

## Faction claims responsibility

TYRE, Lebanon (AP) — A pro-Iranian group said today it kidnapped a U.S. Marine colonel serving with the U.N. peacekeeping force in south Lebanon and released identity cards bearing his photograph.

The claim by Oppressed of the Earth was made in a typed Arabic-language statement delivered to a Western news agency in Beirut. It was accompanied by two identity cards, one in English and one in Hebrew.

Both bore photographs of Lt. Col. William R. Higgins, 43, of Danville, Ky., and what appeared to be his signature. It was the second claim of responsibility for the abduction.

Shiite Amal militiamen today seized six activists of the Iranian-backed Hezbollah, or Party of God, in Tyre in a dragnet for Higgins and the gunmen who kidnapped him just south of the southern port city on Wednesday. Amal sealed off a 300-square-mile area.

## Annual report issued Reagan's economic message

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan today issued his annual report on the state of the economy, taking credit for the country's longest peacetime recovery and renewing his threat to veto protectionist trade legislation and omnibus budget bills.

The president contended the country is in a lot better shape now than when he took office seven years ago.

"It is hard to believe that at the beginning of the 1980s, the prevailing attitude toward the economy could best be described as despair," Reagan said in an

eight-page introduction to this year's report. "Inflation and interest rates had ratcheted higher with each successive business cycle and ... the goal of sustainable growth, appeared increasingly elusive."

In a theme sure to be sounded by the eventual Republican presidential candidate, the report asserts, "The past five years of sustained and vigorous growth in production, income and employment did not occur by accident. They were shaped by government policies explicitly directed toward fostering the inherent dynamism of the private

sector." Reagan was president during the 1981-82 recession, the deepest since the Great Depression, but since then the country has enjoyed an economic recovery that is now entering its sixth year, a record for peacetime.

But the Reagan years also have been marked by record high federal budget deficits and record foreign trade deficits, a situation which has transformed the United States from the world's largest creditor nation into the world's largest debtor country.

## No charges likely against landowner in plane drug bust

A state narcotics agent investigating the apparent use of a private airstrip in Borden County for drug-smuggling operations said Friday he does not anticipate charges against the property owner on which the landing strip was located.

Bob Nestoroff, the Department of Public Safety agent who ex-

ecuted two search warrants in Borden County Tuesday, told The Snyder Daily News Friday morning that the landowner, Warren Beaver, might be "being targeted unfairly" and that he does "not anticipate any charges against Mr. Beaver."

Beaver is currently a candidate for sheriff in Borden County. Accounts indicate he has told investigators he did not know the

runway was being used for an illicit purpose.

Monday night, an airplane linked to the deliver of some 1,200 pounds of marijuana in Palo Pinto County was confiscated at the private airstrip.

Nestoroff said Friday he could not reveal where the search warrants were served or what, if anything, was found.

## Science exhibition due judges

The setup of an estimated 130 science projects was underway Friday at the Snyder Junior High in preparation for judging Friday night.

The public viewing of the third annual Snyder Junior High Science Fair is planned Saturday morning at the school campus.

The public is invited from 9 until 11 a.m. to view the projects in the junior high girl's gymnasium.

The winners of the fair will be announced at a 10:30 a.m. awards assembly Saturday in the junior high auditorium.

Entries include some 80 projects from seventh and eighth graders as well as 50 more expected from elementary-age youngsters, who have been invited to participate also. They will compete in their own division.

In addition to the elementary division, competition categories include physical science, biology and exhibit, which will include models.

Entries in physical science and biology will be based on the scientific method and will feature an experiment used to support a hypothesis.

The judging of these projects is slated Friday from 6:30 until 9 p.m. Judges will include Dennis Young, Osma Karaman, Larry Adams, John Clarke and Bill Rogers, members of the local chapter of the Society of Petroleum Engineers; and Melinda Owens of the Snyder High School science department.

Plaques for first, second and third place will be handed out.

Special honor ribbons will be given out in each division also and all students entering will receive a certificate.

"Would that relationship prevent your being able to consider the evidence in an unbiased way?" the attorney asked.

"The fact is that since 1980, the inflation rate for education has far outpaced the overall rate of inflation. In 1986, education costs (primarily tuition and textbooks) rose at eight percent while the Consumer Price Index was rising at about two percent."

Moral of this story: if you're poor, you may have to remain ignorant.

### In Brief

#### Plane crashes

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — A small private plane barely missed Interstate 10 traffic as it smashed into a shopping mall's parking lot this morning and burst into flames. At least two people were killed, officials said.

