Begin Construction of Modern Plant For Consumers Oil on Highway 70

This bustling community is getting another new business building.

Construction got underway Monday on Highway 70 for a new building to house Consumers Oil Co., which as before will operate as a Shamrock wholesale and retail outlet, according to Marshall Campbell, manager.

Being built now are the warehouse and office, and an adjoining Shamrock service station will be built upon completion of the warehouse, Campbell said.

The Highway 70 site is across from the Hart highway intersection.

The warehouse will be 24 by 36 feet and will front east, Campbell said. The retail station will be situated on the corner, and will front both north and east. It will be a completely modern station with three islands and seven gasoline pumps.

The installation will include five 4,000-gallon gasoline and diesel storage tanks.

Construction is under the direction of Jack Straw.

The firm will handle Shamrock gasoline and diesel fuels, Amalie and DX oils, Shamrock greases and Wanda turbine oil and grease, gearhead oil, wheel bearing and water pump grease, barrel pumps and pressure grease guns.

Campbell said Monday that the warehouse facilities will be completed soon, and that construction of the service station will get underway "sometime this month."

School Has Advanced In Recent Months

One of the greatest physical advancements in Olton School System, of course, is the new school plant which was dedicated last September.

The new building consists of 10 class rooms, band hall, auditorium and vocational agriculture shop.

Also through public support, a new stadium is to be built. The football field will have a shower room and public rest rooms. Contract for the stadium has been let and construction should get underway by June 1.

The other building at the football field still is in formative stages.

Olton school patrons also are proud of the new homemaking cottage which was built for a two-teacher homemaking department should the need ever arise.

In scholastics the school has added several new courses during the past two years. They include safety education, drivers training, speech, physics and vocational agriculture shop.

This year an extra agriculture teacher has been employed and enrollment in vocational agriculture is the highest in history. Homemaking enrollment has also increased.

The school requires the following subjects for graduation: mathematics, two years; social study, 2 years; and English four years. Journalism or speech may be substituted for the fourth year of English. Also required is two years of science.

The school has increased its faculty from 34 teachers in 1952 to 44 teachers at the present time. The Negro school faculty has increased from two to four teachers during the same period.

Death Strikes Twice In Hart Family Recently

Ill fortune struck the J. E. Thompsons of Hart for the third time in a row last week when Mr. Thompson's mother died suddenly in a Dimmitt hospital.

Mrs. E. A. Thompson, 61, was stricken early Saturday morning at her home and was rushed to the hospital where she died a short time later.

Mrs. Thompson's father, L. C. Riordan, 62, had died at Brownwood a little more than a week before.

February 11 fire destroyed a business building belonging to the Thompsons. It was located at Hico.

Mrs. E. A. Thompson had lived at Hart for four years. She moved there from Fort Worth. She was a native of San Angelo. In fact, her father, R. F. Tankersley, was the first white man to settle in Tom Green County. Mrs. Thompson's maiden name was Emma Tankersley.

She would have observed her 62nd birthday Tuesday and she and Mr. Thompson would have observed their 47th wedding anniversary Monday.

Funeral services were held Monday in Plainview First Methodist Church with Rev. R. O. Browder of Ropesville officiating. Graveside rites were conducted at San Angelo Monday afternoon. Burial was under direction of Lemons Funeral Home of Plainview.

Survivors include the husband, E. A. Thompson of Hart; a son, J. E. Thompson of Hart; a daughter, Mrs. Bob McClure of Carlisbad, NM; two grandchildren; and two brothers, Frank Tankersley of Globe, Ariz., and Francis Tankersley of Los Angeles, Cal.

Mr. Riordan had lived at Bangs. He was a stock farmer. Mr. Riordan was stricken with a cerebral hemorrhage and died at Brownwood.

Survivors include the daughter, Mrs. J. E. Thompson; a son, Jerre Riordan of Houston; and another daughter, Mrs. W. A. Davis of Monahans.

Funeral services and burial were at Bangs, Feb. 18.

SCHOLASTICS INCREASE 47 OVER 1954

An increase of 47 scholastics, or a total of 1,182, was shown in the 1955 census for Olton Independent School District as compared with 1954, it was announced Wednesday by E. A. Dodson, school tax collector.

Of the 1,182 scholastics, 1,077 are whites and 105 are Negro, Dodson said. This represents an increase of 26 whites and 21 Negro scholastics.

OLTON MAN'S FATHER DIES THURSDAY AM

A pioneer Hale County irrigation farmer is dead.

He was S. S. Daniel, 88 years old, father of Raiford Daniel of Olton and one of the first Hale County farmers to use underground water for irrigation.

Mr. Daniel died last Thursday morning in Andrews. He had been making his home with a son, Rev. N. S. Daniel.

Funeral services were held Friday afternoon at Plainview Methodist Church of which Mr. Daniel had been a member. Burial was in Plainview Cemetery under direction of Carter Funeral Home of Lockney.

Mr. Daniel was born in Alabama in 1867, just after the close of the Civil War. He came to Texas as a boy and the family settled near Waco.

As a young man he was engaged in the lumber business. He moved to Plainview about 1910 and settled on a farm 2 1/2 miles west of Plainview. It was there about 1915 that he dug one of the first irrigation wells in this part of the country. He irrigated 80 acres of alfalfa and was engaged in dairy farming.

