CROP DUSTER KILLED IN CRASH HERE

Robert Van Wanning, 38 years old, Great Falls, Mont., was killed instantly last Thursday afternoon when his crop dusting plane crashed and burned.

The mishap occurred about 5 o'clock on the Dennis Hefflefinger place, about nine miles east and two north of Olton.

He had been defoliating cotton on the Troy Thomas place, near the Hefflefinger farm, Olton and Plainview fire trucks sped to the scene.

Gene Garvin was flying another plane on the same assignment and saw the crash.

He said Van Wanning's craft burst into flames as soon as it hit the ground. Garvin said the Van Wanning plane was carrying a full load of defoliant.

The plane stalled and then went into a spin, according to Garvin. Van Wanning was employed by a Plainview firm.

Farm Workers Arriving At Rapid Rate

Bracero farm workers are being processed through the Texas Producers Co-Op office here at a rate of approximately 90 per day, according to Tom Beard, local representative of the organization.

"We are slightly behind demand for Mexican National workers at this time, but it looks like there will be a sufficient supply of hands to meet farmer demands," Mr. Beard said Tuesday.

He estimates that there are approximately 500 braceros now working on farms in this area.

CLEANER FIRM IS BOUGHT BY HORACE CATES

Leroy Denton has sold Olton Cleaners and will move to his farm at Rupert, Idaho.

Buyer of the firm is Horace Cates, long-time Olton resident and businessman. Mr. Cates will take over operation of the establishment Nov. 1.

He said there will be no personnel changes. Mr. Denton will remain with Mr. Cates for some time.

Mr. Cates operated Olton's first steam cleaner in a shop which he opened back in 1926.

He came here to operate the cleaning plant in a barbershop-a tailor shop combination operated by his brother, the late S. L. Cates. He retired the old hand iron that had been in use and installed Olton's first steam press.

The shop was located on the west side of the old H. H. Ogletree garage at the present site of Kelley's Men's Shop.

Mr. Cates has operated various businesses here, including a grocery. He operated a tourist court in Pagosa Springs, Colo., until 1952 when he returned to Olton to open White Auto Store. He sold out that business to M. T. James in January of this year.

Cotton Harvest Gains Momentum; Ginners Report Grade Improvement

The tempo of Olton's cotton harvest has more than quadrupled in the past week. But ginners say it will be the end of the month before the harvest is underway on a full-scale basis.

A Thursday morning check of Olton gins showed that 1,549 bales of cotton have been processed to date. At this time last week, only 382 bales had been ginned.

Most encouraging note, ginners say, is that grades are picking up. Most of the cotton being ginned, a week ago was classed as strict low middling. This week, though, lots of "middling" cotton is being ginned.

City Official Emphasizes 'Brighter Side'

There is "cause for concern" over the City of Olton's financial position, an audit report showed this week. But there is also a bright side of the picture, a city official points out.

A comprehensive city audit report, covering the six months ended Sept. 30, has been completed by Franklin Armstrong, Plainview accountant.

In comments prefacing his report, Accountant Armstrong had this to say:

"Not Precarious"
"A review of the statements accompanying this report will reveal that the (city's) financial position, while not precarious, is cause for great concern, and its correction will require a more rigid economy policy than existed in prior years."

Several economy measures have already been placed in effect, City Commissioner Carroll Cox pointed out yesterday.

And Mr. Cox points to other factors that erase some of the gloom which surrounds the long and technical audit report. Among them are these:

Brighter Side
1. Olton's city property tax valuation showed a good gain this year, and promises to reflect an even larger boost in 1956. The 1955 city tax valuation total is \$1,571,187, as compared with last year's valuation of \$1,339,685.

2. The higher property tax valuation means more tax revenue for city operations. Last year, city taxes figured \$20,089.09. This year, that figure is up to \$23,567.99.

3. Olton's rapidly increasing population will mean a big increase in both tax revenues and water and sewer department revenues.

4. Hillcrest Addition, being developed at the western outskirts of Olton, is within the city limits as result of a recent incorporation action, and its development will mean sharply increased tax, water and sewer revenues in the city till.

Looking Forward
"All in all, things may not look so good on the ledger at this moment, but Olton's steady growth seems assured, and I am optimistic that city books will reflect a healthy financial position by the end of 1956." Commissioner Cox commented.

