Attention now on homeless violence

DALLAS (AP) — Each night they line up on a grubby street that smells of urine for shelter at the Union Gospel Mission. They are frisked and watched carefully for trouble.

They receive their medication, often psychiatric drugs. They get a meal, and they pray.

Carl Williams was one of them. He was homeless, mentally ill, and violent. He was here the night before he died, the night before he killed a cop.

Williams' shooting of Officer John Chase, 25, touched off a citywide outpouring of grief and a public feud among the police department, the mayor and City Council members.

And it has highlighted the growing problem of a younger, homeless population growing more violent.

Police now travel in pairs, city plans day of reflection

DALLAS (AP) — Police Chief Billy Prince has ordered officers to temporarily patrol in pairs as a safety move in response to two police slayings in the past two weeks.

The order Wednesday came a day before the funeral of 25-year-old John Chase, who was shot to death Saturday by a deranged homeless man. Scores of law officers from Texas traveled to Iowa to attend the funeral.

Prince said the pairing up of officers would reduce the number

of patrols by 30 percent. But he said he didn't expect the move would decrease police response time on emergency calls.

He said the two-by-two patrols would be evaluated after two weeks.

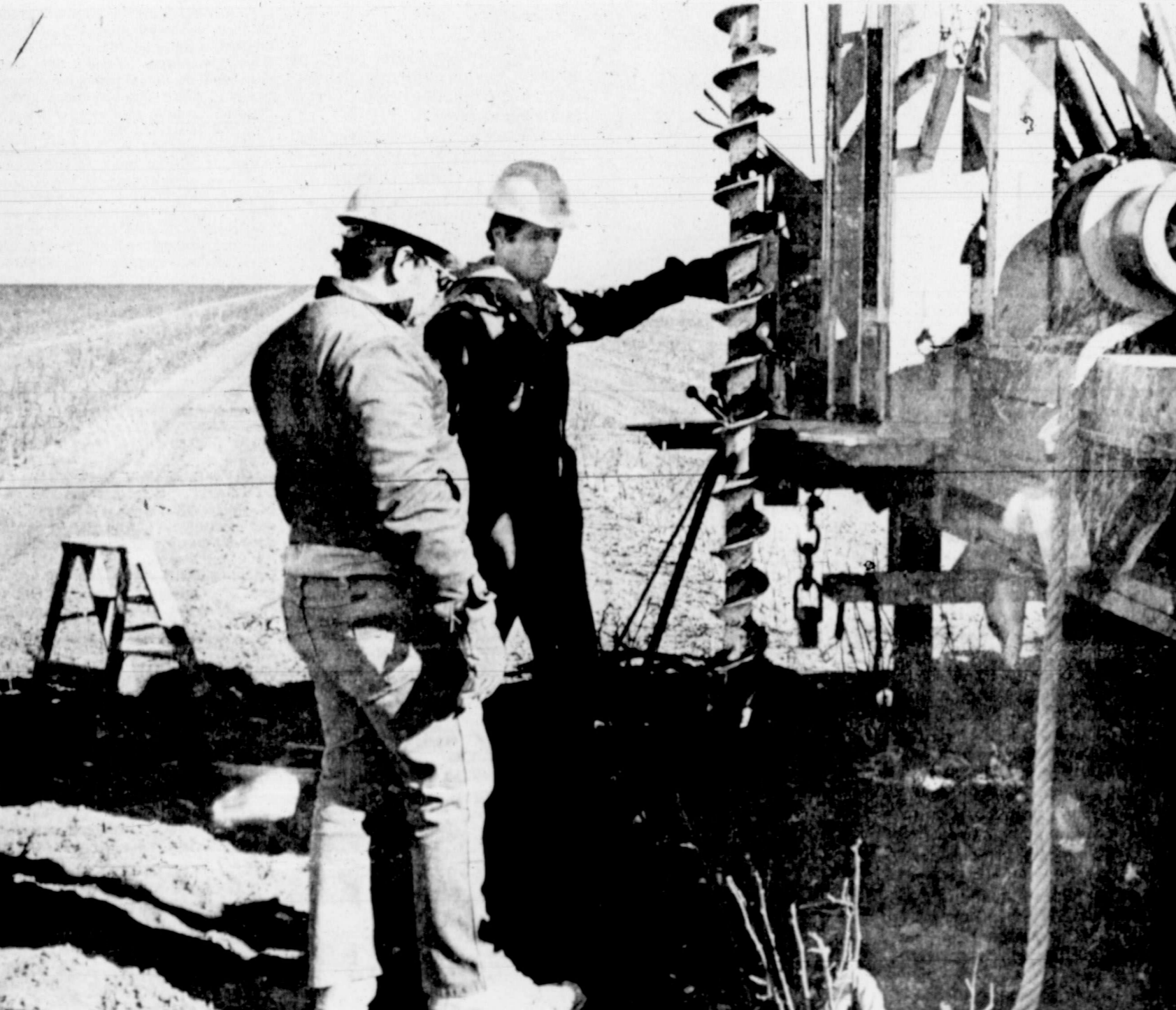
Assistant Chief John Driscoll said officers will continue to respond in person to major calls, but no longer will answer non-violent calls and other requests in which the only immediate action by police is to make a written report

