## Property Owners To Be Contacted On Curb and Gutter Project Here

Property owners along Olton's main street - from Highway 70 to 9th St. - will be contacted in the near future concerning their willingness to bear a proportionate part of the cost of putting curb and gutter on the main street, according to a decision reached at last Thursday's Chamber of Commerce meeting. Dr. Lynn Fite and Chamber President Basil Sherman were told on Tuesday of this week by Texas Highway Commission officials at Lubbock that the state is "ready to go" on 68-foot-wide paving of the main street if Olton property owners will bear the cost of the curb and gutter. Sherman said C. of C. members will have definite information on cost per running foot for curb and gutter before property owners along the main street spur are contacted.

Only the curb and gutter cost would be borne locally. Paving would be done at state expense, Sherman explained. He says the state already has drawn plans for the project, which awaits only local approval to finance the curb and gutter.

Other C. of C. business at last Thursday's meeting included presentation of a report on the local telephone situation by Mayor Lefty Hollingsworth.

## Boxing Tourney Scheduled Here

Only 16 entries have been received for the high school boxing tournament scheduled here Monday and Tuesday nights, March 14-15, and unless quite a few more entries come in, the tournament will be held Monday night only, Coach Joe Turner said this week.

Turner said Wednesday he is confident that there will be enough entries to assure a good card Monday night. Action will begin at 8 p. m. in the OHS gymnasium. Admission will be 50c and \$1.00.

At mid-week, entries had been received from Abernathy, Morton, Mulshoe and Olton, and Turner is hopeful that some Plainview boxers will enter prior to weigh-in time Monday (6 p. m.).

Anyone on the South Plains and Panhandle is eligible to enter if the boxer currently is enrolled in either high school or junior high school. All entries should be submitted to Coach Turner, and should include name, age, grade in school and weight.

If a sufficient number of entries is received, the tournament will be concluded Tuesday night. Otherwise, it will be a one-night affair on Monday.

## Final Services Held Wednesday For M. A. McCraw

Final rites honoring the memory of M. A. McCraw, who died Sunday evening in Olton Memorial Hospital, were held Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock in the First Baptist Church.

Mr. McCraw, 71 years old, had been in failing health for about a year. He was hospitalized five days before his death.

Services were conducted by the Baptist pastor, Rev. J. Henry Cox, assisted by Rev. R. H. Campbell, pastor of the Olton Methodist Church. Music was under direction of Duward Price.

M. A. McCraw was born May 23, 1883, in Hope, Ark. He came to Plainview from Celeste in 1905, and December 16, 1908, was married to Mary Bell Sheffer.

As a clerk for farm sales, Mr. McCraw was well known by farmers and neighbors. He made friends easily and was spoken well of wherever he went. T. D. Pearson, whom he had known in Celeste, was one of his closest friends here.

In 1941-42, Mr. McCraw was Plainview's city jailer under Sheriff Oat Martine. He had a used furniture store there for a short time, and in 1944-45 operated the same business in Olton. He retired in 1945, however, and moved back to Plainview. He and Mrs. McCraw returned to Olton last May.

Mr. McCraw was a member of the First Baptist Church.

Pallbearers for funeral services were C. T. Lokey, Doyle Pinson, T. D. Pearson, Olton; and L. D. Brown, W. C. Buntin and Harry Jackson, Plainview.

Burial was in the Plainview Cemetery under the direction of Lemons Funeral Home.

Mr. McCraw is survived by his wife; three daughters, Mrs. Frank Struve, Olton; Mrs. C. R. Jackson, San Antonio and Mrs. J. H. Arrant, Lubbock; two brothers, M. D. of Farmersville and B. M. of Greenville; three sisters, Mrs. Lucy Lynch, Ardmore, Okla.; Mrs. Fannie D. Turner, Farmersville and Mrs. Joe Perkins, Celeste; and four grandchildren.

