

Parties sign Afghan agreement in Geneva

GENEVA (AP) — The Soviet Union, the United States, the Marxist Afghan government and Pakistan signed an agreement today to withdraw an estimated 115,000 Soviet troops from Afghanistan.

The agreements were signed by Secretary of State George P. Shultz, Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze, Afghan Foreign Minister Abdul Wakil and acting Pakistani Foreign Minister Zain Noorani in a formal ceremony at the U. N. building in Geneva.

The agreements, which take effect May 15, commit Pakistan and Afghanistan not to support "directly or indirectly, rebellious or secessionist activities" directed against each other.

Pakistan represented Afghan guerrillas at the talks. The Moslem insurgents, who have been fighting the Soviet-backed government for 10 years, have said they will not sign the accord.

Shultz arrived in Geneva about two hours before the scheduled signing and praised the accord.

"Through their blood and sacrifice, the Afghans have earned the opportunity to resume their independence," Shultz said. "Let us help them realize it."

Shultz arrived about an hour before the ceremony, and was scheduled to meet with Shevardnadze afterward. The fourth summit of President Reagan and Soviet Communist Party General Secretary Mikhail S. Gorbachev begins May 29 in Moscow.

The United Nations estimates 1.5 million Afghans have been killed in the war, which began after an April 1978 Communist coup. More than 10,000 Soviets have died since they became involved 1½ years later, Western sources estimate.

The agreement, under which the Soviet pullout would begin in a month, was worked out over six years in U.N.-sponsored indirect talks between Afghanistan and Pakistan, which claimed to represent the U.S.-supplied rebels.

The guerrillas, however, have rejected the agreement and vow to continue fighting.

No Afghan resistance fighters were to be present at today's signing ceremony.

U.N. Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar was to preside. Eduard A. Shevardnadze, the Soviet foreign minister, and U.S. Secretary of State George P. Shultz were to sign for the superpowers.

Gorbachev told American business leaders in Moscow on Wednesday that the Afghan accord may have international implications on a par with the superpower treaty signed in December to ban medium-range nuclear missiles.

"We believe that the situation has changed for the better, that a window of hope has opened a little," he said in remarks carried by the state-run Tass news agency.

15-year sentence assessed

Jury deliberates case four hours

Jurors deliberated for about four hours Wednesday night before assessing aggravated kidnapping defendant John Randel "Randy" Locknane 15 years' imprisonment in the drug-related abduction of a Snyder man last Oct. 27.

After hearing final arguments in the punishment phase of the trial by District Attorney Ernie Armstrong and defense attorney James Clark, the 132nd District Court panel considered the case for about an hour before going to dinner, reconvened at 8:15 p.m. and came back with the sentence at 11 p.m.

The two previous defendants to be tried in the case, Larry Dan Beard and Grady Allen Davis, had both received 25-year sentences, the minimum they could have gotten with two prior felonies and had sought probation.

A number of character witnesses testified in his behalf Wednesday afternoon.

Beard was convicted in January and Davis was sentenced following a week-long trial here which began March 21.

The jury took just over two hours Tuesday night to find him guilty in the case, which involved the gunpoint kidnapping of 25-year-old Lafayette Griffin, who was held briefly to recover some \$60 said lost in a drug purchase "burn" involving relatives of Griffin's.

Griffin was released unharmed after two of his relatives paid the trio some \$54.

During his confinement, a gun was reportedly held on him.

Presiding at the trial was District Judge Gene Dulaney.

Attendance zones, 'gifted' program due trustee action

Two school district changes—one related to attendance boundary lines for North and Northeast Elementaries and the second to the gifted and talented instruction program here—are listed as action items Thursday at the regular April meeting of the Snyder school board.

The meeting will begin at 7 p.m. at the school administration building.

Regarding the boundary line change, the board first discussed it at a Feb. 29 meeting. It was

noted at the time the change would affect some 37 bus students now attending Northeast Elementary.

