Business manager for school district accepts new post

Nick Williams, assistant superintendent for business for Snyder ISD, has accepted a post to head the Hockley County Appraisal District based in Levelland. He will report to his new assignment effective June 16 and his resignation from his local post is expected to be considered Thursday by the Snyder school board.

Brady resigns

AUSTIN (AP) — State appeals court Justice Jim Brady, who was reprimanded earlier this year by the State Commission on Judicial Conduct, has resigned his seat on the Austin-based 3rd Court of Appeals. The resignation is effective Aug. 31. Brady, 63, was defeated in the March 8 Democratic primary by Woodie Jones, an Austin lawyer, who is unopposed in the November general election. Brady said in his resignation letter to Gov. Bill Clements that he is quitting "to pursue private practice of law and support urgently needed improvements to the condition of our Texas judicial system." Brady's term expires at the end of the year. The six-member appeals court hears cases from 24 Central Texas counties.

Won't testify

NEW YORK (AP) — A black woman who has refused to testify about her daughter's alleged abduction and rape by six whites took sanctuary in a church this morning to avoid arrest for contempt for court, an adviser said. Glenda Brawley, her two attorneys and two bodyguards entered the Ebenezer Baptist Church in Queens about 6 a.m., according to the Rev. Al Sharpton. In taking sanctuary, Mrs. Brawley was seeking "relief from a higher authority," one of her lawyers, Alton Maddox Jr., said Tuesday. Authorities issued a statewide warrant for Mrs. Brawley, saying she was "fair game" for arrest.

Judge rules

HOUSTON (AP) — An 11-year-old boy had no right to lead police to a cache of marijuana hidden in his mother's bedroom, a judge ruled in approving her motion to suppress the evidence. Without the marijuana evidence, the state has no case, prosecutor Denise Palmer said. Harris County Criminal Court at Law Judge Mark Atkinson said James Beszborn Jr. did not have his mother's permission to enter her bedroom when he found about a half ounce of marijuana inside a box in her bedside table April 4. The child reported the find to his father, who has divorced his wife and remarried. Beszborn and his 10-year-old sister, who want to live with their father, admitted police into the home of their mother, Diana Maria Daleo, after the father told officers of the discovery.

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Bush, Dukakis celebrate victories

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Republican George Bush and Democrat Michael Dukakis today celebrated victorious conclusions to the long primary season, with Dukakis declaring, "The marathon is over and now the race to the finish line begins."

choice. "I feel terrific. Here I am as the Democratic nominee," Dukakis exulted in an interview broadcast today on CBS-TV. His only remaining opponent, Jesse Jackson, declared in separate interviews broadcast today that he would continue the nomination fight all the way to the convention in Atlanta. But Jackson, implicitly conceding the

fight was really over, renewed his contention that he had earned a Dukakis offer of the vice presidential spot. "I've earned an option to accept it or turn it down," he said on CBS in an interview taped late Tuesday night. Dukakis, making no promises, said on ABC-TV, "He's due consideration and there are other people who deserve consideration as well."

"The race to the finish line begins," proclaimed a jubilant Dukakis after returns from a four-state primary sweep guaranteed him a delegate majority. He won races in California, New Jersey, Montana and New Mexico. "Now we'll be going into the major-league ballgame and I am ready on the issues," declared Bush, who locked up the GOP

nomination more than a month ago and cruised to uncontested wins in the states voting Tuesday. Jackson congratulated Dukakis for a "fine campaign," but also vowed to "keep our campaign alive." He said he would continue urging uncommitted delegates to support him at the convention.

Democrats favor county chair for 78th House race

A Democratic candidate for this area's 78th District House seat—admittedly an "unofficial" one—was selected Tuesday by the 12 county party chairmen for the district. Chosen by a vote of 6-4 was David Counts, 51, himself one of the county chairmen gathered to name a candidate to oppose Republican hopeful and former Snyder Mayor Rod Waller. Only 10 votes of the 12 were cast since Counts did not vote and one party chairman was absent from the meeting, held at an Asperment restaurant. Among the party chairmen supporting Counts was Scurry County party representative Earl (Hassie) Sneed. Counts received votes also from county chairmen representing Jones, Kent, King, Stonewall and the 14 rural precincts of Taylor County. Also seeking the nomination was Greg Wortham, 27, an aide to Steve Carriker, who will soon officially vacate the 78th District House post. Wortham, a resident of Sweetwater, gained votes from the Democratic chairs for Nolan, Cottle, Fisher and Garza Counties. The only chairman not attending the meeting was from Lynn County.

The selection of Counts is "unofficial" since the Democrats cannot present his name until Carriker is officially off the ballot. The placement of any Democratic candidate is expected to be contested by Republicans as well. Republicans point to a legal opinion set forth by Secretary of State Jack Rains that once Carriker officially steps down to run for the 30th Senatorial seat once held by Ray Farabee, his party will be unable to replace him on the ballot. Counts has served as a Democratic Party county chairman for Knox County for some eight years. He is the founder and owner of Counts Insurance and See DEMOCRATS, page 12.

Salaries snag appraisal budget vote

Salary increases for 1989 prompted a lengthy discussion at the Tuesday evening board meeting of the Scurry County Appraisal District. The talks were part of proposals for the district's new operating budget. It was noted that office personnel had not received any pay raise in three years. Ray Peveler, chief appraiser, also reported that training had been completed by some of the staff which should qualify them for pay increases. Figures were also cited showing that personnel at the ap-

praisal office are payed on a lower scale than similar workers in county offices. Board member Mickey Sterling repeatedly expressed the opinion that due to the continual decline in farming and oil industries, costs should be cut in offices being supported by tax monies. Peveler countered with the fact that his office should not have to bear the brunt of cuts when other tax supported workers are paid on a much higher scale. Other items on the proposed 1989 budget showed cuts or remained the same when compared with the approved 1988 budget.

The office is eliminating one worker in attempts at cost efficiency. The salary portion of the proposed budget was some \$184,000, down from the current year's total of some \$186,000. The reduction in personnel accounted for the drop. The total budget proposed was for \$354,623. This was down from total operating expenses for 1988 estimated at \$367,530. The 1988 budget was further reduced some \$13,850 due to a carryover from 1987. In other business, board members approved May bills and

reviewed collection reports showing that 97.46% of Hermleigh school taxes have been collected and 99.9% of the Ira district had been paid. Due to the lengthy discussion concerning pay increases, the board decided to consider the figures and meet again at a later date for a final vote on the 1989 budget proposals. In attendance at the session were Peveler; Larry Crooks, assistant appraiser; Rona Sikes, county tax collector; and board members, Dwain Williams, Mickey Sterling, Doug Flynn and Julius Roemisch. Mairi McFaul was not in attendance.

The weekly events will normally alternate between age groups K-3 and 4-8. In addition, the library will have "Story Time" each Friday this summer from 10 until 10:30 a.m. for youngsters ages 3-5. Again it's just the way you look at it, but one thing does defy all laws of mass production. It's commonly accepted as an economic principle that the more you make of an item, the lower the price. Ain't so with the postage stamp.

INS agents said punished

WASHINGTON (AP) — Investigators are reviewing allegations that the Immigration and Naturalization Service retaliated against agents who complained that an administrative assignment put their undercover identities in jeopardy and that they were told to falsify their time cards.

The alleged reprisals began after all eight agents in the Houston anti-smuggling unit told Congress they were being reassigned part of the time to contact employers about the new immigration law and sanctions for hiring illegal aliens.

They were allegedly told to record those duties as anti-smuggling work on their time cards.

U.S. Rep. Jack Brooks, D-Texas and chairman of the House Government Operations Committee, contends the agents' safety was threatened when they had to

meet employers who may have been hiring illegal aliens.

"I'd hate to be an undercover agent traveling around and visiting those big employers of aliens. They'd recognize you; you'd stand out like a sore thumb," Brooks said.

BUT INS Commissioner Alan Nelson said it is "ludicrous" to claim the agents' cover was blown by meeting with employers. Nelson said he's "not aware there's any truth" to the allegations about the time cards.

"It's a basic and simple case of insubordination and failure to follow directions that started the whole thing," Nelson said. "It is our belief that they failed to perform their duties and appropriate action took place."

