SHORT GRASS

Dove hunting, which has been underway for a couple of weeks now, has been fairly good in this area. I have been out three times with no particular success, but Major James, Brent Burrow, Jack Straw and other more experienced hunters have reported limits on several occasions.

Best dove hunting seems to be in big sunflower patches. Doris McGill and my favorite brunette were cleaning a few doves the other night, and all of the birds were full of sunflower seeds. If they don't get the best of you, you can usually scare up plenty of doves by trekking through some sunflowers.

And don't be discouraged if your shooting percentage isn't good. A recent report of hitting averages by North Carolina hunters gives these figures: 22 hunters fired 452 shells to get 88 doves. That's an average of slightly over five shells per dove.

Dove season in this zone will continue to Oct. 15. The bag and possession limit is 10, and shooting hours are noon to sunset.

The quail season will be December 1-January 16 under general state law.

The duck season in Texas probably will open Nov. 2 and end Jan. 15, according to Howard Dodgen, executive secretary of the Texas Game and Fish Commission.

Abernathy Thwarts Mustangs, 13-0 In Hard-Fought Season Opener

The Abernathy Antelopes capitalized on experience and some fancy scampering by Quarterback Freddie Apperson to punch out a 13-0 win over the Olton Mustangs before a capacity audience Friday night in the Antelope Stadium.

Apperson set the stage for the first Antelope tally late in the second quarter when he pegged a 20-yard aerial to Halfback Billy Gist that moved the ball to the Olton 18. Five plays later, Apperson swept his own right end for 7 yards to score.

The touchdown climaxed a 65-yard drive with Apperson's off-tackle slants accounting for the biggest chunks of yardage. Abernathy's point-after-touchdown try was unsuccessful, and the half ended one play after the ensuing kickoff.

Muff Big Chance

The Mustangs muffed a golden scoring opportunity early in the second half. Apperson, returning Bobby Johnson's kickoff to open the half, was hit hard by Donald Powell, fumbled, and Olton recovered at the Antelope 22.

Short gains by Jackie Gray and Jack Roye Straw eked out a first down at the Antelope 10. Then on the next play, an attempted handoff from Quarterback Teddy Estes went awry, and the Antelope Tackle Jesse Ramos pounced on the loose ball to thwart the Mustang drive. It was the deepest penetration of the night for Olton.

Intercept Pass

The Antelopes notched their final tally with only three minutes left in the big affair again this year.

The Detroit Tigers' Al Kaline, who seems a virtual cinch to win the American League batting championship this year, is only 20 years old. Wonder how good this boy will be when he gets a little experience?

During the 1954 football season, the 10 opponents of the Olton Mustangs accounted for only 113 points, an average of 11.3 points per game. The hustle displayed against Abernathy by the Mustang defensive unit leads this writer to believe that the current squad may compile an even better defensive record. You can count on it that no 1955 opponent is going to roll up 47 points, as Sundown did last year.

The Antelopes, who were victimized by bad breaks in their 21-0 loss to the Mustangs here last year, got advantage of most of the breaks this time. Coach Royal James' 5-AA aggregation recovered three Mustang fumbles and intercepted two Olton passes. Four of these breaks came in the second half.

Spirit Aplenty

Olton's line, with only one regular back from last year, displayed spirit aplenty, time and again breaking through to drop Antelope backs for sizeable losses.

Inability of the Mustang offense to gain appreciable yardage bottlenecked the local cause. The Mustangs picked up only 37 yards net rushing and added another 24 yards through the air on a pair of completions by Wally Stewart for a net offense of 61 yards.

The Antelopes got a net 184 yards on the ground and 20 through the air for a mediocre offense figure of 204 yards for their night's work.

The Antelopes carved out the win without their services of their stellar groundgainer, Fullback Roy Sons, who was injured in a practice session early last week.

Carlton Ashley, Donald Powell, Harold Eby, John Jefferies and Clyde Rhodes turned in stout defensive performances for Olton.

Spur slapped Matador to the tune of 41 to 6. Matador is reported to have a strong Class B team.