of the incident.

Meanwhile, Dallas city officials, under fire from police and citizens, sought a time of reconciliation.

The slaying prompted an outpouring of both grief and outrage by Dallas residents who rallied to the side of the embattled police department.

The police department has been under fire in recent months for police shootings of minority residents.

Changes on tap for ER

Weekend doctors to end agreement

Officials at Cogdell Memorial Hospital have been notified that doctors in residency through the Texas Tech Health Sciences Center at Lubbock will no longer be providing weekend emergency room medical care at the local facility.

An alternate method of providing this care is slated to be discussed Thursday at a meeting of the hospital board. It will begin with a dinner meal at 6:30 p.m.

Cogdell administrator Tom Hockwalt said Thursday morning that the Lubbock physicians have indicated they will continue with the current arrangement through Feb. 22.

Cogdell has contracted with doctors still in residency through the Tech medical center to provide this ER coverage. The expense to the hospital for the service has been in the range of \$90,000 annually.

Hockwalt said an alternate proposal for ER weekend coverage will be discussed at the meeting, but he said it is not listed as an action item.

Thursday will mark the "annual meeting" for the hospital board and will include the first session both under Hockwalt as the new hospital administrator and with St. Mary of the Plains Hospital in Lubbock as Cogdell's new management firm advisor.

The session is to include both a "management objectives for 1988" discussion from Hockwalt and St. Mary officials, who are also expected to attend.

Included on the agenda is a proposal for a hospital pricing update, which will be considered as an action item, Hockwalt said.

The board's annual meeting will include also the swearing-in of new board members and the election of new board officers.

The board will gain one new appointee as G.A. Parks has been named by county commissioners to replace the outgoing Leon Autry.

Polygamist band in Utah...

Standoff apparently ends, shots fired

MARION, Utah (AP) — A 13-day standoff between a polygamist band and police apparently ended today after two armored personnel carriers drove into the group's compound and eight to 10 shots were heard.

At least two people were wounded, authorities said.

Five people were seen fleeing from the house with their hands raised.

At the same time, two ambulances and a helicopter with one person strapped to a gurney raced from the compound.

The people, some of them children, walked down the driveway from the main log house toward a police van as the ambulances sped from the compound toward area hospitals.

At least two people suffered gunshot wounds, according to

John Dwan at the University of Utah Medical Center in Salt Lake City. One victim, a male, was taken by the Army helicopter to the center's emergency room, Dwan said. Another gunshot victim was being picked up by a center helicopter, to be transferred to Salt Lake City from a hospital in Heber City, about 20 miles from Marion.

Several minutes after the first

group filed out of the log house, a second group of about five — also including children, left the house.

The second group included a man in a wheelchair, presumably the 21-year-old disabled son of one of the group's leaders.

The band of 15 polygamists, including nine children, had been holed up in the compound since the Jan. 16 bombing of a Mormon chapel.

Rural fire damages farm garage

Firemen battled a garage fire for almost two hours Wednesday morning seven miles east of Snyder off the Roby Highway.