## HART WILL HOLD SCHOOL VOTE APRIL 2

Hart voters will elect three school board members April 2 and decide whether Hart is to be an independent school district or remain under supervision of the county judge.

Up for re-election to the board are Howard Bridges, present board president; and Milton Sharp and Buster Aven. Deadline for filing for candidacy for the school board is March 22. Filing is with the county judge at Dimmit.

Voters also will elect a trustee at large. Roy Pyeatt is asking re-election.

Proponents of an independent school district at Hart declare that it would save the school district money as the school then would be responsible to the state only. At present business must be transacted through the county judge.

## Delegation Talks With New Phone Men

Olton probably will get a new telephone system if General Telephone Company of the Southwest persists in its bid for rates ranging from \$5.25 a month for two party residential service to \$15.00 for one party business lines.

This became apparent Monday as an Olton delegation conferred with the man who plans to install and operate systems here and at Abernathy.

Spokesman for the company which plans to install phones here said he and his associates already have conferred with attorneys and have found that an exclusive franchise cannot be granted in Texas.

The new company already is contemplating plans to go into several other towns now served by General, the spokesman declared.

Matador, Turkey and Quitaque — to name a few — will be contacted some time in the future.

The spokesman for the new company said the rates now being paid by telephone customers here would be ample to operate the new system.

He said he and his associates will either promote and finance the company here by sale of stock or operate a system installed by the city. Also discussed was the possibility of creating a communications district embracing the Olton territory and financing the project with a bond issue.

Olton city commission last week turned thumbs down on the latest telephone company proposal.

The commission earlier had offered a compromise proposal which would have granted a 10 percent rate increase across the board. The phone company offered a proposal which would have set one party business rates at \$9.00 and other rates proportionately.

Then the company rejected the city's compromise, withdrew their own proposal and made the new rate demands.

The city now has withdrawn its own compromise offer.

## Expert Stresses Great Importance, Low Cost of Mineral Supplements

Mineral supplements are great things in little packages, it was pointed out this week by Don Spain, co-owner of Olton Farm Supply.

The cost of adequate mineral supplement for dairy and beef cattle is less than \$3.00 per year per head and the cost for sheep and hogs is less than a fourth this amount, Spain said. Still there are thousands upon thousands of dollars lost yearly by producers of milk, wool, poultry and meat because of inadequate mineral feeding, he emphasized.

"Adequate amounts of mineral in your feeding rations are as important as proteins and vitamins. Wide-awake producers realize the importance of mineral and watch their rations and supplemental feedings very closely to insure their expected profits," Spain declared.

### A Problem Area

The Plains area is a definite problem area as far as natural mineral in feeds is concerned. Our soils are very low in phosphorus. Consequently, the crops grown from our soils are low in phosphate, unless the soil has had the proper amounts of phosphate supplied in the form of commercial fertilizer phosphate. For this reason, there are miner-

als especially developed for this area containing a high level of phosphate, Spain said.

Spain lists as follows functions of some of the essential mineral elements: Calcium, phosphorus and magnesium are important parts of bone and are especially necessary for bone growth in young animals (even before birth).

### Mineral Functions

Iron, cobalt and copper help to prevent anemia. Iodine regulates the speed at which the body uses energy (metabolic rate). Manganese is used in the prevention of perosis in poultry. All are essential for rapid growth and maintenance of good health.

A deficiency of any one essential mineral element, Spain pointed out, may have the following specific effects: pronounced slump in milk production; still-born calves; early deaths in lambs, pigs and calves; low disease resistance, poor gains in the feed lot. A deficiency of any one mineral in the ration hinders the utilization of the other nutrients, Spain said.

### Free Choice

Free choice of a complete mineral supplement is the best way to assure an adequate supply of mineral to every animal. Free

choice lets each animal balance its own mineral requirements.

Present day mineral mixtures are modifications of the more or less standard formula formerly recommended by many of the state experiment stations: bone meal 40%, limestone 40%, and salt 20%. This formula has been improved by adding trace minerals and by adjusting the phosphorus content to suit various types of rations, declared Spain.

