Olton Chamber Offers Cash Prize For Community's First 1955 Bale

Olton Chamber of Commerce will offer a cash prize for the first bale of cotton to be ginned here again this year.

President Basil Sherman is in the process of collecting the prize money.

The first bale will be processed free of charge and the gin which gins it will pay 50 cents a pound for the lint cotton.

Following are rules for the first bale:

1. First bale to be weighed in at any gin in Olton, provided that the bale gins out 450 pounds gross weight.

2. The cotton must be grown in the Olton trade area.

3. The cotton must belong to one man.

4. The farmer cannot be a first bale winner in another area.

The cash premium is to be given in addition to all premium offered by the gin which gins the first bale.

Mr. Sherman believes that the first bale may be ginned by Sept. 10, which is next Saturday. Ginmen say cotton is a little later but is just as loaded as the crop last year.

The first bale of cotton ginned here last year was brought in by W. J. Boykin and T. J. Roberson, from their partnership farm on the Nell Crawford place 6 miles southeast of Olton.

The farmers received a \$300 bonus from the Chamber of Commerce.

Seven Day Mail Service Gets Underway

Seven day a week mail service and prompt delivery to Springlake and Earth has been inaugurated in Olton.

The better mail service was brought about by a new 43.9 mile route between Plainview and Earth. Carrying mail on the route is Clifford Cook of Dimmitt.

Olton Postmaster I. B. Holt said first mail now arrives at 7:15 o'clock in the morning instead of at 9:30 as formerly.

The last dispatch of mail formerly was at 3 o'clock in the afternoon and now is at 5:30.

On holidays and Sundays mail arrives at 7:15 o'clock and is dispatched at 10:30 o'clock.

Water Saving Method Under Study Here

Members of Lamb County Soil Conservation District were to meet at the E. C. Jones farm east of Olton and then tour the Olton area.

One of the major points of interest will be the Jones farm itself where Mr. Jones pioneered a water conservation method this year by pumping lake water into two irrigation wells.

Mr. Jones later used the wells for irrigation. They suffered no ill effects. Mr. Jones saved 120 acre feet of lake water and made 40 acres of flooded farm land tillable by this method.

The group was scheduled to meet at 9 o'clock. They were to make four or five stops during the morning and were to wind up at noon at the school cafeteria.

Lunch was to be provided for them by Olton State Bank.

Thurlo Branscom, county chairman, will act as master of ceremonies and W. C. Howard, area director from Quanah, will be principal speaker.

On the afternoon tour the group will see cotton following alfalfa, cotton following blue panic grass, cotton following improved pasture and fertilized cotton.

They will see 20-inch row grain sorghum and cotton. The group will hold an irrigation field trial on the Jones place.

They will see weeping love grass and then see sesame growing on the Don Spain farm. They will observe Arizona Cypress on the Mardema Ogletree farm.

