

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — Gov. Evan Mecham and his brother pleaded innocent today to criminal charges accusing them of lying about a \$350,000 campaign loan.

A March 9 trial was scheduled for the embattled governor and his brother Willard, who was his 1986 campaign treasurer.

Mecham, also facing possible impeachment by the Arizona House and an almost certain recall election, pleaded, "Not guilty," in a brief appearance in Maricopa County Superior Court before Commissioner Patrick O'Neil.

30-year term

NEW YORK (AP) — A state judge today sentenced one of three youths convicted in the Howard Beach racial assault trial to up to 30 years in prison for manslaughter and assault.

Jon Lester, 18, was the first of the three to be sentenced by Judge Thomas Demakos in the death of a black man chased to his death on a highway in the mostly white Queens neighborhood of Howard Beach.

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Arms talks are underway in Geneva

WASHINGTON (AP) — American and Soviet nuclear arms negotiators met today in Geneva and, sources said, the United States was presenting a treaty that could extend 1972 curbs on anti-missile defenses if the Reagan administration's Star Wars program is not ready for deployment in the 1990s.

A U.S. official said Thursday

night that the proposal had the strong endorsement of the U.S. military Joint Chiefs of Staff, who were concerned that lifting the curbs would free the Soviets to deploy their own anti-missile defenses.

President Reagan settled an internal dispute between the Joint Chiefs and their boss, Defense Secretary, Frank C. Carlucci,

when he secretly approved the instructions to U.S. negotiators for presentation in Geneva today.

Under the U.S. draft, the two sides would pledge to observe the 1972 Anti-Ballistic Missile treaty until 1994. The disagreement within the administration centered on what course the United States would take at the

end of that period.

According to the official, who spoke on condition of anonymity, Carlucci argued for notifying the Soviets that the United States did not intend to abide by the ABM treaty beyond that point. That would remove any remaining curbs on the Star Wars program to develop a space-based defense against Soviet ballistic missiles.

But the Joint Chiefs were worried that the Soviets might use that opportunity to develop their own space-based defense system.

With the backing of the State Department, they argued for notification of the Soviets that the United States would maintain the ABM treaty beyond 1994 if Star Wars was not ready for deployment.

Crimes decline in city

In most major categories of crime for Snyder during 1987, the city experienced a slight decrease in the number of incidents reported.

This also proved true for arrests, which declined overall by 13 percent, and traffic accidents, which declined by 16 percent.

The decline in traffic accidents was linked in part to an increase in DWI arrests. In '86, 195 suspects were arrested for DWI by the city and this rose to 221 in '87.

Regarding overall arrests, the city reported 959 adult and 233 juvenile arrests, both reflecting decreases from 1986. In that year, 1,099 adults and 259 juveniles were taken into custody.

As for traffic mishaps, police investigated 370 during '87 as compared to 437 the year previous.

In addition, the police department again reported almost a 75 percent average for recovery of stolen property.

Burglary list linked to four local suspects

Police have identified four suspects and recovered property from a number of burglaries dating back to March of last year and have forwarded the cases to the district attorney's office, they said Friday.

Two juvenile males, 14 and 15 years of age, and an 18-year-old male are suspects in the March 1, 1987, theft of a .22-cal. rifle and a pair of Justin spurs from a pickup truck belonging to Mike Foster of 306 32nd St.

The 15 and 18-year-old suspects are linked to the Jan. 20 burglary of a vehicle belonging to Stanley Clark of 2901 28th St. In that incident, 30-30 cal. ammunition was taken. A city detective said the box and some of the ammunition has been recovered.

The 15 and 18-year-old suspects are also accused of the Jan. 7 burglary of a pickup owned by Pat Kohl of 3203 Houston Ave. in which a \$350 Sherwood equalizer, 20 cassette tapes and a tape box were stolen. The equalizer has been recovered at a residence used by one of the suspects, a detective said.

In addition to these three suspects, a 19-year-old male has been identified in a previously unreported burglary of a garage, belonging to N.R. Clements of 3005 Ave. U in which a Colt .22 mag. revolver was stolen. The detective said the burglary took place three to five months ago and that the pistol has been recovered.