The change is contemplated next school year to offset a declining enrollment at North Elementary and the need for additional classroom space at Northeast to conform to 22-1 student-teacher ratios mandated by the state.

Three men indicted in car bombing

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — A man who had been trying to impress people that he had ties to the Mafia has been indicted along with two other men in connection with a car-bomb killing a week ago at a barbecue stand.

A federal grand jury in Dallas Wednesday indicted Steven Michael Gerkin, 26, and two other men in connection with the death of Giovanni Mancini Jr.

Two other men were identified as Steven Ray Turner, 20 of Ardmore, Okla., and Ralph Michael Lanfranca, 27, of Kansas City, Mo.

Gerkin, who was born in Waterloo, Iowa, has used several Italian aliases and used the surname of Gambino in the Fort Worth-Dallas area. Gambino is the name of a prominent New York family linked to organized crime.

But investigators say they are not certain if Gerkin has any Mafia ties.

"He apparently was at least trying to give that impression to people," Fort Worth police Sgt. Paul Kratz said.

The victim in the April 7 car-bombing also cultivated a gangster-like aura. Mancini often wore heavy gold jewelry, told many stories about himself and his alleged wealth and had a

flashy lifestyle, according to acquaintances and police.

On the day Mancini died, he greeted Gerkin with a kiss on the cheek when they met at the Truck Box Barbecue in northeast Fort Worth, witnesses told police.

Mancini told Gerkin that he loved him and that it was time to resolve a year-long feud, according to an arrest warrant affidavit. Police said the feud was the apparent motive in the bombing. They declined to comment on the cause of the feud, but said it was linked to some sort of business transactions.

Chris Nelson, assistant special

agent in charge of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms in Dallas, said Lanfranca uses the alias Joe Luca.

All three men are charged with conspiracy, punishable by up to five years in prison and a \$250,000 fine.

Gerkin and Lanfranca also are charged with destruction by explosion that resulted in the death of Mancini. That charge carries a maximum penalty of life in prison and a \$250,000 fine, Nelson said.

Mancini, 26, who had lived in North Texas about a year, died when a pipe bomb triggered by

remote control exploded in his rental car as he left the barbecue stand, police say.

He had told his girlfriend, Vicki Lynn McBride, that he was going there to meet Gerkin, according to an arrest warrant affidavit written by Fort Worth police Detective C.W. Riley.

"Mancini told Vicki McBride that Gambino (Gerkin) had just been released from a drug treatment program and that they were friends now and Gambino wanted to pay Mancini for the damage he (had) done to Mancini's car when he blew it up last year," the affidavit said.

Lithium can cause side effects

DEAR DR. GOTT I have been taking 1200 milligrams of lithium daily for 10 years. I don't feel suicidal any more, but have developed a goiter. The trembling in my hand is a nuisance as is my clumsiness. Are these conditions and my lack of concentration due to my age (59) or the lithium?

DEAR READER Lithium is a marvelous drug for certain hyperactive emotional states. However, it can be dangerous if the level of medicine in the body rises to toxic levels. Lithium toxicity produces irritability, lack of coordination and trembling, among other side effects. You should have periodic measurements of lithium blood levels. In this way, the dose of medicine can be altered, depending on your needs. You also should have blood tests for thyroid function, because, in the presence of goiter, you may have developed an overactive thyroid gland.

I doubt that your symptoms are due to your age, more likely, they are the result of the lithium or the thyroid gland. Ask your doctor to order the necessary tests.

DEAR DR. GOTT My daughter is 38 and married, with no children. She is considering a hysterectomy because she suffers excruciating pain for about four hours every month during her menstrual period. The last doctor suggested she take birth-control pills, which she refuses to do because she says they make her feel weird. What can you suggest?

DEAR READER A hysterectomy for four hours of monthly menstrual pain seems to me to be an inappropriately complicated and risky solution. I believe that your daughter should first try anti-prostaglandin medicine to relieve her symptoms. By reducing irritation and spasm, these drugs often help women through the difficult problem of excess menstrual cramps. Motrin is particularly useful for this purpose. I assume that your daughter has had a thorough gynecological exam to make sure that she has no treatable underlying disease, such as fibroids, that could add to her discomfort.