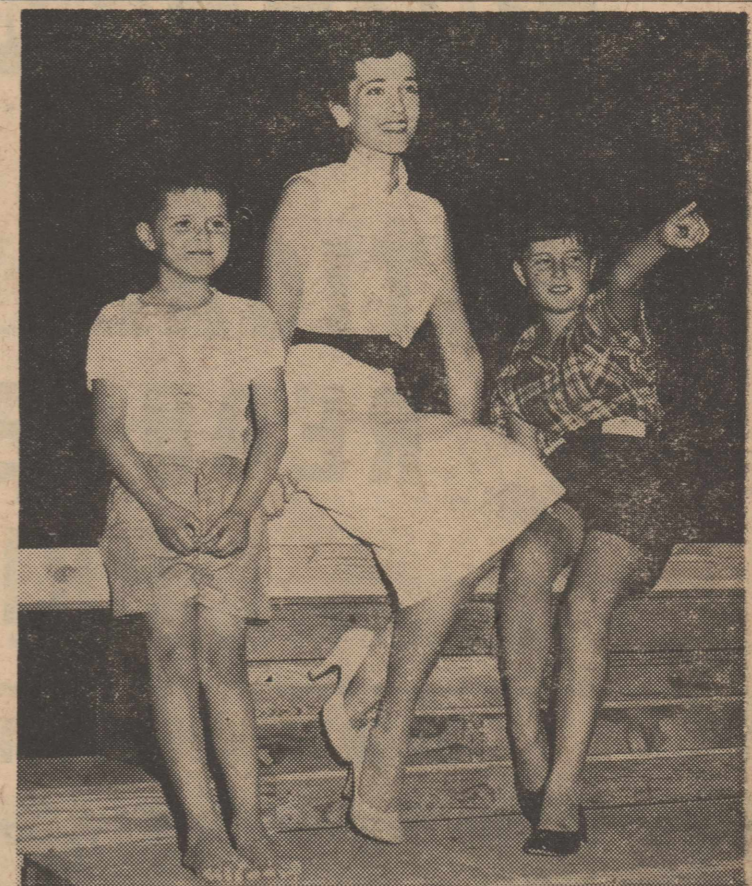

Mustang Gridders Underdogs For Season Opener Against Abernathy

The Olton Mustangs will open their 10-game 1955 schedule this Friday with an away-from-home contest against the highly-regarded District 5-AA Abernathy Antelopes.

Kickoff time at Abernathy Stadium will be 8 p. m.

The Mustangs, long on spirit but short on experience, enter the fray as definite underdogs.

OHS Coach Joe Turner has only one regular—right end Donald Powell—back from last season. It's a different story in the Abernathy camp, where Coach Royal James has eight regulars returning from his 1954 squad which tied Tahoka for

the 5-AA championship.

Good Running Back

Abernathy's returnees include quarterback Freddie Apperson and Fullback Roy Sons. Sons, a powerfully-built senior, is being touted as one of the best running backs in this area.

Slated to see lots of defensive duty are James Ray Hyatt and Roy LaDuke as linebackers. Clyde Rhodes and James Carson at tackles, Danny Cure at guard, and John Jefferies at defensive end.

Stewart and Hyatt have been on the injured list, and neither is expected to be a full strength for Abernathy.

The Antelopes are expected to operate from the split-T, and probably will stick pretty much to a running game. Olton will operate from the Michigan State

T, with frequent shifts into single wing. Turner has hinted broadly that the Mustangs probably will use the air lanes more than they did last year. Estes and Johnson are expected to share the passing assignments.

"It is a squad with practically no experience, but the boys have excellent attitude and spirit," Coach Turner told Quarterback Club members Monday night. "They have been working hard, and they are taking the game seriously. They can make a game of it against Abernathy if they don't let first game stagefright get the best of them."