"It looked like it was going to attempt maybe to come onto the freeway, but as soon as it got over the freeway, it just nosedived," witness Victor Armendariz said. "There's not much left. It's just charcoal."

Three parked cars in the parking lot caught fire after the crash, but those flames were quickly extinguished, El Paso police Sgt. John Loy said.

No casualties on the ground were reported, but at least two people aboard the twin-engine plane died, he said. The victims' identities were not immediately known.

The crash scene on the south side of I-10 is about three miles away from El Paso International Airport. Airport authorities said they did not know where the plane was based.

#### Starts to work

WASHINGTON (AP) — Anthony M. Kennedy is quickly getting down to cases after taking his place as the newest member of the Supreme Court with a pledge to uphold a Constitution that he said makes the United States unique.

"The Constitution of the United States is the single idea, the single fact, the single reality, the single moral principle that sets the United States apart from other nations, now and throughout history," Kennedy said during a White House swearing-in ceremony. "I shall honor that Constitution."

#### Farm budget

WASHINGTON (AP) — Reagan administration plans to overhaul the U.S. sugar support system and drastically cut rural housing and telephone programs are headed for the same chilly reception that Congress gave them in past years, farm-state Democrats say.

"They were dead on arrival and will remain dead on arrival," Rep. Leon Panetta, D-Calif., said after President Reagan submitted his proposed fiscal 1989 farm budget on Thursday.

Panetta, a member of the House Agriculture Committee, characterized Reagan's spending plan as "a no-news budget" and "a rehash of old proposals."

### Steroid drugs pose problems

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** I took steroids for asthma. When I stopped the drugs, my adrenal glands stopped functioning. I have nausea and shaking spells, have lost 22 pounds in three months and am in bed most of the time. Will this get better?

**DEAR READER:** It may not get better if your disorder is due to adrenal insufficiency.

Steroids, such as cortisone and prednisone, are wondrous drugs that block the body's inflammatory response; hence, they are useful in treating myriad diseases, including asthma and autoimmune (self-allergy) disorders.

There is a tradeoff: Long-term use of steroids produces alterations in body chemistry, leading to brittle bones, easy infection, diabetes and cataracts, to name just a few complications. The adrenal glands form natural cortisone-like substances, small quantities of which are necessary for life. Because of a mechanism called biofeedback, the adrenal glands will cease producing cortisone when the substance is given by pill or injection.

Problems can ensue when the medicine is abruptly discontinued, without giving the adrenal glands time enough to recover, to start producing their own cortisone. This is the reason that doctors will gradually wean patients off the drug. In people who have taken steroids for more than a few days, the dose of medicine must be tapered. As less and less medicine enters the body, the adrenal glands are stimulated to produce more and more natural cortisone.

Possibly, in your case, the steroids were stopped too quickly. Consequently, you are now cortisone-deficient because your adrenal glands have not been permitted to begin functioning. Without any steroids in your system, you could become quite ill.

I suggest that you discuss the situation with your doctor. He or she may choose to administer steroids once again and then, under careful monitoring, taper the dose. As an alternative, a blood test will show if your adrenal glands are malfunctioning.

## Police officer said drowned

HOUSTON (AP) — A police officer drowned after his car plunged into a bayou and divers were unable to rescue him from the murky waters, authorities said.

The accident Thursday evening apparently was triggered by a car that ran a red light, striking Officer Andrew Winzer's car, said police spokesman Dan Turner.

The officer's car went into a

spin and the patrolman crashed through a guardrail and into Buffalo Bayou, he said.

"We have conflicting stories at this time, but the witnesses are telling us that the citizen ran the light striking the (patrol car) in the intersection," Turner said.

An off-duty patrolman, who was following Winzer in an unmarked car, and patrons of a nearby bar dove into the murky waters in an attempt to save the officer, he said.

"We saw bubbles so we tried to locate the car. It was too deep, we couldn't reach it and they called for divers," said a man at the bar who dove into the cold water.

"It's very disappointing we couldn't get to the car. It was a

terrible moment thinking that he may still be alive. We just couldn't get to the car," said the man who declined to give his name.

It took police department divers more than an hour to pull the officer from the car which had all its doors locked. Officers were still attempting to pull the car from the bayou, a few blocks from the downtown police station, late Thursday.

The male driver of the other car was not seriously injured and taken to police headquarters for questioning, Turner said.

Winzer, whose age was not immediately known, had been with the police department about four years, Turner said.