Nelson said it was necessary nationwide to shift manpower to accomplish the visits with employers, but apparently the men in Houston were the only

ones who "just didn't want to do it."

Brooks said the agents have continued to suffer, although a source said members of the unit were reassigned this week to full-time anti-smuggling duties.

Brooks said he requested a General Accounting Office investigation in April because although the INS is "treading a little more carefully until the heat dies down" its top-ranking officials "in their minds think they have done nothing wrong."

ed about it, but never have I seen it with the terrible dangers this one reflects for the participants," said Brooks.

The Office of Special Counsel, an independent investigatory agency of the Merit Systems Protection Board, is also investigating, said Laura Baumgaertner, executive assistant.

Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, said he has looked into the situation and received "wholly inadequate replies from the agencies involved."

"We don't need an INS whitewash, we need an objective assessment of the facts. Then we will know what other steps, if any, we need to take," Bentsen said Tuesday.

After the agents complained in a letter Sept. 12 to Brooks, the INS Southern regional office in Dallas began an investigation of the agents, which Brooks contends violated the agency's own rules that its office of professional responsibility conduct such a probe.

"In essence, the agents' allegations of impropriety were being handled by those they had complained about. ... The Immigration and Naturalization Service has demonstrated that it cannot fairly and impartially evaluate itself," he said.

The Justice Department's office of professional responsibility, however, concluded in March that the INS investigation was not improper.

Tokyo crew films CRMWD

The weather modification project of the Colorado River Municipal Water District will be the subject of a Japanese television network program in early July.

A network crew out of Tokyo, Japan headed by Katsuhiko Oguchi, spent Thursday and Friday interviewing CRMWD personnel and photographing operations at Big Spring.

Oguchi explained that while Japan has no shortage of rain in general, phenomenal growth of Tokyo and other major metropolitan centers has taxed localized water supplies. Consequently, there is interest in anything that promises to increase inflow of reservoirs in proximity to the cities.

The Japanese were directed by Bob Riggio, Austin, head of the weather modification program of the Texas Department of Water Resources, because CRMWD's

project is now in its 18th year and is the oldest such continuous effort in the United States.

Riggio was present for interviews, along with O. H. Ivie, general manager of CRMWD, Ray P. Jones, meteorologist, and Dan Keady, contract pilot for the cloud seeding. Friday Don Couvillion, pilot and coordinator of the program, flew the crew so that pictures could be taken of Keady seeding clouds. Shots were also taken of Jones operating the radar unit that directs the pilot to prospective clouds.

With Oguchi were his assistant, Nayo Ryoji of PBS News of Tokyo, also Daisuke Osabe, camera man, and Kaz Maruyama, audio, Ken Kitamura, K-West News Services of Los Angeles, Calif., who handled arrangements, accompanied and interpreted for them.

Footprints don't match deaf-mute

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — Officials plan to continue their efforts to identify a deaf-mute boy found wandering last year in Mexico after the mysterious boy's footprints didn't match those of a missing Illinois boy.

The deaf-mute boy, nicknamed Sabat, was found last November near an international bridge in El

Paso's Mexican sister city of Ciudad Juarez. He cannot speak and communicates through drawings and gestures.

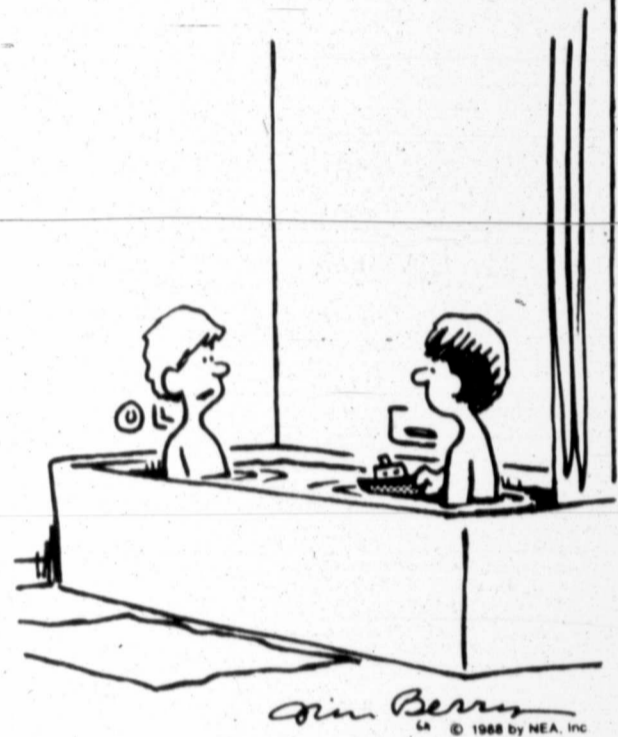

Identifying the weak spot

There's no drama in these nit-picking hands where the defense has to do the right thing to keep declarer from making 11 tricks. But today's deal has at least one lesson worth remembering.

West led the seven of diamonds, ace was played from dummy, 10 from East and the five-spot from declarer. Now came a low club to the jack, and West won the ace. What next?

Despite the encouraging look of the 10 of diamonds, West should know that South would be unlikely to bid two no-trump with only small cards for stoppers in the unbid diamond suit. Since the 10 is likely to be a singleton and declarer is attacking clubs and the heart suit has no future, it becomes easy to play a spade, even though that is right into the teeth of the one-spade bidder's hand. Sure enough, the spade shift holds down the overtricks. Declarer has 10 tricks but can no longer take 11.

And the lesson? The fact that declarer did not play hearts at trick two is an almost certain indication that he holds the heart ace and has no work to do in that suit. That's a good general rule. When declarer does not play what seems to be his best suit, you'd better assume that he does not have any tricks to lose there.

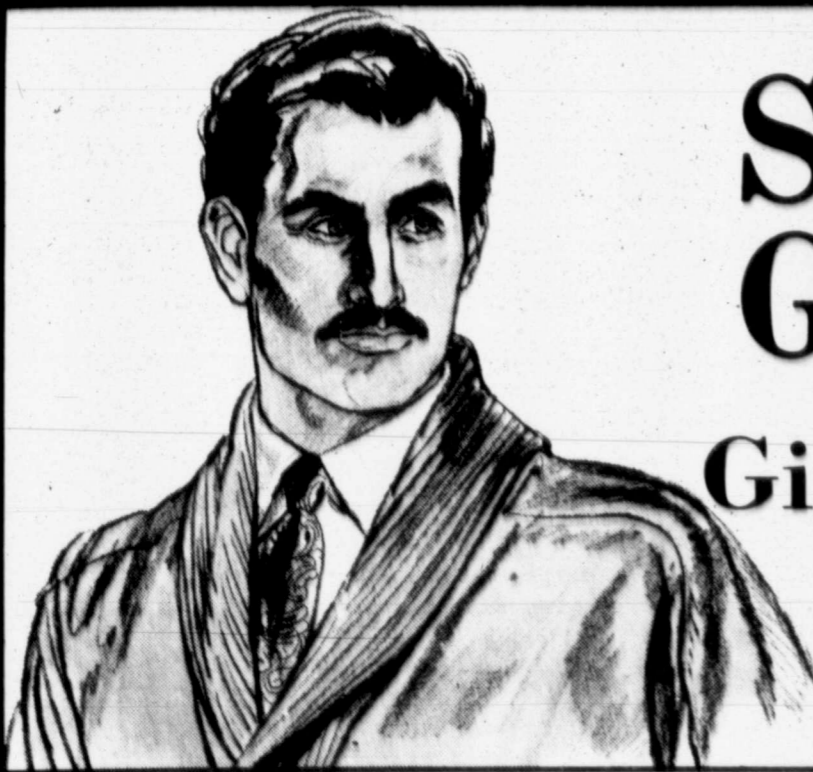

The Rainbow Family reported that two Groveton men pulled the gate down Friday night and dragged it a mile away.

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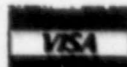

Competition for shuttle boosters expected

HOUSTON (AP) — Despite the pullout of Morton Thiokol from competition to build the next

generation of space shuttle boosters, NASA believes other companies will step in to bid for

the work. "We're going ahead with this project. We do expect strong competition for the contract," NASA spokesman Jerry Berg said Tuesday.