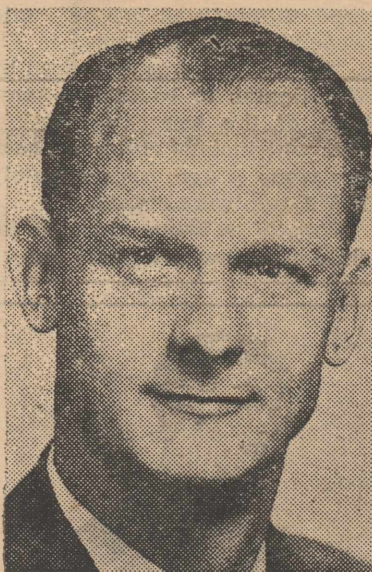

Janelle Miller-Charlotte Gibson Win Sewing Contest; National Contest Next

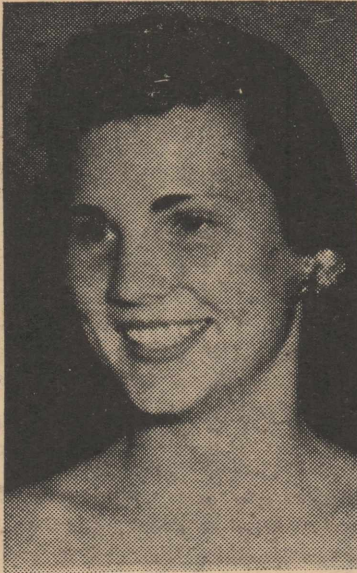

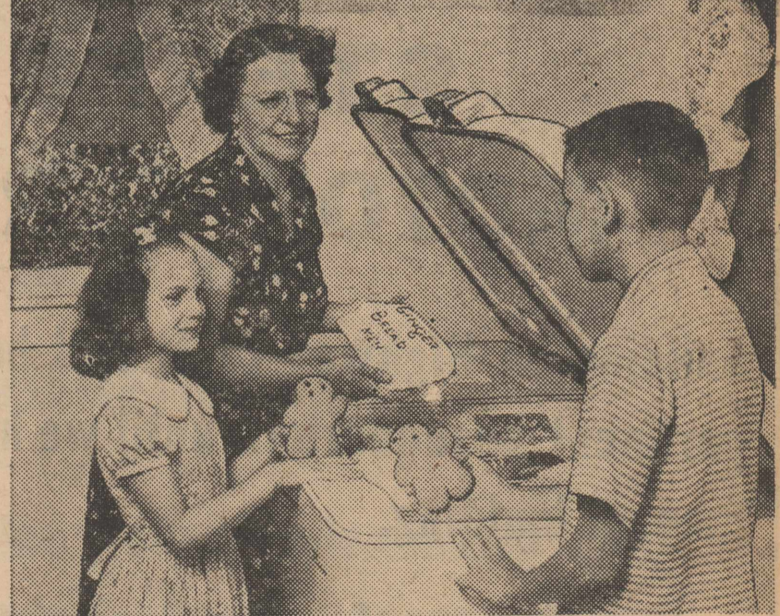

It's a smart woman who, early in the fall, if not before—prepares and freezes traditional foods, novel snacks and special treats that will help make her holiday season a more comfortable and leisurely time of year.

Realizing what a great time saver the freezer can be, Mrs. Oscar Detten, who lives on her farm seven miles northeast of Amarillo, prepares and freezes most of the food for her Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners in September. She already has her pies, breads, cakes, vegetables and turkey in her freezer awaiting the busy days ahead.

Dressing, or stuffing for poultry, should not be made until you are ready to roast the bird, however. Coffee cakes and cinnamon rolls from the freezer make for more festive breakfasts and most welcome Christmas gifts.

"You can hardly think of Christmas candies without including Christmas cookies in the same thought—so," says Mrs. Detten, "while you're in the mood, freeze some of both. Save some of the gingerbread men and fancy cookies to decorate the Christmas tree. Make up some strings of cranberries for the same purpose and freeze them too."

A supply of hamburger patties and buns stored in the freezer will be another welcome answer to the cry of hungry holiday guests. Mrs. Detten knows the importance of proper packaging of foods for her freezer. She carefully packages foods in moisture-vapor-proof material so that they will be just as good when she takes them out as they were the day she put them into her freezer.

If you'll try some of the ideas given here, you'll have an easier and more enjoyable holiday season. "You can't really know the continuous satisfaction that a food freezer gives until you've owned one!" says Mrs. Detten.

Mr. Price is majoring in religious education and music in his minor.