### Cost Is Small

The granular mineral sup-

plements have been improved greatly in the past few years in that they are more highly palatable, and not so dusty, he said. The block minerals are hard enough to withstand normal weathering and soft enough for easy consumption. Special purpose minerals are now made for hogs, for cattle on range, for cattle in feed lots and for problem areas of mineral deficient soils.

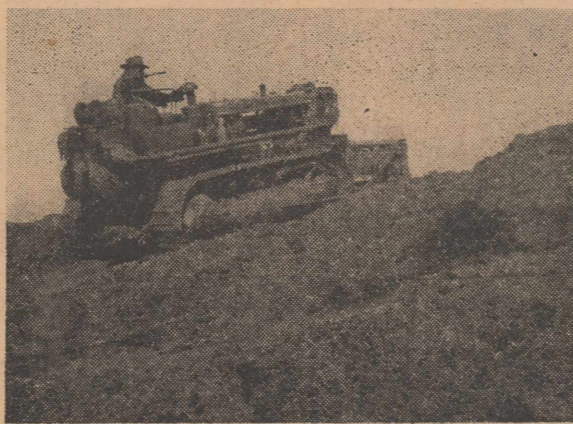
"The cost of the mineral used today is usually not more than 0.1% of the total feed bill, so we can say that great things often come in small packages," Spain concluded.

Other plans for the day include intramural games, fellowship period, fun program, tour of the campus, chapel program, special lunch, and faculty conferences.

