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# Panamanians... **Soldiers** chase ambassador's car

PANAMA CITY, Panama (AP) - A Panamanian military vehicle with its siren blaring chased the car of U.S. Ambassador Arthur Davis for two miles in an incident the U.S. Embassy called "serious.

The Panamanian government claimed the chase began when one of its police officers spotted three cars of armed men follow ing the diplomat's vehicle.

The chase on Sunday brought an abrupt end to a calm Easter holiday and ushered in a week of uncertainty for Panamanians.

A Roman Catholic Church offer to mediate an end to the country's political crisis was set to expire at midnight tonight, while 1,300 American troops and military personnel are due to arrive on Tuesday.

Embassy spokesman Terence Kneebone said Davis was leaving the home of Vatican Ambassador Jose Sebastian Laboa when the Panamanian vehicle "began following immediately, picking them up right outside the gate." He said it tried to stop the chauffer-driven car with its lights and sirens.



# Dr. Gott

### By Peter H. Gott, M.D.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I went to a masseuse recently for muscle strain. She remarked that my rib cage on the right was considerably more pushed out than on the left. She recommended that I get a chest X-ray. What do you think

DEAR READER: None of us is symmetrical. The dominant side of our bodies is prominent; that is, right-handed people have better develop-ment of the right side of the body, lefthanded persons have a better-developed left side. Most women have one breast larger than the other. Our faces show asymmetry; also, one side of the rib cage is not a mirror image of the other.

In your case, the rib asymmetry may be normal; if you have not been ill or injured and if your breathing is normal, you can probably ignore the masseuse's observations. In the event that your rib cage deformity is truly noticeable or gives you symptoms, check with a doctor. I think that this approach is better than simply asking for a chest X-ray.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I read with interest the letter from the lady whose husband suffered, like mine, from alpha-1 antitrypsin deficiency. However, I think that you omitted a valuable resource. I'm an R.N. at the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda, Md. We investigate diseases, offer information and support, and can often suggest treatments for exotic and rare conditions that may not be avail-

able elsewhere. Please let your read-ers know about NIH. DEAR READER: The National In-

stitutes of Health are, indeed, a valuable resource for patients with exotic and rare diseases. The institutes also carry out valuable epidemiological studies and perform research into common illnesses, such as hyperten-sion and stroke. DEAR DR. GOTT: A woman wrote you about her grandson grinding his teeth in his sleep. Once I baby-sat for a child who did that. I checked, and he had worms. His mother got him medicine for the worms and there was no more grinding.

DEAR READER: Teeth-grinding at night can reflect physical disease as well as psychological discomfort. Al-though I am not aware of a relation to intestinal parasites, such a relation could theoretically exist. Teeth-grinding is certainly seen with other diseases, such as those causing chronic pain, that interfere with a normal restful sleep.





# Anti-trust awsuit is filed AMARILLO, Texas (AP) - Af-

filiated Foods Inc. contends in an antitrust lawsuit that a dairyindustry oligopoly exists in an area encompassing parts of New Mexico, Texas and Colorado.

Affiliated filed the suit last week against Borden Inc., Associated Milk Producers Inc., and Furr's Inc., alleging the firms conspired to keep milk industry competition out of Eastern New Mexico.

The suit seeks \$7.5 million in damages, an amount that may be amended as the plaintiff ascertains the exact amount of damage done. Damages are tripled in antitrust litigation.

Affiliated alleges that Borden, one of two major producers in the region, declined to sell it assets of the milk plant in Clovis, N.M., in favor of selling to AMPI, a company that markets products that do not directly compete with Borden

Affiliated charges that move was designed to protect Borden's market in the trade area.

The issue dates back to last summer, when Furr's began negotiating with Safeway Inc. to buy 60 grocery stores in the area, says the suit, which was filed Thursday.


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
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
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
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# Unwritten rules govern lawmakers dealings

AUSTIN (AP) — In the Texas staff. House of Representatives, a set "Fi of unwritten commandments fire me, or he would regret it," governs relationships between members.

Near the top of the "rules of the jungle," said a lawmaker who asked not to be identified, is: "Thou shalt not mess with another member's re-election."

But that commandment has been broken in several bitter and divisive 1988 campaigns for the state House and Senate.

A heated conversation between two members of the House recently caused a lawmaker's aide to resign, The Dallas Morning News reported.

Donna Poston, an aide to Rep. Keith Oakley, D-Terrell, initially had planned to take a temporary leave of absence to work on the state Senate race of Helen Farabee of Wichita Falls, who wants to succeed her husband, former Democratic Sen. Ray Farabee.

Rep. Charles Finnell, D-Holliday, also is campaigning for the Wichita Falls Senate seat.

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# **Palestinians mount general** strike; Arab said wounded

today to protest the visit of Secretary of State George P. Shultz, who was trying to persuade Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir to accept an international peace conference.

Streets in the towns of the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip were nearly deserted and shops shuttered after an underground PLO leaflet called for a strike and three days of protests to coincide with Shultz's visit.

Officials at a hospital in the West Bank town of Nablus said an 18-year-old Arab youth was wounded in the right thigh by army gunfire during a demonstration in the Balata refugee camp.

The army said a border policeman opened fire during the protest, wounding a young Arab in the leg, after being attacked with an axe. The camp was placed under curfew, confining its 12,000 residents to their homes indefinitely.

About 600 police were deployed in Jerusalem's Old Walled City to prevent clashes between Moslems and a militant Jewish group that tried to enter and pray in the Al Agsa mosque complex.

# Services, egg hunts mark Easter holiday

Easter sunrise ceremonies and church services drew multitudes of worshipers across Texas on the day considered the holiest day of the year for Christian denominations.

Egg hunts, family gatherings, an adoption conference and a wedding where the groom wore bunny ears and the bride wore a cottontail were some of the other events around the state for the religious holiday, which observes Christ's resurrection following his crucifixion.

An estimated 6,000 people attended a church service Sunday in Houston where scores of gay rights activists protested the exclusion of a musician with AIDS from the church orchestra.

In Movie Theaters

thriller begins promisingly as an English lit prof (Dennis Quaid) in Texas stumbles into a police station and gasps that he's been slipped a fatal dose of poison. The rest of the picture tells how Quaid got to this desperate point, and who got him there. The built-in black joke is that the prof - a once-successful, now heavy-drinking author who's lost his nerve and whose wife (Jane Kaczmarek) is leaving him - rediscovers his vitality and integrity only when it's too late, and he's about to die.

Viewers in the mood for a highstyle film noir will be encouraged by the presence of Quaid, a good down-to-earth actor who doesn't make a false move, and by the baroque cine-matography of Yuri Neyman (who shot the dazzling cult hit "Liquid Sky"). Meg Ryan, Quaid's co-star in "Innerspace," brings a fresh blend of cuddliness and spunk to the role of one of Quaid's students, whose adoration of her prof gats her more than she of her prof gets her more than she bargained for.

Rob Lowe may not be enough of an actor to make us see the contradic-tory sides of his character's nature, but the movie builds suspense without his help. Meg Tilly and John Glover contribute most of the acting — Tilly by imbuing her character with a pa-trician dreaminess, Glover by playing a stinker with bravura snideness. GRADE: ++ But the movie, over-directed by "Max Headroom"/music video cre-ators Rocky Morton and Annabel Jankel, disintegrates in an onslaught of poorly motivated violence, murky plot mechanics, laughably self-con-scious dialogue, and a terrible sup-porting performance by ghoulish-

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