Mr. Armstrong's audit report covers the six-month period from April 1 to Sept. 30. The April 1 beginning balance was \$104,977.09. During the six months, the city had receipts totaling \$28,380.25. Biggest item in these receipts was \$16,531.49 realized from water and sewer revenues, the report shows.

City Disbursements
Disbursements by the city during the six months, the report explains, totaled \$30,407.51. Biggest of these items was \$36,580.54 planked out of the city treasury for construction work to modernize street, water and sewer systems necessary to a growing population.

Other big disbursement items included \$9,693.90 for salaries and wages, and \$7,357.76 for purchase of new city equipment.

At the close of the six-month period, the report shows, the beginning balance and receipts exceeded disbursements by \$53,140.03.

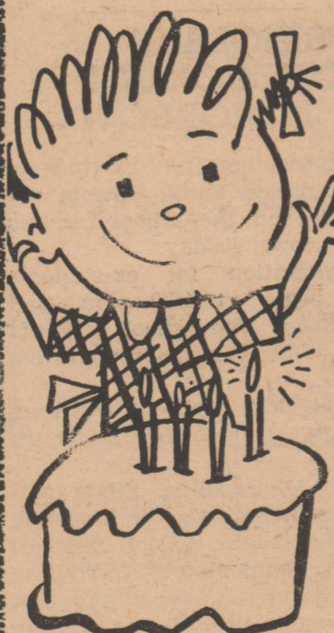

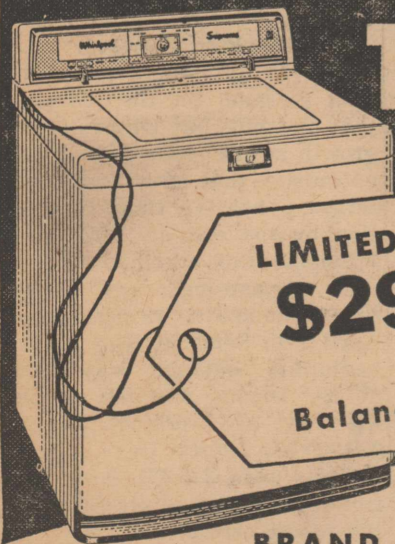

Both Janice and Clyde will be featured in the '56 yearbook. The Mustang. Janice is a junior and Clyde is a senior in Olton High School.

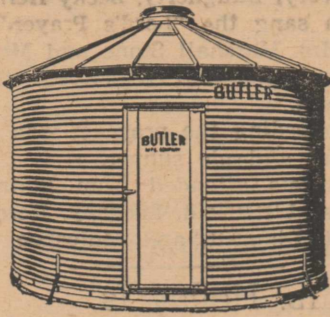

fiscal year on Oct. 1. Plans call for Mr. Armstrong to make a comprehensive audit report of city finances quarterly hereafter, and to discuss his findings in detail with city officials.

The city financial picture is clouded additionally by the fact that, beginning this fiscal year, the city will have to pay out \$3,855 per year more on bonded indebtedness than in the past, Mayor G. H. Bley has pointed out.

It is significant that the period covered by Mr. Armstrong's report reflects (1) lower-than-average receipts, because the bulk of city taxes are not paid during April-September, and (2) higher-than-average expenses because of the king-sized city improvement program which was started here during the period covered by the report.

The audit report is available for anyone's inspection at City Hall, Mayor Bley said.

Open Letter From Fire Chief

The city of Olton bought a new fire truck in 1953 for use in the city. In that time, the Olton volunteer Fire Department has answered any and all calls whether in city or country.

Some of the farmers have donated to the Fire Dept., others haven't. That doesn't matter. We are glad to be of service day or night.

At the present time the other truck that the city is not using is out of service. First, the pump won't work and second, we do not have enough hose to load this truck with 1,000 feet of hose which the state requires on a truck.

There is some who have come to me and asked why we don't buy a army surplus truck for use on country runs. In the first place, it is not the city's place to furnish a truck for the farmers! However, we do not hesitate to answer all calls that come to us. An army surplus truck would cost from \$900 to \$2500, depending to what kind of shape it is in.

How many farmers would be willing to give \$10 toward buying one of these trucks? If enough farmers would donate that amount, for this purpose, the Olton Volunteer Fire Dept. would take care of it and service it and keep it ready to run at all times.