Birth-control pills would probably help her, because this medicine reduces the amount of tissue shedding that accompanies menstruation. Perhaps she could tolerate one of the newer, low-dose sequential formulas. In any case, I'd advise against hysterectomy and choose to follow her doctor's advice regarding medical management of the condition — saving surgery as a last resort.

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Physicist first to see atoms

HOUSTON (AP) — Peering through a homemade microscope, a Rice University physicist says he's glimpsed atoms contained in a single crystal of a superconductor discovered by University of Houston physicist Paul C.W. Chu.

Carl Rau says the microscopic view may enable him to prepare super-thin samples of the material, and etch them in microscopic detail, possibly bringing closer commercial production of such compounds.

Such fine etchings on a computer chip could help shrink computers dramatically and improve the guidance mechanism of a missile, Rau said Tuesday.

Rau, 47, believes his up-close look at the superconductor through a homemade scanning, tunneling microscope with equal properties by depositing thin layers of a superconductor onto flattened metals.

"The goal is, who comes first to room-temperature (superconductors.) I feel that if one has thin films, one has better chances," Rau said.

"With the microscope, you can see from the size of the atoms what is going on," he said. "I really favor single crystals. It's a lot of effort, and it takes a lot of manpower."

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Jury rules in favor of state in lawsuit over pet javelina

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — The owner of Bubba, a chocolate-loving javelina, says the civil trial over the creature's disappearance could have been avoided if game wardens had treated the animal more humanely.

A jury on Wednesday said Texas Parks and Wildlife supervisor Frank Kelso acted properly in ordering the seizure of Bubba, who was later released into the wild and has not been seen again.

Buddy and Patsy Thorne had sought \$500,000 in damages, claiming they sustained mental

anguish, loss of earnings, physical impairment and medical expenses after losing Bubba, a peccary, or piglike animal.

Wildlife regulations forbid individuals from taking an animal out of the wild. Thorne acknowledged he kept the animal after finding it abandoned during a hunting trip 11 years ago.

The state district court jury deliberated more than four hours before ruling in favor of the state.

The Thornes' attorney, Phil Westergren, said that since the suit was filed, game wardens keep a seized animal at a public pound for 10 days.

"If they had just done that with Bubba, we probably wouldn't have been through all this," Buddy Thorne said.

Kelso and other state officials welcomed the verdict and its ef-

fect on future wildlife cases.

"If we had lost, what would I go back and tell my men?" Kelso said.

Thorne said, "I'm disappointed. I just don't feel like the whole story was told to the jury."

During the week-long trial, Westergren argued that the entry into the house caused emotional problems for the Thornes, especially Patsy Thorne, who has undergone medical treatment.

Westergren argued that Kelso did not have permission to enter the house the day he seized Bubba.

Parks and Wildlife officials removed Bubba because they said he was a game animal being held illegally. Evidence in the trial included pictures of the javelina drinking beer and eating malted milk balls and ice cream.

Grass schedule slowed

Participants in the Conservation Reserve Program in Scurry and Borden Counties are busy seeding their croplands to permanent grass. The program was developed to take highly erodible croplands out of production for at least 10 years and plant these lands to a permanent grass adapted to the soils.
 The Upper Colorado Soil and Water Conservation District purchased a grass drill last year to help area producers put in their grass seed. James Wesson, district technician, said the grass

drill has been an asset to many producers, but the frequent use has caused some breakdowns of the drill and moved the scheduling somewhat behind.
 Wesson also stated that some of the producers scheduled for the drill in the late spring should probably try to find another avenue for getting their grass planted because of the delay in the schedule for the drill. Lynn Wauer, range conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service, said the deadline for grass seeding is June 1.