"Eyes—The implications are apparently limitless, and most of the connotations are negative. Those with visible eyelids are blessed since they are considered doers.

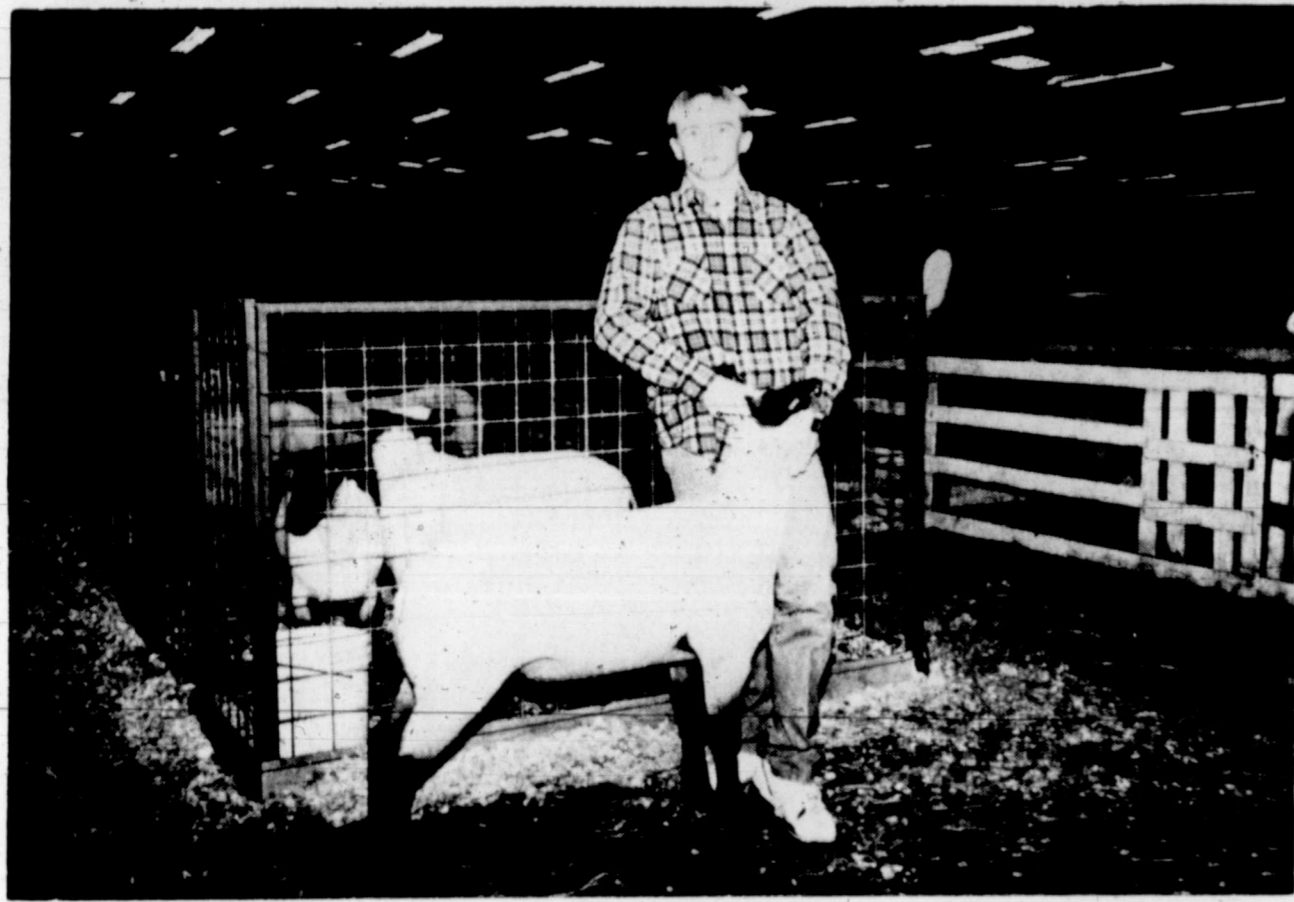
"Ears—Large ears are the best. Experts say they indicate a generous person who gets the big picture.

