## Motor Freight Warehouse Marks Progress For Olton

### OLTON YOUNGSTERS WILL GET SMALLPOX SHOTS THIS FRIDAY

Smallpox vaccinations for small fry Friday at Olton Memorial Hospital will highlight the Olton Parent-Teachers Association summer roundup health program.

Vaccinations will be given at 3 o'clock Friday afternoon at the hospital.

School children who have not yet been vaccinated for smallpox will be eligible for the shots. Inoculation will be given free of charge to children whose parents are not in a financial position to pay for them. A small charge to cover cost of the medicine will be made for the others.

The State Public Health Department will furnish the serum for those unable to pay.

Both school authorities and public health officials strongly recommend the vaccinations.

School officials say they are doubly advisable here because of the high percentage of itinerants in the community during the fall months. Migratory workers could conceivably bring in the germ which might start a smallpox epidemic if proper precautions are not taken, they say.

The grand jury last week interrogated 50 witnesses in the case and has employed a group of auditors to give the books another thorough check.

### Main Street Modernization Job To Start Soon, Chamber Told

"Our Main Street paving and curb and gutter work should get underway any day now," Basil Sherman told Chamber of Commerce members at their regular monthly meeting last Thursday night.

Mr. Sherman, C. of C. president, said he has been informed by Texas Highway Department officials that work here will begin following completion of a similar project at Friona. Friona work is in progress.

Plans call for 80-foot paving along Main Street from Highway 70 to the south end of Ol-

ton Memorial Hospital grounds. Curb and gutter will be installed along the entire route on both sides of the street.

Property owners along Main Street have already placed in escrow here the necessary funds for the curb and gutter work. Expense of the paving is to be borne by the state.

### WRECK KILLS OLTON MAN'S KIN TUESDAY

F. Bailey Roper, 53 years old, Tulla, brother of Ralph Roper of Olton, was killed Tuesday morning when the pick-up he was driving blew a front tire and went into Tule creek a mile south of Tulla.

Mr. Roper was dead on arrival at Swisher County Hospital in Tulla. His son, Roy, 12, and I. J. Treveno, an employee on the Roper farm, were in the pick-up. They suffered minor injuries.

At last report funeral arrangements were pending at Wallace Funeral Home in Tulla.

### Mayor Stresses Need Of Adequate Water Supply For Fire Fighting

"We want to re-emphasize that all watering of yards should be stopped immediately if there is a fire alarm," Mayor G. H. Bley said Tuesday.

Water pressure was somewhat better over the week-end, but it is still low and probably will continue low until the city's new water well is completed, Mayor Bley explained.

Peerless Pump Co. set the casing on the new 8-inch well last Thursday, and test pumping started Tuesday. The well should be in service within two weeks, the mayor says.

Meanwhile, city officials are asking continued cooperation from all city water users on the every-other-day irrigation plan which was started here during July.

Under terms of that plan, residents from Main Street west are being asked to irrigate only on odd-numbered calendar days . . . Aug. 11, 13, 15, etc. Residents from Main Street east are irrigating only on the even-numbered calendar days.

The restrictions do not apply to use of water within the house.

The irrigation restrictions were placed in effect primarily to assure an adequate reserve of water in event of possible fire.

Mayor Bley and city commissioners have said that the irrigation restrictions will be removed when the new well is completed and tied into city mains.

### Trustees Okay \$297,460 Budget For School Year

Olton school trustees Monday approved a budget of \$297,460 for the 1955-56 operation of the Olton Independent School District.

The budget is for the school fiscal year, which begins Sept. 1.

The new budget is approximately \$11,000 more than the \$286,490 budget under which the school district operated during 1954-55, it has been explained by Carl Macon superintendent of schools.

Biggest item in the budget is \$163,000 for teachers' salaries. Other big items include bonds (principal, interest and balance), \$32,677, and transportation, \$30,874.

Trustees also received bids on gasoline and oil for the 1955-56 term, and accepted the Texas Co. bid on gasoline, Supt. Macon said.

### Mexican Mission Is Remodeled

Remodeling of the Mexican Baptist Mission is almost completed, according to Rev. Glen Godsey, pastor.

