# Senate tries to ratify plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate is racing the clock in a bid to ratify the U.S.-Soviet medium-range missile treaty in the dozen days remaining before President Reagan meets with Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev in Moscow.

The last obstacles to beginning floor debate were swept away Monanding a process of intense scrutiny that began soon after the treaty was signed in early December.

Three Senate committees told Senate majority leader Robert C Byrd, D-W.Va., that last week's agreement in Geneva between Secretary of State George P. Shultz and Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze satisfactorily resolved disputes about how to implement the treaty's on-site inspection provisions.

Byrd then announced he would call up the treaty for debate sometime today.

The Intermediate-range Nuclear Forces or INF treaty, signed at the White House on Dec. 8 by Reagan and Gorbachev, would require the elimination of all, U.S. and Soviet missiles with a range of between 300 miles and 3,400 miles.

The decision to begin Senate floor action on the pact followed testimony in which Shultz said that in the Geneva talks, "we got

Shultz said that included both the on-site inspection and a Soviet agreement that medium-range weapons using such futuristic technology as particle beam generators are banned by the treaty.

Both issues had delayed consideration of the treaty on the Senate floor with Byrd vowing not to schedule action until they were resolv-


# New mayor closes municipal court

PATTON VILLAGE, Texas (AP) - The new mayor of this East Texas town has closed down the Municipal Court, laid off its staff and proposed amnesty for all who have received traffic tickets from Patton Village

police. Mayor Robert Devaney, 66, who took office in this Montgomery County town last Friday, said he took the action Monday because the town is a "parasite" that leeches off

motorists on U.S. 59. "It's a parasitical situation. We're mooching off citizens of East Texas by writing up citations and abusing people, according to reports I've heard,' Devaney, an accountant, said Monday: "It's my intent and desire to remit all these fines, wipe them out and dismiss them.'

He said the next action might be to vote to disincorporate the



Devaney said he acted on his own, but the five members of City Council will vote on the action today. He said he expects support from three new council members proposing a stream-lined police force and court system.

Patton Village Police Chief Alan E. Hall and some ousted employees have questioned Devaney's authority.

"He's going to shut down court, padlock the doors and open up this whole town to lawsuits. He's opening up Pandora's Box and desn't even have the sense to realize it," said Hall

"I was told he'll be liabling this city to false arrest charges if you just start returning tickets," Hall said. "It don't take an Einstein to figure it out from a liability standpoint."

"The man is a stone-cold idiot," Hall said.

Elna Christopher, spokeswoman for the Texas attorney general's office, said Monday there is no state ruling indicating whether a mayor has jurisdiction to close down court and grant amnesty on traffic ticket fines

#### Following a false trail

By James Jacoby

North tried out a new gadget today cue-bidding the opponents' suit as a passed hand to demand that partner hid his better major. Poor South respended in no-trump and then finally realized partner must have length in both majors. So they got to four

North should have bid two spades over two clubs. If he could bid hearts later, fine. But he should not insist on game in a major when partner might not have a fit or even have a decent

As to the play, did West pull a wrong eard? After the club king, West continged with the diamond king, ducked by declarer. A second diamond was played. Declarer took the ace and played the heart ace, intending to play another. But on the ace of hearts West played the king. Can South be blamed for believing that East was left with J: 9.77 Declarer now hoped that East started with four spades as well. So he ruffed a club, returned to his hand with the spade king and ruffed a diamond. If he could now play A:Q and ruff a spade, he could exit with either remaining minor eard and simply discard a spade from dummy. East would have no choice but to ruff and lead back into dummy's Q-10 of hearts. Of course West ruffed the second spade with the heart nine, and his partner took the setting trick with the trump jack. If West plays low on the ace of hearts, declarer will play another heart, and the king will come up. Declarer will then make the contract by ruffing one spade before drawing the third round of hearts

Reagan, who has warned Israel and Jordan against rejecting the peace plan, is expected to stress his view that the U.S. blueprint is the only solution to the fivemonth rebellion in which 180 Palestinians have been killed by Israeli troops.

But neither side held out much hope that Reagan would be able to budge the plan initiated earlier this year by Secretary of State George Shultz.

"There are several new ideas, but they're minor and we don't expect great progress," said a senior Israeli official, who spoke on condition of anonymity. He declined to discuss the ideas, saying they were not meaningful in the short run "but incremental in

the big plan." Peres explored these ideas with Shultz at a meeting Monday and was to continue discussions with him at two sessions today. Shultz will bring Peres' ideas to Jordan and Egypt when he visits the region on his fourth peace shuttle of the year starting June

Peres supports the Shultz plan, which calls for Arab-Israeli peace talks to be held under the auspices of the five permanent members of the U.N. Security Council - the United States, Soviet Union, China, England and France.

