Cutbacks on water directed tomorrow as 'tie-in' finished

At 11 p.m. Tuesday, the water supply from Lake J.B. Thomas is to be closed off, leaving the city dependent on its stored reserve of water at least through Wednesday.

The shutoff will allow the "tie-in" of a new rapid mix basin at the water treatment plant. If all goes as planned, water from the lake should be flowing again by sunrise Thursday.

Until that time, however, individuals served by Snyder water are asked to cutback on any non-essential water uses. This includes watering lawns or gardens and washing cars.

City officials will be "topping off" all water storage facilities here. during the day Tuesday. These equal an estimated 3.7 million

The work prompting the water curtailment is the installation of a new rapid mix basin at the water treatment plant. This is a small holding area where the chemicals used to treat the lake water can be mixed rapidly

City crews and staffers with Decker Construction Company of Abilene will be installing a 24-inch loop connecting the rapid mix basin into the 21-inch line bringing water from Lake Thomas.

McALLEN, Texas (AP) -There is no need to allow outside the United States to do seasonal farm work because there is no shortage of migrant farmworkers, witnesses have told a Texas House subcommit-

Witnesses say no need

a hearing room Monday to tell the Subcommittee on Labor and Employment Practices that Texas migrant workers are willing and able to travel to other states do the harvesting of farm

Testimony concerned revisisions in a federal program which over the past decade has allowed employers to hire temporary workers from foreign countries for seasonal farm work.

Simplifications in the program (formerly called the H2 and now known as the H2A program) under the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986 will cause many employers to consider hiring illegal aliens before even looking for workers in the United States, witnesses said.

State Rep. Lloyd Criss, subcommitee chairman, said one purpose of the hearing was to show the federal government that there are farm workers in Texas who are willing to travel to

"There's plenty of workers employers to hire workers from here and in the United States,' said Criss. "There's no sense in not giving them the opportunity to work. They don't need to open it up and bring workers in from Mexico.

Criss said he would like to see a Migrant workers crowded into referral system set up through the Texas Employment Commission that would give American workers' applications first consideration.

> A Lower Rio Grande Valley migrant worker told the subcommittee that employers like to hire illegal aliens because "they are easily intimidated and don't cause trouble.'

In reply, Mayor Troy Williamson said the development of the new contract began with Mathis' proposal that a section on rate regulation be deleted from the existing franchise.

Following a presentation by Austin cable TV consultant Jack Hopper on the 33-page proposed contract he wrote for the city, Mathis said the "whole situation, as far as we're concerned, has gone downhill from the word

Mathis said Landmark, although "we're not a low-budget company," does not have the accounting or engineering capability to meet all of Hopper's proposed conditions, which would entail certification of broadcast standards, frequent financial reports and other new standards.

Williamson said the council had not had a proposed document to work with until Hopper's presentation Monday night and that the document "is a skeleton, but a fat skeleton, I'll admit."

The mayor said the council wants to meet with Landmark next Monday night to go over the franchise point by point and, hopefully, come away with an agreement that night so that the transaction may be completed.

He said there was no need for a franchise that was updated to account for the rapid changes in the cable TV industry as long as SCAT continued to offer the service here because the operators were well-known local citizens who were always responsive to the customers.

But, he said, the council now feels a need to bring itself and the franchise contract up to date, although he said he has no doubt that Landmark "is a good com-

Tissue should be removed

By Peter H. Gott, M.D.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm 23 weeks pregnant. I have "moderate dysplasia arising in flat condyloma." Should I wait to have laser surgery until after the baby is born?

DEAR READER: Dysplasia means abnormal cells that appear, in your case, to be arising from warts in your reproductive tract. Your obstetrician is the best judge of whether you should have the tissue removed now or later. However, sooner or later, you should have it removed. The timing of the procedure is a highly individualized matter.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My husband sustained a blow to the inside of his knee. It is hard, swollen, about the size of a baseball and painful. He's had fluid removed five times in the last four months. The surgeon can give us no idea of how long this will continue.

Will he ever improve? DEAR READER: From the information you supply. I suspect that your husband has developed an annoying medical condition called traumatic bursitis. The blow to his knee irritated the joint covering, causing fluid buildup, commonly known as "water on the knee." This excess fluid results in a

swollen knee that can be uncomfortable.

Often, the fluid can be removed

with a needle and syringe; however, the improvement is sometimes only temporary, as the fluid may reaccumulate. Several "joint taps" may be necessary until the knee returns to

Obviously, your husband could be suffering from other causes of joint swelling, such as ligament or tendon injury from the blow he received. I suggest that you ask for a referral to an orthopedic surgeon, who will be able to more precisely define your husband's problem.