The old windows have been torn out and new windows, at a lower position, have been put in their place. Also, stucco and paint jobs have been completed around the mission.

All the work was donated by members and friends.

The mission has been averaging 112 in the services.

### TWO HURT IN HART ACCIDENT

HART --- Buster Hacker suffered a broken arm and bruises and James Shepard suffered a broken hip and pelvis when the pick-up in which they were riding overturned Saturday.

They were reported to have been chasing rabbits on the cotton yard at Hart. Buster was hospitalized in Olton and James at Plainview.

Three others in the pick-up were not hurt.

### Thompsons Buy Gin Near Circle

Mr. and Mrs. George Thompson have bought half interest in the Simmons Gin, located five miles north of Circle.

Mr. and Mrs. Thompson moved here from Fredric, Okla., six weeks ago to take over the gin. Mr. Thompson has been in the ginning business for forty years.

The gin will be called Thompson Gin.

### Rural Telephone Subscribers Map Strategy Next Saturday

A meeting of rural telephone patrons has been called for 8 o'clock Saturday night at the city fire station to discuss strategy in the rate dispute with General Telephone Company of the Southwest.

The meeting was called by Horace Walker, head of the rural telephone committee.

Mr. Walker said he feels that rural subscribers have been given the "run around" by the company.

A sliding scale of rural rates went into effect on the August billing. Rates of \$5.00 per month are being charged for the first three miles distance from Olton city limits; \$5.25 for the next two

miles and \$5.50 for those living further than five miles out.

Rural subscribers have offered a compromise of \$5.00 flat on all rural telephones. General Telephone's Jim King has refused to negotiate.

"I fulfilled my obligation to meet with them before the rates went up and as far as I'm concerned that's the end of it," Mr. King declared.

Walker indicated that he favors a fight. "It looks like we ought to be entitled to the same rates as the city," he declared.

Rural subscribers have employed Potter & Gowdy law firm to represent them in the dispute.

### Faster Service Says Hub Motor Freight Owner

Olton will get a motor freight depot and warehouse.

This announcement came on Wednesday from Lewis Jackson of Amarillo who operates Hub Motor Line. Hub serves the Olton area.

Mr. Jackson said the Olton warehouse will serve as the break-over point for shipments out of Lubbock to Earth, Springlake, Hart, Dimmitt and Hereford.

He said the new facility probably will bring two new families to Olton.

Laing truck line out of Lubbock already has approval on direct trucking service between Lubbock and Olton.

Laing is operated by C. M. Laing and C. R. Givens of Lubbock.

A warehouse in Littlefield now is serving as the break-over point for this area.

Two Olton men, G. L. McKinzie and Wyman Blackwell, attended a Texas Railroad Commission hearing in Lubbock Tuesday to expedite the new trucking service.

Mr. Jackson said Laing was granted approval on the direct Lubbock-Olton service about a month ago.

"It's going to speed up deliveries both ways," Mr. Jackson declared.

Mr. Jackson said many deliveries will be made directly to the addressee in spite of the new warehousing facility here.

The new warehouse will be equipped with loading docks and beyond this description Mr. Jackson would not go. He said other details remain to be worked out.

### GRID DRILLS TO BEGIN AUGUST 22

Mustang football practice will begin Monday, Aug. 22, it was announced this week by Coach Joe Turner.

Workouts will be held on a two-per-day basis until the opening of school on Monday, Aug. 29, he explained.

The Mustangs will open their 1955 schedule on Sept. 9 at Abernathy. First home game is scheduled for Sept. 16, against Morton.

## Springlake Area Steeped In History

In spite of the fact that Springlake officially is the youngest town on the South Plains, that community is steeped in the history of this area.

Bustling little Springlake was incorporated only a few weeks ago but it already has lowered its oar into the stream of North Lamb County's progress and is pulling its own weight.

Springlake voters will go to the polls August 20 to vote on a \$50,000 water improvement proposal.

Springlake's mayor is V. T. Tanner, cotton buyer and insurance man. Aldermen are Jesse G. Watson, Hershall San-

ders, Grant Lott, Roy Byers and James Busby. Springlake has a population of about 200.

