# Hearing Scheduled On County Pay Hikes Friday

## SO THE PEOPLE MAY KNOW—

Friday morning Lamb County commissioners will hold a public hearing on a proposed pay hike.

We congratulate the commissioners for holding such a hearing. Too many of our elected representatives have lately been meeting behind closed doors and spending public money without informing their constituents.

Now to get down to the meat of the matter. We definitely believe that the pay increases are in order and should become effective Jan. 1, 1957.

We most certainly are opposed to any raise during the current term of office of incumbent county officials.

This is our reason. Officials in the offices affected are elective and knew what their salaries would be before they ran for the offices.

Also, \$7,500—proposed salary for the county judge—is pretty good money and should entitle Lamb County to the undivided attention of the holder of that office.

At \$7,500 a year, the judge would be drawing \$25 a day if he took off only for Thanksgiving and Christmas and neglected to take a vacation. We don't think this is too much but we do think that he should give us 100 percent of his attention.

The same goes for the county attorney who will be drawing \$6,000 under the new schedule. His office certainly should not be used as a private law office. (Let us hasten to say that this is not meant to insinuate that either the incumbent county judge or the incumbent county attorney actually are using their offices in such a manner. We believe that both men are conscientious office holders who are giving Lamb County their very best.)

We certainly think that the county commissioners should be worth \$5,100 a year and their \$600 car allowance. But we believe that at such a salary they should maintain some semblance of an office in the major town or village of their precinct and devote their full time to administration of the county's business.

## HIKES MAY BEGIN IN OCTOBER

Public hearing on proposed salary hikes for county officials will be held at 10 o'clock Friday morning at the county court house in Littlefield.

Proposed increases range up to \$2,400 a year.

County Judge Bob Kirk said it is his understanding that the salary raises if passed probably would become effective as of Oct. 1.

The county judge said arrangements for meeting the salary hikes were made in the budget adopted by the commissioners court at that group's meeting in August.

He said law which went into effect in September set up new maximum salaries for county employes.

## Gate Receipts Below Average

Gate receipts have been low for both the Morton and Slaton football games here the past two week-ends, Supt. Carl Macon pointed out this week.

Net gate receipts for the Morton game amounted to \$688, and were \$699 for the Slaton game, Mr. Macon reported.

Participating schools share equally in the gate receipts; so Olton's share of the Morton and Slaton games was \$343 and \$349.50, respectively.

"Olton people turned out well for both games, but we had only a handful of Morton and Slaton fans," the superintendent said.

Paid attendance for Olton's opener at Abernathy was \$1181.

## Enterprise Acquires Building Site; Announces New Line of Merchandise

The Olton Enterprise has purchased two 25-foot lots just south of Legion Hall and just across the street from Olton High School.

The Enterprise acquired the lots from J. H. Sauter of Santa Fe, N. M.

Troy Martin, publisher of the Olton newspaper, said his firm will erect a modern newspaper plant and stationery store on the site some time in the future.

"We don't know exactly when we will begin the building," Martin declared this week. "We have remodeled the front of our present quarters and are experimenting in retail of stationery, office supplies and office machines.

"We want to see how much demand there is in Olton for these items so we will better be able to tell how much room to allow for them in the new building."

The Enterprise this year has stocked a complete line of school supplies and has on hand a representative line of office supplies.

Martin also announced active dealership for Remington Rand typewriters and adding machines and Cole Steel, Haskell and Anderson Hickey office fixtures.

Martin said the Enterprise will concentrate on supplying farmers of this area with the lower priced models of the Remington Rand adding machine. These machines are the finest made and are ideal for use in totaling cotton weights.

The Enterprise also will handle the Montague line of fine social stationery. Monogramming and printing of social stationery and napkins also is available in The Enterprise commercial printing shop which is operated in conjunction with the remainder of the business, Martin said.

"Our boys are coming along in good shape, and they have as good a spirit as any team I have ever coached," Coach Turner said. "I believe we will be able to make a ball game of it for Dumas."