Since January, the Fire Dept. has answered 20 alarms calling for a total of 9 hours and 15 minutes working at fires. Of this time, we have spent 4 hours and 5 minutes at four country fires. This means 16 fires in the city and 5 hours and 10 minutes of working time.

Any donations to this fund will be held in escrow at bank until a truck is bought. If the interest in this project is large enough, the fire dept. will make a drive to put it over.

This doesn't mean we will not make all calls to country fires. However, it will mean that we will have to call Plainview to standby for us until we return to town with our truck.

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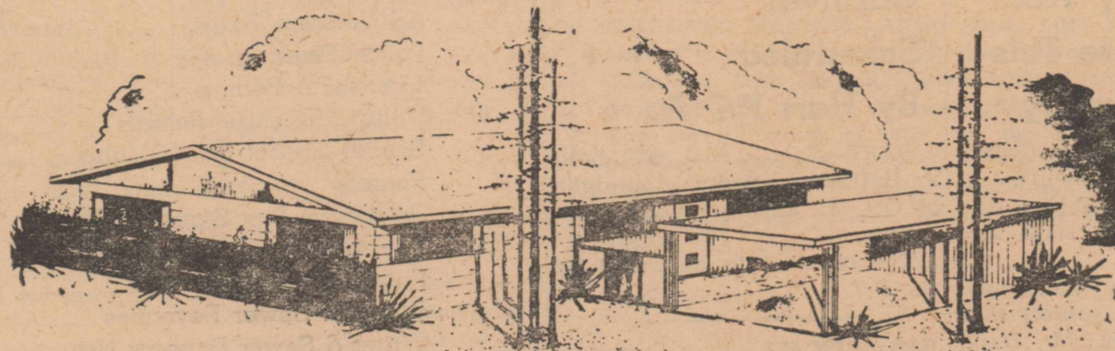

