# Mustang-Wildcat Clash Rated Toss-Up; Sellout Crowd Looms for Key Contest

## Sorry Folks

As Friday is Armistice Day and the rural routes will not be delivered, we were forced to publish a day early. For this reason a number of stories were left out this week in order to expedite production. They will be in the paper next week.

## Snow Hampers Cotton Harvest

Harvest of Olton's cotton crop was severely hampered by a howling snowstorm which swept in Monday afternoon. A Wednesday noon survey showed that Olton gins have processed a total of 8,642. That compares with the 6,235 bales reported a week ago.

Ginners say, however, that the snow, which approximated two inches, will not hurt cotton grades seriously "if farmers wait until the cotton dries out sufficiently to begin pulling again."

Most ginners expressed the opinion that full-scale pulling would get underway again sometime this Thursday, if good weather continued.

One ginner pointed out that the hard freeze which accompanied the snow may help to dry out green bolls.

Grades of cotton harvested prior to the storm are holding up good, with lots of middling and strict low middling cotton being processed. Most ginners expect grades to drop off to some extent soon because of the harvesting of unmaturing bolls.

Stripping machines will be pressed into use soon. Just how soon depends on the weather. Cotton men say that if fair weather continues, with plenty of sun and dry wind, the machines will be put to work in another 7-10 days.

At Ben F. Smith Grain Co., Mrs. Guy Watson says the grain sorghum harvest is "practically complete." As a whole, the quality of local grain sorghum this year was very good, she observed. "The very earliest grain was poor, but after the weather improved, the quality was excellent," she said.

## THRASHING OF SESAME CROPS UNDERWAY IN OLTON AREA

Olton farmers currently are thrashing sesame, one of the oldest crops known to man, yet one of the newest crops in this area.

The yields, according to Don Spain, are running from 700 to 1,200 pounds of seed per acre. The average cleanout has been approximately 14 per cent.

Present price, Spain says, is about 9 and 3/4c per pound on a cleaned basis.

"Chief difficulty in harvesting sesame," Spain commented, "seems to be in getting hands during the busy harvest season to help thresh."

The crop is harvested by cutting and binding with row broadcast binders, shocking the bundles in small shocks, allowing to dry out in the shock for two or three weeks, and then thrashing with conventional combines with minor modifications for sesame.

From three to six men are required in the actual thrashing operation. Most operators are thrashing from 6 to 10 acres per day, Spain observed.

Olton Farm Supply is receiving the crop locally and storing it in steel bins until it is shipped in bulk, by truck, to the cleaning plant near Paris, Texas.