Supt. of Schools Carl Macon explained that Olton has scheduled Abernathy, Floydada and Littlefield as the first three non-conference football games for next year.

New QB Club members are Eldon Franks, V. Y. Jefferies and Gene Trotter. QB Club membership cards this year are being sold for \$10 each. The club has 36 members, and a drive to enroll more members is underway at this time.

## Unbeaten Dumas Heavily Favored Over Invading Mustangs Friday

The Olton Mustangs face a man-sized assignment when they travel to Dumas this Friday for an 8 p. m. non-conference engagement with the unbeaten District 1-AA Demons.

Olton is a definite underdog for the contest with Dumas, which apparently has fielded its best eleven in recent years.

The Demons opened their season on Sept. 9 with a 58-7 shellacking of Quanah, edged Palo Duro High School of Amarillo 12-6 the following week-end, then upset Plainview High School last Friday night, 21-13.

**Last Year In AA**

This is the last year that Dumas will participate in Class AA, and the Demons have been accorded the dark horse role in District 1-AA this year, being rated only slightly less potent than powerful Phillips. Both Dumas and Phillips will com-

pete next year in Class 1-AAA, along with Hereford, Levelland and Littlefield.

Jeff Smart, Mustang assistant coach, scouted Dumas in its win over Plainview last week, and reported to Quarterback Club members Monday night that the Demons have "a big, fast club with a good passing attack and an excellent defense."

**Olton Outweighed**

"We'll be outweighed some 15-25 pounds per man," Smart commented.

The Mustangs will enter the fray without any serious injuries, and Coach Joe Turner is expected to use pretty much the same starting line-up that he employed in last Friday's 32-6 win over Slaton.

The Demons finished with a so-so 4-4-2 record last year, and they have been waiting for this year. The rebuilding program

started last year after only two regulars returned to the 1954 squad.

## Experienced Team

Thirteen lettermen returned this season, along with six regulars. The Demons use the Michigan State multiple offense, going into the unbalanced line and T formation and then shifting into the single wing or running from the T.

The Demon starting backfield Friday night probably will consist of quarterback Gary Ward, 165-pound junior; tailback Jim Boxwell, 155-pound junior; fullback Jim Tiner, 155-pound junior, and wingback Jack Jameson, 140-pound senior.

The Demon line is one of the heaviest in years. Charles Flanagan, senior center, is the heaviest at 220 pounds while junior tackle Jim Davis weighs 200. Both are regulars.

Mr. and Mrs. Hicks are at Roswell for funeral services which will be held at College Avenue Church of Christ in Roswell at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon. Mr. Rae was an elder in the church.

The couple was returning from a Bible study course in Portales. They were riding in the front seat and were accompanied by three other persons who were riding in the rear seat.

One of the persons in the rear seat was critically injured. The other two were less seriously hurt.