Springlake was founded by George G. Wright Land Company from Kansas City. It was called Punkin' Center. Its population was one family, the J. N. Bakers. Mr. Baker was a primitive Baptist preacher, farmer and merchant. He operated a general store in Punkin' Center and the finest pumpkins to be found were raised on his farm. Ernest Baker, who lives east of Springlake, is the son of J. N. Baker.

In Different Location Punkin' Center or Springlake was about 5 miles northwest of its present site. The first mail came to Springlake

on July 4, 1908. The mail came every other day out of Dimmitt. Arthur Edwards was the first mailman and he delivered the mail by horse and buggy.

Springlake post office was located about middle of the quarter that joins north of the old cemetery. That quarter was surveyed into town lots and the lots were sold to different people. Across from the post office, which was located in an old general store, was a hotel and school building built by the land company.

Punkin' Center was renamed Springlake after Springlake Ranch, a division of the XIT Ranch, which was in turn named after a spring-fed lake.

Land sold for approximately \$25 an acre.

In 1915, the population was 15. Lamb County's first election was held in Springlake.

First County Election Mrs. E. N. Burrus of Olton tells of how the men would go to the election and stay until the votes were counted—which would take several days. Mrs. Burrus said that the women, then, weren't allowed to go near the polls, so they stayed home and took care of the children.

Mr. Burrus would take a wagon-full of watermelons to the election, Mrs. Burrus explained, and the men would sit around and eat watermelons, exchange jokes and

talk politics. Reminiscing, Mrs. Burrus says that it would have been so nice if the women could have taken all the children and exchanged recipes and gossip.

N. E. Cleavinger and A. D. Fredrick were two who signed the Lamb County charter.

In 1927, W. C. White was postmaster and he moved the post office to its present site in 1932. He is still Springlake's postmaster.

Most material for building was hauled from Hereford and Friona, and later Plainview. Cotton was growing at Springlake in 1912 but it wasn't ginned. In 1923, there were several patches of cotton and they were ginned at Olton.

Threshed grain sorghum was first sold in 1914 and was hauled to Muleshoe. Norman Cleavinger tells of selling eggs in 1911 for as cheaply as two cents a dozen.

Church Organizations Four families have worshipped continuously with the Springlake Church of Christ for the past 27 years. They are the Cooper, Roach, Crawford, and the Starkey families.

The first meeting of the Springlake Church of Christ was held in the home of the Van Darne family.

The First Baptist Church of Springlake was formally organized on a Tuesday night, July 27, 1949. The meeting was

held in the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Clayton. The Baptists first met in the Primitive Baptist Church, then they erected a big tent and held their first revival.

The Springlake school was first established in 1908 by the George G. Wright Land Company. The first football team was organized in 1923 with only 12 men on the squad; that year they won three games, tied one, and lost five. A school paper, known as the "Siren", was also printed in 1928 and that year the band was organized.

Springlake school now has an enrollment of about 850 students and 35 teachers.

TO ALL QUALIFIED VOTERS OF THE TOWN OF SPRINGLAKE, TEXAS, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY IN SAID TOWN AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in the Town of Springlake, Texas, on the 20th day of August, 1955, in obedience to a resolution and order duly entered by the Town Council on the 2nd day of August, 1955, which is as follows:

#### RESOLUTION AND ORDER FOR TOWN BOND ELECTION THE STATE OF TEXAS TOWN OF SPRINGLAKE COUNTY OF LAMB

ON THIS, the 2nd day of August, 1955, the Town Council of the Town of Springlake, Texas, convened in Regular session, at the regular meeting place thereof in the Town Hall, there being present and in attendance the following members, to-wit:

and with the following absent: (none), constituting a quorum; and, among other proceedings had, were the following:

Alderman Busby introduced a resolution and order and moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Alderman Sanders. The motion, carrying with it the adoption of the resolution and

order, prevailed by the following vote:

AYES: Aldermen Watson, Sanders, Lott, Byers, and Busby.  
 NOES: None.