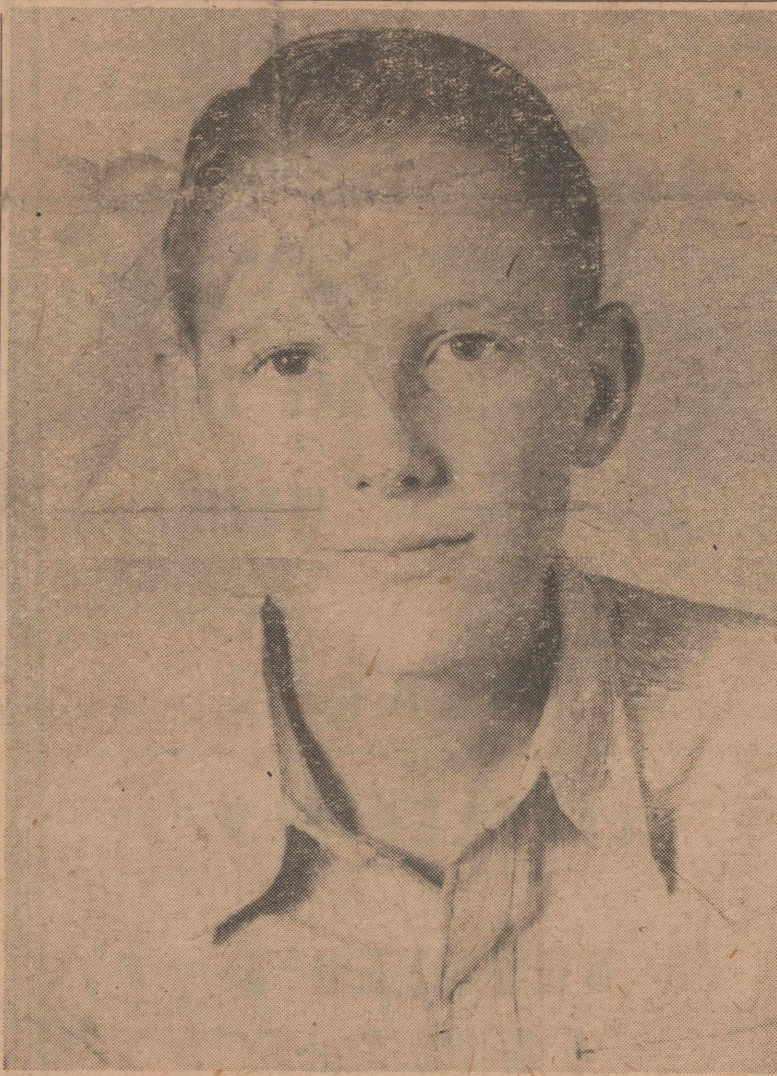

## District Title Hinges On Outcome; Business Firms To Close For Game

The Olton Mustangs go for all the blue chips when they tangle with the arch rival Littlefield Wildcats at 2 p. m. Friday in a crucial Armistice Day clash that is expected to attract more than 3,000 spectators to Olton Memorial Stadium.

For both clubs, it's "the game." Business firms of both cities have saluted the importance of the affair by voting to close during the game, outcome of which is generally rated a toss-up.

To the winner, almost certainly will go the coveted District 2-AA title and a berth in the schoolboy playoffs.

A Mustang victory would assure Coach Joe Turner's eleven the district title. If Littlefield should win—and if Lockney gets past Tulia tomorrow—then the Wildcats would still have to beat Lockney on Nov. 18 to nab the district crown.

Both clubs are 3-0 in district play. Both have been impressive in routing non-conference foes. Both have similar season records. Olton is 5-3. Littlefield is 4-4. Both clubs lost heavily from 1954, and both have had an uphill job of rebuilding this year.

### Wildcats Use T

There are differences, too. The Wildcats deploy from the T-formation, while the Mustangs run the majority of their plays from the single wing. Statistically, the record shows that the Wildcats are a better club offensively than are the Mustangs. Coach Gene Mayfield's aggregation has averaged 24.5 points per game over the season. The Mustangs, though, are not far behind, with 21.1 per game average.

Defensively, the Mustangs appear tougher. They have limited eight opponents to 51 points, a meager 6.4 per game average. Littlefield has given up 158 points over the 8-game stretch, or 19.8 points per game.

Both clubs are reported in fairly good physical shape. The Mustangs, of course, are without the services of quarterback Bobby Johnson, who suffered a broken leg in the Muleshoe game. Clyde Rhodes, who is hampered by a severe leg bruise, and John Jefferies, who missed the Lockney game because of a virus attack, will play against the Wildcats, but may not be at full strength.

### Doubtful Starter

A big question is whether Littlefield's Glen Richards will see action against Olton. Richards, a 210-pound senior tackle who won all-regional honors last year, broke two ribs in the Tulia

game. He and Paul Yarborough, 175-pound senior center, are the bulwarks of the Wildcat line.

The big gun in Littlefield's backfield, according to scouting reports, is Mike Greer, 150-pound junior right halfback. Greer, who has several times turned in a 10.1 100-yard dash, reportedly can outrun anyone on the Mustang team, and the Wildcats use his talents frequently on pincushion plays around ends.

### Shifted To Backfield

The other Wildcat halfback is Max Morris, 180-pound junior. Morris was a tackle last year, but was shifted to halfback to bolster Littlefield's offensive attack.

Coach Mayfield's eleven is quarterbacked by a freshman, 130-pound James Pressley. The youngster has been brilliant on occasion this year. Against Dimmitt, he completed 15 of 16 pass attempts to spark Littlefield to a narrow 35-33 win. His favorite target is Wayne Wicker, the Wildcats' talented senior right end.

John Klayton, 180-pound senior, is the Wildcat fullback. He and Morris provide the power on the frequent up-the-middle thrusts that Littlefield employs off the straight T, the split-T, and the winged T.