The call came in at 10:37 a.m. to a garage owned by Jervis Bullard, and firemen were at the scene until 12:15 p.m.

Fire Chief Terry Don McDowell had not made an official ruling on the cause, a department spokesman said.

He said the garage was being used for storage and that the primary damage was to the back, west side and roof of the structure.

A smaller storage shed behind the garage also had some fire damage, but the contents of the

One arrested

DALLAS (AP) — An alleged money laundering scheme of drug profits has resulted in the arrest of a former Nixon aide and a former Illinois congressman, who are among 14 people indicted in six different cities, an assistant U.S. attorney said today.

All but one of the 14 had been arrested by this morning, and many were out on bond, said Assistant U.S. Attorney Bill Sheetz at a news conference.

Among those arrested was Thomas Gene Crouch, a former aide to President Richard Nixon and former Dallas County Republican chairman.

Crouch, now a Dallas attorney, was named in a 13-count federal grand jury indictment, which stemmed from a nationwide sting operation by the Internal Revenue Service.

Also named in the indictment was Robert Hanrahan, a Washington lobbyist and former Illinois Republican congressman, Sheetz said.

AIDS summit

LONDON (AP) — Health officials are planning to screen every student at a major American university this spring to determine the incidence of AIDS among young adults, U.S. Surgeon General C. Everett Koop said today.

Such tests might also be done at high schools, Koop told reporters on the last day of the world's first global AIDS summit in London.

Midland man given life term

ODESSA, Texas (AP) — A man sentenced to life in prison for the chloroform poisoning of a female acquaintance still faces charges he poisoned two other people with cyanide.

An Ector County jury Wednesday gave David Dowler the maximum sentence for the

chloroform death of 29-year-old Leza Chandler after deliberating less than half an hour.

Dowler, 34, of Midland, is under indictment in the cyanide poisoning deaths of Mrs. Chandler's ex-husband and her best friend.

During the trial, which includ-

ed testimony that the chloroform was meant to be an intoxicant, prosecutors emphasized links between Mrs. Chandler's death and those of her friends years before.

"In essence we've tried the other two cases," said Ector County assistant district attorney Dennis Cadra following sentencing. "It's the exact same evidence."

Prosecutors presented five days of testimony against Dowler, including hours of secretly videotaped conversations between Dowler and a friend. Those conversations, in which Dowler discussed ways to poison people using homemade cyanide, took place three days after Ms. Middleton had gone to Mrs. Chandler's apartment and found the woman's body on June 28, 1987.

Dowler's business partner and Mrs. Chandler's ex-husband, Juan Antonio Casillas, 28, died of cyanide poisoning in his home on Feb. 12, 1986.

On Aug. 16, 1983, Lisa Blythe Krieg, Mrs. Chandler's best friend and an acquaintance of Dowler's, also died of cyanide

poisoning.

Dowler was not indicted in those deaths until Dec. 31, after being indicted in Mrs. Chandler's poisoning. No trial dates have been set for the other two cases.

However, relatives of Krieg and Casillas hugged and cried upon hearing the verdict of murder, delivered early Wednesday after six hours of deliberation.

Defense attorney Thomas Hirsch tried to block introduction of the videotaped conversations and other mention of the other two deaths during Dowler's trial and asked for a mistrial, but was unsuccessful.

Hirsch filed a notice of appeal based on admissibility of the videotapes and testimony about the other deaths.

"I don't believe the legal test for similarity was shown, because those are cyanide deaths and this was chloroform," said Hirsch. "That's a horse of a different color."

State district Judge Bill McCoy had ruled the tapes could be introduced because they showed Dowler's "scheme and design."

Judge grants stay

HUNTSVILLE, Texas (AP) — A federal appeals court that blocked the execution of an inmate scheduled to die early today said if it had not issued the stay, the man would have died before judges received the paperwork needed to review the case.

The 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans granted the stay Wednesday night just a few hours before Raymond Landry was scheduled to die for the 1982 robbery-slaying of a Houston restaurant owner.

Earlier Wednesday evening, a federal judge in Houston had refused to halt the execution, which was scheduled for shortly after midnight today. The date was Landry's second.