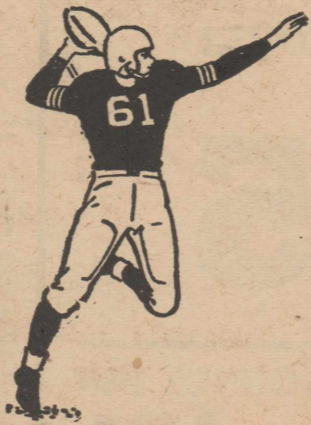

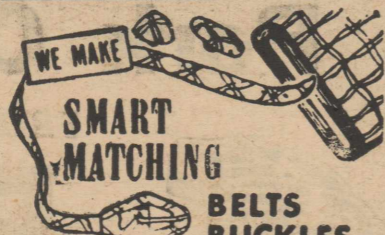

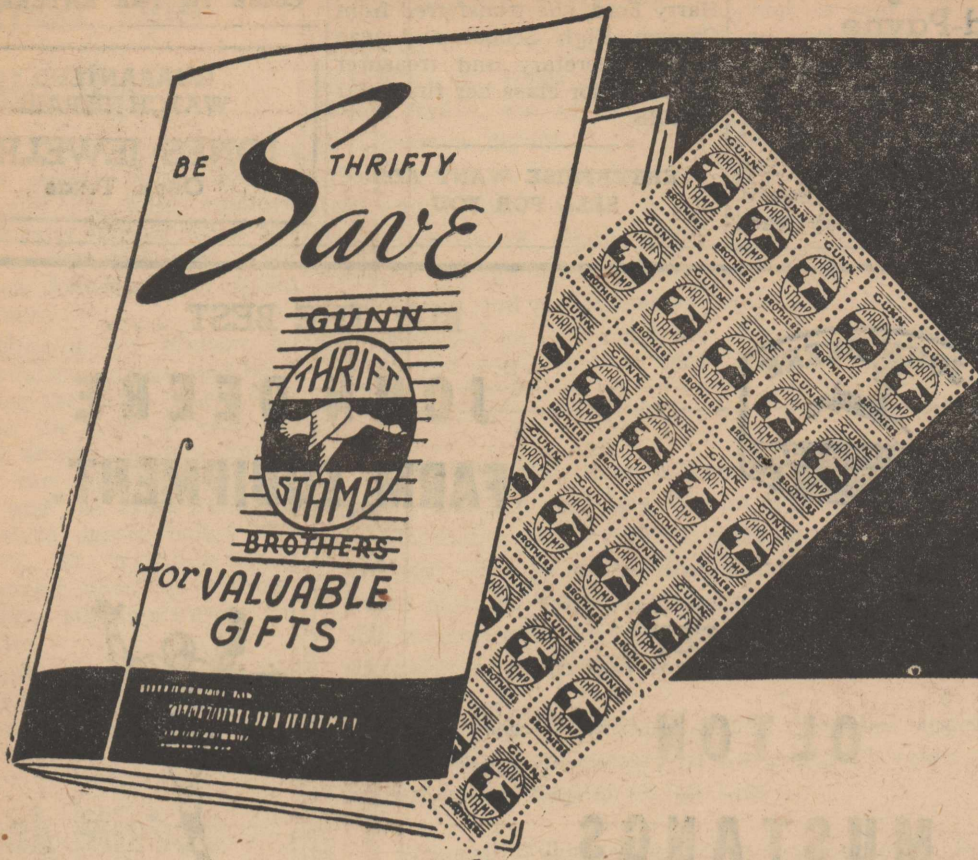

In the first half New Home made five first downs as compared to two by the hometowners; 183 yards rushing as compared to Hart's 41. In the final half New Home collected 115 rushing and only two first downs while Hart picked up 137 yards on the ground and five first downs.

Time and again the Longhorns pulled the Leopards out of kilter with their passing attack and spread the visitors all over the playing field. The Longhorns' lack of experience robbed them of the benefit of this psychological advantage.

James Holloway carried four times for Hart for an average of 11.6 yards a try and Aven carried 10 times for 9.5 a try.

It was Hart's first time to play football of any kind and New Home's first eleven-man game. New Home formerly played six-man ball.

Coach Paul Boswell will lose only two boys from his squad this year. If their first outing is any omen, a year of experience should make Hart's Longhorns one of the roughest teams in their Class B league.

The Longhorns travel to Ropes next Friday for a non-conference encounter there. A scheduled game with Hale Center Sept. 23 has been cancelled.