Opening the door to disaster

Declarer rose with the queen of spades in dummy because he wanted to be in that hand to lead a club. When the club finesse worked, he led a diamond up to dummy's king, on the theory that the club king and diamond ace shouldn't be in the same hand. He took another club finesse and then cashed his ace in the hope that the suit would split. When clubs did not divide, he gave up a club in the hope that somehow he would get back in to cash the long club. But the cruel opponents had other ideas. West had thrown two spades away on the third and fourth round of clubs. Now the defense took five hearts as West threw away his remaining two spades and then won the last two tricks with the A-J of diamonds. The hapless declarer even had to eat his ace of spades.
 Declarer does better if he plays the queen of diamonds from his hand at the third trick. It will not be so easy for West to win the ace and attack hearts, and declarer may get an indication that diamonds are well situated. And if West postpones taking the diamond ace until the third round of the suit, South can scamper home with two tricks in spades, two in diamonds and three in clubs.

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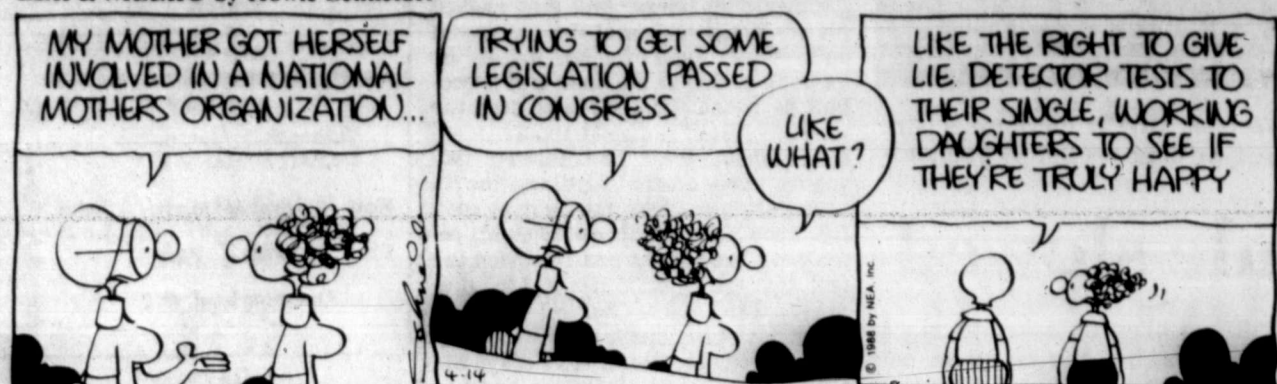

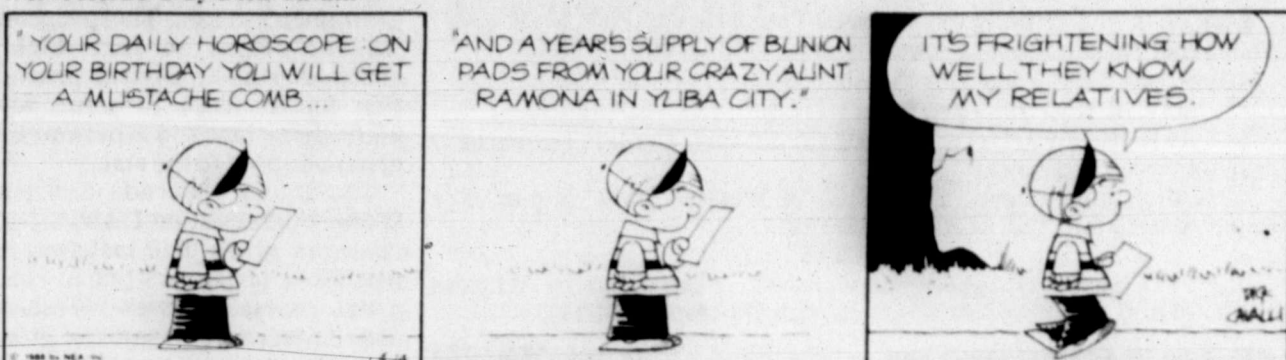

ected parents have been contacted by the district to make them aware of the proposal.