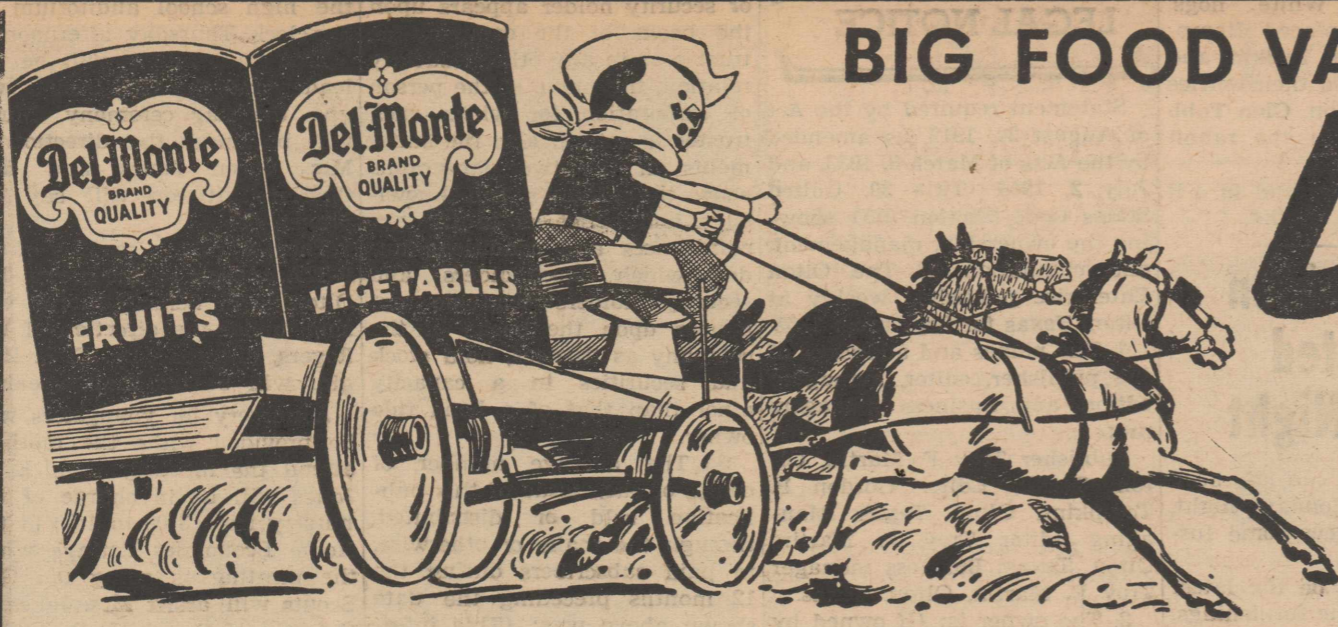

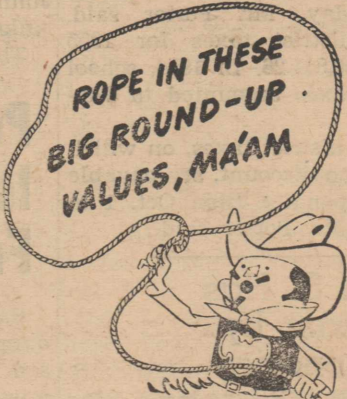

## CITY PROPERTY TAX ROLL SHOWS \$231,000 INCREASE

Olton's 1955 city property tax valuation, announced this week by City Secretary Carroll Moss, shows an increase of \$231,502.

The 1955 city tax valuation total is \$1,571,187, as compared with last year's valuation of \$1,339,685.

City tax notices, based on a \$1.50 assessment per \$100 valuation, will go out this week-end, Mr. Moss said. Total of 1955 city taxes is \$23,567.99, which is an increase of almost \$3,500 from the 1954 city tax total of \$20,069.09.

City taxes, on which there is no discount, will be payable without penalty from Oct. 1 to July 1, Mr. Moss explained. Taxes become delinquent after July 1.

The city realized about 80 per cent collection on its 1954 tax roll, Mr. Moss said. Delinquent 1954 city taxes total \$2,224.52.

Property tax valuation for the Olton Independent School District, announced this week by School Tax Assessor-Collector E. E. Porter also shows a sizeable boost. The 1955 valuation is \$6,952,281, as compared with the 1954 valuation of \$6,824,103.

School district tax notices, based on a \$1.45 assessment per \$100 valuation, will be mailed this Friday, Mr. Porter said. School district taxes for 1955 total \$100,811.26. In 1954, school district taxes amounted to \$98,954.36.

School district taxes, on which there is no discount, are payable without penalty from Oct. 1 to Jan. 31, Mr. Porter said.

The Olton Mustangs scored twice in every quarter here last Friday night to romp to a surprisingly easy 52-6 win over the luckless Slaton Tigers of District 5-AA.

Olton notched its first tally midway in the first quarter when Jackie Gray took a pitch-out from Teddy Estes and swept 15 yards around right end to score. Bobby Johnson converted.