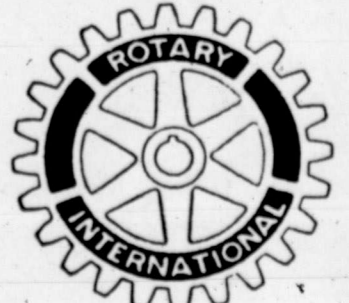

### CRMWD said on even keel

**BIG SPRING**—In the first month of 1988 operations, the Colorado River Municipal Water District ran on even keel.

Income of \$925,727 was just under estimates, but so were operating expenses of \$424,310. The net difference on the negative side was only \$12,824. Of income, \$911,006 of it came from sale of water. The big item in expenses was electric energy in the amount of \$197,492, or \$27,866 less than estimated for the month. Administrative and general expenses were \$20,559 more than projected for the month, but repayment of group insurance and liability insurance premiums accounted for this.

Net income of \$501,025 for the month will go toward interest and bond payments.

The district delivered 1,034,171,370 of water in January, 913,816,980 gallons to cities and 120,354,390 to oil companies for secondary recovery from non-potable (diverted water) sources.

In January 9.13 percent of water produced was from Lakes Thomas and Spence, virtually none from wells and the remainder from stream diversions for quality upgrading. The lakes together contained 361,184 ac. ft. (278,200 Lake Spence, 82,904 Lake Thomas) for 52.14 percent capacity. There was no inflow and withdrawals totalled 2,893 ac. ft. for the month.

Only three Latin American countries — Brazil, Colombia and Panama — had a higher income as measured by per capita gross domestic product in 1986 than they did in 1980, according to the Inter-American Development Bank. Thirteen countries in Latin America had a loss of at least 10 percent and three of these — Bolivia, Guyana and Trinidad-Tobago — went down by as much as 27 percent.

Defense is the most complicated aspect of bridge. The defender sees the dummy and his own cards, but he has to use his imagination to place the cards held by declarer and his own partner. Doing the right thing becomes a difficult task. So let me help you out with today's deal. You will defeat the contract if you follow a simple rule. When in doubt as to the correct defense, make the play that will prevent declarer from accomplishing whatever he is attempting.

East won dummy's spade king with his ace and returned the spade 10. Declarer won dummy's queen and played a diamond back to his queen. Next came the king of hearts. East saw no reason to take this trick. Declarer continued with the jack of hearts. I think you see what is necessary. East held up again on this trick, thereby preventing declarer from getting to dummy. South led a spade and West had to win the jack. A diamond play from West now would be a terrible error, but West played the ace of clubs. Declarer ruffed and led a heart, but East had the fourth spade for an exit card, and so South was unable to reach dummy to play a second diamond. He had to give up the setting trick in diamonds.

You can call it defending passively, or locking declarer out of dummy. But East simply saw what South was trying to do with his heart plays, and took appropriate countermeasures.

# Tigers look for playoff spot

# Chap cyclone wrecks WTC

Thursday's loss sends Western Texas against New Mexico Military Institute in Roswell, N.M. next Monday with a 7-21 season record. The Westerners are 4-9 in the Western Junior College Athletic Conference. Tipoff will be at 8 p.m. (CST).

WJCAC scoring leader Darrell Nelson scored the first two points of Thursday's game but it was the only lead Western Texas enjoyed. Charles McCovery tied the game with a layup seconds later, and Billy Ray Smith put the Chaps on top with a free throw just one minute into the contest. Midland went on to outscore the hosts 22-6, until Nelson finally broke the pattern with a pair of baskets. A two-pointer from Chawn Cummings put Western back within 11, but that was as close as the Westerners could come. WTC struggled through a miserable shooting night, and Midland's height advantage played a factor on the boards. The Chaparrals enjoyed a 46-30 halftime edge.

Any doubts about the outcome were erased early in the second half. McCovery and Clifton Jones punched in the first two buckets of the half, giving the Chaps a 20-point lead with 19:24 still to play.

# Pressey elected to juco hall

Paul Pressey, an All-American on Western Texas College's 1980 national championship basketball team, has been named to the NJCAA Basketball Coaches Hall of Fame.

The NJCAA announced Pressey as one of six players and coaches named to the Hall, located in Hutchinson, Kan.

Pressey, now a key player for the NBA's Milwaukee Bucks, starred at Western Texas during the 1978-79 and 1979-80 seasons. The Westerners, under Coach Nolan Richardson, finished fourth in the NJCAA National Tournament in 1979, and won the tournament in 1980 with a 37-0 record.

Pressey was named the tournament's most valuable player, after leading Western Texas to come-from-behind victories in all four of the Westerners' games, including the championship - an 85-72 win over Jefferson State.