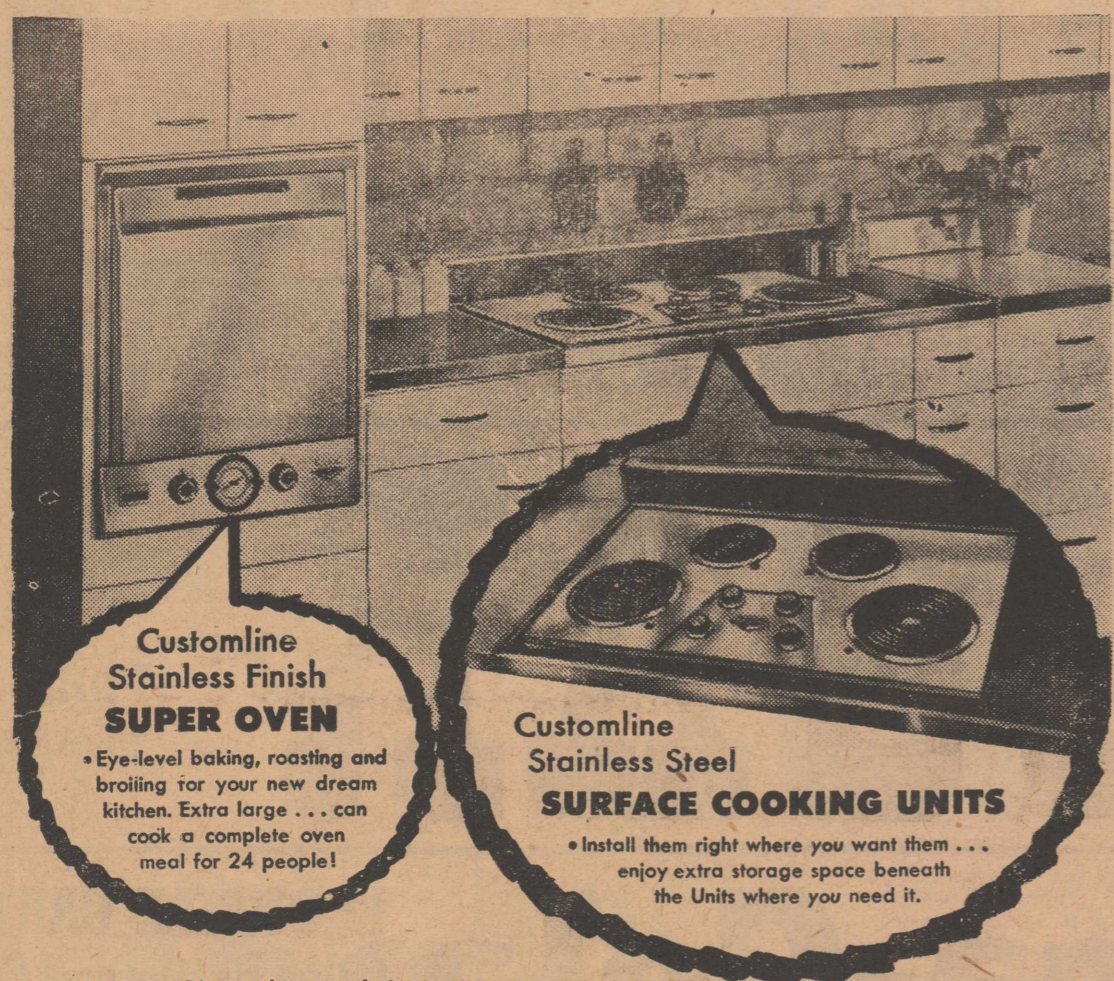

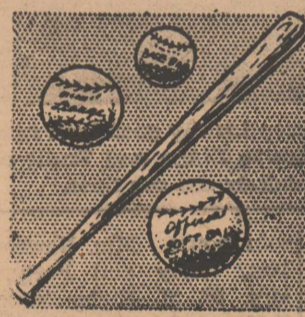
**ANOTHER MYSTERY**

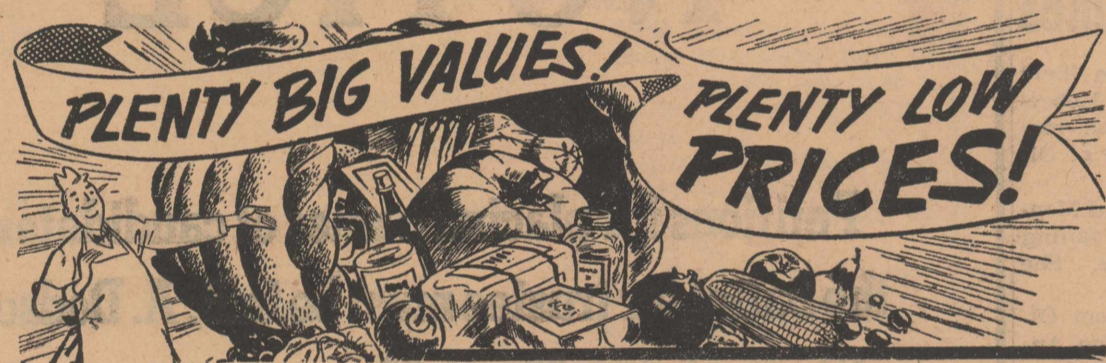

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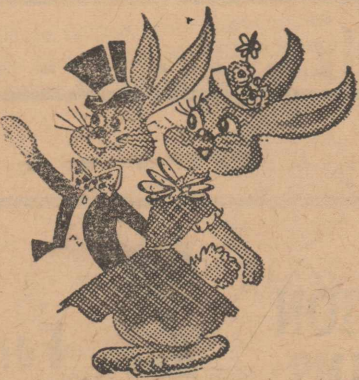

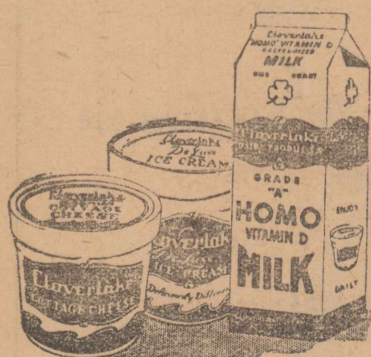
