The Snyder Independent School related to asbestos. District will now join with 63 other districts throughout Texas in a lawsuit against a manufacturer of asbestos products in an attempt to regain some of the expenses already incurred and expected to be incurred by Snyder ISD in relation to asbestos "encapsulation" and "abatement."

Wednesday, the school board voted unanimously to enter into the class action suit being filed against National Gypsum, one of three major manufacturers of asbestos in the U.S.

With that motion, the board voted also to designate attorney Dan Cotton as their local legal counsel related to the lawsuit.

Assuming the district eventually realizes some portion of a settlement or monetary award from the lawsuit, Cotton told trustees Wednesday it will likely be "only

The law firms bringing the suit are both Houston-based, Bracewell and Patterson and the attorney's office of Martin W. Dies III. The board used a telephone linkup Wednesday to talk with firm representative Bob

It was noted during discussion that the Houston firms have already represented Texas school districts in successful litigation challenging another of Colorado City, Kathy Hall of major asbestos manufacturer, W.R. Grace.

The feller on Deep Creek says, "Swelled heads are nature's way of filling a vacuum."

There's trouble in Paradise Valley. The big flap is over speeding tickets, and whether a "robot" has the constitutional authority to issue a speeding citation.

Paradise Valley is a conservative Arizona community made up of what most would describe God-fearing, law-abiding citizens. They do, however, have a heavy foot-like a lot of Godfearing, law-abiding citizens.

City fathers in this community of 14,000 decided to be the first to employ a Swiss-made robot to nab and photograph speeders. So far, some 3,000 tickets have been issued by mail.

The robot has long been in use in Europe. The device marries radar and photography. A signal is aimed at oncoming traffic. When a speeder is detected, it trips a camera shutter and stroboscoptic light. The vehicle's owner is identified by tracing the license number, and a sum-

mons is mailed. The system has aroused loud protests that it is a "big brother" abuse of authority. The legality is untested except in the city's traffic court.

Already, more than 50 motorists have scheduled trials to contest the robot's constitutionality. City fathers are convinced higher courts will find

The system's use involves a considerable amount of private enterprise. Local officers monitor its use, but a Texas company owns technology rights in the U.S. and that company provides the equipment mounted in the rear of a Ford Bronco without charge to the city.

The company processes the photographs, identifies vehicle owners and mails the citation. In exchange, it keeps \$20 out of each ticket that a motorist pays.

WASHINGTON (AP) The judge in the Iran-Contra case is threatening to dismiss charges against Oliver North and three other defendants unless the Reagan administration stops withholding key documents.

"A stone wall is being built up between this court and the trial," U.S. District Judge Gerhard A. Gesell said Wednesday



There are many inferior contracts waiting to be arrived at in bridge. When you have the good fortune of getting to a sound contract, don't jeopardize it by being cute

When South opened two no-trump, North decided that he would probably play five clubs, but along the way he thought he might check to see if South might have four spades. So he bid three clubs to ask for a major. Lo and behold, South bid spades and North bid the spade game.

With the lead of the queen of diamonds, declarer could see there would be no trouble unless spades split 5-0. but he wondered if he could not do something clever if East held four spades to the Q-J. He won the ace of diamonds, played ace of spades and then a low spade. His thinking was that he could handle four spades in the East hand (ruff a heart in dummy, pick up East's spades via a finesse and then run the clubs). His blind spot was that he failed to realize the trap if West, not East, had length in spades. Sure enough, West won the second spade, cashed the jack of diamonds







When she is 8 or 9, ou can re-evaluate the situation

In summary, most children under age 12 do not need tonsillectomies. Antibiotics will cover all but the most unusual situations associated with tonsil problems. If in doubt about surgery, ask for a consultation with an ear, nose and throat specialist.







"If I'd just lost a no-hitter and won the game, I wouldn't have been as disappointed. I let the lead get away and I was one out away from winning the ballgame a complete ballgame," said Ryan, who struck out nine.

Arab guerrillas, Prime Minister Minister Yitzhak Shamir said on Wednesday that guerrillas were trying to mount a spectacular attack on Israel because the uprising was "petering out."

Today, however, east Jerusalem streets were deserted in response to a strike call by uprising leaders. Even fruit and vegetable vendors, normally active during strikes, had closed.

In the Gaza Strip, young Palestinians whose faces were masked with checkered Arab scarves stopped cars to ensure workers did not go to jobs in Israel, according to Arab

Wrecked cars and huge rocks blocked roadways in the West Bank town of Bethlehem and oil was spread on some streets to discourage drivers. Bethlehem's Manger Square, normally busy with traffic and vendors, was nearly empty

An Arab reporter noted that even bakeries were shut in Nablus, the West Bank's largest

In Baghdad, senior aides of Yasser Arafat on Wednesday said the Palestine Liberation Organization chairman traveled to the Iraqi capital to meet with his commanders "to discuss ways of escalating the Palestinian uprising.

Only scattered clashes were reported in recent days in the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip, where 174 Arabs and two Israelis have been killed since anti-Israeli protests began Dec.

The incident began when youths stoned a group of Jewish women walking through downtown Hebron at 11 p.m., said Miriam Levinger, who was in the group.

"We were a group of about 15 women on a stroll when Arabs began throwing stones at us,' Mrs. Levinger said. "The army came immediately and fired tear gas at the Arabs who disappeared into an alley.

Earlier, the army said, Arabs in the Dheishe refugee camp near Bethlehem stoned troops who responded with tear gas and rubber bullets. A military spokeswoman said

seven Palestinians were taken to the hospital, treated and released. Israel Television said some suffered rubber bullet wounds and others fractures from beatings.

Both guerrilla infiltrations this week were near Mount Dov in the Golan Heights, on Israel's northeastern border. In Tuesday's clash, three guerrillas and two Israeli soldiers were killed in a fierce gun battle.

The two guerrillas killed on Wednesday planned to take hostages to exchange them for Arab prisoners held in Israel, using U.S. Ambassador Thomas Pickering as a negotiator, said a military source, citing documents found on their bodies.

Negotiation at the Lenin mills broke off after nearly three hours on Wednesday evening, and another round held early today lasted just 15 minutes, strike committee members said.