"Meanwhile, we look forward to our association with Morton Thiokol on the current booster," said Berg, spokesman at the Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville, Ala. — the center that oversees the space agency's rocket work.

Chicago-based Morton Thiokol says it will concentrate on the current redesign of the rocket booster used on Challenger, which exploded shortly after takeoff Jan. 28, 1986, killing all seven astronauts aboard. At present, Morton Thiokol is the sole builder of the solid-fuel boosters.

According to a presidential commission, the fiery disaster was caused by hot gas that leaked through a joint in a Thiokol-built solid-fuel booster, igniting the shuttle's main fuel tank.

NASA plans to use Thiokol's redesigned motor when it resumes shuttle flights — the first planned for late August. The redesign is nearly complete, with a test firing set for next month at Cape Canaveral, Fla., said Rocky Raab, a Thiokol spokesman in Utah.

Raab said Monday that United Technologies, a team of Lockheed and Aerojet and another team consisting of Hercules, Atlantic Research Corp. and Martin Marietta have expressed an interest in the \$1.2 billion contract.

Tom Fitzgerald, spokesman for Aerojet in Sacramento, Calif., said Tuesday he was surprised by Thiokol's announcement to pull out, but said the news was good for Thiokol's competitors.

"Any time your field of competitors lessens by one, your chances improve, obviously," Fitzgerald said. "And yes, we are interested."

"It's going to be a competitive contract," he added. "(Thiokol) is a very strong competitor. But as to who is the best competitor, it's a tough one to say."

Berg, meanwhile, said he could not speculate what impact Thiokol's announcement might have on the competition for the next-generation version of shuttle boosters — the advanced solid rocket motor — except to say the

space agency plans on strong competition for the project.

NASA plans to release its formal request for final industry proposal for the advance rocket later this month, Berg said.

"The process goes on," he said. "Basically, it's just a case where one firm has indicated they no longer want to (compete)."

NASA plans to begin phasing in the advanced rocket in 1994 and that process is expected to take about four years, meaning Morton Thiokol will still be involved in providing the current shuttle rockets for years, Berg noted.

In addition, Thiokol plans to invest \$200 million in coming years to modernize its northern Utah plant in order to seek other space and defense business, Raab said.

C&W music fans meet their idols

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Charley Pride set up a gazebo. Loretta Lynn boasted a hot-pink booth with revolving mannequins. Barbara Mandrell, surrounded by red, white and blue, offered up baseball and apple pie. To hear country music stars tell it, Nashville's annual "Fan Fair" is as important to them as it is to the thousands who make the pilgrimage year after year to collect their autographs or exchange a few words with their idols.

"People think that it's a drag for performers to meet fans live," said singer K.T. Oslin, who won a Grammy this year as country female vocalist for her single, "80s Ladies."

"It isn't. It's great fun," she said Tuesday. "I mean that's the only way you can tell what your work is going to when somebody looks you in the face and they say, 'I love your record and I'm from so-and-so.' And you go, 'All right, they hear me there.' The fans are fun."

More than 20,000 country music lovers are expected to descend on the state fairgrounds this week for seven days of festivities that feature about 30 hours of concerts and 365 autograph booths.

Naomi Judd, the older half of mother-daughter singing duo The Judds, said she owes it to the fans to come to the festival.

"You come to see us when we come to your hometown. You guys go buy the tickets, get babysitters, get your outfits

Preliminary surveys made in Stacy area

Preliminary archeological surveys have been made in the Stacy reservoir basin, setting in motion a process that will result in field studies. This may also open the way for resumption of brush clearing in the basin.

The Colorado River Municipal Water District has contracted with Mariah Associates, Inc. of Albuquerque, N. M. for the study, and Dr. Chris Lintz of Mariah said a precursory survey of sites within the basin has been completed.

Within a fortnight, he is due to file a report with the district on 60 potential sites for field testing. These will be reviewed by the Stacy Reservoir Archeological Committee which includes Skipper Scott of the U. S. Corps of Engineers, Dr. Jim Bruseth of the Texas Historical Commission, and Dr. Lintz for the district.

One of the 60 sites—15 historical and 45 prehistorical (before white man)—have been recommended, these will be tested in the field and Mariah will make recommendations of a specific number actually to be mitigated.

When the 60 sites are agreed upon, the district will be able to resume its brush clearing of the basin, avoiding the sites.

All work is to be completed prior to Jan. 1, 1990 so that the Stacy Dam can be closed on schedule.

Showers curtail water demand

Although intermittent showers and cool weather cut into demand toward the month's end, Colorado River Municipal Water District in May continued the string of gains for the year.

The 1,519,507,300 gallons for the month was up 7.56 over May 1987. Of that total, 1,399,199,700 gallons were in municipals deliveries, up 10.98 percent, while 120,307,600 gallons went to oil companies, down 20.85 percent. All of the 31,702,000 gallons decline to oil companies—and more—was represented in cessation of deliveries to the SACROC Unit in Scurry County.

Income in May was \$1,084,888, up \$5,000 over the month a year ago.

During May Big Spring took 212,883,000 gallons, up 8.04 percent; Midland 421,780,000, up 14.16 percent (due partly to plant troubles in May 1987); Odessa 651,961,100 gallons, up 9.13 percent; Snyder 102,061,000 gallons, up 13.35 percent; Stanton 16,514,000 gallons, up 26.54 percent.

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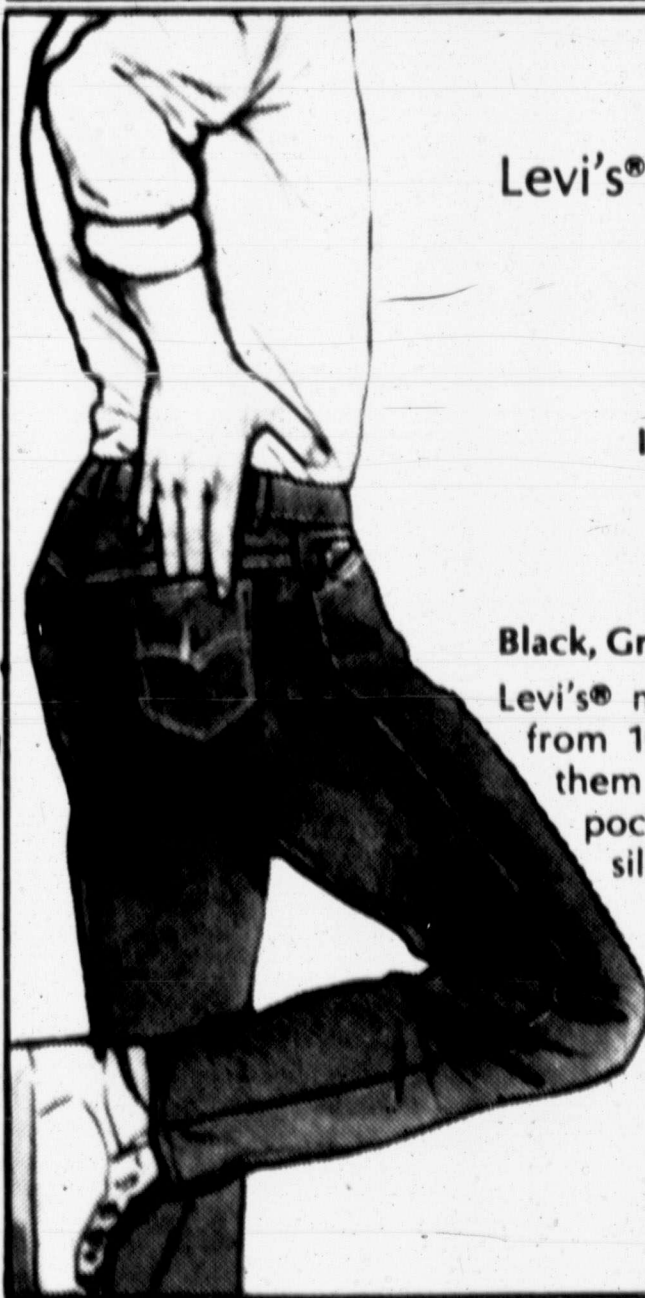


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Republican chairman sees harmonious Texas confab

HOUSTON (AP) — The state Republican convention in Houston this week should be a relatively harmonious affair, top party officials say.