### Heavy Line

Littlefield has more weight, and more depth, than do the Mustangs. "From tackle to tackle, they'll be one of the heaviest clubs we have faced this year," Coach Turner told Quarterback Club members Monday night.

Turner is expected to use pretty much the same line-up against the Wildcats that he used against other district opponents.

Probable offensive starters will be Jarrell Edwards, left end; Jack Hysinger, left tackle; Roy LaDuke, left guard; Jerry Edmonson, center; Max Wozencraft, right guard; Edward Featherhill, right tackle; Donald Powell, right end; James Ray Hyatt, quarterback; Mike Gray, left halfback; Walter Stewart, right halfback; Teddy Estes, fullback.

## Mustangs Move Through Airlanes For 32-0 Conquest of Lockney

### Wolverines Fall Before Mighty Yannigans Of Sand Storm City

SPRINGLAKE—The Wolverines fell prey to a mighty Amarillo B team here Friday night.

The score was the Amarillo Yannigans 35, Springlake 13.

The Amarillo eleven was led by Richard Robinson, David Russell and Bayless Bennett.

Rex Loftis stood out for the home team.

The loss by the Wolverines was their first this season and it also wrote finish to the only unbeaten, untied Class A record in the Panhandle. The Wolverines had rolled to seven straight wins before running into the great Amarillo running attack.

Robinson, Russell and Bennett led the Yannigan ground attack as Amarillo chalked up 18 first downs and ground out a staggering 336 yards net rushing

The Yannigans attempted only four passes and completed one—that good for a conversion.

Meanwhile, the Yannigans' stout defense held Springlake at bay throughout the contest—allowing Coach Colie Huffman's charges to gain only six first downs and 159 yards net rushing. Like the Yannigans' attack, the Wolverines went strictly by land, attempting only one pass, that being batted away incomplete.

One of the most exciting plays of the contest occurred deep in the final period when the Wolverines' talented fullback, Rex Loftis, ran a kickoff 96 yards for a touchdown. A key block was thrown for the swift-footed Loftis on the Yannigans' 35 and from there Rex had a clear field

and went across standing up.

However, Robinson had scored three touchdowns, added two extra points and Russell had scored twice and passed one for conversion to offset Loftis' splendid run.

The Yannigans struck pay-dirt the first two times they had the ball and, aided by a safety, took a quick 15-0 lead in the first quarter.

Taking the opening kickoff, the Yannigans drove 77 yards with Robinson climaxing the march with a beautiful 22-yard romp around his own left end. Robinson converted to take a 7-0 lead.

Springlake took the next kickoff behind its own goalline and Ronald Sandel brought the ball back two yards. After three

plays, the Wolverines had moved the ball only eight yards and a punt situation was in order. However, the punter, Loftis, fumbled the ball in the end zone and was swarmed on when he tried to run it out. This gave Amarillo a 9-0 lead.

Taking the ball on their own 47-yard line on the kickoff, the Yannigans drove the necessary yardage in five plays, with Robinson again turning the corner for the touchdown—a 30-yard gallop over left guard. Robinson's conversion attempt was to the left.

Springlake got into the scoring column for the first time two plays deep into the second quarter when fleet-footed Donald Sandel circled his own left end for a 47-yard touchdown gallop. Keith Leonhart's conversion attempt was to the left. The Yannigans took the second-half kickoff and drove 58 yards for a touchdown in 11 plays with Robinson once again scoring by going the last five yards around his own right end. Robinson's

conversion attempt this time was blocked.

Amarillo drove down to the Springlake four-yard line the next time it had the ball but the Wolverines' defense suddenly became stubborn. Taking the ball on downs, the Wolverines could move only four yards in three tries and Loftis got off a bad punt, traveling only 12 yards and going out bonds on the Springlake 20.

From that point the Yannigans needed only three tries to punch across the tally, with Russell zipping into the end zone. Robinson took a pitchout and scored the extra point.

The Wolverines fumbled the first play from scrimmage after the kickoff, with the Yannigans recovering on Springlake's 17.

Russell took the ball all the way for a tally the first play, but it was called back and a five-yard penalty was stepped off against Amarillo for backfield in motion. However, three plays later, Russell took off up the middle on a quick-opener for the tally. Russell then passed to Bennett, who also was a thorn in the Wolverines' side all night, for the extra point.

