Farmers To Hear Sesame Expert At Tuesday Night Meeting Here

Sesame, a new crop in which area farmers are expressing considerable interest, will be the subject of discussion at an open meeting to be held at 8 p.m. Tuesday, April 12, at Olton High School auditorium.

Chief speaker for the occasion will be R. L. Parker, manager of Texas Sesame Seed Growers at Paris, Texas. Also expected to be present are Dave Eaton, county agent for Lamb County, and Ollie Linder, county agent for Hale County.

Don Spdin, Olton Farm Supply co-owner who made arrangements for Parker's appearance here, says there will also be testimony from area farmers who have grown sesame.

Local Production

Bill Wilson produced about 800 pounds of sesame seed an acre and Weldon Craig produced about 1100 pounds per acre last year near Halfway, according to Spain.

Everyone interested in the possibility of growing sesame in this area is invited to attend. Colored motion pictures on sesame production and harvesting of sesame will be shown.

1954 Price

There is no guaranteed price on sesame seed, Spain said. Average price to growers in 1954 was 9.6 cents per pound, according to figures compiled by Texas Sesame Seed Growers.

Sesame requires a good seed bed, and is planted after cotton is planted, when all danger of cold weather is past. Planting rate varies from 3/4 to 1 1/2 pounds per acre, depending on location. Vegetable planter boxes mounted on standard planter frames are best for good planting results. Seed is planted from one to two inches deep, and best yields are realized from plants in the row one to four inches apart. The crop is cultivated much like cotton, usually no more than two or three times.

Concerning harvesting of the crop, sesame experts point out that sesame sheds its leaves... no chemicals are required. When leaves drop, it is cut with a row binder or grain binder and shocked in small shocks.

Bundles dry in the shock in 10 to 14 days, and the pods crack open at the tip. Seed is threshed by pulling a combine to shocks.

It is reported that sesame grows well in the entire cotton-producing south and southwest. It has a combination tap root and fibrous root system and is very drought tolerant.

Sesame matures in 90 to 100 days. The whole seed, the oil and the meal are top quality. There are no acreage controls on sesame.

Irrigation farmers can expect yields of 600 pounds to 1500 pounds per acre, depending on fertility, care and number of waterings. More than 2,000 pounds at Lubbock and over 3,000 pounds per acre in Arizona have been reported.

The canvass showed that 90 votes were cast altogether, including both the Olton and Hart Camp boxes. Incumbents L. H. Neinast received 79 votes and V. Y. Jefferies received 77. W. R. "Bob" Boone got 19 votes.

Thus Neinast and Jefferies are elected to serve three-year terms.

Neinast was appointed in August, 1954, to fill out the unexpired term of C. P. Montgomery, who was a representative from the original Hart Camp district.

Record Vote Cast By Olton Folks Tuesday

Led by Mayor candidate G. H. Bley, write-in office seekers made a clean sweep of all three city posts Tuesday as Olton voters trooped to the polls in an all-time record number.

Carrol Cox and D. Y. Ray won the two commissioner seats by narrow margins.

The city commission-elect immediately pledged support for "anything for the progress and good of the community."

Bley thwarted a fourth-term try by Incumbent Lefty Hollingsworth.

Election Judge Marshall Campbell said a total of 353 votes were cast.

Bley received 186 votes and Hollingsworth 154 in the mayorality race. Cox with 172 votes led the commissioners race and Ray was second with 167 votes. Incumbent Eldon Franks received 159 votes and Incumbent W. B. Smith 157.

Campbell said one ballot was thrown out because of mutilation and 12 ballots were unmarked.

Voting was spirited throughout the day. City officials said it was believed to be the biggest city vote on record here. Total number of votes cast were only 13 short of the total number of poll taxes paid here this year. Of course several overage persons who are exempt from paying poll tax and therefore not on the poll tax roll, cast votes in the election.

Mayor Hollingsworth said his successor and the new commission will take office at the first regular city commission which will be held the first week in May.

The city was on the verge of launching a \$111,000 improvement program. Hollingsworth said the money, which was voted in bonds back in January, is in the bank. He said the program will be temporarily halted in order to allow the new commission to proceed at its own discretion.

A scheduled meeting with General Telephone Company officials has been postponed.

Hollingsworth said no contracts for construction will be let by the present commission. The present commission opened bids on water and sewer construction only last week but did not award a contract.

Mayor-elect Bley said he would support extension of sewer and water facilities to the proposed housing addition at the western outskirts of Olton if it is certain that a sufficient number of homes will be constructed to justify such extensions. Commissioners-elect Ray and Cox concurred in this statement.

Election Judge Campbell announced the outcome of the balloting at 8:15 o'clock Tuesday night.

Other election officers were Vernon Nixon, Mrs. Fay Stone, Mrs. Billie Edwards and Mrs. Neva Prestridge.

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
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Teen Age Column

Members of the County Board of the Red Cross attended a meeting in Littlefield Friday night.

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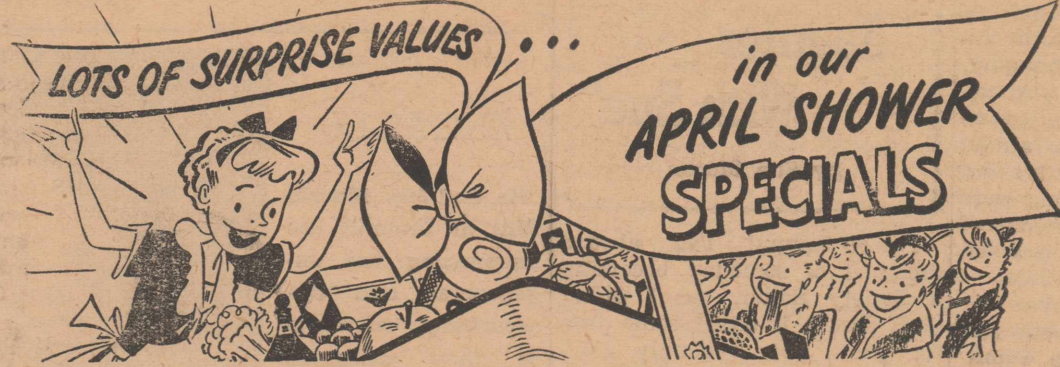