Live Dial-a-Porn ends in state of Texas

AUSTIN (AP) — Telephone company officials say live dial-a-porn has ended in Texas, but a

lawyer for some "Dial 976" providers said the court battles will go on.

Southwestern Bell officials said all 42 live Dial 976 services, including some that offered "adult programming," came into compliance Thursday with a recent court order by either stopping service or switching to recorded messages.

The 3rd Court of Appeals this week refused to reconsider its Dec. 16 decision that Dial 976 service is restricted to recorded

messages. Dial 976 lines are allocated to companies by Southwestern Bell.

The per-call cost is set by the company providing the service. Southwestern Bell does the billing, forwarding to the companies their share of the money.


Dial 976 — available in Texas only in Dallas, Houston, San Antonio and Fort Worth — includes so-called dial-a-porn services that have drawn criticism.

Dave Lopez, a Southwestern Bell spokesman, said the phone company on Thursday monitored all 42 live Dial 976 services to make sure they had switched to recorded messages or stopped service.

"Some are providing recorded service and others are providing a busy signal until they have the opportunity to put (recording) playback equipment in place," Lopez said.

He said the live services "ranged from what some might classify as adult programming to horoscopes."

amount of treatment programs, but really the major responsibility is at the local level," Meese said Thursday. He said the federal role should be limited to disseminating information on treatment and prevention programs.

Meese commented as the Justice Department released a study indicating that between 53 percent and 79 percent of the men arrested for serious crimes in a dozen U.S. cities tested positive for illegal drug use.

Illicit drug use among criminal defendants "seems to be increasing" and far exceeds estimated use in the general population, "where it appears to be leveling off," Meese said at a news conference.

The testing program sponsored by the National Institute of Justice found that 79 percent of those arrested in New York from June through November tested positive for drug use.

In Washington, the rate was 77 percent and in San Diego it was 75 percent.

Drug use was least frequent in Phoenix, where 53 percent of those arrested tested positive.

Most of those tested were charged with street crimes such as burglary, grand larceny and assault. The sample contained few men charged with drug sales, drunken driving or disorderly conduct.

The tests show that among those arrested in New York City, cocaine use has nearly doubled in the last three years, while it has tripled in Washington.

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Grand jury may be used

AUSTIN (AP) — A grand jury will be used if necessary to obtain the Dallas bank records needed for an investigation into the Southern Methodist University football scandal, Attorney General Jim Mattox says.

Capital Bank has turned over about half the records requested in connection with the SMU investigation, Mattox said. The bank has said the delay in turning over records is not related to former Mustang coach Bobby Collins' job there as a director. "They're going to have to give us the information one way or another, if we have to get it through a grand jury subpoena. We would prefer that that not be the case," Mattox said Thursday.

"They have said it's just a lot of information that they need to give us. There could be other motivations that are involved, but very simply, we're not going to go away," Mattox said.

Investment real estate rate of returns might drop soon

HOUSTON (AP) — New tax laws are expected to significantly reduce the rate of return on investment real estate, a Texas A&M University researcher says.

"The new law emphasizes sound business and property management rather than deal-making, tax shelter and appreciation," Jack Friedman, of the Texas A&M Real Estate Center, told members of the National Society of Real Estate Appraisers Thursday.

"The Tax Reform Act of 1986 removes or severely limits incentives for investing in real estate," said Friedman, who has been working over the past year as an educational consultant for the Cleveland-based organization.

For equity investors in the highest tax bracket, the rate of return from investment real estate holdings, such as office buildings and shopping centers, will decline from about 20 percent to about 15 percent, Friedman estimated.

Friedman pointed out that the new tax law mandates straight-line depreciation with a 27.5-year

life for residential property, and 31.5-year life for non-residential, which further reduces incentives for real estate investments.

The law also eliminates favored tax rates for long-term capital gains and prevents investors from using losses from passive real estate investments to offset income from active investments and portfolio income, he said.

"Given the lack of tax incentives to real estate investing brought about by the tax act, one can expect market increases in rental rates to be necessary before extensive building will occur," said Friedman. "Whether the increases will be adequate to raise yields to their former level remains uncertain."