In addition Thursday, the board will consider changes in the way the district's gifted and talented program is offered next school year. This concept was first discussed at a March 31 meeting of the board.

Administrators have proposed combining fifth and sixth grade G&T classes to a single elementary campus next year—West Elementary.

Currently, these students attend classes at their regular neighborhood campus but are bused for enhanced G&T instruction to West Elementary one day each week.

The change will also produce an overall shrinkage in the number of students identified for G&T instruction. This would occur since currently each campus has an allocated number of students.

Under the proposed plan, the G&T students would be chosen districtwide. This would total approximately 50 students, 25 from the fifth grade and 25 from the sixth grade. Currently, some 85 students are enrolled as G&T students.

Also at Thursday's meeting, the board plans to recognize Snyder High School basketball coach Larry Scott, whose team advanced to the regional semifinals this season.

Other agenda items listed include:

—Consideration of a request for use of the high school practice gym for a summer basketball camp.

—Consideration of bids for an asbestos compliance package, an item tabled from the board's March 31 meeting.

Comments surface about investigation

WASHINGTON (AP) — Transportation Secretary Jim Burnley said today the federal investigation of Texas Air Corp. and its subsidiary Eastern Airlines should be considered a "shot across the bow" of any airline that might compromise safety due to financial pressures. Meanwhile, an Eastern official blamed the investigation announced Wednesday on pressure from unions.

Burnley also said that air travelers should be greatly reassured by a planned month-long safety probe of Eastern's fleet, saying it could bring "the safest 30 days in the history of that airline or almost any airline in U.S. history."

Burnley, interviewed on NBC-TV's "Today" show, said he would not hesitate to fly Eastern despite the investigation and a proposed \$23,000 fine he announced on Wednesday.

Burnley said Federal Aviation Administration officials have not been satisfied with Eastern's performance since it was taken over by Texas Air 14 months ago. "They've made a lot of progress on the safety side, on the maintenance side, but we don't know that they're quite where we want them to be," he said.

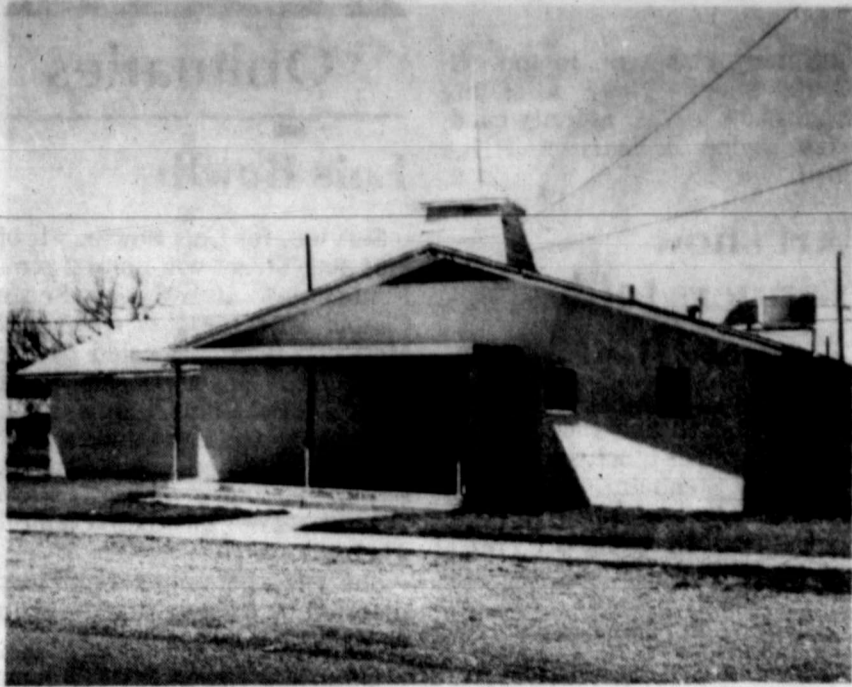

DALLAS (AP) — A day after the police chief quit, troubles continued at the beleaguered police department with an assistant police chief placed on administrative leave pending an investigation of job brokering for off-duty officers.