In granting the stay at about 9 p.m., the three-judge panel noted that it received the request at 7:20 p.m. and that the court would not receive a record of Landry's trial and sentencing until after his scheduled execution.

"It is ordered that the execution of Raymond Landry be stayed until further order of this court in order to permit this court to make a more informed decision on Landry's application for a certificate of probable cause," according to the appeals court order.

U.S. District Judge Lynn Hughes denied a stay Wednesday about five hours before Landry could be put to death, and the inmate's attorneys immediately sought a stay from the federal appeals court.

Landry's attorney, Michael Charlton, argued his client did not have effective counsel during his original trial.

Which suit comes first?

Here is another deal in which you, as declarer, must suppress your natural instincts. You receive the 10 of hearts lead against three no-trump. After you win the first trick with the queen, you force out the ace of clubs, right? Or do you? The answer is yes, if your name happens to be Willy Nilly. And sure enough, East wins the club ace and plays back a heart. Later West wins the third round of diamonds and cashes out his heart suit to beat you a trick. Why should you do better?

You are more likely to make your contract if you play A-K of diamonds first. When it is apparent that West has the diamond winner, give it to him right away. Of course he will continue hearts, but at least now you have the chance that East may have the club ace. And you may just be lucky enough that hearts are 6-2 with the defenders so that East does not have a heart to play back to his partner. Occasionally you may be set an extra trick when West also has the ace of clubs as well as a six-card heart suit, but that risk is worth taking in an undoubted contract if it improves your prospects of making game.

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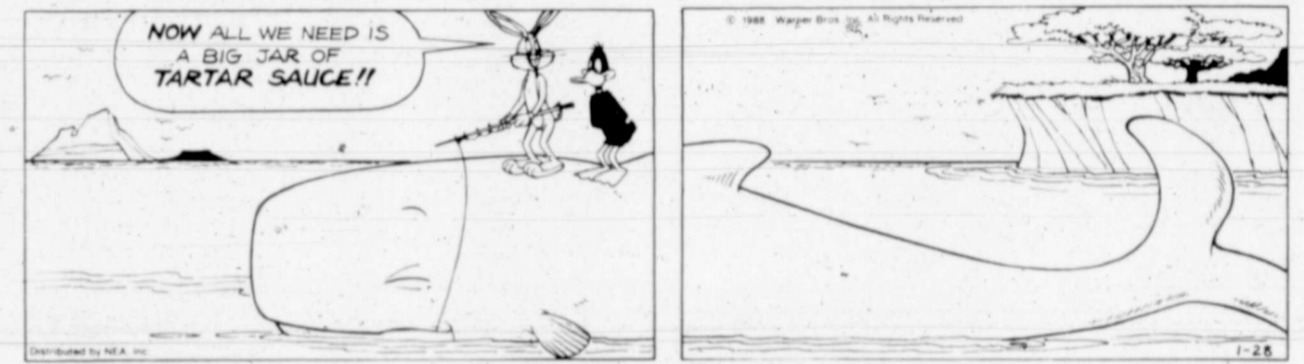
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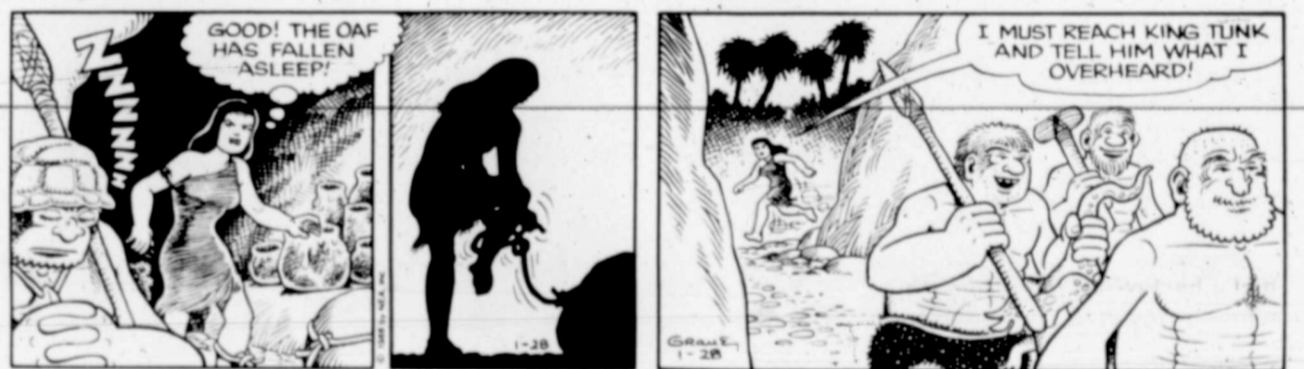

