

# **Dallas pathologist seeks** to keep from testifying

DALLAS (AP) - Dallas psychologist Lucy Papillon says she does not want to testify about her relationship with former Methodist minister Walker Railey because the publicity would damage her reputation.

would damage her reputation. A hearing was scheduled today on a request by Ms. Papillon that she not be required to give a deposition in a suit filed by the parents of Railey's comatose wife, Margaret "Peggy" Railey. The former minister's wife has

been comatose since April 1987 when she was nearly choked to death in the garage of her north Dallas home.

A default judgement last month resulted in a ruling that Railey, former minister of the First United Methodist Church of Dallas, was responsible for the attack on his wife. Railey, who now lives in California and has surrendered his credentials as a minister, declined to fight the civil suit.

The suit was then by mine an Nicolai, Mrs. Railey's mother. A jury trial is set for Oct. 3 to determine how much money in punitive and actual damages should be awarded to Mrs. Railey's mother.

Judge John Whittington will consider Ms. Papillon's motion at a hearing today.

The psychologist had been subpoenaed to appear for depositions, at which she would testify and produce any documents relating to Railey.

Ms. Papillon said in a motion filed Tuesday that because the issue of liability already has been resolved, Nicolai's attorney could use her testimony to support a new argument for damages, meaning the deposition would be no more than a "fishing expedition.'

## Scheme thwarted

CHICAGO (AP) - Officials at the nation's 10th-largest bank say they foiled one of the biggest "almost crimes" ever, an employee's attempt to embezzle \$70 million through a series of computerized cash transfers.

First National Bank of Chicago announced Tuesday that the employee, whose name was not released, tried to steal the money through a sophisticated wire transfer scheme involving banks in New York and Chicago.

The Chicago Tribune and the Chicago Sun-Times, quoting unidentified sources, reported today the money ultimately was to be channeled to Vienna, Austria, where the worker had set up accounts. The newspapers said the suspect had worked at the bank six to eight years but was not a high-ranking official.

No loss is expected to the bank or its customers, the bank said.

The worker has been identified, but may not have acted alone, said bank spokesman Tony Zehnder. He refused to give details, saying the investigation had been turned over to the FBI. He would not say how the bank learned of the scheme.

FBI spokesman Jim Kuntzelman said his agency was studying the possibility that up to seven people were involved in the scheme, which affected the accounts of the New York-based financial firm Merrill Lynch & Co., Chicago-based United Airlines and Louisville, Ky .based Brown-Forman Corp., the wine and spirits company.



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

## Fiberglass poses hazards

DEAR DR. GOTT: A friend sent me a copy of your column in which you said you were not familiar with studies linking the ingestion of fiberglass particles to disease. As the chairman of Victims of Fiberglass (11143 Lakeshore North, Lake of the Pines, Auburn, CA 95603), I wish to dispute your conclusion. We have numerous studies from the World Health Organization, Occupational Safety and Health Administration, U.S. Department of Labor and other reputable sources which indicate that respirable fiberglass particles are indeed more dangerous than asbestos. DEAR READER: Thank you for

writing. The ingestion of fiberglass has yet to receive the attention given to the inhalation of asbestos. Inhaled fiberglass can, indeed, lead to health problems, including chronic lung disthe ingestion (i.e., eating and swallowing) of fiberglass produces ailments of the magnitude experienced by workers who inhale the particles.

DEAR DR. GOTT. Do antidepressants have any side effects? I've been taking them and have not been able to think clearly, have mood swings and can't concentrate. Is this normal?

DEAR READER: Antidepressants are powerful medicines and, as such, have many side effects and complications. In large part, the side effects depend on the particular drug. The most common side effects of most antidepressants include anxiety, restlessness, confusion, difficulty think ing, sedation, dry mouth, constipation, low blood pressure, electrical irregularities of the heart, numbness of the extremities, seizures and abdominal pains. The list goes on and is quite long This is why antidepressants should be administered only by physicians who are familiar with their use and are willing to monitor their patients for toxicity





HUNTSVILLE, Texas (AP) - The Texas prison system is close to its 95 percent legal limit of capacity, although officials say a closure isn't likely in the next few days

'As far as releases versus admissions, it looks fairly good for the week," said David Nunnelee, spokesman for the Texas Department of Corrections. "As far as next week goes, we have to wait and see.

As of midnight Monday, when the official population tally was taken, the 26-unit state prison system was at 94.82 percent of capacity, 72 beds below the 95 percent level at which the prison would have to refuse new admissions

The count was an improvement over Sunday, when the prison system had only 26 beds to spare, said David Nunnelee, Texas Department of Corrections spokesman. Nunnelee said 148 inmates were released Tuesday.

Barbara Slaughter, spokeswoman for the Texas State Board of Pardons and Paroles, said that if the population exceeds the limit, Gov. Bill Clements could allow more good time credits under the Texas Prison Management Act.

"We've been told every day they're going to hit it," Ms. Slaughter said referring to the 95 percent capacity. "We're doing everything we can from here."

Officials also said the parole eligibility data must be recalculated for more than 8,000 convicts whose good time was stepped up last week by court order. That was expected to take several days.

Prison officials had to halt admissions 23 times last year as its population exceeded the capacity limit, imposed by state law and federal court order, Nunnelee said.

The 26-unit Texas prison system, the nation's third largest behind California and New York, has managed to stay open all year primarily because it has been limiting admissions to roughly 150 inmates a day while about the same numbers are be-ing released on a day-to-day bases.