Three plays later, Slaton quarterback Wendall Akin fumbled and Don Powell pounced on the loose ball to give the Mustangs possession at the Tiger 24. Wally Stewart, on the second Mustang play from scrimmage, scampered 24 yards on a reverse to tally the second Mustang touchdown. Johnson again converted to put the locals out front, 14-0.

**Gray Gallops**

Gray climaxed a 35-yard scoring drive early in the second period on a 7-yard bolt over right tackle. A good block by Estes helped clear the path. Johnson's attempted conversion was low.

Late in the second quarter, Coach Homer Tompkins' Tigers gambled and lost on a fourth down try for first down yardage to give Olton possession at the Bengal 30. Then Gray looped a long pass to Stewart, who gathered it in at the 7 and outmaneuvered two Tiger defenders to the goal line.

Johnson converted to give Olton a comfortable 27-0 halftime margin.

**84-Yard Scamper**

The Mustangs widened their gap to 34-0 on the first play from scrimmage in the second half. The score came when Estes faked a handoff, shot through a gaping hole at left guard, and rambled 84 yards for the fifth Olton score. Johnson converted.

Slaton's touchdown came midway in the third quarter when Fullback Roland German piled over from one yard out to cap a 62-yard Bengal drive. It was the only time during the entire game that the Tigers managed, any sort of impressive offensive drive.

**Stewart Scores**

Five plays after the ensuing kickoff, the Mustangs scored again when Gray pegged a perfect 42-yard pass to Stewart. Running shoulder to shoulder with Powell, Stewart took the flip at the Bengal 10 and Powell effectively discouraged Bengal pursuers as Stewart scampered the remaining yards to the goal line.

About three minutes later, the

Mustang offense again found itself in scoring position when James Carson recovered a Tiger fumble at the Slaton 25. Four plays later, Quarterback James Ray Hyatt lobbed a short pass to Powell in the right flat and Powell scooted 20 yards to score.

**Final Tally**

Coach Joe Turner's aggregation notched the final tally with three minutes remaining in the game. The score came when Estes shook loose from three would-be tacklers to score from 14 yards out to make it 52-6.

In addition to their eight touchdowns that went on the scoreboard, the Mustangs had two tallies called back because of rules infractions. The first was an 11-yard gallop by Gray in the first quarter, and the other was a 31-yard scoring aerial from Gray to Jack Royce Straw.

It was a team victory for the Mustangs, whose 52-point scoring total overshadowed any score racked up by the 1954 Mustang club.

**Better Blocking**

Sharper offensive blocking by the Mustang forward wall played a big part in the lopsided victory. Well-timed blocks time and again cleared the way for long gains by the fleet Olton backs.

The Mustang defensive unit turned in a stout performance, limiting the Tiger ground game and again cleared the way for only one pass completion, for 14 yards.

It was a team victory, with every boy on the Mustang squad contributing enthusiastically to the impressive victory. The win left little doubt in the mind of the approximately 1,200 spectators that Coach Turner's club will be a definite contender for District 2-AA honors.

**LEGAL NOTICE**

**ORDINANCE NO. 86**

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING ITINERANT VENDORS AND PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF A LICENSE AND PRESCRIBING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF OLTON:

**Section 1.**

(a) The term "Itinerant Vendor" as used in this ordinance means and includes and shall be construed to mean and include any person, firm or corporation as well as his, their or its agent and employees who in the City of Olton engage in the transient or temporary business of selling, exhibiting, or offering for sale any goods, wares, merchandise, or other personal property, or exhibiting the same for the purpose of taking orders for the sale thereof; and who, for the purpose of carrying on such transient or temporary business either hires, rents, leases or occupies any room or space in any building, structure or other enclosure, or any space in, upon, through, or from which any goods, wares, merchandise, or other personal property may be sold, offered or exhibited for sale, or exhibited for the purpose of taking orders for the sale thereof.