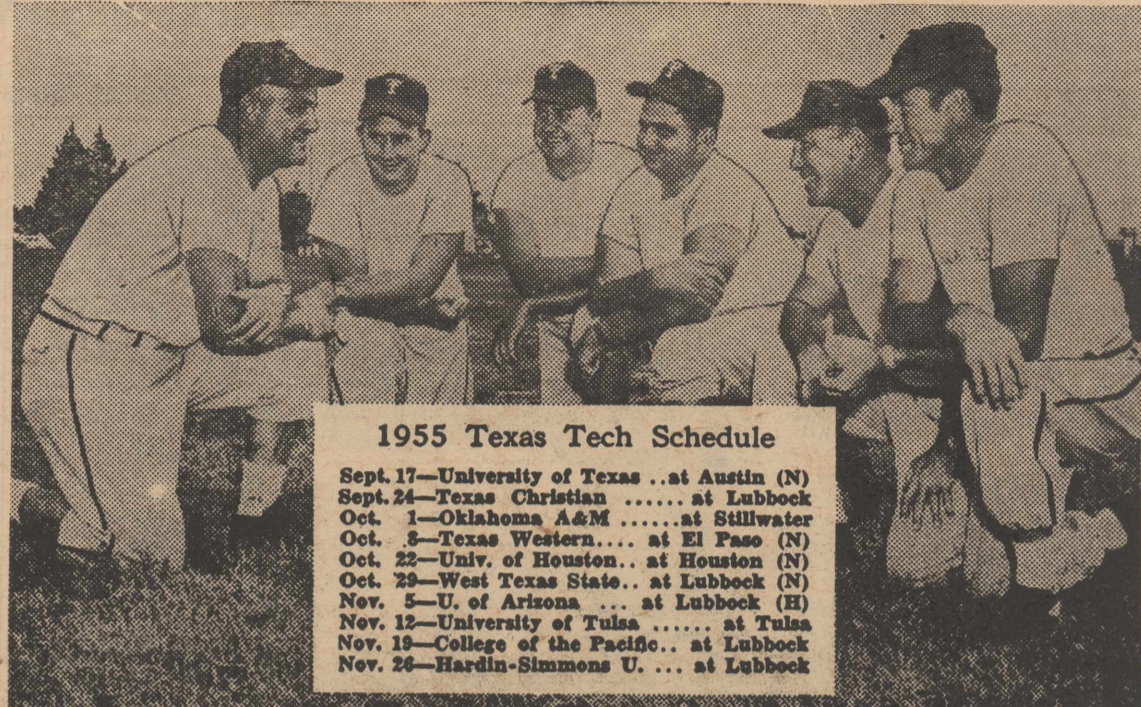
Spur fullback Eddie Hagen carried the load for the Spur club. He scored two touchdowns and then set up a third with a 42 yard run.

Tuesday's meeting was chiefly a school of instruction on P.T.A. work.

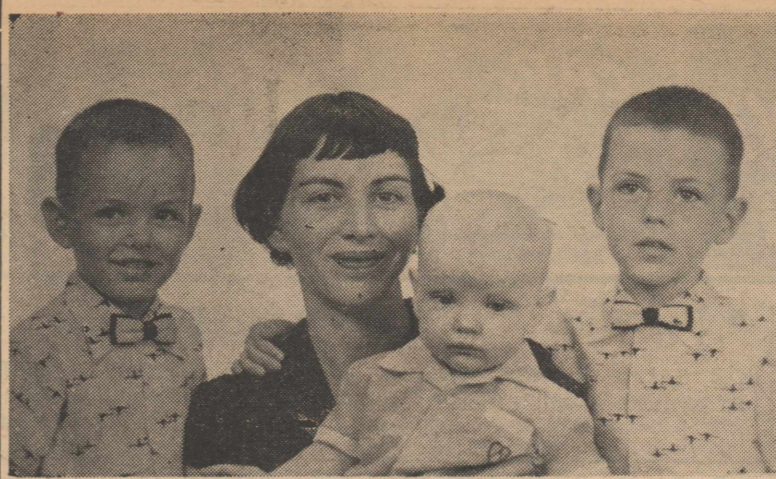

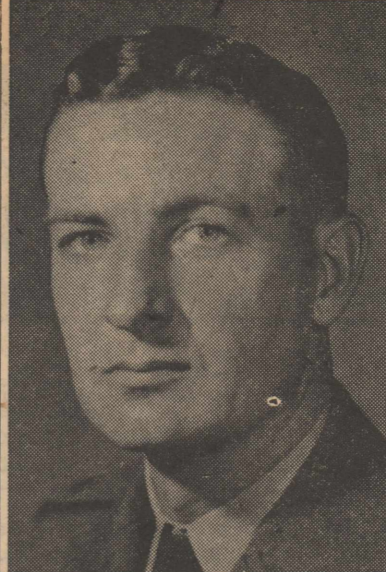