The new law provides incentives for investors to hold properties for longer periods of time, Friedman said. Without favorable depreciation deductions or capital gains rates, property values under the new law may stay the same or decline, especially if inflation is low, Friedman said.

West was now forced to lead away from his K-J-10 of diamonds into declarer's A-Q, giving South his 10 tricks.

Prison escapees are recaptured

ANGLETON, Texas (AP) — A state prison inmate serving a life sentence for attempted capital murder was on the loose for about two hours before being recaptured by prison personnel, authorities said.

Jerry Quate, 45, an inmate at the Retrieve Unit, scaled a fence under fire from guards and fled about 7:15 p.m. Thursday night, said Charles Brown, Texas Department of Corrections spokesman.

"We caught him about 9:30, about two miles on the northeast side of unit, near Angleton airport," Brown said. "The dogs tracked him and he was apprehended by TDC personnel."

Quate was serving the life sentence in connection with an attempted capital murder case and aggravated robbery case out of Dallas County, said Brown, who had no other details about the escapee.

Wriggling off the hook

It seems as if North was bidding quite a lot when he barged into four spades over West's takeout double. If he had redoubled and then jumped spades to the three-level, that would have been adequate and it would have given South a little leeway just on the off chance that the third-seat opening bid was light. Here it wouldn't have mattered, since South had enough to go to game.

After the opening lead there was one important consideration for declarer — to keep East off lead so that he would not be able to lead through the A-Q of diamonds. With that in mind, declarer allowed West to win trick one. When a second heart went to dummy's ace, declarer played king of spades (if West played an honor, South would finesse against the remaining honor in the East hand) and a spade back to his ace. That left East with the master trump, and declarer in some jeopardy. If South played a third spade, East would win and play a dia-

Texas congressman arranges for visa

LONGVIEW, Texas (AP) — A Texas Congressman has arranged the reunion of a South African woman and her daughter and may have negotiated a little time for the two to gain legal U.S. residency.

Christine "Chrissy" Jackson Askew, a popular gospel singer in South Africa, has been trying for months to secure U.S. residency. This week the attempt became more intense as she tried to beat a Saturday expiration date on her daughter's temporary Zimbabwe passport.

Zimbabwe officials had said that when her passport expired, they would expel Danielle Jackson, 4, to South Africa, where she had no place to stay, Mrs. Askew said. The girl has been staying with her grandparents in Zimbabwe.

On Sunday, Danielle will arrive in the United States on a visitor's visa good for 90 to 120 days, courtesy of Rep. Jim Chapman.

The Sulphur Springs Democrat learned of Mrs. Askew's plight when her husband called his office for help, Chapman said.

"We're really excited. We want to thank everyone who did so much work," said Mrs. Askew, 32.

Mrs. Askew moved to the United States six months ago and married Allan Askew, 29, an American living in Longview. When she tried to obtain legal residency, she ran into a paperwork snafu.

Immigration officials said as soon as they had Mrs. Askew's citizenship papers and her divorce papers, she could get a green card and obtain a visa for her daughter the same day, Askew said.

But U.S. Immigration and Naturalization officials received only preliminary settlement papers from the 1985 divorce, instead of the final divorce decree needed for the process.

Mrs. Askew tried getting the papers through the Zimbabwe and South African consuls but failed.

"Once we heard the story, we jumped into it. We deal with im-

migration problems all the time. But we don't usually have our back up against the wall and a gun to our head. That girl's passport was going to expire Saturday," Chapman said.

Chapman said he worked with the Zimbabwean vice counsel and the American embassy in Zimbabwe to arrange Danielle's trip.

"We just needed some creative thinking to get it done," Chapman said.

Chapman planned to bring the little girl to the United States toting her mother's final divorce

decree, but her mother says the papers are still in South Africa. She said she is arranging for her lawyer to send the papers to the American embassy in South Africa.

"We've never given up hope, we put it in God's hands. We had a lot of people praying for us," Mrs. Askew said. As for obtaining legal residency, "We carry on hope," Mrs. Askew said.

Danielle will arrive at 9:25 p.m. Sunday at Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport, Mrs. Askew said.