Red Raiders shock Aggies

Texas Tech Coach Gerald Myers says it was one of the best team efforts all season as the Red Raiders kept their home victory streak alive with an upset of Texas A&M in Southwest Conference basketball action.

Texas Tech defeated the Aggies, 72-61 Wednesday night. In other SWC games, Arkansas defeated Rice, 80-61, Southern Methodist University beat Texas, 75-70, and Baylor whipped Houston, 77-59.

Wes Lowe scored a career-high 28 points to lead Texas Tech to the victory over Texas A&M and keep the Red Raiders home victory streak alive. The Raiders have not lost a game at Lubbock this season.

"We had a lot of guys play well tonight," Myers said. "We executed our offense, and our defense was effective. It's the first time all year that our defense has been able to pick us up when our offense bogged down."

High scoring Darryl McDonald, who scored only 13 points and hit only four of 12 field goal attempts and turned the ball over six times, said the poor showing by the Aggies puzzled him.

"We didn't play together as a team," he said. "I don't know what the problem was. I've been starting slow the past few games, and I can't explain it. We have to get hungry again."

The Aggies, who fell to 4-2 in conference play and 12-8 overall, came within 9 points three times but could get no closer. The Raiders are now 8-9 and 3-3.

Andrew Lang scored 17 points to lead the Arkansas Razorbacks to an 80-61 victory over the Rice Owls and give Arkansas sole possession of first place.

David Willie had a career-high 28 points for Rice.

The Razorbacks are now 5-1 in

conference play. Rice dropped to 5-12 overall and 2-5 in SWC games.

Kato Armstrong scored 17 points to lead SMU to a 75-70 victory over the Texas Longhorns.

Southern Methodist had lost three previous meetings with the Longhorns by a total of four points.

The Mustangs, 5-2 in the SWC and 16-4 overall, were also helped by 14 points from Todd Alex-

ander, who keyed a second-half surge with three three-point shots.

Texas, 2-4 in the conference and 8-10 in all games, was paced by center Jose Nassar's 16 points.

Texas Coach Bob Weltlich, under fire because of his team's lack of success, said he was pleased with the Longhorns' play despite the loss.

"I thought we played better

than we have been lately, with much more poise," Weltlich said. "We made some mistakes down the stretch but not because we got excited or because we felt nervous."

Baylor guard Michael Williams scored 34 points, 24 in the second half, to lead the Bears to a 77-59 win over the Houston Cougars.

Baylor, 12-7 and 3-3 in league play, led 33-27 at halftime. The Cougars, 8-7 and 3-3, cut the score to 50-45 with 9:12 remaining in the game. The Bears went on an 16-4 run, extending their lead to 66-49.

Three Cougars, Craig Upchurch, Randy Brown and Perry Russell, fouled out of the game.

Baylor Coach Gene Iba said the victory helps keep the Bears in the conference race.

"We really played a good second half. We took control and played a hard 20 minutes," Iba said.

In Sunday's Super Bowl...

Redskins like underdog role

SAN DIEGO (AP) - While the bookmakers are playing favorites with the Denver Broncos, the Washington Redskins are enjoying the role of Super Bowl underdog. After all, it's been good to them.

NFC champions for the third time in seven years, the Redskins lost as favorites against the Raiders in 1984, Washington's last appearance in the Super Bowl. The previous year, the Redskins were underdogs to Miami and won.

"Let them be the favorites," linebacker Neal Olkewicz said. "This team thrives on being the underdog. It's part of the Joe Gibbs philosophy to have us thinking we always are the underdog. It makes us want to get out there and prove ourselves even more."

