Carl Swerdna "Tabe" Clark, 67 years old, Olton farmer for many years, died at 5:15 o'clock Saturday morning following a heart attack.


Mr. Clark had been in ill health most of the summer. He apparently felt better Thursday and Friday and then became violently ill early Saturday morning.