Woman given 70 year term

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — A woman convicted of killing a 2-year-old she was caring for in her registered day care home was sentenced to 70 years in prison without probation.

A Tarrant County jury convicted Sheila Arthur of murder Thursday for repeatedly striking the head of 2-year-old Anna Smith against a solid object.

The jury rejected a defense plea that Ms. Arthur is insane and should be allowed to return to her family in Ohio and receive mental help.

Prosecutors said Ms. Arthur, 46, deserved a lengthy sentence. "Children cry and children break things, but they don't deserve to be murdered for it," prosecutor Bill Ray said after the verdict. "She (Arthur) did the absolute worst thing you can do in this country. She took the life of someone who had no defense and had no capacity or means to provoke this, and that's a 2-year-old girl."

Anna's parents said they are satisfied with the sentence and don't believe Ms. Arthur is insane.

"If I had thought she was insane, I wouldn't have left my kids there," said Anna's father, David Smith.

Anna's sister, Rachel also was under Ms. Arthur's care when Anna died.

Groups provide aid for Alzheimer's

By Peter H. Gott, M.D.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm 84 and live alone, since my husband has Alzheimer's. I've stopped going to parades, church and small meetings because I start feeling sick and have trouble breathing. I should get out, but find I stay home more and more. Is there a reason for my reaction to crowds?

DEAR READER: Although you may be suffering from panic attacks due to the stress you are living under, I think that you should be examined by a doctor to make sure that your symptoms do not have a physical basis. For example, mild heart failure may be causing you to have trouble breathing.

In any case, you could be helped in dealing with your husband by contacting a local support group for Alzheimer's patients. The Alzheimer's Disease Association (70 East Lake St., Suite 200, Chicago, IL 60601) can refer you to a group in your area.

To give you more general information, I am sending you a free copy of my Health Report on ALZHEIMER'S DISEASE. Others who want a copy of this Report should send \$1 and their name and address to P.O. Box 91369, Cleveland, OH 44101-3369. Be sure to mention the title.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've had two heart attacks and a transient ischemic attack. I feel pretty good for an old biddy, so I guess I can't gripe too much. Is there such a thing as stomach angina?

DEAR READER: The pain of angina can be referred to the upper abdomen. In other words, patients can mistake indigestion for heart pain. If you are having attacks of abdominal discomfort, report them to your doctor. He or she will test you to find out whether you are having referred pain or whether your symptoms are related to your digestive tract. A change or alteration of your medicines may be in order.

DEAR DR. GOTT: What can you tell me about epidermolysis bullosa? My son's wife's family has it. Their 6-year-old daughter suffers terrible bruises when she falls and a nephew looks retarded because of it. My daughter-in-law says she had it but outgrew it.

DEAR READER: Epidermolysis bullosa is a group of rare, hereditary skin diseases in which blisters form at the sites of injuries. The blisters usually heal with scarring. In severe cases, mucous membranes may be affected, resulting in strictures of the esophagus, among other complications. The disease also causes muscle weakness. Its cause is unknown.