(b) The words "Temporary Business" as used in this ordinance means and shall be construed to mean any such business, as described in the preceding paragraph, transacted or conducted in the City of Olton, in, upon, through, or from, any private premises, or from

any private premises or space upon any private property for which no definite arrangements have been made for a period of at least six months next succeeding the date when the business is begun.

(c) "Transient Business" as used in this ordinance means and shall be construed as meaning any such business, as described in paragraph (a) above, of any itinerant vendor as may be operated or conducted by any person, firm or corporation, or his, their or its agents or employees, who resides or is domiciled away from the City of Olton or has a fixed place of business or business headquarters outside of the City of Olton, or who moves stock of goods, wares, merchandise or other personal property or samples thereof into the City of Olton with the purpose or intention of removing the same or the unsold portion thereof from the City of Olton before the expiration of six months.

(d) "Goods, wares, merchandise, and other personal property" as used in this ordinance, means, and shall be construed to mean, any property or thing of value kept and offered for sale by any merchant or merchants doing business in the City of Olton.

**Section 2.**

It shall be unlawful hereafter for any itinerant vendor or any person as agent, employee, or servant of any itinerant vendor to sell, offer to sell, or offer or exhibit for the purpose of taking orders for sale thereof, any goods, wares, merchandise, or other personal property, in the City of Olton, without first having obtained an unexpired license permit as herein provided. The Tax Collector of the City of

Olton shall issue to any itinerant vendor applying therefore, who has complied with all the requirements of this ordinance a license permit authorizing such applicant, as an itinerant vendor, to sell, offer for sale, exhibit for sale, or exhibit for the purpose of taking orders for the sale in the City of Olton, goods, wares, merchandise or other personal property of the owner and holder of such permit. Provided, however, before the issuance of a permit, the applicant therefore shall:

(a) Make a written application for such permit, verified by affidavit as to truthfulness of its contents to the Tax Collector of the City of Olton at least five days prior to the beginning date of the sale contemplated or the exhibit to be held, such application to state the full name, address and location of the principal office and place of business of the applicant, and if a partnership, the application shall show the names, address and places of business of the several partners; and, if a corporation, the names of its officers and their addresses; and the application shall state the character of goods, wares, merchandise, or other personal property to be sold, offered for sale, exhibited, or exhibited for the purpose of taking orders for the sale in the City of Olton; and, in cases where the business is not to be conducted by the applicant in person, the names and legal relationship of the person who will be in charge of the business shall be stated in the application.

(b) If the applicant shall be a corporation, it shall file with the Tax Collector a copy of its charter, and if not incorporated under the laws of Texas, it shall file a copy of its permit to do business in Texas.

(c) Each applicant shall file with the Tax Collector a solvent bond in the sum of \$2,000.00, with two or more good and sufficient sureties, payable to the Mayor of the City of Olton and his successors in office, for the benefit of any person or persons legally entitled to recover thereon, and conditioned that the parties to said bond, as principle and sureties, shall pay all damages to any person or persons arising from or growing out of the fraudulent or illegal or wrongful act of such itinerant vendor in the conduct of such business in the City of Olton. Such bond shall provide that any person for whose benefit the bond is given may sue thereon in his own right without joining the Mayor, the Commission thereof or the City of Olton; and successive recoveries may be had upon said bond to the full extent therein named

and above provided, and such bond shall remain in full force and effect during the time and term for which the license permit is issued.

(d) For each of such license permits issued by the Tax Collector of the City of Olton there shall be paid to such Tax Collector the sum of \$100.00 as part compensation for the issuance of a permit and enforcing the provisions of this ordinance, the proceeds received from the issuance of all license permits to be credited to the General Fund of the City.

**Section 3.**

No license permit issued under this ordinance shall be assignable or transferable, and any itinerant vendor selling, transferring or assigning any goods, wares, merchandise or other personal property to any other person or persons for the purpose of re-sale in the City of Olton shall be subject to the penalties herein provided, unless the person or persons purchasing such goods, wares, merchandise, or other personal property to be sold, offered for sale, exhibited, or exhibited for the purpose of taking orders for the sale in the City of Olton, or to whom the same can be validly applied.