"Old Republicans as well as new Republicans agree on about 90 percent of the issues," GOP Chairman George Strake said Tuesday. "My job ... is to get people to focus on things they agree on."

He said no major skirmishes were expected between supporters of George Bush, the likely nominee, and supporters of former candidate Pat Robertson.

"I've said all along I look at the Robertson situation as an unlimited opportunity," Strake said at a news conference prefaceing the three-day convention, which begins Thursday. "I think this party would not be where it is today, on the verge of becoming a majority party, if we would not have had the Robertson faction."

Party officials estimate about 40 percent of the 6,000 delegates to the state convention back the former television evangelist while 55 percent support Bush, the party's likely presidential nominee.

Robertson was expected to arrive at the convention Thursday but was not scheduled to speak until Saturday. Vice President Bush, who calls Houston home, is slated to address the convention Thursday.

Other convention speakers were to include Gov. Bill Clements, Secretary of Education William Bennett, Interior Secretary Donald Hodel and GOP National Committee Chairman Frank Fahrenkopf.

"We want to leave this town with an upbeat attitude," Strake said. "What I want to do in November is win big because a big win will help us all the way down the ballot."

Strake said he expected Republicans to gain 10 seats this November in the Texas House, two to four seats in the Senate, keep its two spots on the Texas Supreme Court and add two or three more.

MEXICO CITY (AP) — A "Freedom of the Press Day" was declared by President Miguel de la Madrid, but some reporters say his administration hasn't done enough to solve the murder cases of journalists.

Tonys are victim of TV movie

NEW YORK (AP) — It's been a boffo year for Broadway ticket sales, but television viewers were apparently unimpressed, giving the annual Tony Awards show its lowest TV rating yet, according to the A.C. Nielsen Co.

NBC put "Short Circuit," a sci-fi comedy movie, opposite Sunday night's two-hour live Tonys show and racked up a top-10 performance. The Tonys ranked 42nd.

Last year, the Tonys had a rating of 11.9 and a 23 share, barely above the 1977 all-time-low of 11.3. But this year's show had only a 9.5 rating and a 17 share.

The rating is a percentage of the nation's estimated 88.6 million households with televisions. The share is a percentage of sets in use.

Other first-run specials also failed to draw big ratings even though viewers had little original programming to choose from.

The only other non-repeat in the top 20, except for "60 Minutes," was the National Basketball Association playoff game between Boston and Detroit on CBS. It tied for 20th. The Los Angeles-Dallas game tied for 36th.

CBS also had the American Film Institute salute to Jack Lemmon, with a 10.5 rating and 19 share. It ranked 31st. "Liza Minnelli: A Triple Play" on ABC ranked 44th with a rating of 9.2 and a 16 share.

NBC, which had the top seven shows, won the week that ended Sunday with a 12.9 average rating; CBS rated 9.8; ABC 9.3. The three-network share was only 59, compared with the season-to-date average of 70, typical of the summer months. NBC's season-to-date average rating is 15.7, ABC 13.2, and CBS 13.1.

The week's top 10 prime-time shows were: "Night Court," "The Cosby Show," "Cheers," "A Different World," "Short Circuit," "L.A. Law," and "Stranded," all on NBC, followed by "Who's the Boss?" ABC, "The High Price of Passion" NBC and "Perfect Strangers Special," ABC.

"Stranded" and "The High Price of Passion" were repeats of made-for-TV movies.

Fernando Pineda, president of the liberal Union of Democratic Journalists, said in a telephone interview he did not attend Tuesday ceremonies because "on this June 7, there is nothing to celebrate."

The union and other journalists' associations in Mexico have complained the government has been slow to conclude investigations into the slayings of as many as 25 journalists in the past six years.

De la Madrid presented the National Journalism Awards and attended a luncheon Tuesday for the press day as his last official activity before departing for New York, where he will address the U.N. General Assembly.

Most recently, columnist Hector Felix Miranda of the outspoken weekly Zeta in the northwestern border city of Tijuana

was fatally shot April 20. Police believe the man arrested May 1 may have been just a triggerman acting for others.

The case is the only one of 25 in which an arrest has been made.

In an apparent response to the increasing number of complaints, the Interior Department on Friday issued an unusually detailed 80-page report on the cases.

The report said de la Madrid had "put into practice the actions needed to guarantee free exercise, without any restriction of the freedom of the press" throughout his six-year term, which started in December 1982.

The case of Manuel Buendia, a front-page columnist for the Mexico City newspaper Excelsior who was fatally shot four years ago, is being handled by the federal attorney general's office.

Strep throat affects tonsils

By Peter H. Gott, M.D.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My health class raised some questions our teacher couldn't answer. Why do you often get little white spots on the back of your throat when you have strep throat? Why do you often get chills when you have a fever?

DEAR READER: Streptococcal bacteria commonly affect the tonsils, where they cause little pockets of infection to develop. Often these pockets resemble grains of rice; usually they are fluffy and appear to stick to the tonsils; sometimes the areas of infection coalesce to form a whitish covering over the tonsils.

The end result is tonsillitis. This condition need not be acute. Young people will occasionally have chronic tonsillitis: hard pellets of infected material that are wedged deep into the crypts (crevices) of chronically inflamed tonsils. These can cause bad breath, a foul taste in the mouth, fatigue, swollen glands in the neck and a tendency to develop repeated fevers and upper respiratory infections. Sore throat may not be present. Antibiotic therapy may give temporary relief, but tonsillectomy may be the most effective way to cure chronic tonsillitis.

With respect to your second question: When a person is ill, Nature has provided a means by which the immune system can be helped to combat infection. This is fever — a complex biochemical reaction that forces the body to hold in heat. Because many bacteria and viruses grow best in a constant temperature of normal body heat (98.6 degrees), the body tends to inactivate the invading microorganisms by turning up the thermostat and, in a sense, trying to burn them out.

Since muscle contractions are a good way to increase body heat (as every athlete knows), Nature causes us to shiver and have chills at times when body heat must be increased. Chills are the turbocharging of fever. As uncomfortable as they are, they serve a purpose by making us pull on the covers and by producing more heat by muscle contraction.

In summary, chills and fever go together as a natural mechanism designed to disrupt the metabolisms of foreign germs that are attacking the body.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm 28 and just moved to a new area. Recently, I had my initial physical assessment by my new physician. He asked me to disrobe but to leave my bra on. During the physical it stayed on until it was time for my breast exam. Only then did he have me remove my bra, which then remained off. I've had physicals before. Sometimes I was given a gown or a sheet and sometimes I wore nothing, but never before did I get to wear only my bra. Can you explain why he would choose this procedure?

DEAR READER: I believe that your doctor's approach was a matter of personal preference. I am happy to learn that he paid special attention to your modesty. Completely naked people feel vulnerable and ill at ease; doctors owe them the respect of at least some covering. Drapes and gowns usually are used for this purpose. However, I can see no reason why a bra isn't a suitable substitute. If you have an objection to your doctor's practice of using your bra as covering, talk to him about it. Otherwise, it seems OK to me.

As NBA championship begins...

Pistons power past Lakers

INGLEWOOD, Calif. (AP) - The Detroit Pistons handled the playoff pressure like some lightweight nuisance they could simply flick off their shoulders. They handled the defending NBA champions the same way.

Finalists for the first time in their 31 seasons in Detroit, the Pistons were remarkably poised Tuesday night. They shot well, stifled Los Angeles' shooters and upset the Lakers 105-93 in the opener of the best-of-seven title battle.

Now, perhaps, the team that eliminated Michael Jordan and the Chicago Bulls 4-1 and Larry Bird and the Boston Celtics 4-2 will get the respect it feels it deserves.

"A lot of guys are upset that most of the media has us going down in four or five," said Detroit's Adrian Dantley. "We're fired up."

If the Pistons win Thursday night's second game, they'll become the first team in NBA finals history to win the first two

games on the road. The three games after that will be in Pontiac, Mich., starting Sunday.