Loftis' great touchdown run was the final scoring play of the night.

Aggressive defensive play and the aerial artistry of Jackie Gray paved the way for the Olton Mustangs Friday night as they pinned a convincing 32-0 defeat on the scrappy Lockney Longhorns, who went into the contest with an unblemished district record.

The win left Olton and Littlefield deadlocked for District 2-AA leadership with identical 3-0 district records and set the stage for this Friday's crucial Olton-Littlefield meeting.

Olton got a break early in the first period when Donald Powell burst thru the Lockney line to tip away an attempted Longhorn pitchout, and Jack Hysinger recovered at the Lockney 13. Four plays later, Gray flipped a six-yard pass to Donald Powell for the initial Mustang tally. Gray's conversion put Olton ahead, 7-0.

#### Thru The Airlanes

Two more passes—a 37-yarder from Gray to Wally Stewart and a 13-yard running pass from Stewart to Powell—set the stage for the next Olton tally at the Longhorn 13. Gray passed to Jarrell Edwards at the 2. David Price kept to the 1. Then Gray took a handoff from Price and piled over left guard to score. Gray's conversion attempt was no good.

Late in the first period, Teddy Estes broke through to deflect an attempted pitchout from the Longhorn quarterback Gene Handley to halfback Jerry Williams, and Estes recovered for Olton at the Lockney 9. Estes and Gray moved the ball to the 1 and Gray moved the ball to the 2 in three carries, and Gray piled into the left side to score on fourth down. Jack Royce Straw's conversion attempt was high enough but off to the left, and Olton was out front, 19-0.

#### All For Nothing

Four minutes deep in the second period, Estes broke through the Longhorn primary line of defense and scampered 65 yards to the Longhorn 8 before he was hauled down from behind. His run, longest of the night by either team, went for naught, however, because of a backfield in motion penalty called against the Mustangs. Less than a minute later, Max

Wozencraft intercepted a Lockney pass to give Olton possession at their own 40. On the first play from scrimmage, Gray fired to Powell at the Lockney 37, and Powell went the rest of the way untouched—with the aid of some timely blocking by Stewart—to put the Mustangs out front, 25-0.

That's the way it stood at halftime.

#### Tough Break

Early in the third quarter, with Olton facing third and 23 at the Lockney 48, Gray completed a pass to Powell at the Longhorn 23, and Powell wrestled away from Longhorn fullback K. Callaway to go the rest of the way. Another backfield in motion penalty, however, kept that tally from going into the books.

The Mustangs scored for keeps late in the same period. From Olton's 47, James Ray Hyatt pitched back to Stewart, who carried around left end, and with good blocking at the primary line of defense, put on a burst of speed to outdistance three Longhorn pursuers to the goalline. Gray flipped to Estes for the PAT that put Olton ahead 32-0.

#### Out With Virus

The Mustangs carved out the win without the services of John Jefferies, defensive right end, who was out with a virus attack. Clyde Rhodes, defensive right tackle, saw only limited service because of a severely bruised leg.