**Section 4.**

Each itinerant vendor, as herein defined, having a license permit as herein required shall keep the same prominently displayed at his place of business.

**Section 5.**

The provisions of this ordinance shall not be held to be applicable to the following:

(a) Ordinary commercial travelers who sell or exhibit for sale goods, wares, merchandise, or other personal property to persons, firms and corporations engaged in the business of buying, selling and dealing in the same.

(b) Vendors of farm produce, poultry, milk products, stock or agricultural products in their natural state. "Agricultural Products" means, and shall be construed to mean, only such products as are planted, cultivated and harvested annually.

(c) Sales of goods, wares, merchandise and other personal property donated by the owners thereof, the proceeds of which are to be used and applied for charitable purposes, or for religious or philanthropic purposes.

**Section 6.**

Any person, firm or corporation who shall sell, offer for sale, or exhibit for the purpose of sale or for the purpose of taking orders for the sale of any goods, wares, merchandise or other personal property, from or by any truck, wagon, trailer, van, or other means of transportation, in the City of Olton, not excepted by Section (b) of Paragraph 5 hereof, while such truck, wagon, trailer or van by other means of transportation is capable of being moved on its own wheels, shall be construed and held to be an itinerant vendor under this ordinance; provided, however, that persons, firms, or corporations engaged in the wholesale business of selling, offering for sale, or exhibiting for the purpose of sale or taking orders for the sale of goods, wares and merchandise to retail or wholesale merchants shall not be subject to the penalties of this ordinance.

Section 7.

Any person who shall violate any provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in a sum not less than fifty dollars (\$50.00) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for each sale or each day's exhibit for the purpose of sale or each day of exhibition for the purpose of taking orders for sale in violation of the provisions hereof and each sale or each day's exhibit or offering for sale or taking orders for sale shall constitute a separate offense.

**Section 8.**

In the event any term, paragraph, sub-paragraph, section or part of this ordinance shall be judged invalid or unconstitutional as to any person or class of persons, this ordinance, nevertheless, shall be held and deemed in full force and effect and valid in all other respects as to all other persons or classes of persons falling within the provisions hereof and as to whom the same can be validly applied.

**Section 9.**

In the enactment hereof, the City Commission of the City of Olton does find and declare that there does not now exist adequate regulations and ordinances of such City, governing the sale, offering and exhibiting for sale, and exhibiting for the purpose of taking orders for sale, of goods, wares, merchandise and other personal property, by itinerant vendors as herein defined and that the unregulated conduct of such business enables unscrupulous persons to deceive and defraud inhabitants of the City of Olton under circumstances that leave such inhabitants without adequate remedy; and it further appearing that other evils and abuses exist in connection with said business, said business of itinerant vendors is hereby declared to be one affected by public interests, and the public policy of regulating such business is hereby declared and established; and further that it is necessary to protect the inhabitants of the City of Olton from further abuses by itinerant vendors creates an emergency and imperative public necessity that the rule requiring ordinances to be read and passed at two regular meetings of the Commission be suspended, and this ordinance, by the unanimous consent of the Commission, is hereby placed upon its first and second reading, and shall take effect and be in force and effect from and after its passage and publication as required by the Charter of the City of Olton.

**ORDINANCE NO. 85**

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE USE OF OPEN TOILETS WITHIN 150 FEET OF THE CITY'S SEWER MAIN AND REGULATING THEIR USE OTHERWISE, AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF OLTON:

SECTION I. Any person, firm or corporation who may own, or the lessee or in possession of premises located in the City of Olton using an open toilet, shall connect the same to the City's sewer main, if said main is 150 feet of said premises.

SECTION II. The City Commission finds that the use of open toilets within the city of Olton constitutes a nuisance and a health hazard to the inhabitants of the City of Olton and creates such a serious condition as to justify the regulation of their use.