THE RESOLUTION AND ORDER is as follows:

WHEREAS, the Town Council of the Town of Springlake, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said Town for the purpose hereinafter mentioned; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF SPRINGLAKE, TEXAS:

I.

That an election be held on the 20th day of August, 1955, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this resolution and order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified electors of said Town who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

"SHALL the Town Council of the Town of Springlake, Texas, be authorized to issue FIFTY

THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$50,000)

of revenue bonds of said Town for the purpose of purchasing and constructing a Waterworks System in and for said Town; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed twenty (20) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed FIVE PER CENTUM (5%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; said bonds to be special obligations of the Town of Springlake, payable as to both principal and interest solely from the revenues of the Town's Waterworks System, and shall the Town Council of said Town be authorized to encumber the Town's Waterworks System, or the revenues thereof, or both, for the purpose of securing the payment of principal of and interest on said bonds, said encumbrance on said revenues to be an exclusive first lien on and pledge of said revenues, after deduction of the reasonable expenses of operating and maintaining said Waterworks System, as said expenses are defined by Statute?"

II.

That said election shall be held at the Office of V. T. Tanner, in the Town of Springlake, Texas, and the entire Town shall constitute one election precinct.

III.

That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election, to-wit: W. B. Braden, Presiding Judge Mildred Goforth, Judge John T. Williams, Clerk

IV.

That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified electors, who own taxable property in the Town, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

V.

That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V. A. T. S. Election Code, adopted by the Fifty-second Legislature in 1951, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF WATERWORKS SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS AND ENCUMBERING THE TOWN'S WATERWORKS SYSTEM, OR THE REVENUES THEREOF, OR BOTH, FOR THE PAYMENT OF SAME."

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF WATERWORKS SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS AND ENCUMBERING THE TOWN'S WATERWORKS SYSTEM, OR THE REVENUES THEREOF, OR BOTH, FOR THE PAYMENT OF SAME."

AS TO the foregoing proposition, each voter may mark out with black ink or pencil one of such expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote on the proposition, or, in the alternative, each voter may vote on the proposition by placing an "X" in the square appearing on the ballot beside the expression of his choice.

VI.

In the event the said revenue bonds are authorized to be issued by a majority of the qualified electors of said Town, vot-

ing at said election, and the same are issued and sold, the holder or holders of such bonds shall never have the right to demand payment thereof out of any funds raised or to be raised by taxation; and each bond issued or executed in pursuance of such election, shall contain this clause:

"The holder hereof shall never have the right to demand payment of this obligation out of any funds raised or to be raised by taxation."

VII.

That a copy of this resolution and order, signed by the Mayor of the Town and attested by the Town Secretary shall serve as proper notice of said election.

VIII.

That notice of said election shall be given by posting and publication of a copy of this resolution and order, at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS". Said notice shall be posted at three public places in said Town, one of which shall be the Town Hall not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation, published in the City of Olton, Texas, there being no newspaper of general circulation published in the Town of Springlake, Texas, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.

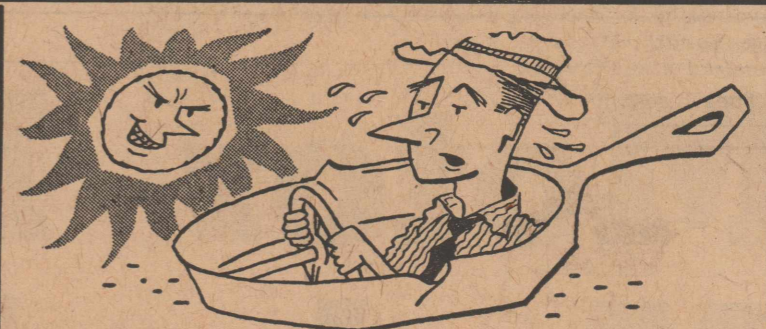

### Formal Opening Of Spotlight Cafe Slated This Saturday Afternoon

Formal opening of the Spotlight Cafe on Highway 70 has been set for 3 p.m. to 8 p.m. this Saturday, according to O. L. Crouch, owner.

"Work on the cafe is moving along on schedule, and unless something unexpected pops up, we'll be open by 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon," Mr. Crouch said.