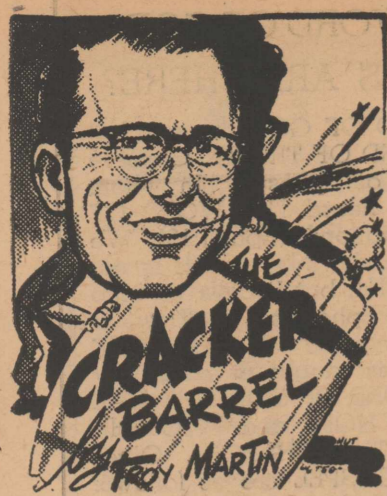

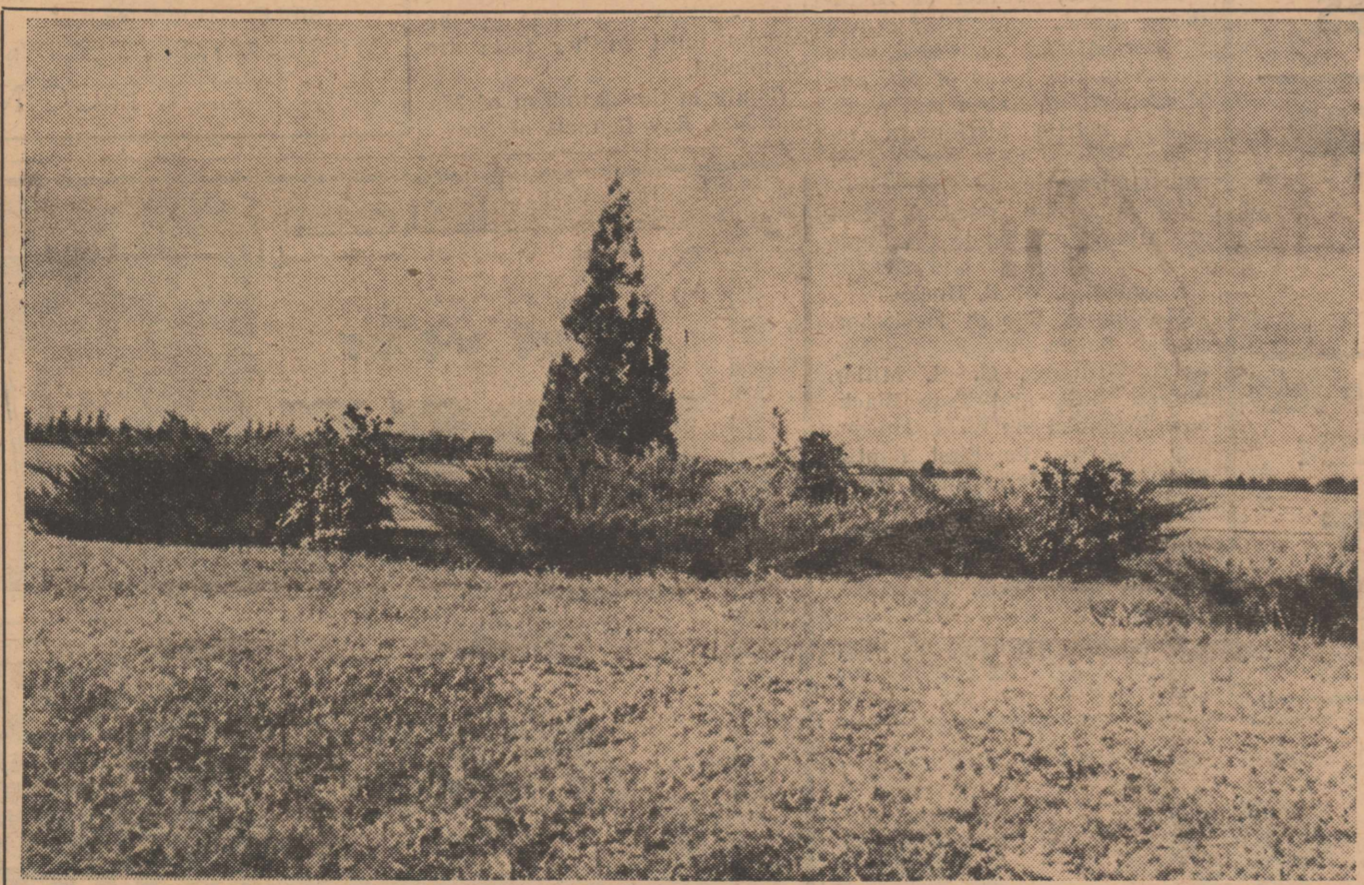

(I Pet. 4:17).

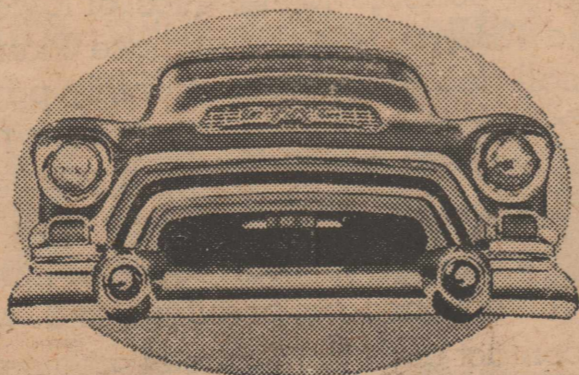

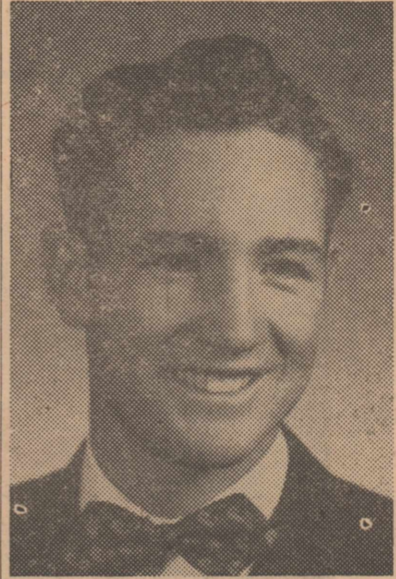

Supper will be served in Hart Legion Hall. Admission will be by ticket—\$1.75 for adults and 75 cents for children.

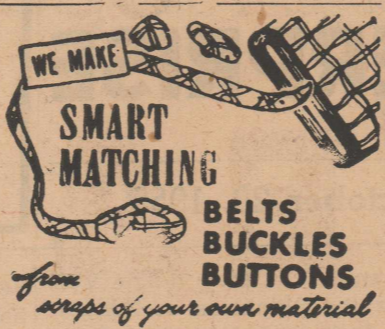

WANT A HOBBY THAT'S NO TROUBLE?—GET FISH

"Raising tropical fish is the most interesting hobby anyone can have and it's a hobby that's no trouble at all!" declared Mrs. Albert Walthall. Mr. and Mrs. Albert Walthall have a hobby of raising tropical fish. They have two aquariums, a 20 gallon and a six gallon.