Will Enroll In Texas Tech

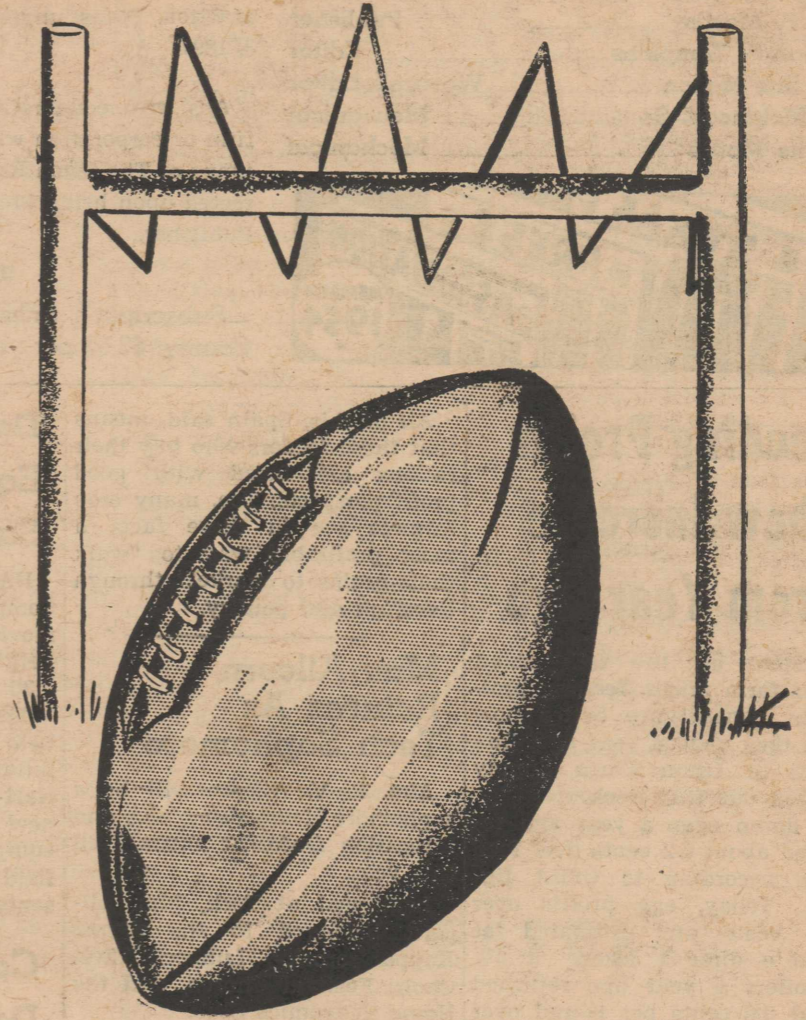

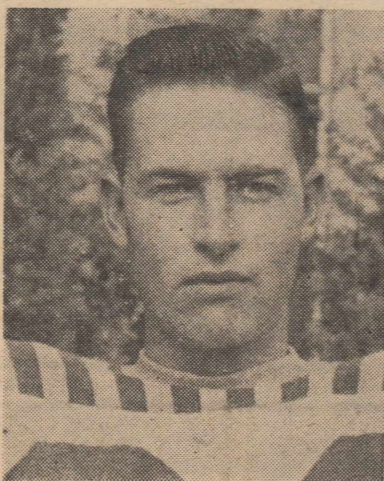

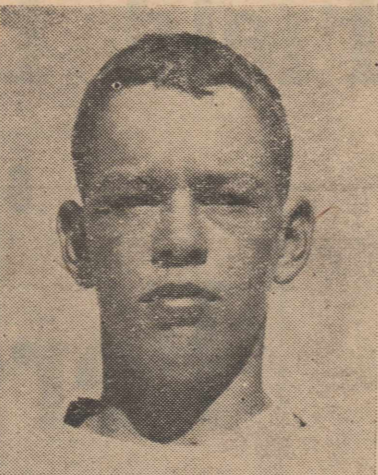

Feeding Profits Show Increase From Year Ago

Despite all the talk about lower farm prices, feeding profits in general are better now than they were a year ago, Don Spain of Olton Farm Supply pointed out this week.