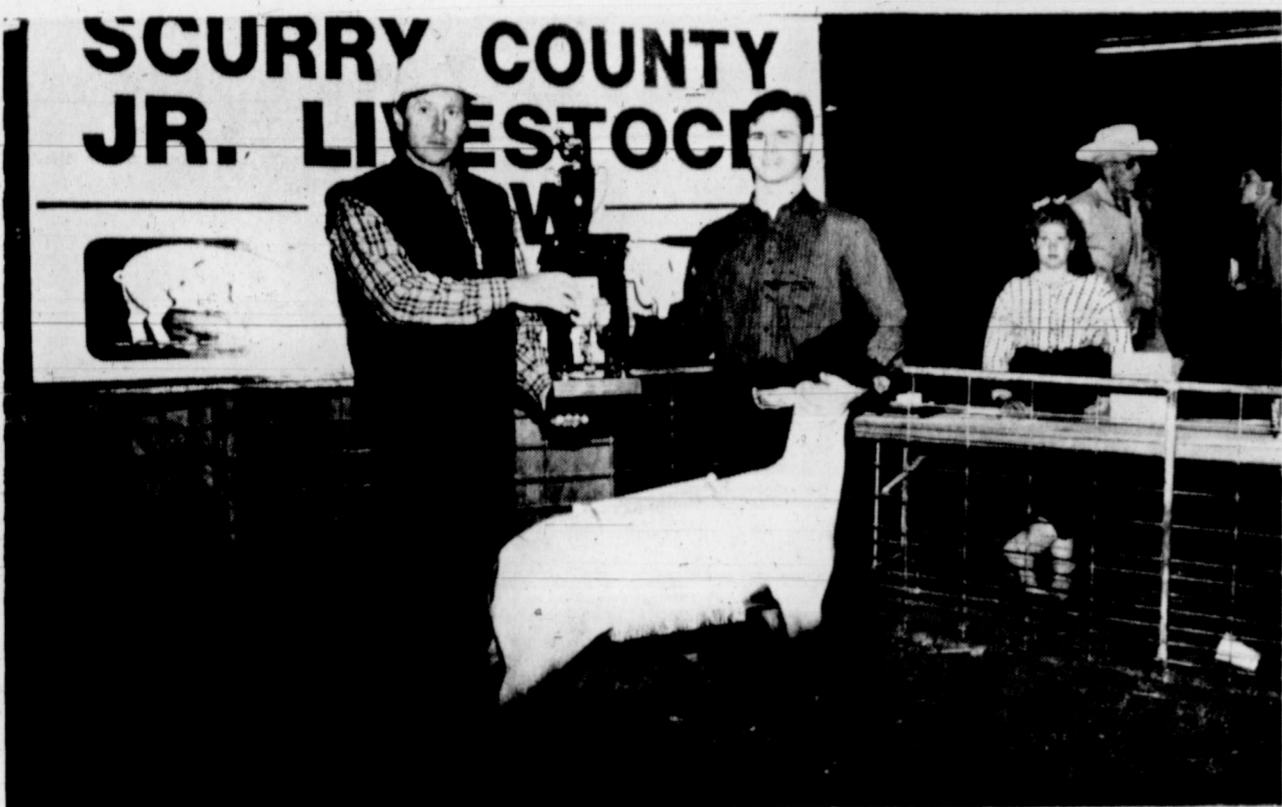

Crime statistics decline for city

According to statistics recently released, the department average was 73 percent during the year for value of property returned to the owners. In the year previous to that, the average was 71 percent.

Most crime incidents involving felonies all showed a decrease. Business burglaries dropped from 22 to 17; house burglaries from 21 to 10; and felony theft reports from 14 to 10.

Select areas, which involve less than 10 incidents reported for the entire year, showed some wide variance for the relatively small category.

An example would be rape or attempted rape incidents. In 1986, only two were reported, and this rose to eight during '87.

On the reverse side, Snyder reported two murders during 1986 and none during '87.

The only other crime areas which showed increases were car burglaries, up from 15 to 20; and auto theft, up from 12 to 22.

Other categories reported, with the previous year's total shown in parenthesis, include: misdemeanor theft, (166) 142; vandalism, (138) 94; robbery by assault, (0) 1; armed robbery, (1) 1; assault, (106) 78; and sex crimes against children, (9) 8.

Meanwhile, The Houston Post reported in a copyright story today that a tape recording of a conversation between a top aide to presidential hopeful Pete du Pont and a fired campaign worker shows the aide knew the campaign had attempted to forge signatures on petitions to get du Pont on the Texas primary ballot.

Du Pont aide Tim Hyde, however, did not admit to submitting petitions with forged signatures during the taped conversation. The quality of the tape was not clear, and Hyde's last name was not mentioned, the Post said.

Representatives of the fired staffer, Rosanne Robertson, claimed the person speaking on the tape was Hyde, du Pont's national political director.

"That was the whole thing, you showed me how to do that, and I thought that's exactly how you wanted this done," Ms. Robertson said.

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More accidents inevitable

LONDON (AP) — A university study says there have been more than 200 nuclear weapons accidents and that more are inevitable because safety and security measures have not been able to prevent them in the past.

"The past history of known nuclear weapons accidents shows that improvements in nuclear weapons safety cannot prevent accidents from occurring," said the report by the School of Peace Studies.