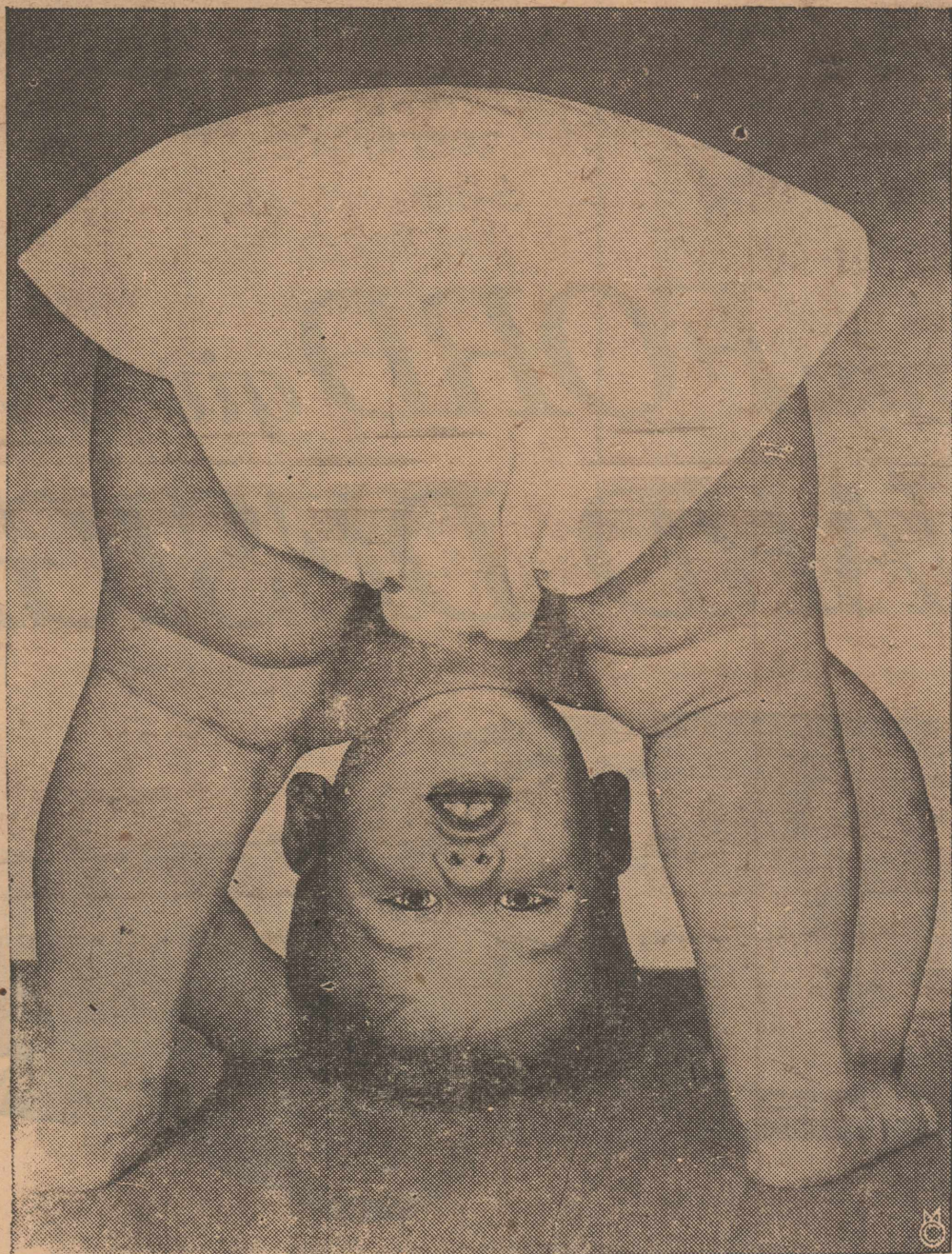

sents currently is engaged in constructing a community mausoleum at Abernathy.



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**SHORT GRASS**

Olton's Mustangs and Littlefield's Wildcats collide head-on here Friday afternoon to determine the District 2-AA championship, and the game is rated in most corners as pretty much of a toss-up affair.

That's not news, but if someone had told you before the season's start that Olton would be in the thick of contention for the district crown, chances are you would have been skeptical.

The Mustangs started the season with only one regular, Donald Powell, back from last year. Several boys slated for starting berths had nothing more than B string experience. Few people thought they would win as many as half their games. Even fewer entertained any real hope

of a district championship. Things looked pretty dismal.

Eight games down the line, though, things look different. The Mustangs have won 5 and lost 3. Their three losses were to highly-respected clubs: Abernathy, Dumas and Spur.

And the Mustang defensive record, despite those three losses, is the best of any AA club on the South Plains. The Olton defensive unit has allowed only 51 points to eight opponents, an average of 6.4 per game. Next best AA defensive record belongs to unbeaten Spur, whose opponents have managed 58 points in eight contests.

Folks who openly conceded the 2-AA championship to Littlefield at pre-season are optimistic about our chance to eat the Wildcats' lunch tomorrow afternoon.

All of which is this writer's roundabout way of saying that a tribute is due each of the Olton Mustangs, and Coaches Joe Turner, Jeff Smart and Jimmy Goss.

Win, lose or draw this Friday, the ball club has performed far beyond early expectations. It sorta warms you inside to get to know these kids have had to substitute spirit and determination for experience and know-how. You can find them in church on Sunday. You can find their names well up on the class recordbooks.