A dozen eggs a year ago returned about 6.2 cents over feed costs, according to USDA figures. Today, egg profits over feed costs are estimated at about a dime a dozen.

Broilers a year ago returned about 8.6 cents per pound over feed costs, compared with 11 cents today, Spain said.

Milk and hog returns are up similarly.

All of this, Spain said, means that those feeders who buy their rations are faced with good profit prospects. Too, many crop farmers see in these facts a most profitable way to "walk their grains to market" through livestock and poultry.

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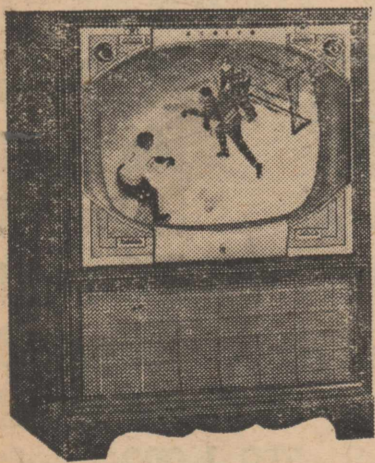
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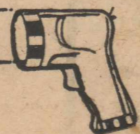
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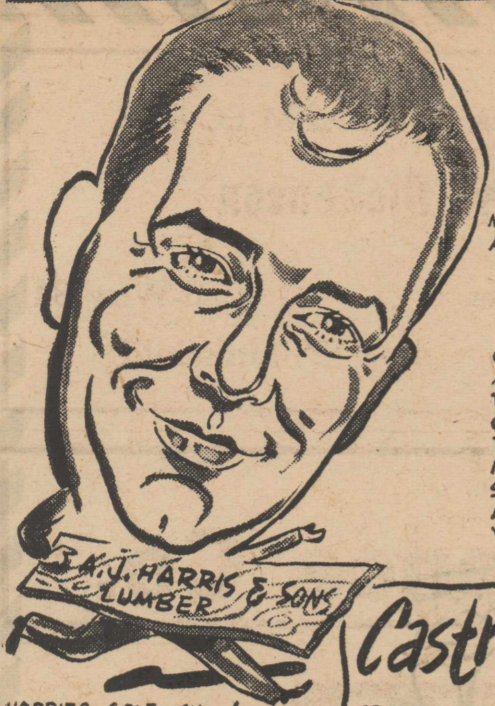


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OFFICIAL BULLETIN ON CASTOR BEANS

Grain producers and handlers are warned that any food or feed grains contaminated with castor beans or pieces of beans will be graded sample grade with a corresponding drop in value.

During the past few weeks several carloads of grain sorghum coming from areas where castor beans have been grown has been given the sample grade. Extension Agronomist Ben R. Spears has been told by W. J. Funchess, Federal grain supervisor for the USDA's Galveston District, that grain inspectors have very definite instructions on grading such contaminated lots of grain.

Their instructions are . . . "If a lot of grain contains castor beans or pieces of castor beans then the lot should be graded sample grade." Funchess stated further that an inspector or supervisor would need only to be assured of the presence of the castor beans or pieces to down-grade the lot of grain. Castor beans contain a deadly poisonous protein and a very potent allergen.

Spears says the alkaloid poison is known as ricin and is found not only in the beans but also in the stems and leaves of the castor bean plant. Therefore, none of the plant should be allowed to contaminate feed or food grains.

Ridding fields of volunteer plants does not usually present a serious problem since the plants are easily killed by cultural methods. But if plants are present in a grain sorghum field, they should be removed from the field before the crop is harvested, says the agronomist.

Furthermore, he says, all combines, storage facilities and other equipment used in handling castor beans should be thoroughly cleaned before being used in connection with grain harvesting.

Methods, he adds, have been developed for detecting the presence of castor bean plant material in ground feeds as well as the whole grain.

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
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


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