"We got started last year," Mrs. Walthall said, "when I was sick. We only had 8 fish then. This year, we have raised and given away about 200 to 250 fish!"

The Walthall aquarium consists of 1 "Seven Spot"; 3 "Zeb-ras"; 1 "Angel Fish"; 1 "Pencil Fish"; 2 "Tetras"; 2 "Butterfly Tetras"; 1 Siamese Fighter; 1 "Neon"; "Black Mollies";

"Orange-Tail Mollie"; "Speckled or Silver Mollie"; "Fan-Tail Guppy"; "Golden Guppy"; "Silver-Tail Guppy"; "Scissor-Tail Guppy"; and "Veil-Tail Guppy."

"There are about 25 different varieties of tropical fish in our aquarium," Mrs. Walthall explained.

Have Scavenger Cats

"We have several 'Scavenger Cats,'" the Walthalls said. "They keep the bowl and plants clean." These cats not only clean the bowl, but the minute a fish dies, they eat him, Mrs. Walthall pointed out. For some unknown reason, the cats sleep during the day and clean all night. "But if there is going to be a change in the weather, like rain or snow," Mrs. Walthall remarked, "the cats will clean the bowl in the daytime."

The cats in the Walthall aquarium are "Black Catalina", "Polka-dot", "Polecat," and the "Lacastamos."

"Mystery" snails and "Red" snails are also used to keep the bowl clean. "The 'Red' snails are really pests," Mr. Walthall declared, "because they multiply so fast that they not only eat the waste, but eat the food up from the fish."

Fish Need Meat

"Tropical fish have to have meat—scraped beef or shrimp—once a week," Mrs. Walthall explained.

They only feed their fish lightly once a day. "A hungry fish is a healthy fish," Mrs. Walthall pointed out, "and an overfed fish can't live."

The tropical fish can go two or three days without food. "They tell us you can leave them for two weeks without food," the Walthalls exclaimed, "but we're a little afraid to try it!"

Mothers Eat Their Babies

Mothers of the tropical fish eat their babies, the Walthalls declared. "These fish are live bearers and if you don't get the mother out of the bowl after she's had her babies, she will eat them," Mrs. Walthall said.

It takes a few minutes over an hour for a mother tropical fish to have from 25 to 50 babies. "I put a 'Black Mollie' in a bowl by herself and watched her have 48 baby fish in a little over an hour," Mrs. Walthall remarked.

The life span of a fish is about

two years for most fish.

"Angel Fish," which is black and white striped, will fade out to a pure white if it gets mad or scared. "The Angel Fish was made that way to protect himself in the tropics," Mr. Walthall explained, because if a big fish got after him, he could be seen too easily with those black stripes!"

Aquariums Easy To Fix

To fix an aquarium, a person can buy a small one, about six gallons, and put several pounds of gravel in it. Next you should set your plants (oxygen plants) in the gravel and fill with water. "You should let the aquarium set for about a week, then add your fish," Mrs. Walthall said. "It'd cost a little to get started, but after you have them fixed, the tropical fish are about the cheapest hobby you can have," agreed the Walthalls.

"If you buy the correct kind of aquarium," remarked Mr. Walthall, "you should get one with an electric heater that keeps the water 70 to 75 degrees at all times." The water in an electric aquarium is never changed.

Are Interesting

"Tropical fish are so interest-

ing, we just love to watch them!" exclaimed Mrs. Walthall.

Mr. and Mrs. Walthall have given away several of the fish they have raised. "We won't sell them, because we have too much fun just raising them for a hobby," declared Mr. Walthall. The Walthalls explained that they have given fish to people as far as 300 miles away.

"We enjoy our fish so much, we look for new and unusual ones everytime we go anywhere," Mrs. Walthall said. "The more unusual they are, the better we like them!"

"If anyone is in the market for hobbies," exclaimed Mr. Walthall, "we'd suggest raising tropical fish! Very interesting... very!"