SECTION III. Where open toilets on premises are located more than 150 feet from the City's Sewer mains, all owners or those in possession thereof of such premises, shall provide a trench or ditch at least four feet deep and two feet wide for each open toilet as a receptacle to catch all waste and a layer of slack lime shall be spread in said trench or ditch once each day while in use.

SECTION IV. Any person who shall be found guilty of the violation of any provision of this ordinance shall be fined not less than \$1.00 and not more than \$100.00.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

**ORDINANCE NO. 83, LOUD SPEAKERS**

AN ORDINANCE BY THE CITY OF OLTON PROHIBITING THE USE OF LOUD SPEAKERS OR ANY CONTRIVANCE FOR REPRODUCING SOUND WHEN OPERATED IN SUCH MANNER AS TO CONSTITUTE A NUISANCE AND PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF OLTON:

SECTION I. Any person who shall own, or have charge of any loud speaker or any machine, instrument or contrivance for reproducing sound, or anyone who shall own, be in possession of, or lessee of, any room, house, building or vehicle in which any business is transacted and in which any such loud speaker, machine, instrument, or contrivance for reproducing sound is situated, who shall operate or permit such instrument to be operated in such manner or with such volume as may be a nuisance, or as is calculated to disturb any person shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor.

SECTION II. Any person who may be found guilty of violating Section I of this ordinance shall be fined in any sum not less than \$1.00 and not more than \$100.00.

**Hart Camp Man Goes Uranium  
Prospecting In Colorado-Utah**

Prospecting for uranium is a hobby for Faye Moore of Hart Camp, who has made several claims in the Colorado and Utah area.

Mr. Moore of Hart Camp returned Wednesday afternoon from a uranium prospecting trip to Colorado and Utah.

Mr. and Mrs. R. S. Moore, his parents, accompanied him to Cortez, Colo., to visit Weldon Moore, their son and brother, where Weldon is temporarily making his home while prospecting and staking a few claims.

Faye and Weldon are partners in several claims, which they feel will eventually be profitable.

Although some of the area they covered is very rough terrain, Mr. Moore said they had surprisingly good gravel roads into most of the areas.

One of the sample rocks he brought back was a dinosaur bone. It showed traces of uranium. He also acquired several gem stones although they have not great value other than for

commercial use. Winter is setting-in in the Colorado-Utah area, and work on the claims will soon have to stop. The government is stock piling the ore rocks. There are quite a lot of people prospecting, yet in this vast area, one may work all day or several days at a time without seeing another person prospecting.

R. S. Moore, despite his age and failing health, accompanied his sons on some of their field trips as they were prospecting. Mr. Moore really thinks the Colorado peaches are wonderful and there is a bountiful crop of them in the valley at Cortez, Colo. Faye tells of cougars and deer in the area.

Also in this area are some deadly pools of water, which are contaminated with natural arsenic. The pools can easily be determined by the absence of deer and other animal footprints at the edge of the pool, whereas a clear, pure water stream or pool will have these signs around or nearby. The animals seem to have an instinct to sense the danger and smell the deadly poison, and they shy away from these pools.

Several experiences, not easily forgotten, happened and among them are these: Near Shiprock, N.M., as they were driving along on the high-

way, a small two motor plane made an emergency landing directly in front of their car. Mr. Moore decided the bar ditch might be the safest path of travel for a few minutes.

Another impressive place was the Wolf Creek Mountain Pass near Cortez, Colo. It is not only beautifully scenic; it is extremely dangerous, especially in the winter when the sharp horse-shoe curves are covered with snow and ice. At times it is entirely impassable because of the blizzards.

Interest in uranium is extremely high now, and the government is urging prospecting and staking of claims if there be any reason at all to believe it might be radio-active.

This is one hobby which might really pay off, and is a good experience for anyone who enjoys geology or nature. It is extremely interesting for a lot of men and quite a few are taking some spare time to investigate further into uranium activities, concluded Mr. Moore.