"New weapons and strategies have constantly moved ahead of existing safety and security measures," said the study issued Thursday.

The school, part of the University of Bradford, in Bradford, England, listed in its "Handbook of Nuclear Weapons Accidents" more than 200 known accidents in the United States, Soviet Union and Britain since 1945.

The school said it has evidence suggesting its list of accidents represents only a small percentage of the real number of accidents, which it said remain hidden in classified military files.

The school said it compiles its information from published sources such as newspapers and

magazines.

The school said its report is the most comprehensive single source of accident information currently available, updating and expanding the Stockholm International Peace Research Institute list which was last updated in 1977.

The report said one accident occurred during a routine Titan II nuclear missile launch drill at McConnell Air Force Base, Kansas, on Nov. 19, 1980, when an apparently real launch began, threatening to launch the 9-megaton weapon.

A launch control officer hastily shut the missile down by disconnecting the power supplies, the report said.

In an incident at a Minuteman nuclear missile launch control center at Warren Air Force Base, Wyoming, on Jan. 10, 1984, a computer indicated that a Minuteman missile was about to launch itself from its silo, the report said.

Despite later U.S. Air Force statements that there was no danger of an actual launch, an armored car hastily was parked on top of the missile silo as a precaution, the report said.

On Oct. 4, 1986, an explosion on board a Soviet Yankee-class submarine patrolling the eastern U.S. coast with 16 nuclear ballistic missiles killed three crewmen, the report said.

U.S. military experts said that one of the nuclear missiles probably exploded, rupturing the cap of its container and possibly ejecting nuclear warheads into the ocean, the report said.

This English-speaking, Central American country was once known as British Honduras. Although Christianity is one of the religions of the people of Belize, the majority of the population are Roman Catholics.

About their ministry in Belize, Fairbanks says: "The country of Belize is very open to the Gospel, but with the encroachment of communism we desperately need to establish a strong national church in Belize now. When we return to Belize, we plan to develop the bilingual training which the Belize Bible School desires to offer in order to prepare more ministers and Christian workers."

The Fairbankses also have ministered in the country of Haiti where Fairbanks was the director of the Bible school, and in Nicaragua where they were involved in evangelism and church planting.

At this special missions service, Fairbanks will share the spiritual needs of Belize.

Ex-con talks to teenagers in 'Twice Pardoned' film

"Twice-Pardoned," a new film presentation created especially for teenagers, examines the destructive ways in which many young people try to cope with the pains and pressures of growing up. It will be shown in two parts this Sunday at the Ira Baptist Church. Part I begins at 6 p.m. and Part II will follow at 7 p.m.

Several churches are sponsoring this event including Ira Baptist, Ira Methodist, Ira Church of God and Ira Church of Christ.

In this recent release from Focus on the Family Films, ex-con Harold Morris tells his life story and urges teenagers to avoid the snares—alcohol, drugs, illicit sex and wrong associations—that led to his imprisonment.

In this two-part series, taped before 10,000 teens in San Antonio, and on location at Georgia State Penitentiary, Morris encourages young people to realize how much they are loved. Speaking from personal experiences, he explains how feelings of inferiority can make them vulnerable to peer pressure. He also shares, in a down-to-earth manner, some of the tragic consequences of his wrong choices.

"Twice Pardoned" has been endorsed by noted family psychologist and best-selling author Dr. James Dobson. "I have never seen a more powerful message for teens," he said. "Every young person in America needs to see these films."

In 1969, as a result of false testimony from two "friends," Morris was convicted of armed robbery and murder and was sentenced to a double life term at Georgia State Penitentiary.

After eight years in prison (including "hard time" on Death Row), Morris made a commitment to Jesus Christ and began an outreach to young people to help them avoid the traps that got him into trouble.

Morris was released on parole on March 14, 1978, after nearly a decade behind bars. He later graduated from Southeastern Bible College in Birmingham, Ala. and was granted a full pardon by Gov. George Busbee on March 15, 1981.

Morris' first book, "Twice Pardoned: An Ex-Con Talks to Parents and Teens," has ranked near the top of Christian best seller lists since its release on June 1986 by Focus on the Family Publishing.