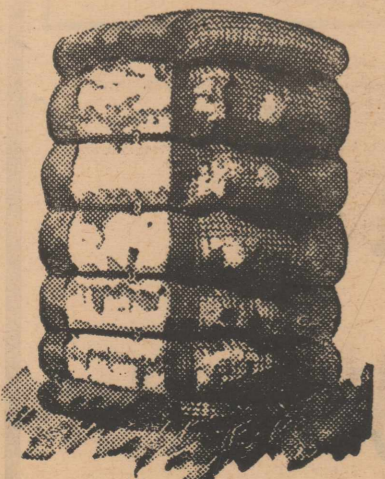

AROUND OUR

FARMS

By VERNON NIXON

After two weeks of perfect fall weather, activities around the farms are certainly humming. Every available combine has been put to work, and most of the Mexican hands are busy pulling bolls.

There has been much concern about the damaged maize crops. Much of the soft varieties have been damaged by sprouting in the head and being discolored by the long period of bad weather.

The damaged grain, being unable to go into the government loan, is being sold on the open market. Many fields were also harvested while still too green and damp to meet the moisture contents minimum requirements. This is either stored locally on the farms or sold outright. Most of this type grain is bringing from \$1.45 down.

Martins maize, the old standby for the Plains, is mostly going into the loan at \$1.53.

Cotton harvest is getting a very slow start. Only the "hot-spots" in the fields are being harvested now. Very little of the better cotton is opening up yet. There has been approximately 1,000 bales ginned thru this week in town. Grades coming back for the first pulled are generally low-middling-15/16 staple length and valued at from 28c to 31c per pound in the loan. The next to be pulled should be of better grades, barring further bad weather.

The fellows with the sesame crops have begun harvesting by bundling and shocking the plants. Production most generally looks to be good. The next step will be to thresh and sack after the stalks dry out in the shock. As always with something new which we know nothing about, we are quite anxious to see this crop completed and learn the outcome.

With the October cotton estimate up a million bales over last month, we need to be looking for something to take up the cotton acres which most certainly will be cut again next year.

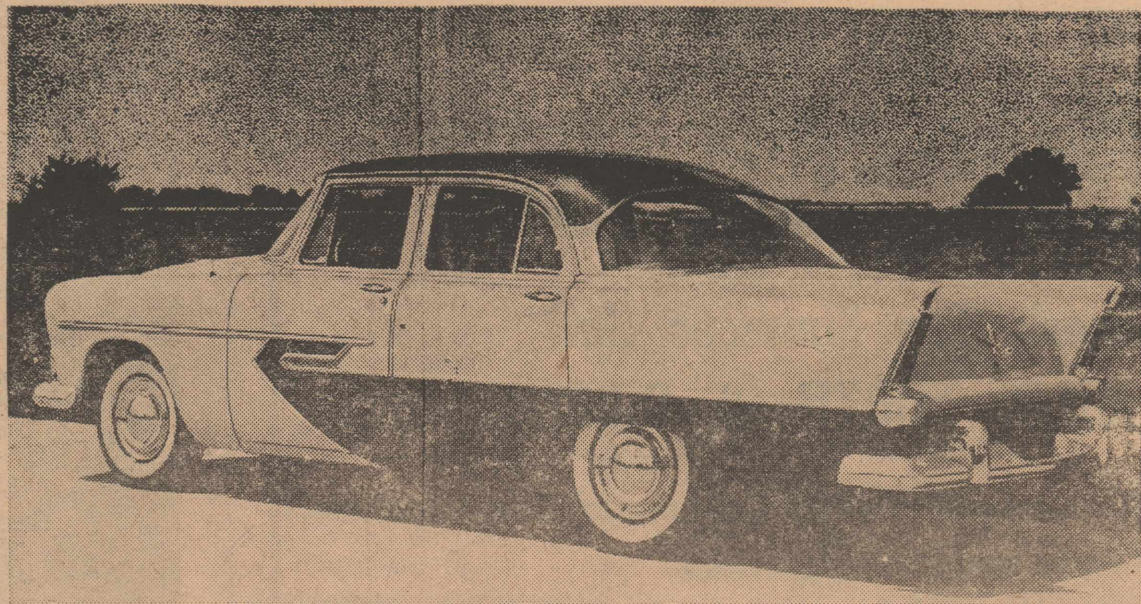