But his rival in Israel's fractious governing coalition, Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir, has rejected the formula out of concern that the five powers would pressure Israel into relinquishing lands it captured from the Arabs in the 1967 Mideast war

General elections scheduled in Israel for November are expected to serve as a referendum on the plan.

Underscoring support for his stand, leading administration officials attended a luncheon in Peres' honor hosted by Israeli Ambassador Moshe Arad. The guest list included Shultz - who toasted Peres' "creativity" in searching for peace formulas as well as Defense Secretary Frank Carlucci, White House chief of staff Howard Baker and

Senate leaders. Peres aides say he is counting on this show of support for his

election campaign. But at a speech Monday night to some 2,000 pro-Israel supporters, Peres sought to underscore the unity in his country rather than the divisiveness, saying Israelis are united in their rejection of a Palestinian state.

"We shall not support a Palestinian state equipped with Russian weapons and Russian advisers," he told the annual conference of the American Israel Public Affairs Committee, the major pro-Israel lobbying group in the United States. Peres said the "best solution"

Palestinian selfdetermination is within a confederation with Jordan, which already has a Palestinian majori-

## Pope John Paul II meets with clergy in Paraguay

ASUNCION, Paraguay (AP) Pope John Paul II, in one of his sternest lectures to a head of state, told President Alfredo Stroessner that the granting of human rights "is not a question of political convenience." In an address Monday night to

Stroessner, top government aides and foreign diplomats at the presidential palace, the pope said "respect for human rights stems from the dignity of the person by virtue of his condition as a creature of God."

Stroessner, 75, has ruled Paraguay since a coup in 1954.

The pope also defended the church's role in social causes, saying, "You can't corner the church in its temples."

Today, the pope met for an hour with 1,000 priests, nuns and seminarians, then left by car for a Mass with peasant farmers in Villarrica, a regional agricultural center of 50,000 people 100 miles southeast of the capital.

In his meeting in the National Cathedral, the pontiff told the clergy they must give preference in their ministries to the poor "who in Paraguay, as in so many parts of Latin America, suffer every kind of privation."

# Protests mark AIDS hearing

WASHINGTON (AP) = A Civil Highls Commission hearing on AIDs turned surreal when gave protesters in clown masks him med "America the Beautifut," shouted insults at witnesses and commissioners and held up wristwatches to denote that "time is running out" for AIDs victims.

At one point, the 65 gay protesters in clown masks turned their backs on the proceedings to show their disdain for the commission and its efforts.

"This is a waste of time," said Duncan Osporne, one of the protesters. Osporne said the money would be better spent testing new drugs or educating beoble on now to ayona getting atths. The commission proposed its hearings, part of a larger study, in a memo that discussed state sodomy laws in the same footnote as Biblical denunctations of homosexuality.

Osborne and others said the commission could play a legitimate role investigating

legitimate role investigating employment, housing, health

care and insurance discrimina-tion against AIDS victims. But they said the panel has no business reopening debate on now AIDS is transmitted or hear-ing inflammatory testimony from witnesses who are not medical or public health experts. Jim Johnson, executive direc-tor of a religious hospice in Long Beach, Calif., called Beyond Re-lection, said homosexual ac-tivists had bombed his hospice and infreatened him because he had left behind "the narcissism and contempt of my earlier life"

and contempt of my earlier life as a homosexual.

Jeffrey Levi, executive director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, hoted the prevailing medical belief that a homosexual orientation cannot be changed.

"If I had to make the choice between dying in the street and dying in his hospice, I'd choose dying in the street," Levi said.

Dr. David Pence, a University of Minnesota radiologist, Vietnam war protester and civil rights worker, alleged that gay pressure groups have thwarted public health efforts to stop the spread of AIDS.

"Twenty-live years ago it was southern bulles in leans that we had to light. Now it's Northern smoothies in ties," Pence said.

An outraged Levi demanded a retraction and an apology.

"He has just likened us... to the Ku Klux Klan," Levi said. "That is so deeply offensive that I question whether I can continue to sit at the same table with him."

He said gay people oppose reporting techniques which identify victims by name because they fear discrimination of all types, even prosecution for violating and my laws. It anyons.

types, even prosecution for violating sodomy laws, if anyone finds out they are victims or ear-riers of AIDS.