Pressey followed Richardson to Tulsa, where the Hurricane won the National Invitational Tournament in 1981, and reached the NCAA National Tournament in 1982.

As a junior college player, Pressey earned all-conference and all-region honors and was MVP of the 1980 Region V Tour-

namment. As a sophomore, the Richmond, Va. product scored 13.9 points on a team which averaged 11 scorers a game - four others of whom also averaged in double figures.

Called the "Rubber Band Man" by Coach Richardson, Pressey played only one year of high school basketball before coming to Western Texas. Despite that, he averaged eight rebounds and 5.2 assists, and finished the season with unofficial totals of 191 assists, 141 steals and 60 blocked shots. He shot a remarkable .668 from the field.

Also named to the Hall were Ralph Arietta, in his 21st year as coach at Westchester Community College in Valhalla; Harry Simmons, former coach at Pueblo Colorado Junior College who recorded 701 victories as a

two-year and four-year mentor; Boyd Grant, who played for Snow College in the 1954 national tournament and spent three years as head coach at College of Southern Idaho; George Killian, Executive Director of the NJCAA, a former basketball coach and athletic director at Erie County Technical Institute and a former NJCAA president; and Bob Burrow, an all-tournament choice at the 1953 and 1954 national tournaments for Lon Morris College. He was later an All-American at Kentucky and played for the NBA in two years.

# Candidates say they support energy policy

DALLAS (AP) — Five of the Democratic candidates for president began their push toward a Super Tuesday sweep of the South with promises in Dallas to pay more attention to Mexico's problems and the nation's dependence on foreign oil.

"We're involved in this fiasco in Nicaragua, we're obsessed with that nation ... and in the meantime, our relationship with

Mexico deteriorates," Massachusetts Gov. Michael Dukakis said at a debate Thursday night with four other contenders.

"If we would spend less time on Nicaragua and more with our neighbor, we'd be better off," Dukakis said.

Only Illinois Sen. Paul Simon did not attend, saying he wanted to concentrate on winning South

Dakota or Minnesota before turning toward the South and the March 8 Super Tuesday primaries.

Dukakis and the others, Missouri Rep. Dick Gephardt, Sen. Albert Gore of Tennessee, Gary Hart and Jesse Jackson, took turns criticizing the Reagan administration for its lack of a national energy policy and its handling of U.S.-Mexico rela-

tions. Jackson said the United States refers to Mexico as being back door and not next door, and "that's just dripping with contempt."

"We should be exporting grain, tractors, medicine, rail lines," Jackson said.

Texas shares 1,000 miles with Mexico, half of the 2,000-mile-long U.S.-Mexico border.

Moderator Andrew Young, mayor of Atlanta, said a collapse in Mexico would send millions north into the United States "because they want to eat. We can't sit here and do nothing."

Hart said he would help Mexico restructure its debts to the United States — stretching out the loans and lowering interest rates, strengthen trade relations and increase reliance on

hemispheric oil. But Hart said he would also let Mexico know the United States won't tolerate a quasi-democracy rife with corruption.

"We must encourage them to open that political process up," he said.

# 16-year-old arrested in ax murder of parents

ROCHESTER, Minn. (AP) — Authorities today arrested a 16-year-old boy in the ax murders of his parents, a brother and a sister, and prosecutors said they would seek to try him as an adult on murder charges.

"The boy has been captured

and they are interviewing him now," said a police dispatcher who refused to give his name. The boy, who had dyed his hair black and partially shaved his head before the bodies were found, was taken into custody at a phone booth at the main

Rochester Post Office, he said. Olmsted County Attorney Raymond Schmitz said at a news conference that "our intent is to file a petition charging him with four counts of first-degree murder. Then we'll petition to try him as an adult."

"The officers who took him into custody said he was quite nervous and frightened," Officer Bill Verdick said.

The bodies of Bernard Brom, 41, his wife, Paulette, about 40, and children Diane, 14, and Rick,

9, were found in their nightclothes Thursday evening at their home in suburban Cascade Township, said Olmsted County Sheriff Charles Von Wald.

The four were believed to have been slain early Thursday morning, the sheriff said. A bloody ax 2 to 3 feet long was found in the basement of the home in a quiet, well-to-do area just outside this southeastern Minnesota city of 60,000, he said.

Law enforcement officials talked with friends of the 16-year-old who had spoken with him Thursday, the sheriff said.

"He indicated he was having some trouble with his parents," Von Wald said. "One student said he was having trouble with his dad because of a tape he had bought and he didn't want him listening to it."