Acting Police Chief Louie Caudell put Assistant Police Chief Charles R. Busby on leave Wednesday "pending the resolution of legal issues relating to how he has arranged for the service of off-duty officers to work off-duty jobs," police spokesman Ed Spencer said.

Tuesday, Police Chief Billy Prince announced he was retiring as head of the department, following controversy over police shootings of minorities, the deaths of three officers this year and a struggle with City Council members over police accountability.

The Texas Board of Private Investigators and Private Security Agencies told police officials Wednesday that Busby may have been operating a private security business without a license by arranging the off-duty jobs for which he charges a fee.

Busby has operated the com-

pany, which uses off-duty officers as security guards, since 1985. He has said that while he schedules officers for off-duty jobs, he does not employ them and therefore his firm is exempt from state licensing law.

Busby has said he has done nothing wrong by charging an administrative fee for coordinating the off-duty jobs. He said he coordinated the security jobs on his own time.

The Dallas Morning News reported earlier that Busby controlled access to most off-duty jobs at the Dallas Convention Center and Reunion Arena for more than 15 years.

Busby's superiors said they gave him a monopoly in 1985 over

scheduling officers who would escort houses being moved through the city. But last month, police officials allowed other officers to compete for scheduling duties last month after receiving a legal opinion from the city attorney that called Busby's monopoly a "poor practice."

A preliminary verbal opinion by the city attorney's office says that Busby was not in violation of state law, Caudell told his officers. Caudell also said he does not believe Busby violated department policy.

Assistant Chief John Driscoll, who talked to the state investigator Wednesday, said, "The thing was, they felt like he was running a guard service

which should have been licensed and since it wasn't, it was a violation."

Driscoll said the investigator told him the state agency would refer its findings to the Texas attorney general's office next week. Depending on the attorney general's opinion, the case may be referred to a Dallas County grand jury, he said.

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Ex-bank officers are convicted

ABILENE, Texas (AP) — A federal jury has convicted two former bank officers on 36 counts accusing them of embezzling \$1.3 million from Abilene National Bank through a scheme involving the sale of bank stock.

Convicted Wednesday were Don Earney and James Kington after the jury of nine men and three women deliberated more than 14 hours over two days.

Earney, former chairman of the bank, and Kington, a former vice president, were convicted on several counts each of embezzling money from stock purchase loan transactions, falsifying bank records to hide the true reasons for the loans, causing federally required cash transaction reports not to be filed and aiding and abetting criminal activity.

Maximum sentence for the former bankers would be five years in prison and a fine of \$250,000 on each count.

U.S. District Judge Jerry Buchmeyer of Dallas will sentence the men on May 27 after a pre-sentencing report is submitted.

Earney, 53, appeared stunned as Buchmeyer read each of the 36 individual guilty verdicts. His wife, Debbie Earney, lowered her head and began to cry as it became apparent that her husband would not be acquitted on any of the charges he faced.

Neither Kington nor his wife displayed any emotion as the verdicts were announced.

Evidence presented at the six-day trial showed that Kington approached bank customers and offered to arrange a stock sale. Kington also agreed to arrange a loan to allow each customer to pay for the stock without a down payment.

Earney approved the loans and Kington deposited the proceeds into the customers' accounts.

Kington then arranged for a withdrawal to be made from the account for the full amount of the loan, which was for more than the price of the stock.


Kington and Earney would then pocket the difference between the stock price and the loan amount, the government alleged.

Evidence also showed that the

men falsified loan documents to indicate that the loans were to be used for purposes other than stock purchases.

The cash transaction report charges alleged that the men did not report the transactions, which were more than \$10,000, as required by federal law.

Co-defense attorney Ben Krage of Dallas said the men will likely appeal the convictions.