Free coffee and doughnuts will be served during the formal opening hours.

The Spotlight Cafe occupies the building formerly occupied by West Side Laundry.

Crouch has launched an extensive remodeling program on the building, and says, "We will have a cafe which is modern in every respect."

The cafe features a 23 by 31-foot dining area with five booths, four tables, and 10 stools at the counter. Seating capacity is 46. The kitchen is 14 by 19

feet, and there is a 14 by 14 storage room.

"We have the latest in modern equipment," Mr. Crouch said. "All fixtures will be new. Booths and upholstery will be in black and coral. We have refrigerated milk dispenser, and all stainless steel equipment behind the counter."

There will be individual lighting for each booth, wall boxes for the nickelodeon, and modern air conditioning throughout.

Restrooms are situated on the west side of the building.

LEGAL NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 77

AN ORDINANCE declaring it to be unlawful for any person to ignite and burn trash, debris, or other combustible materials upon any premises in the City of Olton in such a manner that endangers any property or buildings; declaring it to be unlawful for any person to ignite and burn trash, debris or other combustible materials within fifty (50) feet from any building and Two Hundred (200) feet from any building selling, containing, storing, or using any combustible liquid or material unless said trash, debris, or other combustible material is burned in a closed incinerator; declaring that all stoves or heaters connected to a plug or other outlet must be connected by copper tubing; declaring that all two (2) story buildings shall have and provide a fire escape; providing that no flammable liquid with flash point below 100 degrees F. be used in any garage unless in a special closed machine or a separate approved room; providing penalties; and repealing all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith.

WHEREAS, the indiscriminate burning of trash and other combustible materials upon open premises within the limits of the City of Olton consisting a condition detrimental to the health, safety, morals and general welfare of the people, and constitutes a hazard to surrounding property; and, WHEREAS, there is no adequate valid ordinance covering this subject, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF OLTON, TEXAS

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to knowingly ignite and burn, or knowingly cause to be ignited and burned, any trash, debris or other combustible materials upon any premises within the limits of the City of Olton in such a manner that endangers any property or buildings.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to knowingly ignite and burn or knowingly cause to be ignited and burned, any trash, debris or other combustible materials upon any premises within the limits of the City of Olton within Fifty (50)

feet of any building unless said trash, debris or other combustible materials be burned in a closed incinerator, and within Two Hundred (200) feet of any building, selling, containing, storing, or using any combustible material unless said trash, debris or other combustible materials be burned in a closed incinerator.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any person to connect any stove or heater to a plug or other outlet in any house, building, or other edifice within the limits of the City of Olton by means of a rubber or plastic hose. All stoves shall be connected to plugs or other outlets by copper tubing.

Section 4. Each owner, board, commission, official or person having charge or supervision of any Two (2) Story building located within the City Limits of the City of Olton shall provide and maintain an adequate fire escape. An "adequate fire escape" within the meaning of this title, is defined to be an exterior iron, steel or concrete stairway type fire escape, or an exterior iron or steel straight chute type fire escape, or an exterior iron or steel spiral chute type fire escape, or a combination of said three types, or an interior type fire escape enclosed with non combustible material and having self-closing fireproof shutters on all door and window openings thereof. Each type of such fire escapes shall be so constructed and arranged as to permit exit upon such fire escape from each floor of the building above the first floor and shall provide continuous egress upon it from such building to grade, and the material, construction, erection and test of such fire escapes shall comply at least with the minimum specifications for each respective type thereof.

Section 5. No flammable liquid with flash point below 100 degrees F. shall be used in any garage for washing parts or removing grease or dirt, unless in a special closed machine approved for the purpose, or in a separate room enclosed by walls having a fire resistance rating of not less than two hours, with openings therein protected by approved fire doors or fire windows, and with no opening from such room to any upper or lower story.

Section 6. Any person convicted of violating any Section or part of Section 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 shall, upon conviction, be fined in any sum not exceeding Two Hundred and No/100 (\$200.00) Dollars.

Section 7. All Ordinances and parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are repealed.