If the Lakers come back and win the series, they will become the first repeat champions since Boston in 1969.

Detroit's underdog status against the Lakers, who are in the finals for the seventh time in nine seasons, kept the Pistons loose.

"As far as we knew, we were supposed to get swept, so there was no pressure," Detroit guard Vinnie Johnson said.

"We're very relaxed," Dantley said. "I talked to a lot of guys. Everybody's sleeping better. When we played Boston, we couldn't sleep."

"The Lakers are favorites anyway so what have we got to lose?"

Detroit wasn't going to lose Tuesday night, not the way Dantley and Johnson were shooting and the way they and their teammates were keeping the Lakers from scoring.

Dantley made 14 of 16 shots and led all scorers with 34 points. Johnson came off the bench to make seven of 11 shots and score 16 points. The Pistons sank 57.5 percent of their field goal attempts, which helped them prevent Los Angeles from using its running game.

Johnson's 17-foot jumper with 10:56 left in the second quarter gave the Pistons a 24-23 lead. They never trailed after that, led 57-40 at halftime and stayed on top by at least seven points the rest of the way.

The Lakers were led by Magic Johnson with 28 points and Byron Scott with 25. But Kareem Abdul-Jabbar made just four of 13 shots and Michael Cooper missed all seven of his. The team's shooting percentage was 39.8.

"I wouldn't like to think so," Los Angeles Coach Pat Riley said when asked if his team was emotionally down for the game. "We are playing for the world championship at home. We came ready."

"The shots wouldn't drop and that got the guys frustrated after 10 or 12 minutes," he added. "I probably was one of the worst games we've ever played in the playoffs here."

The Lakers, who lost a home playoff opener for the first time in 20 series, made just eight of 22 shots in the first quarter and seven of 22 in the second. They were open for many of the misses.

"I think we had guys flying at them" on those apparently open shots, Vinnie Johnson said. "We were taking away their first and second options and they had to settle for their third option."

Texas' Hough pitches well but not better than Finley

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) - Last season Chuck Finley was an ineffective long reliever. Then late in the year the California Angels converted the left-hander to a starter. Now he's the most effective member of their rotation.

Finley fired a five-hitter for 8 2/3 innings Tuesday night as the struggling California Angels blanked the Texas Rangers, 1-0.

Finley got into ninth inning difficulties, allowing a pair of

singles to put runners on first and third with two outs. Manager Cookie Rojas summoned right-hander Bryan Harvey to pitch to pinch-hitter Pete O'Brien, who fanned on three pitches for Harvey's fourth save.

"I'd say that's the best stuff I've had in any major league game," said Finley, 4-7, making his 15th career start. "I wouldn't say this turns me around but it's a good step."

"I kept telling myself to slow down my mechanics, to keep the ball low and stay in a groove. I've had some tough games but I feel I'm maturing."

Finley struck out seven and didn't allow a walk as he came within one out of becoming the first Ranger opponent to toss a complete game shutout at Arlington Stadium since Bud Black, then of Kansas City, accomplished the feat in May of 1985.

Finley got a scare in the eighth when Jerry Browne's two-out fly ball dropped between left fielder George Hendrick and center fielder Chico Walker for a tainted double.

But Finley got Bob Brower to fly to right, ending the threat.

Finley got all the offense he needed in the sixth on Brian Downing's lowering leadoff homer to left, his ninth. It was Downing's third game-winner of the season.

Texas' Charlie Hough, 5-7, also pitched a masterful game, allowing five hits while striking out nine and walking three.

"You'd have to say he (Finley) was one pitch better than Charlie tonight," said Rangers manager Bobby Valentine. "Finley had a real good breaking ball and he threw it when he was behind in the count and got it over the plate. He had our guys off balance."

The Rangers got an unlucky break in the fifth when Mike Stanley hit a two-out single and Geno Petralli followed with a double to right.

ORDINANCE NO. 725

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING A FRANCHISE IN THE CITY OF SNYDER, TEXAS, SETTING FORTH CONDITIONS ACCOMPANYING THE GRANT OF FRANCHISE, AND PROVIDING FOR REGULATION OF THE SYSTEM

WHEREAS, the city of Snyder has, without necessity of expressed enumeration, each and every power which has been granted to the City by virtue of Article XI, Section 5, of the constitution of the State of Texas, and all such powers, whether expressed or implied as contained in the City charter;

WHEREAS, Article IX of the City charter contains general provisions for franchises including the inalienability of the City's right of control and use of the public streets, highways, sidewalks, alleys, parks, public squares, and public places of the City; and

WHEREAS, Snyder Cablevision Associates, is found to be subject to the powers and regulatory authority granted to the City of Snyder by its charter, and that the City is a franchising authority;

Now, therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SNYDER, TEXAS,

ARTICLE I. GRANT OF FRANCHISE AND GENERAL PROVISIONS

Section 1. Title of Ordinance

This ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the Snyder Cablevision Associates (SCA) Television Franchise, and it shall become a part of the code of ordinances of the City of Snyder.

Section 2. Rights and Privileges of Cable Operator

The franchise granted by the City pursuant to this ordinance shall grant to Snyder Cablevision Associates, the right and privilege to erect, construct, operate and maintain in, on, along, across, above, over and under the streets and easements, now in existence and as may be created or established during its term, any poles, wires, cable, underground conduits, manholes, and other television conductors and fixtures necessary for the maintenance and operation of a cable television system for the interception, sale, transmission and distribution of television programs and other audio visual electrical signals and the right to transmit signals to the inhabitants of the City on the terms and conditions set forth below.

Section 3. Agreement and Incorporation of Application by Reference

A. On City's passage of this franchise, SCA agrees to be bound by the terms and conditions contained in this franchise, except those terms and conditions that become invalid as a result of changes in state or federal law.

B. SCA also agrees to provide all cable television service in the City of Snyder and by its acceptance, SCA grants and agrees that all attachments are incorporated by reference and made a part of the franchise and this ordinance.

Section 4. Purpose

A. There is hereby granted to SCA the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate in the present and future streets, alleys, easements, and public places of the city of Snyder, Texas, towers, poles, lines, cables, necessary wiring, and other apparatus for the purpose of originating, receiving, amplifying and distributing cable communication signals, including television and FM radio signals and other forms of signals whether video, audio, or digital, to the City and its inhabitants.

B. This ordinance and franchise creates and sets conditions accompanying the grant of a franchise period and provides for the regulation of a system designed and constructed for the purpose of distributing video and other forms of electronic signals in the City and referred to as the "cable communication system." The system is recognized to be subject to regulation by this City by virtue of its charter and the Cable Communications Policy Act of 1984 as amended from time to time.

C. This franchise is nonexclusive. The City reserves the right to grant at any time additional franchises for cable communications systems on substantially the same terms and conditions.

Section 5. Duration and Acceptance of Franchise

The franchise and the rights, privileges and authority granted shall take effect and be in force from and after final passage as provided by law, and shall continue in force and effect for a term of twelve (12) years, provided that within thirty (30) days after the date of final passage of the franchise SCA shall file with the City Manager its unconditional acceptance of the franchise and promise to comply with all its provisions, terms, and conditions.

Section 6. Police Powers

In accepting this franchise, SCA acknowledges that its rights are subject to the police power of the City to adopt and enforce general ordinances necessary to the safety and welfare of the public and it agrees to comply with all applicable general laws and ordinances enacted by the City pursuant to such power.

Any conflict between the provisions of the franchise and any other present or future lawful exercise of the City's police powers shall be resolved in favor of the City except that any such exercise that is not of general application in the jurisdiction or applies exclusively to SCA or cable television systems which contains provisions inconsistent with this franchise shall prevail only if upon such exercise, the City finds an emergency exists constituting a danger to health, safety, property or general welfare or such exercise is mandated by law.

Section 7. Franchise Required

No cable television system shall be allowed to occupy or use the streets of the City, or be allowed to operate, without a cable television franchise containing requirements substantially the same as those imposed on SCA.