Denver is a 3 1/2-point favorite for Sunday's game, the Broncos' second straight Super Bowl. Denver was a 9-point underdog when beaten 39-20 by the New York Giants last January.

"We're not uncomfortable in that role," Steve Watson said. "We don't pay any attention to point spreads and lines because they don't mean anything to the game. I think we're favored because we had to prove something by getting back here. I don't think we got a lot of respect last year. It was 'the New York Giants this and New York Giants that.'"

"This year, we did prove ourselves by getting back a second time. That's why we're favored, not because we're a better team than Washington."

The Broncos are having no

trouble accepting the role as a favorite away from home, a rare occurrence. In Denver, where they have lost only one non-strike game in the last 17, the Broncos nearly always are favored.

"We played so much better the last six, seven games, we really just came together," Dave Studdard said. "The chemistry is better than last year, the confidence is higher."

"We may have been overshadowed by the Giants, but it didn't bother us. The less publicity, the less pressure."

"Being favored doesn't bother us. The drive to come back to the Super Bowl and win it this time is what I think they looked at. That's how they decided the line."

The Redskins figured they'd be considered an underdog, even though they are the only team to qualify for three Super Bowls in this decade.

"It doesn't matter how we rate or how they rate," Darryl Grant said. "It's how we feel about

ourselves. We get told we're too old and too slow, but we wind up back in the Super Bowl."

As underdogs, "I like it," Clint Didier said. "I think Denver deserves to be the favorite. They played in the toughest division and came out on top. They went through the playoffs scoring a lot of points, beating a really good Cleveland team."

Since both teams are relatively healthy and have performed well under playoff stress in close championship games, the spread derives from one factor - John Elway.

"He's a game-maker and a gamebreaker," said Grant, one of the Redskins' massive linemen who consistently must pressure the Denver quarterback. "He's an awesome quarterback."

So awesome that the oddsmakers place enough value on Elway that he means the dif-

ference on the betting sheets.

"Elway is scary," Olkewicz said. "He's as good as you'll find and he gets everyone's respect."

Including the oddsmakers? "Sure."

While Elway can dominate a game with his passing, scrambling and instincts - he is the NFL's most imaginative quarterback - Washington's Doug Williams isn't quite so creative.

"Doug won't scramble, he won't roll out, he'll stand in there and, because he's so big, he can take it," Gibbs said. "He's a very efficient quarterback."

But he's no Elway.

Yes, Lamesa did drop to Class AAA. But no, Pecos and Fort Stockton did not go west. The "new" district will consist of Snyder, Andrews, Pecos, Fort Stockton, San Angelo Lake View, Sweetwater, Big Spring and Monahans.

The only other change is in title only. District 2-4A will become District 4-4A.

Area teams Hermleigh and Ira will not have to meet up with

Jayton until the playoffs in six-man football next season. The Cardinals and Bulldogs - are in District 6-1A, along with familiar foes Blackwell, Highland and Trent. A newcomer is Loraine.

Borden County will be pitted against Sands, Klondike, Grady, Loop and Dawson again, in District 6 for football.

Changes occur on the basketball courts, particularly for Ira and Hermleigh, who jump to District 25 with Roby and Rotan. They are currently in with Loraine and Westbrook in basketball.

Borden will be in District 16 for hoops action, along with Sands, Klondike, Grady, Dawson and O'Donnell.

Lamesa's departure could have some interesting effects on

106-100. "I knew early," said Bird, who rebounded from a 7-for-21 performance at Atlanta on Tuesday night. "I was more active and getting open. The shot felt good and the ball was dropping for me."

It was the Celtics' ninth victory in their last 10 games, 19th in their last 22 and their 64th consecutive Boston Garden victory over Eastern Conference teams since a loss to the New Jersey Nets on April 14, 1985.

Elsewhere, it was Dallas 121, Phoenix 102; Detroit 103, Indiana 86; Chicago 119, Philadelphia 109 in overtime; Cleveland 112, San Antonio 102, and Golden State 115, Portland 110.

Despite Bird's heroics, Washington had a chance to tie the score but Boston's Danny Ainge intercepted a pass that halted a breakaway with the Celtics ahead 102-100. With four teammates trapped deep in their own end, Ainge picked off Tyrone Bogues' pass at midcourt and fed Robert Parish for the last of his 26 points with 10 seconds remaining.