Mr. Daniel also served the municipality of Plainview for eight years as city judge. His health failed about three years ago.

Survivors, other than Raiford and Rev. N. S. Daniel, include the widow, Mrs. Vern Daniel; another son, F. L. Daniel of Hereford; three daughters, Mrs. Lois Williamson of Long Beach, Calif., Mrs. Gladys Allen of Bakersfield, Calif., and Mrs. Maymie Clark of Floydada; 18 grandchildren and 5 great grandchildren.

Grandsons served as pallbearers.

School Trustee Election Slated For April 2

An election to name two Olton Independent School District trustees has been ordered for Saturday, April 2, it was announced yesterday by Carl Macon, supt. of schools.

V. Y. Jefferies and L. H. Neinst, both of whose terms are expiring, have announced for reelection. Neinst was appointed in August, 1954, to fill out the unexpired term of C. P. Montgomery, who was a representative from the original Hart Camp district. Neinst also is from Hart Camp.

Filing deadline is 5 p.m. Tuesday, March 22. Filing should be done at the school tax office.

Board members are elected for three-year terms. Board members whose terms do not expire this year include Eucl C. Jones, I. V. Fent, Owen E. Jones, G. T. Sides and Lauls Hair.

May Invite New Phone Company Here

Olton has turned thumbs down on the latest General Telephone Company rate increase request and the city commission this week was awaiting reaction from San Angelo.

"We cannot even consider such a rate increase," declared the commission in a joint letter to Jim King of the telephone company's revenue requirement department.

Meanwhile, telephone patrons here have been discussing the possibility of another phone system in Olton. Mayor Lefty Hollingsworth pointed out that the General Telephone Company of the Southwest does not have an exclusive franchise.

Governing bodies of several neighboring cities and towns now are served by General Telephone Company have been contacted. One spokesman said it is entirely possible that the united front movement may eventually embrace all Texas towns and cities served by General.

General Telephone Company asked for a rate increase from \$7.75 a month on business telephones to \$12.50 back in July. Company officials last month offered to settle for \$9.00 and then came back two weeks later with a demand for \$15.00 a month.

The company now is asking \$6.50 for one party residential service and \$5.25 on two party residential service. Two party business service would come at \$12.00 if the requested raise were granted.

The city commission offered a compromise proposal last month but it was rejected by the phone company.

Mr. King early this week said he does not know what line of action his company plans to take. He said he would be unable to comment upon that matter until he has talked with Mayor Hollingsworth here.

He said efforts to reach the mayor had been fruitless.

Another week of beautiful weather, excluding a few hours of blowing dust, has given the farmers an opportunity to get more of the late winter work done. Practically all breaking, both Disc and Moldboard, has been completed and much of the leveling work has been finished. Floating closely followed by listers seems to be the next method of operation in this game of farming. Some few have already listed and started irrigation but as a whole this work is limited. Unless double watering before planting is intended most fellows will wait until the last of March to irrigate beds. With the limited amount of moisture in the soil now, a heavy watering is expected this spring. Each year seems to present greater problems in when and how to water, what fertilizer to use if any, and what and when to plant. Several new fellows are getting their feet wet in experience in this crop. And it looks as tho this might be the year to venture out in some new fields. Planting will begin shortly for most of the spud growers. With the set price on small grains any new crop venture might be worth a try.

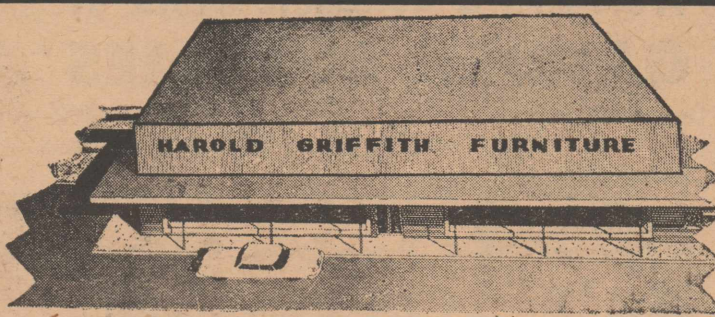

Alton Cure was the champion small fish fisherman. He caught sea bass two on a line on six occasions during the excursion.

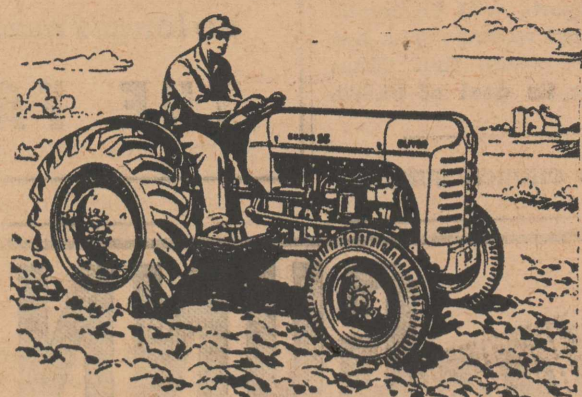

Full reports will be available in next week's paper, but indications were that Olton went over its goal of \$1,000.