LEGAL NOTICE ORDINANCE NO. 79

AN ORDINANCE to regulate the prevention of fire in the City of Olton in places of public assemblage; fixing penalties for violation hereof; repealing all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF OLTON, TEXAS:

Section 1. All doors, aisles and passageways within and leading into or out of places of assembly within the City of Olton shall be kept free from easels, signs, standards, campstools, chairs, people, sofas, benches and any other article that might obstruct or delay the exit of the audience, congregation or assemblage during the entire time during which any show, performance, service, exhibitions, lecture, concert, ball or other assemblage may be held. Clear passage from all exits and on sidewalks must at all times be maintained outside of all places of assembly. No aisle, passageway or stairway in any store shall be obstructed with tables, show cases, or other obstruction during hours said store is open to the public.

Section 2. Any person convicted of violating any part of Section 1 hereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than Ten (\$10.00) Dollars and not more than Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars.

Section 3. All Ordinances and parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are repealed.

LEGAL NOTICE ORDINANCE NO. 78

AN ORDINANCE to better protect the City from the dangers of fires and to forbid obstructions on the streets and alleys to that end; fixing penalties for violation hereof; repealing all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF OLTON, TEXAS:

Section 1. Within the fire limits of this City, as now existing and established, or that may be hereafter established, no person shall:

- (a) Place, leave or cause to be placed, left, or put any box, barrel, or receptacle, or construct any frame, shed, house or pen in any alley; (b) Stand, place or park, or cause to be stood, placed or parked, any vehicle unless the same be actually then loading or unloading, for a longer period of time than fifteen minutes; (c) Place any trash, wood, paper or rubbish in any alley; (d) Kindle or maintain any bonfire or authorize any such fire to be kindled or maintained on or in any street, alley, road, land or public grounds or upon any private lot, unless a written permit so to do shall first have been secured from the Fire Chief or Fire Marshal. (e) Deposit ashes, smoldering coal or embers, greasy or oily substances or other matters liable to create spontaneous ignition within ten feet of any wooden or plastered wall, partition, fence, floor, sidewalk, lumber, hay, shavings, rubbish

or other combustible materials, except in metallic or other non-combustible receptacles. Such receptacles, unless resting on a non-combustible floor or on the ground outside the building, must be placed on non-combustible stands, and in every case must be kept at least two feet away from any combustible wall or partition.

(f) Permit to remain upon any roof or in any court, yard, vacant lot or open space, any accumulation of waste paper, hay, grass, straw, weeds, litter or combustible or flammable waste or rubbish of any kind. All weeds, grass, vines or other growth, when same endangers property, or is liable to be fired, shall be cut down and removed by the owner or occupant of the property it is on.

(g) Use any cotton batting, straw, dry vines, leaves, trees, celluloid or other highly flammable materials for decoration purposes in show windows or stores without permit, provided, however, that nothing in this section shall be held to prohibit the display of saleable goods permitted and offered for sale in the store. Electric light bulbs in stores or public halls shall not be decorated with paper or other combustible materials unless such materials shall first have been rendered flameproof.

(h) Take into any building, barn, vessel, boat or any other place where highly flammable, combustible or explosive material is kept, an open flame unless such light or flame shall be well secured in a glass globe, wire mesh cage or similar approved device.

Section 2. Any person convicted of violating any part of Section 1 hereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than Ten (\$10.00) Dollars and not more than Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars.

Section 3. All Ordinances and parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are repealed.

### Hogs May Answer Milo Problems

Hogs may be the answer to the milo marketing problem that is puzzling Olton farmers with a bumper crop in prospect, declares Don Spain who operates Olton Farm Supply.

Don said the West is in deficit by some 7 million head of hogs this year.

He pointed out that modern feeding supplements have placed milo in almost the same category with corn as a hog fattener.

Probable support price on milo this year is \$1.78 per hundred weight. He said 305 pounds of milo and 45 pounds of good supplement will produce about 100 pounds of pork. Figuring hogs at \$18 per hundred weight, this would more than double the price realized for the milo marketed in this way.

Spain also pointed out that the farmer with a bumper crop of milo on hand can get into the hog business with only a small cash outlay.