Section 8. Costs of Franchising

A. SCA shall pay the City for the direct and indirect costs of franchising up to a maximum of \$15,000, which shall include consultants, legal, and other costs of examination of SCA's performance, qualifications, and proposal.

Section 9. Liability and Insurance

A. SCA shall maintain, and by its acceptance of this franchise specifically agrees that it will maintain throughout the term of the franchise, insurance in the minimum amount of liability: each occurrence \$500,000, aggregate \$1,000,000.
B. Certificates of insurance which show proof of the policies obtained in compliance with this section shall be filed and main-

tained with the City Secretary during the term of the franchise, and may be changed from time to time to reflect changing liability limits or conditions. SCA shall immediately advise the City of any litigation that may develop that would affect this insurance.

Section 10. Performance Bond and Letter of Credit

Within sixty (60) days after the award of this franchise SCA shall file with the City a Performance Bond in the amount of Twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) in favor of the City.

Section 11. Indemnification

A. SCA shall, at its sole cost and expense, fully indemnify, defend and hold harmless the City, its officers, boards, commissions and employees against any and all claims, suits, actions, liability and judgments for damages, arising out of SCA's cable TV operations of this franchise, including but not limited to expenses for reasonable legal fees and disbursements and liabilities assumed by the City.

ARTICLE II. CABLE TV SYSTEM EXTENSION, OPERATION, STANDARDS AND PROCEDURE

Section 1. Service Availability

SCA shall provide cable television service throughout the entire franchise area pursuant to the provisions of this franchise and shall keep a record for at least three (3) years of all request for service. This record shall be available for public inspection at the local office of SCA during regular office hours.

Section 2. Cable TV System Construction and Standards

A. SCA will expand the system's channel capacity to 35 channels as soon as practicable.

B. Performance Tests on Expanded System:

1. Not later than ninety (90) days after new or substantially rebuilt portion of the system is made available for service to subscribers, performance tests shall be conducted to demonstrate full compliance with the technical standards shown in the attached Appendix.

2. Such tests shall be performed by, or under the supervision of a qualified engineer. A copy of this report shall be submitted to the City describing and summarizing test results, instrumentation, calibration, and test procedures, and the qualifications of the engineer responsible for the tests.

C. New construction, installation and maintenance of the cable television system shall be performed in a high quality, professional manner. All cables and wires shall be installed where possible, parallel with electric and telephone lines.

1. For all new construction, SCA shall at all times comply with:
a. National Electrical Safety Code (National Bureau of Standards);
b. National Electrical Code (National Bureau of Fire Underwriters);

c. Applicable FCC or other federal, state and local regulations.
2. The system shall not endanger or interfere with the safety of persons or property in the franchise area or other areas where SCA may have equipment located.

3. Any contractor proposed for work of construction, installation, maintenance, and/or repair of the system or equipment must be properly licensed under laws of the state, federal regulatory agencies, and all local ordinances.

Section 3. Use of Streets, Alleys, Easements and Public Ways

A. The cable communications systems and facilities, including SCA owned poles, lines, equipment, pedestals, and all appurtenances, shall be located, erected and maintained so that such system and facilities shall not:

1. Endanger or interfere with the health, safety or lives of persons;

2. Interfere with any improvements the City, County, State, or other governmental authority may deem proper to make;

3. Interfere with the free and proper use, access, ingress, or egress of public ways, streets, roads, alleys, or easements except during actual construction or repair;

4. Interfere with the rights and reasonable convenience of private property owners;

5. Obstruct, hinder or interfere with any gas, electric, water, sewer, telephone, or other utilities located within the public ways, streets, roads, alleys, or easements.

B. In case of any disturbance of pavement, sidewalk, driveway, other surfacing, landscaping, fencing, plantings, retaining walls, embankments, drainage channels, structures, or parking areas, SCA shall, at its own cost and expense and in a manner approved by the City, replace and restore all paving, sidewalk, driveway, landscaping, fencing, plantings, retaining walls, embankments, drainage channels, structures, or parking areas or surface of any street, alley, road, easement, or public way disturbed, in as good a condition as before work commenced in an efficient workmanlike and timely manner in accordance with standards set for such work by the City. Such restoration shall be undertaken within no more than 10 days after the damage is incurred, and shall be continuously pursued until completed to the satisfaction of the City. All permits and procedures for notification to the City or other owner, authority, or utility, shall be obtained or complied with in advance of the disturbances contemplated within this paragraph.

C. Erection, Removal and Common Use of Poles.

1. No location of any pole or wire holding structure of SCA shall give rise to a vested interest, and such SCA owned poles or structures shall be removed or modified at SCA's expense whenever the City reasonably determines that the public convenience would be enhanced.

2. Where poles already exist for use in serving the City and are available under just and reasonable terms and conditions, for use by SCA, but it does not make arrangements for such use, the City may, with reasonable cause, require SCA to use such poles and structures if the City determines that the public convenience would be enhanced. Where a public utility serving the City desires to make use of the poles or other wire holding structures of SCA, but agreement with the SCA cannot be reached, the City may, with reasonable cause, require SCA to permit such use for payment and terms as the City shall determine to be just and reasonable, if the City determines that the use would enhance public convenience.

3. Where SCA desires or is required to extend cable communication service to a location not then served with existing poles, wire holding devices, conduit, or trenches, whether or not such poles, devices, conduits, or trenches

could be the shared responsibility of one or more utility, the absence of such facilities shall not be justification by and of itself to deny such service extension. In the event joint use of facilities set forth in this paragraph cannot be accomplished, SCA shall arrange for the provision of such facilities independently or in conjunction with other utilities and at the expense of SCA and/or in cooperation with other utilities.

D. In the event that, at any time during the period of this franchise, the City, County, State, or other authority shall lawfully elect to alter or change the line or grade of any street, road, public way, alley, or easement, SCA, upon reasonable notice by the proper authority, shall remove or relocate as necessary its poles, wires, cables, underground conduits, pedestals, manholes and other fixtures.

E. SCA shall, on the request of any person holding a building moving permit issued by the city, temporarily raise or lower its wires to permit the moving of buildings. The expense of such temporary removal, raising, or lowering of wires shall be paid by the person requesting the same, and SCA shall have the authority to require such payment in advance.

Section 4. Overhead (Aerial) and Underground Service and Extensions.

A. The cable communications system authorized and required in this franchise ordinance during reconstruction, relocation, renovation, or extension throughout the term of the franchise, may be installed or extended by means of overhead or aerial construction except in those areas within the franchised territory where both telephone and electric utility facility are underground at the time of reconstruction, relocation, renovation, or extension of the cable communications system. Where not otherwise required to be placed underground and at the request of adjacent property owners or developers, provided any excess of underground over that of aerial or overhead cost shall be borne by the property owner or developer making the request.

All cable passing under improved roadways, streets, and paved alleys, shall be installed in conduit and shall be installed as directed and specified by the City to minimize or eliminate the need for the open cutting of improved streets, roads, paved alleys, or walks. The City's specifications for boring, trenching, backfilling, encasement and embedment for installation of utilities within public rights-of-way including permit and fee requirements as same may exist on the effective date of this franchise or as same may be enacted or adopted by amendment during the term of this franchise and extensions shall be conditions of this franchise as if fully set forth here. Failure to comply with the directions and specifications shall be deemed a violation of the franchise ordinance and shall be enforceable as such.

B. Where a system is already installed, the total cost of replacement with a new underground system shall be borne by the developer making the request.

ARTICLE III. CAPACITY AND SERVICES

Section 1. Capacity and Rates

A. SCA shall provide a cable communications system capable of receiving and transmitting 300 mhz for video, audio, and/or digital signals for visual programs or other uses to subscribers within the franchise area, and 35 channels of capacity.

B. SCA shall provide or reserve the following public educational, and government access channels:

1. One (1) channel for government purposes;
2. One (1) channel for educational purposes;
3. One (1) channel, if available, for purposes requested by the City Council.
4. SCA shall be authorized to provide temporary shared, joint, or cooperative use of one or more of the channels assigned to public, educational, government uses until such time as there is demand for use of the shared channels. Shared use shall cease on notification by the City Council.

C. 1. The city may regulate rates to the extent allowed by law.
2. When basic channel service is increased to 24 channels, SCA may raise its rate for service to \$18.95 per month.