And you'll find them Friday afternoon doing their darndest to beat the sox off the pesky Littlefield Wildcats.

We believe they've got the stuff to do it, too. On a theory that whichever team is able to score as many as three touchdowns will take home the bacon we'll say Olton 19, Littlefield 13.

\*\*\*

How do Olton and Littlefield look on paper? Statistics are sometimes misleading, but they are far from meaningless. Littlefield is 4-4 for the season and 3-0 in district. Olton is 5-3 and 3-0.

Over the eight-game stretch, both clubs have met about the same class of opponents, with the Wildcats perhaps having met somewhat rougher clubs. Littlefield has scored 194 points, an average of 24.5 points per game, and they have managed to score in every game. The Mustangs have accumulated 169 points, or an average of 21.1 per game. In district play, the Wildcats also have an offensive edge, statistically speaking. They're averaging 37 points per game to Olton's 24.5.

Defensively, the Mustangs get the nod. For the season, Olton opponents have managed only 51 points, or 6.4 per game, and in district play, only Tulla has dented the Mustang goalline, so that district opponents have averaged 2.0 points per game.

Littlefield's defensive unit has been more liberal. Wildcat opponents for the season have tallied 158 points, or an average of 19.8 per game. District opponents have racked up 53 points, or an average of 17.7.

The situation is best summarized, perhaps, by pointing out that Olton has been held scoreless in three games (Abernathy, Dumas and Spur). Littlefield has scored at least once in every game.

But on the other side of the ledger, it's noted that Olton has blanked three opponents (Morton, Muleshoe and Lockney). Littlefield hasn't blanked anyone.

So, paperwise, that makes it look like Olton's defense against Littlefield's offense.

The best thing to do is throw all statistics in the nearest wastebasket and get out to the ball park Friday afternoon to see what promises to be one of the best games ever unfolded here.

In a very hard fought game at Littlefield Friday night the Olton Mustangs won what is considered the most important game of the year when they downed the Littlefield Wildcats, 21-6.

This was the fifth victory for the Mustangs and the second conference win.

One peculiar part of the game was the first downs and the yardage gained by the two

teams. Littlefield made 11 first downs to 6 for Olton, however, the Olton team gained 172 yards to 62 for Littlefield.

The Wildcats outplayed the Mustangs all the way in the first half of the game when they opened up with an aerial attack. Early in the first quarter, Capt. McKnight of Littlefield received a well placed pass from Hammons and trotted across the goal line to score.

Just before the end of the first half, Willard Hedges intercepted a pass and ran 35 yards for a touchdown. Lyon's place kick for the extra point was good. This left the score at the end of the first half, 7-6 in favor of Olton.

Perfect timing accounted for the second score. Willis Hedges cleared right end at top speed and when he crossed the goal line some eighty yards away he was the only one left in the race. Lyon again converted for the extra point.

The Mustangs made the last counter late in the fourth quarter with a series of line plunges and end runs. Huggins carried the ball across the goal line with a terrific line plunge. Again, for the third time, Lyon kicked the extra point.

Littlefield threw 33 passes. Ten of these passes were completed and 9 were intercepted by the Mustangs.

Captain Maxie McKnight of the Wildcats was the outstanding player of that team. He passed, punted, carried ball and received passes all over the field. He played a very nice game all the way.

It was predicted by the Littlefield fans that the Hedge twins, Willis and Willard Hedges could be stopped. Well, they still haven't been stopped.

To name Olton's heroes of the game would be to name all. Co-captains Huggins and Givens played super-ball. Miller, Smith and Daugherty, playing their first time against Littlefield, made a good showing. Daugherty did a good job of carrying the ball, tackling and intercepting passes. W. C. Sanders, slowed down by injuries, did well at center. Lyon at tackle, played a good defensive game and kicked placements for three points. The Hedges twins, due to be stopped made long runs.

The win over the Littlefield Wildcats practically clinched the District 5-A northern division title for the Mighty Mustangs. They have yet to play Sudan and Morton. Neither of these teams figures to give the Mustangs more than a good work out. Coach Gray of Morton stated after the Littlefield-Olton game, "We will give you boys a good workout."

Olton will play Morton there Friday afternoon at 2:30 in a conference game. Little is known about Morton. Olton will have a 20-pound weight advantage and should win.