The boy was at Lourdes High School on Thursday morning. Friends at the Roman Catholic school said he had dyed his hair black, shaved the sides of his head and spiked the hair on the back of his head, the sheriff said.

The boy also bought a wig and makeup, Von Wald said.

The family van had been missing but was found late Thursday near Methodist Hospital in Rochester, Von Wald said. A car and another car's license plates were reported stolen from the vicinity of the school, he said.

The family's priest, the Rev. Syl Brown of the Pax Christi Roman Catholic Church, said Bernard Brom worked in a supervisory position for IBM in Rochester and Paulette Brom was a homemaker.

"There are no explanations to strange things, mysteries like this," Brown said. "It's an exemplary family. They were very active in every phase of the parish. There's no indication there was any difficulty in the family."

The priest said the 16-year-old attended church with his family every week.

Von Wald said friends and neighbors described the boy as

"a nice young man" who was a very good student.

"He babysat for one of the neighbors, and recently had shoveled the sidewalk for another neighbor," the sheriff said.

## Drug plane investigation continuing

He said the two men who are believed to have escaped from the plane after it landed five miles west of Gail late Monday night are probably back in Austin — their suspected hometown.

"We know who they are and probably where they are, but we're not prepared to pick them up at this point," Nestoroff said.

Regarding the Borden County connection, the agent said, "I don't know what is going to happen on that end," Nestoroff said, adding that he does not have sufficient cause to make any accusa-

tion against "the Beaver family."

The KingAir plane was confiscated west of Gail after it "dropped" more than 1,200 pounds of marijuana near Possum Kingdom Lake and two men who left, hauling it in a horse trailer, were arrested in Palo Pinto and Erath counties.

"This is a multistate investigation that has been in existence for some time," Nestoroff told the Associated Press Thursday.

He said that because the investigation is continuing, he cannot discuss details of the case,

but it does involve numerous defendants.

The investigation of the ring involves his agency; Drug Enforcement Agency offices in Austin, Lubbock and Dallas; sheriff's offices in Bandera and Borden counties; the Dallas Love Field Task Force; U.S. Customs Service in San Antonio and San Angelo; the Oklahoma Bureau of Narcotics; and other agencies.

After U.S. Customs Service agents followed the plane from Mexico, DPS narcotics agents arrested Gerald Blake Mackey of Cedar Creek and Gary M. Whit-

tington of Austin about 10 p.m. Monday. Both are being held on charges of aggravated possession of marijuana.

The plane's pilot and another man flew from Palo Pinto County to Borden County, where the aircraft landed on the isolated airstrip on the Beaver ranch.

Authorities believe the strip had been used in previous smuggling operations, Nestoroff said.

Ed Mazurek, resident-in-charge of the DEA's Lubbock District Office, said Beaver had told authorities he was unaware the airstrip had been used for illicit purposes.

## Sematech project...

# Solons push for full funding

DALLAS (AP) — Texas Sens. Lloyd Bentsen and Phil Gramm say they will press for full federal funding of the planned Austin-based Sematech project after President Reagan submitted a 1989 budget proposal with only partial support of the research project.

Sematech plans called for the semiconductor industry partners and the Defense Department to provide \$100 million each to help meet the project's annual budget. But the budget Reagan proposed includes only \$44.8 million for Sematech, said Bentsen, a Texas Democrat.

Bentsen wrote Defense Secretary Frank Carlucci seek-

ing an explanation for the proposed funding cuts. Gramm, a Texas Republican, said the government would meet its commitment to the semiconductor research project.

President Reagan sent Congress a \$1.09 trillion budget with his most restrained military request ever and requests for more spending on education, science and the fight against AIDS.

Two Texas defense contractors would also suffer major blows under that budget.

The Army plans to cancel its Aquila Remotely-Piloted Vehicle, an unmanned surveillance and targeting drone being developed by Lockheed Missiles & Space

Co. Division in Austin. And the Air Force wants to drop its effort to develop an anti-satellite weapon on which Dallas-based LTV Corp. is a major contractor.

The Army had planned to spend \$226 million in fiscal 1989 and \$1.096 billion over the life of the Aquila program. The ASAT program was to cost \$786 million this year and \$1.432 billion in the future.

In his letter to Carlucci, Bentsen asked the defense secretary what caused the his department

to lower its support for Sematech.

"Let me put you on notice that I intend to fight for full funding for this important project," Bentsen said in his letter to Carlucci.

"While I understand that you may be obliged to support the President's budget without change, I hope that you will not try to prevent restoration of the funds needed to keep this program on track and moving forward."