Section 2. Continuity of Service Mandatory

A. It shall be the right of all subscribers to continue receiving service insofar as their financial and other obligations to SCA are honored. In the event that the SCA elects to overbuild, rebuild, modify, or sell the system with the consent of the City, or the City gives notice of intent to terminate or fails to renew this franchise, SCA shall not so as to ensure that all subscribers receive continuous, uninterrupted service regardless of the circumstances. Revenues shall continue to accrue to SCA until transfer occurs, unless otherwise agreed to be SCA and transferee.

B. In the event of termination of the franchise, SCA shall cooperate with the City or new operator in maintaining continuity of service to all subscribers.

Section 3. Complaint Procedure

A. SCA shall maintain a local office in Scurry County for the purpose of receiving and resolving complaints, which shall be accessible by a local, toll-free telephone. The local office shall be open to receive inquiries or complaints during normal business hours, and in no event less than 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, excluding legal holidays. SCA shall provide the means, such as an answering service or machine, to accept calls twenty-four (24) hours a day, seven days a week. During the rebuilding period (first 18 to 24 months), the City may require SCA personnel to receive and resolve complaints 9 a.m. to 7 a.m. Monday through Saturday.

B. SCA shall investigate and act on all service complaints by the end of the following business day. Service complaints shall be resolved within a reasonable period of time.

C. As subscribers are connected or reconnected to the system, SCA shall, by appropriate means such as a card or brochure, furnish information concerning the procedures for making inquiries or complaints, including the name, address and local telephone number of the employee or agent to whom such inquiries or complaints are to be addressed.

D. On failure of SCA to remedy a loss of service attributable to the cable system within twenty-four (24) hours of receipt of notification of such loss, SCA shall rebate, at the request of the subscriber, one-thirtieth (1/30) of the regular monthly charge to each requesting subscriber so affected, for each twenty-four (24) hours after receipt of notification, until service is restored, unless such restoration is prevented by strike, injunction or other cause beyond control of the SCA. Loss of service shall be considered as a failure to receive less than two-thirds (2/3) of the available channels.

Section 4. Public, Educational, Government, and Emergency Channels (PEG)

New bill calls for costly Medicare expansion

WASHINGTON (AP) — A costly new long-term home health care plan arrives on the House floor against the backdrop of a coming election and a series of polls indicating public desire for such a program.

The home care bill is championed by Rep. Claude Pepper,

D-Fla., who said Tuesday he had been trying for 50 years to help fill "a total vacuum" in the area of long-term care.

But two spurred committee chairmen whose panels never got a chance to review the bill spearheaded an effort to block its consideration on the House floor

today.

"We should not allow the rules of the House to be manipulated to satisfy the popular issue of the moment," Ways and Means Committee Chairman Dan Rostenkowski, D-Ill., said Tuesday in a letter to his colleagues.

Pepper's plan would expand

Medicare to include long-term home care benefits for anyone of any age who is chronically ill or can't perform tasks of daily living.

Sen. Paul Simon, D-Ill., the Senate sponsor of the Pepper bill, said 30 percent of the people in nursing homes would not have to

be there if home services were available.

"We're going to have an explosion in the demand for long-term care and we ought to face up to it now," he said at a news conference Tuesday with Pepper and others.

The Congressional Budget Of-

fice estimates the home care program would cost nearly \$28 billion over five years. Backers say it would be paid for by imposing the Medicare payroll tax on income above \$45,000, which is currently exempt, but opponents are skeptical, saying the cost could balloon out of control.

A. SCA shall provide and maintain PEG access channels for purposes outlined below, which shall be capable of providing service 24 hours per day.

1. SCA's sole responsibility shall be to facilitate use of access channels and not to provide a studio, production or play back equipment or personnel. SCA shall lend technical assistance to users in order for users to deliver video signals to SCA for showing on access channels.
2. Educational access channels shall be available for use by public and private school authorities.
3. Government access channels which shall be available for local governmental use.
4. SCA shall incorporate into its cable television system equipment which will permit the City, in times of emergency, to override the audio on all channels simultaneously. It will be activated by telephone provided by SCA.

ARTICLE IV. ADMINISTRATION

Section 1. Performance Evaluation

A. The City and SCA shall schedule performance evaluation sessions and public hearings at the April Council meeting during the fourth (4th) and eighth (8th) years. The sessions shall be open to the public and announced in a newspaper of general circulation in accordance with legal notice. When there exist other reasonable evidence, which in the judgement of the City, questions the quality of service, the City may require SCA to test the signal quality and performance.

B. Topics which may be discussed during evaluation may include, but not be limited to, rate structures, franchise fee, penalties, free or discounted services, application of new technologies, system performance, services provided, programming offered, customer complaints, amendments to this ordinance, judicial and FCC rulings, and SCA or City rules.

C. SCA shall file with the City a report giving an assessment of its performance evaluation 60 days prior to review. SCA shall bear reasonable cost of City to review performance in the fourth and eighth years.

D. SCA shall run proof of performance tests during the fourth and eighth years conforming to FCC and franchise requirements, and present the results to the Council for consideration of performance review. (When there exists other reasonable evidence, which in the judgment of the City, questions the quality of service, the City may require SCA to test the signal quality and performance.) The City may require the tests to be supervised by an engineer, whose reasonable expense shall be paid by SCA, chosen by the City. The engineer shall sign all records of special tests and forward such records to the City with a report interpreting the results, and recommending action to be taken.

Section 2. Reporting and Availability of Records

A. SCA shall keep complete and accurate books of accounts and records of its business and operations in connection with this franchise. All such books and records shall be consistent with generally accepted accounting practices and shall be made available to the City at SCA's principal office in the City.

B. The City shall have the right, relating to rate regulation of cable service provided by SCA, at reasonable times and for reasonable purposes, to examine, audit, review, and/or obtain copies of the papers, books, accounts, documents, maps, plans, and other records of SCA and/or its affiliates and to inspect, inventory, and/or appraise the plant, equipment, and other property of SCA within the City's jurisdiction. SCA shall fully cooperate in making available its records and otherwise assisting in these activities.

C. The City shall have the power to require that SCA report such information relating to SCA and/or its affiliates as the City may consider necessary for the purpose of regulating rates, when applicable. The City shall have the right, relative to rate regulation of cable service provided by SCA to establish forms for all reports, determine the time for reports and the frequency with which any reports are to be made, and require that any reports be made under oath.

D. The City shall have the right relating to cable service provided by SCA, when necessary for the purposes of regulating rates, if applicable, to require that all contracts or arrangements between SCA and any affiliated interest be in writing and that copies be filed with the City.

E. The City may, at any time, make reasonable inquiries concerned with the management and affairs of the SCA System. SCA shall respond to such inquiries on a timely basis.

F. SCA shall provide the following reports:

- (1) Quarterly reports to be furnished 90 days after end of calendar quarter:
 - (a) Gross revenues and the basis for calculation of franchise fee
 - (2) Annually by April 30:
 - (a) Copies of audited financial statements of income, assets, and liabilities.
 - (b) Summary of operations certified by SCA officer: number of subscribers by class, connects and disconnects, miles of trunk and distribution, homes passed.
 - (c) Future plans: rate changes, service changes, possible introduction of new features, services, or new technology.
 - (d) Description of investment and property installed by type and account number and cost.
 - (e) Ownership report, showing partners or major stockholders or parents holding 5% or more of stock or ownership.
 - (f) Copies of petitions, applications, and non routine communications with FCC, SEC, or other state or federal regulatory agency having jurisdiction over matters affecting system or this franchise.

Section 3. Franchise Fee

A. SCA acknowledges that the streets, alleys, easements, and rights-of-way of the City to be used by SCA in the operation of this system within the boundaries of the City are valuable public properties acquired and maintained by the City at great expense to its taxpayers. The grant to SCA for the use of its streets is a valuable property right without which SCA would be required to

invest substantial capital in right-of-way costs and acquisitions; therefore, SCA shall pay the City an amount equal to three percent (3%) per annum of SCA's gross annual revenue from all sources attributable to the operations within the confines of the City. This payment shall be in addition to any other tax or payment levied or required by the City from SCA.