Mavericks 121, Suns 102 Derek Harper and Mark Aguirre combined for 23 points in the fourth quarter as Dallas tied a club record with its fifth consecutive road victory.

Dallas, which never trailed, led 98-95 before pulling away thanks to a 14-4 run during which Harper scored six points.

Phoenix got 24 points from Eddie Johnson.

Pistons 103, Pacers 86 Adrian Dantley scored 23 points and Detroit held Indiana scoreless during a 6:46 stretch in the fourth quarter. The cold-shooting Pacers also went without a basket for a 5:52 stretch of the third quarter, although they managed four free throws during that dry spell.

Bulls 119, 76ers 109

Michael Jordan scored 37 points, including four in a 6-0 overtime burst, as Chicago snapped a nine-game road losing streak as well as a nine-game period of futility in Philadelphia where it hadn't won since Feb. 10, 1984.

After Chicago's Brad Sellers and Philadelphia's Charles Barkley traded baskets to start the overtime, the Bulls scored six straight points, starting with a drive by Jordan and ending with a pair of free throws by Michael Jordan.

Barkley, who scored 24 points, made another basket, but Chicago ran off another six points. Barkley sent the game into overtime with four seconds left when he tipped in his own rebound.

Cavaliers 112, Spurs 102 Tyrone Corbin scored 21 points and Ron Harper had eight in a 14-4 spurt down the stretch as Cleveland pulled away from a 98-98 tie. Walter Berry, who led San Antonio with 27 points, fouled Harper, who sank two free throws to start an 8-0 run.

On the Cavaliers' next possession, Berry fouled Corbin, who also made two free throws. Brad Daugherty and Harper added two more each.

Warriors 115, Trail Blazers 110 Terry Teagle scored 12 of his 25 points in the final quarter, lifting Golden State over idle New Jersey in the race to avoid the worst record in the NBA.

Teagle scored four straight points after Portland cut the lead to 103-101 with three minutes left.

New virus is now causing AIDS infection

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — The nation's first diagnosis of AIDS from a second kind of virus does not signal a new AIDS epidemic, said a researcher who recommended against testing blood supplies for the strain.

Others, however, favored use of new tests for the virus, which medical authorities said was the first confirmed case in the Western Hemisphere.

The virus, discovered 2½ years ago in West Africa and later spread to Europe, was seen by researchers from the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey in a patient exposed to it in West Africa, the university reported Wednesday.

The state school would not disclose the patient's identity or location, and would not say when or where the diagnosis was made.

The virus is called HIV-2, for human immunodeficiency virus, type 2. That distinguishes it from the original AIDS virus, designated HIV-1.

But Dr. Myron Essex of Harvard University, a leading expert on HIV-2, said Wednesday it was "inevitable that we'd see a case here," and he does not believe it will lead to an epidemic.

"The evidence that this virus causes AIDS in the same way or degree that HIV-1 does is not very great," Essex said in a telephone interview from his hotel room in New York City, where he was attending a medical conference.

However, Luc Montagnier of the Pasteur Institute in Paris, who discovered HIV-2 and was a discoverer of the original AIDS

virus, said illness caused by HIV-2 is exactly the same as the illness caused by HIV-1.

Essex said there is no cause for concern that HIV-2 could have infected the nation's blood supply, because the incidence of HIV-2 infection in this country is "so astronomically low."

As a result, there is little point in testing the blood supply for HIV-2, he said.

"The proportion of people picked up (as infected with HIV-2) would not be as high as the number of people missed with the HIV-1 test, which is 99 percent effective, he said.

But the American Foundation for AIDS Research noted that the two viruses are transmitted in the same ways, and the same prevention methods will protect people from either virus.

"There is still only one AIDS epidemic," said Dr. Mathilde Krim, founder of the New York City-based foundation.

She said discovery of HIV-2 in this country will hinder testing because the genetic makeup of the two viruses is different enough to demand different kinds of tests.

"Testing methods will, therefore, need to be adapted to detect both viruses," she said.