B. Nothing in this Article shall limit the fees, taxes, and charges required by this franchise for other permitted purposes or costs, but this fee shall include the amount of tax, fee, or assessment imposed by the City on SCA or its cable subscribers solely because of their status as such. The term "franchise fee" does not include bonds, security funds, letter of credit, insurance, indemnification, penalties, liquidated damages or other requirements which are necessary to the enforcement of this franchise. The franchise fee shall be in addition to any tax, fee, or assessment imposed on other persons as well as on cable operators or cable subscribers.

C. The franchise fee shall be payable quarterly to the City, and SCA shall file a detailed, verified statement of all gross receipts within the City during the period for which the payment is made. The payment shall be made to the City not later than ninety (90) days after the expiration of SCA's fiscal quarter. The City shall have the right to inspect SCA records and to audit and recompute any amounts determined to be owed; provided, however, that such audit shall be initiated within thirty-six (36) months following the submission of the report. Additional amount due as a result of the audit shall be paid within thirty (30) days following written notice to SCA. The notice shall include a copy of the audit report or findings of the recomputation. Costs of any independent audit or special accounting shall be charged to SCA if the audit finds the actual amount due to be higher than the amount paid.

D. The acceptance of any payment required by the City shall not be construed as an acknowledgment that the amount paid is the correct amount due, nor shall acceptance of payment be construed as a release of any claim which the City may have for additional sums due and payable. Fee payments shall be subject to audit by the City or its appointed agents, and additional assessment or refund shall be made if the payment is found to be in error. In the event that such an audit or audits result in an assessment by, and an additional payment to the City, the additional payment shall be subject to interest at the rate of eighteen percent (18%) per year from the date on which the said original payment was due and payable.

Section 4. SCA Rules and Regulations

SCA shall have the authority to promulgate such rules, regulations, terms and conditions governing the conduct of its business as shall be reasonably necessary to enable SCA to exercise its rights and perform its obligations under this franchise, and to assure uninterrupted service to each and all of its customers. Provided, however, that such rules, regulations, terms and conditions shall not be in conflict with the provisions of applicable State and Federal laws, rules and regulations. If such rules, regulations, terms, and conditions are maintained in written form, SCA shall provide copies to City.

Section 5. Compliance with State and Federal Laws

Notwithstanding any other provisions of this franchise to the contrary, SCA shall at all times comply with all laws and regulations of the state and federal government or any of its administrative agencies. Provided, however, that if any such state or federal law or regulation shall require SCA to perform any service, or shall permit SCA to perform any service, or shall prohibit SCA from performing any service in conflict with the terms of this franchise or of any laws or regulations of the City, then SCA shall notify the City of the conflict believed to exist between such regulation or law and the laws or regulations of the City or this franchise.

If the City determines that a material provision of this ordinance is affected by subsequent actions of the state or federal government, the City and SCA shall have the right to modify provisions to such extent necessary to be in compliance with all laws and to carry out the full intent and purpose of this franchise.

ARTICLE V. TRANSFER, TERMINATION AND REMOVAL

Section 1. Transfer of Franchise

Any such franchise shall be based on the qualifications of SCA, and cannot in any event be sold, transferred, leased, assigned or disposed of, in whole or in part, either by forced or involuntary sale, merger, consolidation or otherwise without prior consent of the City Council expressed by resolution, and then only under such conditions as may be prescribed herein. The consent of the City will not be unreasonably withheld; provided, however, the proposed Assignee must show financial responsibility and must agree to comply with all provisions of this ordinance; and provided, further that no such consent shall be required for a transfer in trust, mortgage, or other hypothecation as a whole, to secure an indebtedness.

Section 2. Termination

A. In addition to all other rights and powers retained by the City under this franchise or otherwise, and the City reserves the right to forfeit and terminate the franchise and all rights and privileges of SCA in the event of a substantial breach of material terms and conditions. SCA shall not be excused by mere economic hardship nor by misfeasance or malfeasance of its directors, officers or employees.

B. In the event that the City decides to initiate procedures to terminate this franchise pursuant to this Article V, the City shall make a written demand that SCA comply with any such provision, rule, order, or determination under or pursuant to this franchise. If the violation by SCA continues for a period of thirty (30) days following such written demand without written proof that the corrective action has been taken or is being actively and expeditiously pursued, the City may place the issue of termination of the franchise before the City Council. The City shall cause to be served upon SCA, at least twenty (20) days prior to the date of such City Council meeting, a written notice of intent to request such termination and the time and place of the meeting. Public notice shall be given of the meeting and issue which the City Council is to consider.

C. The City Council shall hear and consider the issue and shall hear any person interested, and shall determine in a reasonable manner whether or not any violation by SCA has occurred and whether the violation has been cured.

D. If the City Council finds that the violation by SCA has occurred and that the violation has not been cured, the City Council may, by resolution, declare that the franchise of SCA shall be forfeited and terminated. SCA retains all rights to challenge such termination in the appropriate court of law.

Section 3. Renewal

This franchise may be renewed in accordance with the terms of the Cable Communications Policy Act of 1984 as amended from time to time.

Section 4. City Right to Negotiate to Purchase System

In the event SCA forfeits or the City terminates the franchise pursuant to provisions in Section 2, Article V of this franchise, the City reserves the right to enter into negotiations for the purchase of the cable communications system, and applicable provisions of the Cable Communications Act (Section 627, Conditions of Sale) shall apply, but such right shall not be interpreted to exclude other parties from simultaneously entering into the negotiations for purchase of the cable system.

Section 5. Removal of Cable Television System

At the expiration of the term for which this franchise is granted, or any renewal, or upon its termination as provided, SCA may be required, upon notice by City to remove at its own expense all designated portions of the cable television system from all streets and public property within the City. If SCA fails to do so, City may perform the work at SCA's expense. A bond shall be furnished by SCA in an amount sufficient to cover this expense.

ARTICLE VI. EFFECT DATE

APPENDIX Technical Requirements

I. Technical Standards

The system will operate and be maintained to meet the highest standards required by law.

A. Standards:

B. Tests

1. SCA shall test the system in accordance with FCC recommended procedures good industry engineering practices. Tests will be conducted at 10 locations in the system.

- (a) Four at the end of the largest cascade in each of East, West, North and South directions from center.
- (b) Six random locations in the City.

(2) Compliance with performance specifications shall be determined from measurements and tests applied to the worst case; e.g., the signal received by the farthest subscriber, including distribution system and largest super trunk effort.

(3) The procedure shall be overseen by an engineer who shall certify the results in a report to the City. These tests shall apply to the performance in the fourth and eighth years.

Reagan favored in showdown on trade veto

WASHINGTON (AP) — Backers of comprehensive trade legislation headed into today's Senate showdown without enough votes to override President Reagan's veto, but they refuse to abandon hope for their 1,000-page bill.

Some, such as Sen. John Heinz, R-Pa., a strong supporter of the bill, say they still think a version acceptable to Reagan can be fashioned this session.

Senate Majority Leader Robert C. Byrd, D-W.Va., said Tuesday that the bill's "pulse is still beating," but there was nothing he could do to budge perhaps 36

senators prepared to sustain Reagan's veto.

Byrd told reporters there was still hope that home-state pressures would change a few minds at the last minute.

The House already has voted to override Reagan's veto. Senate failure to follow suit could doom trade legislation for the rest of 1988 and send some administration loyalists into fall campaigns with an Achilles heel on the issue.

"This veto is going to be used as a political issue this year; we all know that," Heinz warned his colleagues.

Some administration sup-

porters clearly would like another crack at the issue before November. The administration has been urging a scaled-down bill that would win the president's support. But Byrd has been warning that a fresh bill would be peppered with amendments and could become hopelessly bogged down.

The bill's chief provisions would overhaul the system under which the government imposes import curbs to aid U.S. industries and retaliate against international trade violations.

Other features range from a potential \$2 billion in agricultural

subsidies to repeal of the windfall profits tax on oil-industry earnings.

Reagan's May 24 veto focused on a provision that would require companies with 100 employees or

more to provide their workers with 60-day notice of plant closings and large-scale layoffs.
